





## **Quarterly State of** the District Report

Each year our School Board sets priorities for the school year. Those priorities are in four specific areas: Teaching and Student Learning; Family and Community Engagement; District Culture, Wellness and Engagement; and Finance and Facilities. We use several data sources including surveys, report card data, and universal assessments to determine our priorities for the school year. I want to highlight some of our initiatives as the 2022-23 school year comes to an end.

Teaching and Student Learning: Each year we conduct surveys of our teachers and students to get a better understanding of our overall District culture and wellness. One of our District Priority Areas this year focused on being very direct and specific with the recognition of our staff and students. People need specific and timely recognition regarding desired behaviors that show success. Whether it is in the classroom, sports field, on stage, or on the playground, people should be recognized for showing great effort and behavior. Everyone thrives when recognized for doing a great job.

I am proud to say the Brodhead School District scores in the "Exceeds Expectations" category on the 2021-22 State Report Card. Our Administrative Team has been receiving ongoing training on how to be better "instructional coaches" for our teachers. There are highimpact methods of instruction that have been proven to be effective in student success. A big part of our professional development this year was to provide our teaching staff with consistent and research-based instructional practices that we teach and expect in all classrooms. We are proud of the quality instruction our staff provides and always look for ways to improve. Our standardized test results have not come out yet, but we are excited to see the results of our combined efforts.

Family and Community Engagement: Improving communication with our families has been another one of our priorities this school year. Our new Brodhead School District Website and App. have provided us with more opportunities to communicate events and activities happening in our District. We have also increased the amount of our social media platforms and posts in an effort to reach more people. We want the Brodhead community to know and understand the goals and initiatives we have going on in our District.

A priority our District set this year was to provide more academic

and behavioral feedback to families. We have gone back to sending physical report cards for the first time in several years. With many families not having the ability to view report cards through our Skyward reporting system, we felt it was important to make sure all families were aware of their child's academic progress. Our District survey information shows improved satisfaction from our families in the areas of keeping parents informed about academic progress, feedback about children's learning, and continued high scores for staff expectations for learning and staff caring about the academic success of our students.

District Culture, Wellness, and Engagement: A positive culture is an important foundation for a District. A supportive environment and positive relationships between staff and students need to be in place for other aspects of our schools to be successful. We survey our students and staff every year and use that information to help us focus our efforts in areas of need.

One important thing our data has shown us is that we need to take more time to help and support our newest staff members. We have a process in place that provides our newest staff members with frequent and timely support from Administration to ensure they have the resources necessary to succeed. We also use our student survey data to provide additional support to our students in needed areas. Based on our student survey results from last year, we are making more of an effort to improve teacher/student relationships with specific and timely recognition. We all know the power of a timely thank you, or recognition for doing something well. A student will work hard for a teacher who they know cares about them and wants them to succeed. This is something we focused on as a staff this year.

Finance and Facilities: The Brodhead Board of Education has established a Facility Planning Committee, which is a group of over 20 individuals from the Brodhead School District staff and community. The job of this Committee is to develop and refine short-term and long-term priorities for our District's facilities and determine how to fund those priorities. This Facility Planning Committee meets on the third Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. These meetings will continue through the summer with the goal of presenting our School Board with a recommendation to consider at the September 13 School Board Meeting. Each of these meetings is open to the public with agendas posted in the Independent Register prior to each meeting. ## **GOLDEN GIRLS**




