City Council

New Police Body Camera System Approved

At the Council's March meeting, the purchase of a new Police Body Camera system was approved. The new cameras replace the current obsolete system and will facilitate sharing of video among police agencies. The new system will be paid for in part with grant money and funds from Safer Cities.

Subsequent to last month's discussion, it was decided to invite Appraiser Paul Musser to attend the City Council Meeting on Tuesday, April 18 to discuss questions about the property reevaluation process.

The Public Safety Committee was directed to contact Green County in regard to the current, informal Intergovernmental Agreement. There is concern that without a formal agreement, the city of Brodhead could assume liability should an issue occur with 911 coverage.

An update was provided by City Attorney Mark Schroeder, after his conversation with the Crosswinds subdivision developers, regarding the agreed upon sidewalks. The person he spoke with will talk to fellow shareholders about getting it done.

Questions were raised about paying a consultant to do what a new fire chief could do for the Fire District. Mayor Jones responded that the consultants fill a long-term need in advising how best to set up the Fire District for current and future needs and can provide direction in hiring a new fire chief.

In other business:

A vote on Ordinance 001-2023 amending the ordinance regarding Solid Waste and Recycling passed. Among other changes, it now refers to carts instead of bags and bins.

A conditional offer of employment was approved for a part-time Community Service Officer.

It was decided to approve the Mobile Home Park Permit for Cedar Crest, which is now under new ownership.

It was agreed upon to go with a new insurance carrier for the city providing the same coverage with additional benefits at a lower cost.





April 4, 2023 City of Brodhead Referendum

WHAT CHANGED THAT THE CITY NEEDS AN EXTRA \$400,000 **ANNUALLY?**

Besides the City getting farther and farther behind inflation for the past 10 years, the city's budget was also hit last year with additional costs of \$50,000 for garbage pick up and an increase of \$300,000 from the Fire District and EMS. These are costs that the city must pay. These were presented late in the fiscal year preventing us from going to referendum until this year. Last year, the city drew approximately \$300,000 from the fund balance to afford the shortfall of the taxes we could collect. We cannot as a city sustain this practice without moving the city into financial peril. We decided to leave it up to you, the voters, on whether we have to cut out a whole bunch of the services provided or fund them while we continue to look for solutions in alternate funding.

WHAT IS HAPPENING WITH THE BRODHEAD FIRE DISTRICT?

The City of Brodhead and the Brodhead Rural Fire Association are in the final stages of amending the Brodhead Fire District operating agreement. We are proud to say that the Brodhead Fire District will remain intact. The amendments to the agreement will result in the ability of the District to offer even better service than they have in the past.

WHAT IS THE CITY GOING TO DO WITH ALL THE EXTRA TAX MONEY THEY COLLECTED DUE TO THE ASSESSOR REVALUATION CALCULATION LAST YEAR?

No additional funds were collected. The taxes are split into different sub-sections and each subsection is calculated to determine each parcels share of the ax collected. The overall Levy did not go up, just the percentage of it that each parcel paid.

THE REFERENDUM QUESTION SAYS "EACH YEAR GOING FOWARD:". DOES THAT MEAN AN INCREASE OF 400K EVERY YEAR FOREVER AND

No! The state has us word it that way because the 400k is to be separate from the allowable increase. The allowable increase percentage is calculated every year using a complex formula from the WI Department of Revenue. It ranges from 0.75% all the way to 1.5%. An estimate of the 2024 through 2026 tax levy would be \$2,431,820,2,455,634 and \$2,479,931.

> IS THIS ALL A PLOT FROM THE CITY TO SAY THINGS PEOPLE LOVE LIKE THE POOL AND PARK AND REC IS GOING AWAY SO THEY CAN GET THE MONEY AND SPEND IT ON WHATEVER THEY WANT?

Not at all. The City Council is obligated to spend the \$400k in the areas and departments listed in the question. It all comes down to budgeting. The city has to pay for its needs (fire protection, trash pickup, electricity, fire hydrants) before its amenities (public pool, recreational sports, library)

BESIDES CUTTING THEIR BUDGET, WHAT IS THE CITY DOING TO SOLVE THE INFLATION PROBLEM?

City Council has joined with multiple Wisconsin municipalities to urge the governor and the state to fix the broken levy system. We signed a proclamation requesting the governor to do so. In addition, the different departments have applied for multiple grants. One such Grant was obtained to receive a deep dive Economic Development study in Brodhead to work with the UW and GCDC to see the best ways to proceed in Brodhead and to see what red tape we might have to discourage growth and fix it.

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Designating Corporal Benjamin H. Neal Memorial Highway

Rep. Anderson Joins Colleagues on Bill to Name Highway 11

Representative Clinton Anderson joined Senators Mark Spreitzer and Steve Nass, as well as Representatives Ellen Schutt, Jenna Jacobson, and James Edming on legislation to name the stretch of Highway 11 between Orfordville and Footville the Corporal Benjamin H. Neal Memorial Highway.

Corporal Neal of Orfordville died in Afghanistan on April 25, 2012, after being attacked by an improvised explosive device. He was a graduate of Parkview High School in 2009, and his military honors include: the Purple Heart, NATO Medal, the Bronze Star, the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Good Conduct Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal with Campaign Stars, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, the Army Service Ribbon, and the Overseas Service Ribbon. Corporal Neal was the first person from Orfordville to die in combat since World War 1 according to the American Legion.

"Corporal Benjamin Neal is an Orfordville hero, a Wisconsin hero, and a national hero," Rep. Anderson said. "I am proud to co-author this bill, and encourage my legislative colleagues to join with me in recognizing Corporal Neal's bravery and importance to the Orfordville community." This legislation is supported by the Wells-Davis-Young-Neal American Legion Post 209 in Orfordville and the Wisconsin American Legion.

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
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
