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City of Brodhead Water Quality **Trading Program Receives National ACEC Honor Award**

The American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC) of Washington, D.C., announces its selection of 2022 Engineering Excellence Award winners, recognizing the most outstanding project achievements of the engineering profession in the nation.

The City of Brodhead, Wisconsin, and MSA Professional Services, Inc. (MSA) were together chosen to receive an Honor Award for the community's Water Quality Trading project, selected from 195 project submissions from the United States. The Honor Award is a prestigious distinction and represents exceptional engineering achievements. Winners are determined by a panel of 25-30 judges, appraised and ranked based on achievement in five categories: uniqueness and/ or innovative application of new or existing techniques; future value to, and enhancing public awareness/ enthusiasm for the engineering profession; social, economic, and sustainable development considerations; complexity; and successful fulfillment of client/owner's needs,

The City of Brodhead Water Quality Trading (WQT) project is a multi-faceted solution for achieving compliance with stringent phosphorus water quality based effluent limits (WQBELs) at the City's wastewater treatment facility. In lieu of a costly tertiary phosphorus removal upgrade, City officials elected to instead offset phosphorus loadings to its local receiving water, the Sugar River, by improving the landscape in the upstream watershed to reduce potentially harmful nutrient runoff.


"The trading program successfully offsets the City's total phosphorus load by approximately 1,090 pounds per year, and annually generates 390 pounds of WQT credits," shares MSA Senior Project Engineer Andrew Skog. "The project included the repair of over 62 eroding streambanks, major upgrades to a local small dairy, including runoff diversions and manure storage construction, and establishes longterm nutrient management practices on approximately 500 acres of crop fields. The entire process was

extremely collaborative and we're proud to have established this new and creative long-term solution for the community." The City of Brodhead program saves the city approximately \$3.8 million in lifecycle costs as compared to making significant investments in upgrades to the existing wastewater treatment

"MSA and the City of Brodhead are immensely honored to receive this recognition," remarked Gil Hantzsch, president and CEO at MSA. "Thank you to ACEC Wisconsin for first recognizing this project at the state level, which allowed it to advance to the national stage, and to the national award jury for celebrating the innovative solutions of our country's professional engineers. 

Charles Edward (Charlie) Friederich

Charles Edward (Charlie) Friederich, 87, of Brodhead, Wisconsin, died May 28, 2022, at SSM Health Monroe Hospice Home. He composed his own obituary, which follows: In more than 30 years as a journalist, I have written dozens of obituaries. This, I promise, will be my last.

My parents named me Charles Edward Friederich, but everybody calls me Charlie. I was born in the small town of Western, Nebraska, on Friday the 13th of July, 1934. My father, Fred Friederich, was a Methodist pastor and my mother, Lydia Roth Friederich, was a housewife and registered nurse. Her training came in handy when I was born, as the stork beat the local doctor to the house and Mom supervised the delivery.

I graduated from high school in Seward, Nebraska, in 1952 and from Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln in 1956. I received a full-tuition scholarship to the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, where I received my master's degree in journalism in 1959.

Wanting to see another part of the country, I accepted a job as a reporter for the Binghamton Press in upstate New York. Two years later, in January 1961, I moved to Wisconsin and was a member of the staff of The Milwaukee Journal for almost 30 years. My first seven years at The Journal were spent in Milwaukee, where I did most everything from

Brodhead Fire District and Brodhead Area EMS need volunteers

Imagine that you call 911 and someone shows up 30 minutes later. Everyone would feel this is an unacceptable situation. After all, most 911 calls are made because some sort of help is needed as soon as possible.

Unfortunately a delayed response is becoming more likely as fire departments and ambulances become short staffed due to a lack of volunteers. The Brodhead area is not immune to this issue. The Brodhead Fire District provides the services of a typical fire department including Emergency Medical Response. The Brodhead Area EMS provides emergency ambulance service. They are separate entities although there are some people that belong to both organizations. In fact, 35% of Wisconsin fire departments don't transport patients to hospitals, according to data from the U.S. Fire Administration.

Both organizations are woefully short of staff, which makes it very difficult and sometimes impossible to respond. The Brodhead Fire District has gone from a full roster with a waiting list to less than half-staff over the last 30 years.

Most departments including the Brodhead Fire District rely on volunteers. More than 92% of Wisconsin fire departments are either volunteer or mostly volunteer according to the U.S. Fire Administration. The state is 14th in the country in that regard. This means a lot of firefighters are paid-on-call volunteers who often hold other jobs, generally out of town, and have other time commitments. The same goes for Brodhead Area EMS. Most municipalities simply can't afford full time personnel for emergency services.

Why is there a lack of volunteers for Emergency Services? It is hard to recruit candidates when the job requires over 100 hours of initial technical college education, a training commitment each month and will inevitably not pay them what their work is worth. Most volunteers

have full-time jobs, so the idea of taking on another full-time job with little to no pay is a hurdle volunteer **Emergency Services organizations** have had to deal with for years. Add to the time commitment the fact you may be paged any time day or night no matter the weather and it becomes easy to understand why very few people want to do it.

Other reasons for the shortage aren't as obvious but illustrate how the fire service profession has evolved over the last few decades. Today, firefighters respond to more medical calls for service than any other emergency call. The allure of being a volunteer firefighter may lose its luster as candidates realize that the job may be far less exciting than they imagined. Add to that the possibility of having to respond to an active shooter, hazardous material or terrorism event.

Emergency Services also face problems recruiting young people to become volunteers. Volunteers are aging, making them less and less capable to respond to emergencies. When you call 911 you may get three 65-year-old people showing up in an emergency vehicle and you think everything is fine because someone responded. The problem also extends to career positions. It used to be that there would be hundreds of applicants when a full time position opened up. That has dwindled to only a few people applying. In the last few decades, the number of firefighters, both paid and volunteer, has decreased by over 5%. There are less people protecting more homes, buildings and lives.

What has been tried to get more volunteers? Billboards and mailings have failed to bring in any new applicants. Positions have been divided so a volunteer can be only a driver, a firefighter or an Emergency Medical Responder instead of having to fill all those roles. No one has come forward to apply for one of these reduced roles. Pay has been increased as much as budgets will

The Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) is a way to quickly request additional resources for larger incidents. MABAS is a mutual aid organization that has been in existence since the late 1960s. MABAS first came to Wisconsin in 1987 with the joining of the Village of Pleasant Prairie in Kenosha County. MABAS divisions, typically following County borders, geographically span the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Missouri, Michigan, and the other states, i.e. Minnesota, Iowa, and Ohio, are considering joining. There are 59 established Wisconsin divisions (as of January 2019) who share MABAS with the 67 divisions established in Illinois.

What other actions could be considered? Hiring a minimum number of full time responders would ensure a minimal, timely response on some shifts. Orfordville Fire is currently considering hiring 6 full time people at a projected cost of over \$600,000 annually. This is a very large number in the era of tight budgets and levy limits. The dwindling number of volunteers would still be required to staff other vehicles and to cover other shifts.

How about consolidation of several fire departments into one? Could all the fire departments in Green County be consolidated into one? Perhaps one Chief, one Training Officer, a paid Assistant Chief and full time people in each community with equipment strategically placed around the County. Individual community pride would be a barrier to such an approach.

The bottom line is that the day is fast approaching when a call to 911 might not be answered by local volunteers.



District and Brodhead Area EMS are attempting to launch an intern program. In return for paid tuition in the Fire Science and Emergency Medical Technician programs in addition to a monthly stipend the intern will work rotating shifts responding to Fire and EMS calls. They will be mentored by paid on premise responders who are certified firefighters as well as having EMT or Paramedic certifications. There are concerns about the applicant pool for this initiative also. Currently, the Blackhawk Technical College has 16 people in the Fire Science Technician program and about 3/4 are already affiliated with a Department or doing an internship. There are 15 people in EMT programs and most are already affiliated. The pool of people is very small. Currently there are a few processes in place that formalize cooperation between fire departments to increase the number of firefighters responding to more severe calls. Autoaid entails automatically paging a neighboring department for additional support for certain types of calls. For example, when Orfordville Fire is paged for a structure fire Brodhead Fire is automatically paged to respond with our platform truck. Vice

Class of 1967—We Remember Our Nine Angel's Scholarship



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
