## School Board Board Heard Proposal for New Softball Field

The board approved the recommendation of the Building and Grounds committee to allow the Sports Boosters and Brodhead Foundation, who are funding the project, to get quotes and finalize a budget for a new proposed softball field north of the existing one. This will keep the JV girls from having to travel across town to play.

Kelly Knox reported the Elementary school will use the remainder of their Get Kids Ahead Initiative funding to hire a part-time staff member to help provide Tier 1 guidance and social and emotional learning through December 2024.

Lisa Semrow announced Erica Foulker was named Middle School Teacher of the Year after receiving 100 nominations. She gave a shout out to all the teachers in honor of Teacher Appreciation week May 8th through the 12th.

Kevin Buxton, Director of Technology, advised the board of a one-hour outage earlier that day that further illustrated the need for the failover and continuity devices now on order. They will ensure basic connectivity is available when the Internet goes down and that no progress is lost.

The rate for paraprofessional substitutes was increased from \$12 to \$14.50 per hour.

## Remains of S2C David Joseph Riley to be laid to rest



The remains of S2C David Joseph Riley, who was killed at Pearl Harbor in 1941, will be laid to rest on Saturday, May 27, in Juda, Wisconsin.

After over 81 years, a young man who once called Juda and Monroe, home will finally be returning, memorialized at what will be a special and historic event.

The public is invited to honor and remember Green County's first casualty of WWII, Seaman Second Class David Joseph Riley, at a memorial program scheduled for 11 a.m. on Saturday, May 27, at the Juda High School gymnasium. Immediately following the short program, S2C Riley's remains will be interred with full military honors at Mt. Vernon Cemetery just outside Juda.

Riley was the foster son and only child of the late Elmer and Della (Matzke) Asmus of Juda, and enlisted in the Navy in May 1940. At 25 years of age, S2C Riley lost his life on December 7, 1941 aboard the USS Oklahoma during a surprise Japanese military attack on Hawaii's Pearl Harbor. In the days, months, and years following the attack, remains of men lost aboard the ship were recovered, but few were identified. Starting in 2015, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) used forensic technology, including DNA, to identify those who were previously unaccounted for, including Riley, whose remains were identified February 24, 2021.

A vehicle procession of veteran's groups and others will accompany Riley's remains from Shriner-Hager-Gohlke Funeral Home in Monroe to Juda High School the day of the memorial program and burial. Anyone is welcome to be part of the procession, and should be at the funeral home, located at 1455 Mansion Drive, at 9:15 a.m. if interested in participating.

The Zilmer-Riley American Legion Post # 84, which is partly named for S2C Riley, will host a reception in Monroe following the burial. Riley will also be remembered on Monday, May 29 at 10:30 a.m. as part of the annual Memorial Day ceremony at Juda's Mt. Vernon Cemetery.

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### May is National Treatment Court Month

Ms. Muchow appears to glow from the inside, and she has worked hard to achieve it: she has been clean and sober for more than 500 consecutive days, works three part-time jobs, is an active member of her church and has developed a close network of supportive family and friends.

Green County’s Adult Drug Court was established in 2017. The program has since expanded to accept clients with alcohol-related offenses, and is now known as Green County Adult Hybrid Treatment Court (or “Treatment Court,” for short). The target population includes adult residents of Green and Lafayette Counties with substance abuse issues related to their criminal charges.

Participation in the program is voluntary, and the responsibilities and obligations of the participants are substantial. Each participant is referred to the Treatment Court Coordinator and also is assigned a Department of Corrections agent for case planning and monitoring accountability. The Green County Treatment Court is a highly-structured program with five phases. Each phase consists of specific requirements for transition into the next phase. The components of each phase include judicial interaction, supervision, AODA and mental health counseling, case management, individual and group counseling, homework, drug and alcohol testing, and community service.

The goal is to enhance public safety by reducing repeat drug and alcohol-related offenses through evidence-based treatment, counseling and services, combined with requirements of legal accountability and pro-social community involvement.

Treatment Court is held every Wednesday at the Green County Justice Center, in the Branch 1 Courtroom from 9:30–10:30 a.m. The Treatment Court team consists of the Green County Human Services AODA Supervisor, Treatment Court Coordinator, Counselors, Recovery Coaches, Department of Corrections–Probation and Parole, Monroe Police Department, Green County Sheriff’s Office, Treatment Court Judge, and counsel from both the Office of the State Public Defender and District Attorney’s Office, as well as a liaison from Lafayette County’s Human Services Department.
