2022-23 Teacher Contracts approved

The 2022-23 Teacher Contracts were approved with a base salary increase of 4.7%. The District Health Plan was changed to include a \$50 co-pay for primary care/specialists, \$50/\$250 urgent care/emergency room visits for Mercy and \$70/\$250 urgent care/emergency room visits for Dean. This change will have impact on participants and will save the District a bit of money.

After a closed session, the Board approved the following staff salary changes: \$13.50 and less will increase to \$14.50 per hour; \$13.51-\$14.50 will increase to \$15.25 per hour; and \$15.26 and above will have an \$.80 increase.

Elected officers of the Board are Mike Krupke, President; Don Buchanan, Vice-President; Jim Wahl, Clerk; and Al Schneider, Treasurer. Jim Wahl was elected CESA 2 representative. Committee assignments will remain the same.




Arthur Carter and Oscar Olson Named 2022 Friends of Extension

Olson seldom missed a meeting in that 22 years and has served as Vice-Chair of the committee for his career as well. Butts continued with, "We will miss you and congratulate you on your retirement and don't forget you can return to "volunteer" anytime!"

Carter was a member of the **Green County Board of Supervisors** for 45 plus years and served on the Ag and Extension Committee for the last 16 years. As a member of the Ag and Extension Committee, Carter portrayed tremendous dedication to the Ag Industry. He also carried the passion of the Wisconsin Idea to "learn outside the classroom." Carter has the ability to rationalize situations when they don't seem exactly right and a unique way to explain the most complicated issues for a better understanding of an issue. Butts gave a little history on Carter saying "my mom went to high school with Art... a few years ago... and she always used to tell me, "He's one of the good ones." The Extension Green County office congratulates Art on his retirement and advised him to keep being "one of the good ones."

Before retiring from the Green County Board, both gentlemen provided support for Extension Green County in educational and research programs including Community Resource Development, Nutrition, 4-H Youth Development, Health and Well-Being, and Agriculture an Natural Resources. Both Carter and Olson recognized the importance of quality education, and the impact it can make in the lives of individuals and communities. Building and maintaining a strong UW-Extension office in Green County was an important part of their leadership skills for the County. Their support of UW-Extension in Green County has allowed the local Extension office to remain responsive to the current and emerging community needs in Green County.

Identification Day Required for Green County Fair Market Wether Goats

An identification program for all market goats to be exhibited at the 2022 Green County Fair will be conducted on Saturday, May 7th, at the Green County Fairgrounds in Monroe. Market goats will be identified between 10-11 a.m. in the south end of the show barn. Only market goats that are identified on this date will be eligible for exhibition in the market goat classes and to sell at the Green County Fair Meat Animal Auction.

Market Wether Goats will have the Champion and Reserve Champion Wether Goat winners sell in the auction, provided they meet all auction requirements. Exhibitors will need to turn in an auction entry form by Tuesday, May 31st, and two signed buyer cards to the Extension Green County office by Friday, June 24th to be eligible to sell in the auction. The cards will be available online for printing after Sunday, May 1st or hard copies of the buyer cards will also be available at the Extension Green County office.

Youth who exhibit goats will be required to complete YQCA training. If you have not already completed this training, directions on how to certify are on the Green County Extension webpage. Each individual Green County Goat Exhibitor MUST submit their YQCA Certificate number online when completing fair entries. Fair Entries CANNOT be completed without the Certificate number. Copies of the Certificate do not need to be submitted to the Extension Green County office.



41st Annual Bloody Lake Rendezvous

Open to Public May 6-8

A time portal opens, just outside of quiet Woodford, Wisconsin, once a year beginning Tuesday of the week that includes the first full weekend of May. This year is no different. Tuesday May third will be a busy day at Blackhawk Memorial County Park as historical reenactors from all over the country gather at the entry point to the portion claimed by Yellowstone Flint and Cap, Inc. (YFC). YFC members will have already set-up their primitive tents and tipis so they are free to help newcomers and returning participants find a place to be their home for the next six days. In a matter of hours, the open fields surrounded by tall trees are transformed into a community of early American history, whose citizens live the pre-1840 lifestyle in every possible way.

The gathering is many things all at once—reunion, competition, adventure, history lesson, party, place to learn new skills, make new friends, and peaceful departure from modern life. Motor vehicles are gone. Cooking is by campfire and lanterns light the evening paths.

Competition includes black powder shooting of rifles and pistols, primitive archery, tomahawk and knife throwing, fire starting, and pie baking. Shopping or trading stories and equipment are part of the fun. No t-shirts or ball caps. Everyone is dressed in the period attire of the persona they portray which can be any time from 1600 to 1839. There are "mountain men," Native Americans, fur traders, voyageurs, pioneers, settlers, colonial militia, camp followers, and families. Children are entertained with the simpler pastimes of swing, stick and hoop and other games.

If you enjoy visiting historic sites with period attired interpreters, and thought you might find that rewarding, YFC would be a great place to begin. Friday, Saturday and Sunday during the day, the public can visit the encampment. Friday is Schools Day. Several area schools, and home school groups will visit, try their hand at tomahawk throwing, and enjoy demonstrations of pre-1840 skills. The general public can visit the encampment Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. for a small charge (scouts in uniform, veterans, and children 12 and under admitted free). The public is encouraged to take a leisurely stroll, shop at the vendors, try black powder shooting, and ask questions of the participants.

When the visitors depart, the magic returns, and participants enjoy living the pre-1840 life as if they've gone back in time Tuesday through Thursday and Friday and Saturday Evenings, when not a ball cap, car or cell phone is seen. 



Monroe Man Arrested for Fifth Offense OWI

The Green County District Attorney's Office has charged a Monroe man with fifth offense OWI after a Brodhead Police officer witnessed his vehicle cross the centerline on STLL11

On Saturday, April 23, at approximately 1:28 a.m. a Brodhead Police officer was traveling northbound on 1st Center Avenue (STH 11) near 15th Street when they observed a vehicle traveling southbound near the intersection of 14th Street cross the centerline. The officer performed a traffic stop on the vehicle and identified the driver as Gail Myers, age 53, of Monroe. While speaking with Myers the officer detected the odor of intoxicants emanating from the interior of the vehicle. The results of the standardized field sobriety test indicated Myers was impaired. Myers was arrested for OWI and submitted to an evidentiary chemical test of his blood. Meyers was booked into the Green County Sheriff's Jail.

Myers was released Monday from the jail after his initial appearance in Green County Circuit Court. The court imposed a \$5,000 signature bond with conditions. In Wisconsin a person who has been convicted of four or more OWI offenses, cannot have a blood alcohol concentration of .02 or greater.



SSM Health Monroe Hospital achieves Level III Trauma Center verification

The American College of Surgeons (ACS) has officially verified SSM Health Monroe Hospital as a Level III Trauma Center.

This achievement is the culmination of dedicated work by multiple teams to improve best practices leading to better patient outcomes in providing this level of critical care to local rural communities. SSM Health Monroe Hospital is one of 41 hospitals in Wisconsin with Level III Trauma Certification.

"Being certified as a Level III Trauma Center will allow more individuals to stay local in an emergency, which is a tremendous benefit to our communities that can be utilized whether you are an SSM Health patient or not," explained Mary Tessendorf, EMS Coordinator at SSM Health Monroe Hospital.

Level III Trauma Center hospitals provide assessment, resuscitation, stabilization and emergency surgery and arranges transfer to a Level I or II facility for definitive surgical and intensive care as necessary. They must have 24-hour coverage by emergency medicine providers, general surgeon is available to respond to the hospital within 30 minutes and provide care to injured people within capabilities and resources in order to stabilize and transfer to another facility. This is in addition to having agreements with other hospitals for transferring trauma patients and providing education and training to pre-hospital

There are five separate categories of trauma verification that hospitals can achieve, and it is a lengthy process. For SSM Health Monroe Hospital, this process began in January 2020 with thorough reporting during which the hospital needed to provide it had the resources and staff to care for patients in with serious injuries. That reporting period concluded with a successful survey in September 2021.

"Just striving for this level improved the quality of care for our patients, let alone receiving this distinction, speaks volumes to the dedication and collaboration of our teams," shared Jane Curran-Meuli, President of SSM Health Monroe Hospital and Monroe Clinic Medical Group. "I want to thank our extraordinary staff for all of their efforts to find new ways to provide exceptional care."

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
