Brenda Beuschel, second grade teacher, and Cathy Pfeuti, Comptroller, are retiring this year and were thanked for their years of service. The possibility of not filling the second grade opening was discussed, but the board agreed they would like to maintain current elementary staffing levels as long as possible.

Mr. Novy, Mike Krupke and Al Schneider were appointed to canvass results after the upcoming spring school board election.

The first Facility Planning Committee went well and minutes were distributed.

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

National Honor Society and Wall of Fame

Bill Pfisterer, class of 1960, was chosen as this year's lifetime outstanding Brodhead High School Wall of Fame recipient. Bill has spent most of his career as an educator of Alaskan Indigenous People. Bill flew in from Fairbanks Alaska to receive this honor.

Bill and his late wife Linda moved to Alaska in 1968 where they raised their family and Bill taught in remote native Alaskan villages. In his travels along the Porcupine River, and the Yukon River to the upper reaches including the Black River. He met interesting people who told their recollections of their native lifestyle in their own language, Gwich'in Athabascan. Bill's recordings of

those visits were used in the Alaska Native Language Center at University of Alaska, where they were transcribed into printed Gwich'in, and translated into English, resulting in two books.

Bill was also a professor at the University of Alaska at Fairbanks for many years. He oversaw supervising native student teachers, and was instrumental in having them learn and teach in the outlying villages instead of students being brought in to boarding schools and returned to their village's a year later, which enabled them to remain immersed in their own cultural ways. Bill was married to Linda Westre and together they raised four children.

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

Pastor's Corner

In every church, on every continent, men and women come together regularly to open their hearts to God and one another. They're not pretending to have life figured out. In fact, because they don't, they make their gathering opportunities with one another a high priority.

When they come together as imperfect people worshipping a perfect God, somehow the uncertainty of life feels a bit more navigable. It might be because they surrendered a little control back to God. It might be because being a mess doesn't feel so lonely and alienating when

you hang out with others who are also willing to admit they're a mess. Or, maybe it's the realization that Jesus died and rose so that we would never be defined solely by our mess again.

There are many stories from people who experience the opposite of what I just described. They tell of judgment, condemnation, belittling, devaluing, and outright excommunication. Often, they say these are not isolated incidents with church folk, but ongoing patterns of misbehavior that caused deep wounds. Sometimes it starts with the pastor. Other times bad behavior may fester without the pastor's knowledge.

No matter the source, such behavior has resulted in the vast ma-

jority of people avoiding church today. I get it — we haven't been great ambassadors of the God we serve. If you feel like your life is a mess, the LAST place you want to be is in the midst of judgy people.

Still, it's worth the search to find your messy people who come together seeking a cleansing God. Where you find them, you will find a God who welcomes and loves you as you are, but created you for more. There you will find people who are living out that God-created purpose. You'll find direction, hope, and grace there. They will become your people, and we all need people.

This is the time to put down your phone, step away from the screens, and reconnect with people who

feeling just as messy and disconnected as you. They're waiting for you. So is God.

You can do this.

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
