

In lieu of flowers, memorials can be directed in her name to the Brodhead United Methodist Church or the Brodhead EMS.






BHS students take CNA course

The class is a hybrid class, which means some coursework is done online and lab/clinical is done in person. The lab time was spent on campus in the lab/classroom setting and the clinical time was spent at SSM Monroe Clinic Hospital. Lab time was held in the morning at 7 a.m. and the students had to be up bright and early for clinical time starting at 5:45 a.m. in the morning! The instructor is Laura Powers, BSN; RN. She is a Blackhawk Technical College adjunct and the Brodhead School District Nurse. Brodhead High School had seven seniors and one junior take the CNA class this year. Classes were taught at Brodhead High School campus.

Day Without Child Care

On Monday, May 13, around 100 community members and elected officials gathered to learn and talk about child care as a critical part of our infrastructure in order to have thriving communities now and in the future.

Olivia Otte, Green County Development Corporation Executive Director, Theresa Keehn, United Way of Green County Executive Director, Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation Deputy Secretary and COO, Sam Rikkers, kicked off the event speaking out about the partnerships they have with the Green County Child Care Network members to create and allocate grants that truly meet the needs of the child care businesses in our county. These grants ensure that employers in our community have more available employees and ensure our children are better prepared for life. The speakers talked about the grants following successes: opening more regulated programs, increased quality as over 70 child care professionals earned1500 professional development hours that emphasized the social emotional development and inclusion of all children, seven more programs that accept Wisconsin Shares subsidy for lower income families. The latest round of WEDC grants with a match from the Only in Wisconsin Giving is ameliorating radon, capital improvements, bonuses for completions of credentials and degrees, and maintaining or improving quality. Only in Wisconsin also awarded GCCCN \$15,000 for professional development last week. Shawn Phetteplace from Main Street Alliance spoke about small businesses taking leadership roles in advocating for investments and that they are supporting and encouraging small business owners to run for local office.

Following the economic piece were State Superintendent Dr. Jill Underly and Heather DuBois Bourenane, Wisconsin Public Education Network, who both talked about how child care is vital for a healthy public k-12 system. One of the main reasons teachers consistently give for why they leave teaching is lack of child care for their own children. Furthermore, our child care programs care for and educate our youngest, ensuring they have caring nurturing educational environments that lays the necessary social, emotional, and pre-academic skills necessary to lower remedial and special education costs to our school system.

Jeff Pertl, Deputy Secretary of Department of Children and Families spoke about the Evers Administration's emphasis on "what's best for kids is what's best for our state," and the importance of ensuring the educators who care for and educate the children in their programs need to be paid a living wage to attract and retain high quality staff, but not outprice the parents ability to pay.

Other speakers were: Secretary of State Sarah Godlewski who mentioned child care as imperative for her to have done her work as Treasurer and now Secretary and the critical role it plays in all our society's ability to function. Sue Nelson who shared her story of how this is not a new issue and continues to impact our communities, and how as a Green County Supervisor she supported GCDC's work. Rep. Jacobson who talked about her own children and the state's legislative body's inaction and Republican party's consistent unanimous votes against continuing to fund Child Care Counts, and how she is working to ensure that the next budget includes investment. Sarah Kazell, child care professional, talked about her inability to get health care, low wages, and necessity of working multiple jobs to make ends meet, but also that she refuses to believe that it is her fault and be embarrassed, but, instead it is society's fault for allowing the government's inaction. That we must all come together to advocate for thriving wages, a just and equitable system for every child and family to access the care they want and need at an affordable price.

May was National Treatment Court Month By Judge Faun M. Phillipson

Green County's Adult Drug Court was established in 2017. The program has since expanded to accept clients with alcohol-related offenses, and is now known as Green County Adult Hybrid Treatment Court (or "Treatment Court," for short). The target population includes adult residents of Green County with substance abuse issues related to their criminal charges.

Participation in the program is voluntary, and the responsibilities and obligations of the participants are substantial. Each participant is referred to the Treatment Court Coordinator and is assigned a Department of Corrections agent for case planning and monitoring accountability. The Green County Treatment Court is a highly-structured program with five phases. Each phase consists of specific requirements for transition into the next phase. The components of each phase include judicial interaction, supervision, AODA and mental health counseling, case management, individual and group counseling, homework, drug and alcohol testing, and community service.

The goal is to enhance public safety by reducing repeat drug and alcohol-related offenses through evidencebased treatment, counseling and services, combined with requirements of legal accountability and pro-social community involvement.

Treatment Court is held every Wednesday at the Green County Justice Center, in the Branch 1 Courtroom from 9:30-10:30 a.m. The Treatment Court team consists of the Green County Human Services AODA Supervisor, Treatment Court Coordinator, AODA Counselors, Recovery Coaches, Department of Corrections—Probation and Parole, Monroe Police Department, Green County Sheriff's Office, Treatment Court Judge, and counsel from both the Office of the State Public Defender and District Attorney's Office, as well as a liaison from Lafayette County's Human Services Department.

BRODHEAD ORDINANCE 272-6 B.

Public nuisance declared. The Common Council finds that lawns, grasses and noxious weeds on lots or parcels of land within the City of Brodhead which exceed eight inches in length adversely affect the public health and safety of the public in that they tend to emit pollen and other discomforting bits of plants, constitute a fire hazard and a safety hazard in that debris can be hidden in the grass, interfere with the public convenience and adversely affect property values of other land within the City. For that reason, grass or weeds on a lot or other parcel of land which exceed eight inches in length is hereby declared to be a public nuisance, except for property located in a designated floodplain area and/or wetland area or where the lawn, grass or weed is part of a native landscape as defined in § 272.5A. This section does not apply to crops grown in conformity with the provisions of Chapter 480, Zoning, of the Code of the City of Brodhead.


