

If you are a Presbyterian, your religion was founded by John Knox in Scotland in the year 1560.

If you are a Baptist, you owe the tenents of your religion to John Smyth, who launched it in Amsterdam in 1606.

If you are a Protestant Episcopalian, your religion is an offshoot of the Church of England, founded by Samuel Seabury in the American colonies in the 17th century.

If you are a Methodist, your religion was founded by John and Charles Wesley in England in 1774.

If you are a Unitarian, Theopolis Lindley founded your church in London in 1774

in London in 1774. If you are a Mormon (Latter Day Saints), Joseph Smith started

your religion in Palmyra, New York in 1829. If you are of the Dutch Reformed Church, you recognize Michaelis Jones as founder, because he originated your religion in

New York in 1628.

If you worship with the Salvation Army, your sect began with William Booth in London in 1865.

If you are Christian Scientist, you look to 1879 as the year your religion was born and to Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy as its founder.

If you belong to one of the religious organizations known as "Church of the Nazarene," "Pentecostal Gospel," "Holiness Church" or "Jehovah's Witness," your religion is one of the hundreds of new sects founded by men within the past hundred years.

If you are an Orthodox Christian, your religion was founded in the year 33 by Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It has not changed since that time. Our Church is now 1,967 years old.

Pandemics happen, but the last major one was 100 years ago. This pandemic has been confusing, scary, stressful, tiring, and more. They will talk about some of our own struggles. Roger will talk about a bit of science, a bit of pandemic history and a bit of psychology. They will end by talking about how each person can plan better for their life, until this ends. (They will not debate protocols or politics regarding the pandemic.)

PROFILE: Noah's Ark Preschool and Childcare

Recent stressors on the economy, including the Covid-19 pandemic, have focused a spotlight on the need for quality childcare. But the issue of access to affordable, high-quality childcare isn't new. In fact, the need for more childcare in Monroe is what prompted Monroe United Methodist Church to start Noah's Ark Preschool and Childcare almost 25 years ago.

Noah's Ark began in 1998 and continues today as a mission of the church. It is a state-licensed group childcare center with a Christian-based curriculum. The center includes six rooms within the Monroe United Methodist Church building for the different age groups it serves: an infant room, one-year-old room, two-year-old room, three-year-old room, four-year-old room, and a school-age program with before- and after-school care during the school year and full- or part-day childcare available during the summer. The Monroe school district provides busing for school age and 4K students.

"Our mission is to connect children with God and one another," said Director Ruby Clark. "With the help and support of our church, the Noah's Ark staff and board have made a commitment to offer loving care and education in a Christian environment to the children of our community."

Noah's Ark offers a seamless progression through the center's agebased classrooms. "We strive to give children a positive first learning experience so they can continue to become life-long learners," she said.

"It is a privilege to be a part of the lives of the children and families we serve, and watch each child explore their world and reach milestones," Clark said. "It is rewarding to see the families grow through the years."

Early childhood education benefits children's social, emotional, mental and physical development, Clark said.

An example of this lasting, positive impact can be seen right at Noah's Ark. Clark points to a former Noah's Ark student who is now an elementary teacher in her own classroom. "She says she knew she wanted to be a teacher ever since was three years old because she had enjoyed her years at Noah's Ark so much."

With the tremendous impact that early childhood educators make, Clark advocates for changes in how her profession is viewed. "Our teachers need to be looked at as the professionals they are and be compensated with higher wages and health benefits for the incredible work they do," she said.

One way to help support childcare in the community is to extend school outreach programs to childcare centers, Clark suggested.

Supporting childcare and early childcare educators really means ensuring the entire community flourishes.

"Without childcare, businesses and the community would suffer," Clark explained. "We are interwoven and need to support each other to all thrive now and in the future."

Self-identification Required for Green County Fair Pigs

Green County fair swine exhibitors will be required to self-identify their pigs using the RFID tag method this year. Exhibitors will be required to tag their own pigs and do photo identification for each fair pig. There will be no cost for the Swine Photo Identification Kits. Exhibitors will also be given two RFID ear tags for each animal at no cost. Swine photo identification kits and ear tags will only be available for pickup at the Extension Green County Extension Office, 2841 6th Street, Monroe.

The photo identification kits and ear tags will be available for pick up starting Monday, March 21, 2022 and must be returned to the Extension Green County office by Thursday, April 14th. The kits cannot be mailed. Photos of each pig must be taken from one head view, clearly displaying the RFID ear tag in the pig's ear. Photos must be attached to the Green County Fair Swine Photo identification form and submitted to the Extension Green County office by 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 14th, 2022.

The Extension Green County office will loan out ear taggers for exhibitors to use for tagging their pigs. The taggers must be returned to the Extension office and will be sanitized before being given to another farm to prevent the spread of disease. 4-H Leaders and Agriculture instructors will be allowed to pick up ID kits for their members. However, they will be required to sign for all the kits they pick up at the Extension Green County Office. Each kit will include the photo identification forms and two RFID ear tags for each pig to be identified.

When picking up their pig identification kits exhibitors will be provided with instructions on the correct procedures for taking the photos and placing the RFID ear tags. Only pigs that are identified using the Green County ID kits will be eligible to exhibit at the 2022 Green County Fair.

All pigs, including both market gilts and market barrows need to be self-identified. Each exhibitor can identify a maximum of five pigs. Exhibitors will be allowed to bring a maximum of two total pigs to the fair. Pigs must weigh at least 225 pounds by the fair to exhibit and at least 235 to sell in the Green County fair livestock auction. The 2022 Green County show will continue to be a terminal show with all pigs going directly to a terminal market after the fair to eliminate the possible spread of any diseases.

Exhibitors will be allowed to sell either a gilt or barrow in the 2022 auction. They will need to turn in two signed buyer cards to the Extension Green County office by June 24th to be eligible to sell in the auction. The cards will be available on-line for printing after Monday, May 2nd. Hard copies of the buyer cards will also be available at the Extension Green County office.

Youth who exhibit swine will be required to complete YQCA training. If you have not already completed this training, directions on how to certify will be explained when the Swine Identifications are picked up at the Extension Green County office. Each individual Green County Swine Exhibitor MUST submit their YQCA Certificate number online when completing fair entries. Fair Entries CANNOT be completed without the Certificate number. Copies of the Certificate do not need to be submitted to the Extension Green County office.

Swine exhibitors will also be required to complete swine health verification forms that include any medical treatments that were administered to the project animal. These forms will be distributed to exhibitors when they pick up their ID kits and must also be turned in to the Extension Green County office by Friday, June 24th with the signed buyer cards. Brodhead Community Gardens to open in early May

Interested in growing your own food? Do you have limited or no space for a garden where you live? Would you like to have fresh beans in July, tomatoes in August and butternut squash for dinner in October? Then you are a candidate to join the Brodhead Community Gardens. There is an acre of land available behind Gasser True Value for community residents to have their own garden plot to grow what they wish. The spaces are approximately 20x25 or roughly 500 square feet. You may reserve up to two sections per family and you may keep your same plot year after year. Participants are asked to use limited amounts of fertilizer, use organic herbicides and insecticides and clean up their space by November 1. All vegetables are the property of the grower and gardens will be open from 6 a.m.-9 p.m. (daylight hours) during the summer months for planting, weeding and harvesting. If you have never had a garden before experienced gardeners will be available to help you get started. There will be water available on site.

Community Garden members who had plots from last year may sign up by sending a check to Dennis Singstock, 2725 S State Road 213, Orfordville, WI 53576. Please make your check out to the Brodhead Community Gardens. Please reserve your plots by Sunday, May 1. If you are planning NOT to garden this year and release your garden to someone else, please send a note to Dennis or call Tiff at 608-684-0012.

They will hold an in-person meeting on Saturday morning, April 23, at 9 a.m. at the Congregational United Church of Christ across from the gardens. The meeting is open to existing Community Garden members and those wishing to get a garden plot for the first time. Because of an expected increase in expenses this year they are charging \$20/plot. They will be making plans for the coming year and receiving payment and assigning plots.

Afterwards, weather permitting; they will have a short workday to install the two signs and other simple jobs. Compost will be available by mid-April if you want to apply it before the gardens are tilled. Tilling is based on temperature and ground conditions but is usually done by the first week in May. In 1999 the adjacent building at 119 North Water Street was offered for sale. Thru the generous donations from the membership and community the money was raised and the building was purchased.

The society took possession on September 1, 1999. This purchase expanded the museum to a total of three rooms on the main level and 1 room at the lower level.

The society continues to be supported by it's membership and community.

2022 brings the society thru two

years of Covid-19 shut-downs with no meetings or programs. The first general meeting with a program since February 2020 is scheduled for June 20, 2022.

The museum has been back open since June 2021 on Saturday mornings, 9 a.m. to noon (year round) or by appointment. There is no charge for admittance. New members are welcomed.

Set up times, booth pricing, and show hours are consistent for both vendor areas. Set up can either be done on Friday, September







Green County Sheriff's Department March 28-April 3, 2022

At approximately 7:40 a.m., Thursday, deputies responded to the N1600 block of County Highway T, Town of Spring Grove, for a report of a single vehicle accident. The driver was identified as Yvette A. Smith, 43, of Brodhead. Smith reported she was northbound on County Highway T when she lost control of the vehicle on the snow/ ice covered roadway and entered the west ditch, striking a culvert. Smith reported no injuries, reported wearing her seat belt, and airbags deployed within the vehicle. Smith's three juvenile passengers reported no injuries and reported wearing their seat belts. Smith's vehicle sustained disabling damage and was towed from the scene. On Thursday, March 31, at 7:43

a.m., Green County Sheriff's dispatch received a 911 call reporting a two vehicle crash on State Hwy 104 north of County Highway A, Town of Albany. Green County Deputies along with Rock County Sheriff's Deputies, Albany Fire Department, Albany Emergency Medical Services, Brodhead Fire Department, Brodhead Emergency Medical Services and Green County Emergency Medical Services responded to the scene. At the time of the crash road conditions were wet and slush covered from ongoing snow. Deputies arrived on scene and located a commercial motor vehicle blocking the entire roadway and a sport utility vehicle on the east side of the roadway. Deputies immediately began life saving measures on the driver of the sport utility vehicle until patient care was transferred to EMS. Preliminary investigation revealed that a 2003 Nissan Murano sport utility vehicle was northbound on State Highway 104 when it lost control due to the slush covered roadway. The SUV crossed the centerline into the path of a southbound 2019 Freightliner straight truck. The collision caused moderate disabling damage to the Freightliner and it came to rest across all lanes of State Highway 104. The Nissan sustained severe disabling damage and came to a rest on the east side of State Highway 104. Both vehicles were towed from the scene. The driver of the Freightliner, Robin Greenland 62, of Westby, Wisconsin, sustained non-life threatening injuries and was transported by Albany EMS to Mercy Hospital-Janesville. His seatbelt was used and there was no airbag deployment. The driver of the Nissan, a 25 year old male of Brodhead sustained life threatening injuries and was transported by Brodhead EMS to Mercy-Hospital of Janesville. Upon arrival at the Mercy Hospital he was pronounced deceased. The male was not wearing a seat belt at the time of crash and airbags did not deploy. Identification of the driver is being withheld pending notification of family. WI State Patrol assisted at the scene with the commercial motor vehicle inspection and crash reconstruction. Green County Highway assisted with barricades and road detour routes. This is Green County's second traffic fatality for 2022.

At approximately 7:06 p.m., Thursday, Albany Police Officers, assisted by Green County Sheriff's




