Students Donated \$1,500 to Art Program

Summer Eldred and Alexis Brian presented the district with a \$1,500 donation from their senior project for the art program. Each district school will receive \$500 to be used to purchase art supplies or whatever the art classes need.

This newspaper was made aware of a complaint of a possible conflict of interest regarding one of the board members. The board conferred with legal counsel during closed session. I reached out to Board President Mike Krupke, but he wasn't able to comment on what occurred during the board's closed session discussion.

Clerk Michael Oellerich and Superintendant Dave Novy reported election results. Two incumbent board members, Mike Krupke and Don Buchanan, were reelected. Almost half of the district's 3,600 voters turned out to vote and approved the facilities referendum by a margin of 65 votes.

Stephanie Tresemer, Erin Kammerer and Jessica Gardipee informed the Board about the new WEB (Where Everbody Belongs) Program. As part of the program, 23 eighth graders will be trained to help incoming sixth graders transition successfully to the Middle School.

In her information report, Pupil Services Director, DeAnne Larson stated there is a growing number of homeless students in the district. The Pupil Services team is working to identify all of those students and determine how best to meet their needs.

In Other Business:

The FFA Wildlife Team will be going on to state after placing fourth in the Career and Leadership Development Event at UW Plateville.

Better Brodhead will once again be sponsoring post prom on Saturday, April 27 at Albany Lanes.

Principal Kelly Knox gave shout outs to Kid Connection for their successful Carnival and to the Middle School TOOL students who helped and also to the High School students who are assisting in classrooms this year.

Finance Manager Robin Bye reported the district is projecting an end of year surplus of \$553,003, which is down about \$30,000 from the original projection.

Director of Technology, Kevin Buxton reported he expects about \$30,000 in federal funds to be available for technology needs during upcoming construction and renovations





Brodhead Community Gardens meeting Wednesday, April 24 Interested in growing your own food? Do you have limited or no space

Interested in growing your own food? Do you have limited or no space for a garden where you live? Would you like to have fresh beans in July, to-matoes in August and butternut squash for dinner in October? Then you are a candidate to join the Brodhead Community Gardens. There is an acre of land available behind Gasser True Value for community residents to have their own garden plot to grow what they wish. The spaces are approximately 20x25 or roughly 500 square feet. You may reserve up to two sections per family and you may keep your same plot year after year. Participants are asked to use limited amounts of fertilizer, use organic herbicides and insecticides, and clean up their space by November 1. All vegetables are the property of the grower and gardens will be open from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m., daylight hours, during the summer months for planting, weeding and harvesting. If you have never had a garden before experienced gardeners will be available to help you get started. There will be water available on site.

They will hold an in-person meeting on Wednesday, April 24, at 7 p.m. at the Congregational United Church of Christ, across from the gardens. You can also sign up on Saturday morning, April 27, at 9 a.m. at the Community Garden site. Both meetings are open to existing Community Garden members and those wishing to get a garden plot for the first time. Because of an expected increase in expenses this year they are charging \$20/plot. They will be making plans for the coming year and receiving payment and assigning plots.

Compost will be available by late-April if you want to apply it before the gardens are tilled. Tilling is based on temperature and ground conditions but is usually done by the first week in May. 


Brodhead Music Department receives a new piano



Saturday Mornings at the Library Watersheds – It's all connected!

The Durand Library was very pleased to have Susan Lehnhardt, senior ecologist at Three Waters Reserve, speak with us April 13 about the lower Sugar River watershed and the water resources in the northwest part of Winnebago County. She brought with her to display beautiful posters, tables of water test results and a three dimensional watershed model produced by a woman owned business in 1980. There was a lot to read and learn about!

Susan is a tireless advocate for the protection of water resources and several years ago spearheaded the formation of the Lower Sugar River Watershed Association. Her presentation on screen began with a beautiful photo of the world and came down, step by step, showing the several watersheds in the United States and then down to the Sugar River watershed, which spans parts of Wisconsin and Illinois.

Two other images were striking. One was a video taken during the 2018 heavy winter rainfall which, due to the frozen ground, roared through the creek bed taking with it large logs which had been placed to bolster the banks. The sound of the rushing water was both scary and awesome. Another image was of a herd of cattle standing in a stream. At first the scene was pleasant as they cooled themselves in the water. The other and unfortunate aspect of that scene was that they would be pooping in the stream.

Those attending learned that a watershed is made up of subwatersheds, smaller areas or basins, where the terrain causes water to collect and drain off to a creek or perhaps directly to the Sugar River. These subwatersheds help landowners understand that what happens on their property will travel the long way to the Gulf of Mexico.

The north and south branches of Otter Creek join the Sugar River, which then joins the Pecatonica River which itself joins the Rock River. After joining the Kishwaukee, the Rock River flows to the Mississippi River and those waters travel all the way to the Gulf of Mexico, nearly 1,000 miles away, carrying whatever nutrient pollution and contaminants it has picked up. In fact, Illinois has the longest section of the Mississippi River at nearly 600 miles along its western side.

The Lower Sugar River Watershed website, https://lsrwa.org/, has excellent maps and offers this suggestion, "Once you've studied the map of the entire watershed, we invite you to explore the subwatershed where you live. This up close glimpse gives you a true sense of what is literally in your own backyard."

Susan described the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources programs for volunteers to monitor stream conditions and collect water samples for analysis. Knowing the level of phosphorus is very important as it contributes greatly to algal blooms, which are detrimental to stream life and

water quality. As Susan pointed out with graphs of analyses going back several years, a quick "snapshot" view of a stream is not sufficient. Stream monitoring is an ongoing activity.

The National Great Rivers Research and Education Center at https://www.ngrrec.org/About/offers activities and volunteer opportunities in Illinois to monitor and protect water resources. Closer to home is the https://rockriverwatershed.org/. It is all connected; all of the several rivers in Illinois eventually empty into the Mississippi River.

Understanding that each sub watershed flows into the Sugar River gives one a clear picture of how critical it is for all of us to protect the natural resources under our stewardship. Will a bottle with a message in it reach the Gulf of Mexico? Perhaps not, as it may get lodged in some vegetation along the bank. But it is certain that the water itself will get there and carry with it any nutrients and pollutants, which it may have picked up from our yards and agricultural fields.

Help Kids Grow Up Alcohol-Free: **Have Small Talks**

Small talks about underage drinking can make a difference in a kid's choices. That's because kids really do listen. Research shows having frequent, casual conversations about alcohol, starting around age 8, can be a lot more effective—and a lot less intimidating—than one super serious discussion.
