# Why does the Brodhead School District Need a Referendum?

The Brodhead School District will present a facility (bond) referendum on Tuesday, April 2. If voters approve the facility (bond) referendum, it gives the Board the authority to proceed with the work outlined in the referendum question. The District is asking for \$17,485,000, to be repaid over a maximum of 21 years. The actual referendum asks the following:

"Shall the School District of Brodhead, Green and Rock Counties, Wisconsin be authorized to issue pursuant to Chapter 67 of the Wisconsin Statutes, general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$17,485,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of a school building and facility improvement project consisting of: construction of additions, renovations, including for secure entrances, window

replacements, bathroom upgrades, capital maintenance, building infrastructure and site improvements at Albrecht Elementary School and Brodhead Middle School; construction of an addition and renovations at Brodhead High School, including for a secure entrance and office; and acquisition of furnishings, fixtures and equipment?"

A facility (bond) referendum asks for voter approval to allow the School Board to borrow money to invest in large assets such as buildings and equipment and other higher cost items that cannot be paid for within an annual budget. Facility improvements almost always involve borrowing money over a certain length of time, which is what the Brodhead School District is seeking.

The Brodhead School Board listened to community feedback

## Airmail Beacons in Southern Wisconsin Fields

The Albany Historical Society will present Airmail Beacons in Southern Wisconsin Fields on Tuesday, March 19th at 7 p.m. Modern day navigation and our understanding of getting from point A to point B was influenced heavily by the U.S. Postal Service's beacon towers. Note that one beacon was located in western Decatur Township.

Airmail was a critical component to the development of American aviation in the 1920s and 30s but how, and why, did this affect rural towns and real people? This presentation will explore the role light beacons played in the advancement of airmail, airways, and navigation, shedding astonishing new light on aviation and USA history.

Presenter Michael John Jaeger is a volunteer docent and researcher at the Kelch Aviation Museum.



# Music In Our Schools—By The Numbers

Music in our schools begins as early as kindergarten, when students put on their holiday concerts at the elementary school level. Beginning in fifth grade, students may choose to participate in their first major ensemble, band. This year, 31 out of 68 fifth graders are playing a musical instrument. At the middle school level, we have 39 students in sixth grade band and 71 students in the combined seventh/eighth grade band. In addition, there are 42 middle school students who make up the sixth grade and the seventh/ eighth choirs. Out of 220 middle school students, 110 are instrumentalists and 42 are vocalists. With a high school enrollment of 324, the concert band and symphonic band consists of 110 instrumentalists. Combining both choirs, there are 43 vocalists. One thing that makes Brodhead schools unique is the large number of students who choose to participate in our music programs. Between the three buildings, we have a total of five bands and four choirs. These groups meet during the regular school day and include evening events, weekend concerts, and parade performanc-

There are extra curricular groups which tempt our musically inclined as well: the musical, middle school jazz, high school jazz, pep band, and show choir. Each February, our Brodhead music department hosts their own annual Solos and Ensembles Festival. Middle and high school students who have worked for weeks perfecting their pieces are able to perform in front of a judge who provides feedback. A select number of events spanning grade levels are then performed later in the evening during an Honors Recital. This year, there were 90 entries with 45 pieces advancing to the Honors Recital. While practices begin early in the academic year, our show choir begins their competitive season in January continuing through February. Show choir consists of both singers/dancers and instrumentalists.

When looking at numbers, we could say our student musicians make up the largest 'team' in the district. In fact, our high school musicians are able to earn a varsity letter, similar to any sport or other activity. As students accumulate points, they may receive additional awards each year. Summer camp opportunities are available on college campuses for middle and high school musicians. There are local scholarships, two sponsored by the Brodhead Music Boosters, awarded for those who have dedicated themselves to our school music programs over the years.







received through a community survey conducted in December of 2023 and is limiting the request to \$17,485,000, which will address the highest priority items. We will work closely with financial advisors to make fiscally responsible choices, secure the best interest rates, and borrow only what is needed to complete the work.

The Brodhead School District has a proud history of educational and co-curricular accomplishments, while managing the District within a framework of fiscal responsibility to the taxpayers. That focus has led to efficient operations and sensible upgrades to our school buildings in the past.

The last time the District asked the community for funding support via a facility (bond) referendum was close to 20 years ago when HVAC, facility, and classroom upgrades were completed at Albrecht Elementary School.

However, with significant use, the passage of time and changing needs in the District, a comprehensive assessment of our building and grounds became important to address the maintenance and educational needs of all our buildings. The comprehensive assessment identified important facility needs that require attention, and the Board determined now was the time to engage with our staff and community to define a plan to address those needs. Although Brodhead has dedicated funds on an annual basis to maintain school buildings, the cur-

rent priorities exceed our ability to address within annual budgets.

With a Middle School built in 1958, an Elementary School built in 1963, and a High School built in 1996, it is understandable that there are significant needs that we must attend to. Things like windows and electrical systems are inefficient, many rooms are outdated, entryways are not safe and secure, and certain programs have outgrown their spaces. Looking at our needs over the next 10 years, the costs for these updates amount to well over 35 million dollars.

Our School Board is tasked with producing a funding plan, which for Wisconsin school districts is a facility (bond) referendum. Most Districts in our area have run a facility (bond) referendum within the last 10 years, but Brodhead has not conducted a significant facility (bond) referendum since the Brodhead High School was built in 1996, which is why this amount has grown to the current level of need and cost.

Because of ongoing management of the District's finances by our Board, the District has reduced tax rates by over 24% over the last (10) ten years. The referendum being presented will allow the District to address key facility priorities in a fiscally responsible manner.

We will be conducting our third and final information night for residents to learn more about our needs and tour our schools. That meeting





# **Juda School District** going to referendum

On Wednesday, January 10, 2024, the Juda Board of Education voted unanimously to go to referendum. The Juda School District will be asking the voters to support the Juda School District with an operational referendum on April 2, 2024. The School District has experienced significant inflationary increases to its operating expenses over the past two years, which were primarily supported by Federal grants. Those grants are no longer available to the School District beginning with the 2024-25 budget. The School District's last operational referendum approved by voters was held November 6, 2018, which allows the School District to exceed the revenue limit by \$350,000 each year. However, the School District's revenue limit has declined for the past two years and reduced the District's operating revenue by approximately \$130,000 each year. The 2024 Referendum would provide funds for operating costs including, but not limited to, maintaining current staff, offering insurance for support staff, and to pay costs of capital projects including boilers, parking lot improvements, building maintenance, repairs and upgrades to the Career and Technical Education Service area.

The 2024 Referendum tax impact begins with including \$500,000 in the December 2024 tax bill and will remain in tax bills ("recurring"). December 2023 tax bills included taxes for one-time debt payments and community services in the amount of \$507,994. The \$507,994 of one-time taxes will not be included in the December 2024 tax bills when the \$500,000 from the 2024 Referendum taxes will be included. The December 2024 tax bills will reflect a simultaneous reduction in taxes of \$507,994 being replaced with the 2024 Referendum taxes of \$500,000, resulting in no increase to the tax levy, described as "tax levy neutral." The \$500,000 would be included in the school's funding formula once and remains in the formula.

This is the question that will be on the referendum ballot in April: Shall the School Board of the School District of Juda be authorized to exceed the revenue limit under Section 121.91 of the Wisconsin Statutes by an amount of \$500,000 beginning with the 2024-25 school year on a recurring basis for the purpose of paying the District operating costs including, but not limited to, maintaining current staff and offering insurance for support staff and costs of capital projects including boilers, parking lot improvements, building maintenance and repairs and upgrades to the Career and Technical Education services area as provided in the foregoing resolution?

If the 2024 Referendum does not pass, the School Board would have one more opportunity to go back to referendum in either August or November of 2024 with another operational referendum. No funding to maintain staff or to offer health insurance for support staff challenges the District's ability to retain and attract staff. Other options available to the District include prioritizing operating budget reductions, preventing or delaying facility maintenance projects or upgrades to the Career and Technical Education Services area and preventing or delaying the acquisition of equipment or vehicles. Reductions in fund balance to meet the District's operating needs could weaken the District's sound financial position.
