Superintendent Quarterly Report

Each year our School Board sets priorities for the school year. Those priorities are in four specific areas: Teaching and Student Learning; Family and Community Engagement; District Culture, Wellness, and Engagement; and Finance and Facilities. We use several data sources including surveys, report card data, and universal assessments to determine our priorities for the school year. I want to highlight some of our initiatives so far this school year.

Teaching and Student Learning: I am proud to say the Brodhead School District scored in the "Exceeds Expectations" category on the 2021-22 State Report Card. Our Administrative Team has been receiving ongoing training on how to be better "instructional coaches" for our teachers. There are high-impact methods of instruction that have been proven to make a difference in student success. A big part of our professional development this year has been to provide our teaching staff with consistent and researchbased instructional practices that we teach and expect in all classrooms. We are proud of the quality instruction our staff provides and always look for ways to improve. A big thank you goes out to our staff for ensuring our students are Learning Today For a Better Tomorrow.

Family and Community Engage-

with our families has been one of our priorities this school year. We introduced our new District website earlier this school year and rolled out our new District app. as well. The app. allows users to customize the content they wish to receive from the school and receive updates and notifications on a regular basis. We feel this new resource has allowed us to better communicate with families and provide information to parents and the community in a timely manner. We have a section on our District webpage under the "Families" tab that provides directions on how to download the app. Along with our new app., we have also focused on social media and newspaper articles to share all the activities and events happening in all of our District's schools. We will be sending out our spring survey to all parents the first part of May and value the input we receive. We will use the results of those survevs to continue with our improvement efforts. ment: Improving communication

Engagement: A positive culture is an important foundation for a District. A supportive environment and positive relationships between staff and students need to be in place for other aspects of our schools to be successful. We survey our students and staff every year and use that information to help us focus our efforts in areas of need. One important thing our data has shown us is that we need to take more time to help and support our newest staff members. We have a process in place that provides our newest staff members with frequent and timely support from Administration in an effort to ensure they have the resources necessary to be successful. We also use our student survey data to provide additional support to our students in needed areas. Based on our student survey results from last year, we are making more of an effort to improve teacher/student relationships with specific and timely recognition. We all know the power of a timely thank you, or recognition for doing something well. A student will work hard for a teacher who they know cares about them and wants them to succeed. This is something we are focusing on as a staff this school year.

Finance and Facilities: The Brodhead School District has contracted with a company called Nexus Solutions to help our School Board create a 10-year facility plan. This plan provides our District with all deferred maintenance needs as well as possible future building projects. We want to be sure our District's buildings and grounds are well maintained and taken care of. Our School Board has established a Facility Planning Committee, which is a group of over 20 individuals from the Brodhead School District staff and community. The job of this Committee is to develop and refine short-term and long-term priorities for our District's facilities and determine how to fund those priorities. This committee meets on the third Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. These meetings will continue through the summer with the goal of presenting our School Board with a recommendation to consider at the September 6 School Board Meeting. Each of these meetings are open to the public with agendas posted in the Independent Register prior to each meeting. We have a section of our District's website devoted to providing information about our Long-Term Facility Planning process. Brodhead Community Gardens meeting April 15

Interested in growing your own food? Do you have limited or no space for a garden where you live? Would you like to have fresh beans in July, tomatoes in August and butternut squash for dinner in October? Then you are a candidate to join the Brodhead Community Gardens. There is an acre of land available behind Gasser True Value for community residents to have their own garden plot to grow what they wish. The spaces are approximately 20x25 or roughly 500 square feet. Participants are asked to use limited amounts of fertilizer, use organic herbicides and insecticides, and clean up their space by November 1. All vegetables are the property of the grower and gardens will be open from 6 a.m.-9 p.m. (daylight hours) during the summer months for planting, weeding and harvesting. If you have never had a garden before experienced gardeners will be available to help you get started. There will be water available on site.

They will hold an in-person meeting on Saturday morning, April 15, at 9 a.m. at the Congregational United Church of Christ across from the gardens. The meeting is open to existing Community Garden members and those wishing to get a garden plot for the first time. Because of an expected increase in expenses this year they are charging \$20/plot. They will be making plans for the coming year and receiving payment and assigning plots.

Afterwards, weather permitting, they will have a short work day to install the two signs and other simple jobs. Compost will be available by mid-April if you want to apply it before the gardens are tilled. Tilling is based on temperature and ground conditions but is usually done by the first week of May. 



Lights out for the Trojans By Teresa Earleywine

In Thursday's game against East Troy, Ava Risum was on the mound for Brodhead. She went seven innings, striking out 13, walked one and allowed three hits in the game. Lucy Schreiber pitched for East Troy, striking out two and allowed five hits in the game.

The first two innings were scoreless. The Trojans would get the first score in the third when their number three got on base after a wild pitch. She would then steal second. Schreiber, who went 2-for-2 at the plate in the game, singled a ground ball to center field. A Cardinal error allowed number three to score. Brodhead made a statement in the bottom of the third with a burst of scores. Jaelyn Hilliard is the first to get on base hitting a ground ball towards third base. She was able to advance to second when Risum lays down a hard ground ball. Sophia Leitzen hits a single, the Cardinals have bases loaded. Mckenna Young connects and reaches first base on error. Hilliard earned the first score for Brodhead. Bases remain loaded. Taetum Hoesly hits a sacrifice fly to right field. Risum scores and the home team has the lead. Brodhead has two outs. Up to bat is Alexis "Klutch" Kammerer who doubles on a fly ball that brings Leitzen and Young home. The Cards have rebounded for a 4-1 lead. Risum goes to work on the mound and it's three up and three down for the Trojans. It's the bottom of the fourth, Hilliard is back at bat. She lays down a bunt to beat the throw to first base. She then steals second. Risum at the plate, connects on a fly ball, getting herself to second base and sending Hilliard across home plate. It is lights out for the Trojans as the game ends 5-1 and the Cardinals earn their fourth consecutive victory.

In a nonconference game on Friday, April 7th, Brodhead took on River Valley. The bats were connecting for the Cardinals in the first inning. With Risum and Young on second and first base respectively, Hoesly was up to bat. Risum steals third and then Young steals second. With a 1-2 count, Hoesly connects to send the ball on the ground hard to left field. Risum scores. Kammerer grounds out to River Valley shortstop but Young will score. Brodhead takes a 2 -0 lead. Bottom of the second, Hilliard triples on a fly ball to center field. She will then score when Risum bats. Meanwhile, on defense, Young is on the mound for the Cardinals. She pitches another impressive game allowing only one hit, zero runs and striking out nine. She was four-for-four at the plate including a homerun in the bottom of the fifth. Also managing multiple hits in the game; Hoesly, Risum and Kammerer. Brodhead would tally 14 hits in the game and finish the week with a 5 - 0 win.

This week the team will be on the road to Evansville on Tuesday and at Edgerton on Thursday.

McFarland overpowers Brodhead

Brodhead hosting McFarland last Thursday saw both teams scoring in the first inning 6–5 with the Spartans leading. McFarland pitcher, Mason Roe started on the mound. After allowing five runs in the first he then did not allow a hit in the second or third inning.





Self-identification Required for Green County Fair Pigs By Jackie McCarville, Extension Green County Ag Educator

Green County fair swine exhibitors will be required to self-identify their pigs using the RFID tag method this year. Exhibitors will be required to tag their own pigs and do photo identification for each fair pig. There will be no cost for the Swine Photo Identification Kits. Exhibitors will also be given two RFID ear tags for each animal at no cost. Swine photo identification kits and ear tags will only be available for pickup at the Extension Green County Extension Office, 2841 6th Street, Monroe.

The photo identification kits and ear tags are available for pick up and must be returned to the Extension Green County office by Friday, April 14th. The kits cannot be mailed. Photos of each pig must be taken from one head view, clearly displaying the RFID ear tag in the pig's ear. Photos must be attached to the Green County Fair Swine Photo identification form and submitted to the Extension Green County office by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, April 14th.

The Extension Green County office will loan out ear taggers for exhibitors to use for tagging their pigs. The taggers must be returned to the Extension office and will be sanitized before being given to another farm to prevent the spread of disease. 4-H Leaders and Agriculture instructors will be allowed to pick up ID kits for their members. However, they will be required to sign for all the kits they pick up at the Extension Green County Office. Each kit will include the photo identification forms and two RFID ear tags for each pig to be identified.

When picking up their pig identification kits exhibitors will be provided with instructions on the correct procedures for taking the photos and placing the RFID ear tags. Only pigs that are identified using the Green County ID kits will be eligible to exhibit at the 2023. Green County Fair.


All pigs, including both market gilts and market barrows need to be self-identified. Each exhibitor can identify a maximum of five pigs. Exhibitors will be allowed to bring a maximum of two total pigs to the fair. Pigs must weigh at least 225 pounds by the fair to exhibit and at least 235 to sell in the Green County fair livestock auction. The 2023 Green County show will continue to be a terminal show with all pigs going directly to a terminal market after the fair to eliminate the possible spread of any diseases.

Exhibitors will be allowed to sell either a gilt or barrow in the 2023 auction. They will need to turn in two signed buyer cards to the Extension Green County office by Friday, June 23rd to be eligible to sell in the auction. The cards will be available on-line for printing after Monday, May 1st. Hard copies of the buyer cards will also be available at the Extension Green County office.

Youth who exhibit swine will be required to complete YQCA training. If you have not already completed this training, directions on how to certify will be explained when the Swine Identifications are picked up at the Extension Green County office. Each individual Green County Swine Exhibitor MUST submit their YQCA Certificate number online when completing fair entries. Fair Entries CANNOT be completed without the Certificate number. Copies of the Certificate do not need to be submitted to the Extension Green County office.

Swine exhibitors will also be required to complete swine health verification forms that include any medical treatments that were administered to the project animal. These forms will be distributed to exhibitors when they pick up their ID kits and must also be turned in to the Extension Green County office by Friday, June 23rd with the signed buyer cards.
