Brodhead pool rescue

Good morning citizens of Brodhead and neighboring communities!

Wednesday, June 14th, the City of Brodhead released the following:

"On Wednesday, June 14th, 2023 at 2:05 p.m., the Brodhead Police Department received a 911 call for an unresponsive, juvenile male at the Brodhead pool. Pool staff quickly removed the juvenile from the water and rendered care immediately, while awaiting arrival of the first responders. Brodhead Police Department, Brodhead Area EMS, and the Brodhead Fire District responded to the Brodhead public pool. The patient was transported by Brodhead Area EMS for further care. The Brodhead Pool will remain closed for the rest of the day."

I am pleased to inform you that the juvenile is reportedly doing very fine because of the efforts of all involved in the rescue, especially the life-guards on scene who pulled the unresponsive juvenile from the water and administered CPR immediately, saving his life.

As some of you may know, I live near the swimming pool and was

able to be on scene quickly. I was fortunate enough to meet and thank the two young heroes and the rest of the staff. It was humbling and emotional to talk to the young heroes. I found myself choking back tears of gratitude as I thanked them for the quick, life saving actions they performed. We are truly blessed to have such fine young people in the city of Brodhead.

I would also like to recognize all of the first responders who were at the scene and supporting from remote areas. Brodhead Police, Brodhead Fire District and Brodhead Area EMS did an awesome job of controlling the scene and making sure that nothing was going to interfere with the rescue efforts.

As I was observing, I was impressed with the actions of all the children and patrons of the pool as they waited to find out what was going on. They remained calm, orderly and stayed back from the scene on their own.

It is the heroic and responsive actions of the citizens of Brodhead that make me proud to be your Mayor!

\$50,000 In **Donations** for JV **Softball Field** Received

The district received \$25,000 in donations from both the Brodhead Area Foundation and the Brodhead Sports Boosters toward the cost of the new JV Softball Field. Any remaining costs above these two donations will be paid with funds from the sign advertisement fund. Superintendent Novy acknowledged both groups for their donations.

Due to several budget items coming in lower than expected, the expected \$24,000 budget deficit looks now looks to be a surplus of approximately \$50,000 or more, depending on several budget items yet to be finalized.

This surplus could fund several needed projects such as replacing middle school fencing, gravel for the upgrade at the front of the elementary school, replacing Honeywell controllers at the elemen-



Funding Available for Green County Businesses

Green County businesses looking to expand can benefit from low interest loans through Green County Development Corporation's (GCDC) Revolving Loan Fund.

High growth startup or emerging growth companies in manufacturing, agriculture, food processing, medical devices, biosciences, or energy industries are eligible to apply for up to \$100,000.

Activities can include acquisitions of buildings, land, or fixed assets; site prep, construction or reconstruction and fixed equipment installation; demolition, clearance or removal of structures or building rehab; and/or working capital for inventory and direct labor costs.

GCDC administers this loan with funds raised through donations from local banks and the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC). This program started in 2019 and is sustained with interest paid from current loan recipients—a revolving loan fund.

An application is completed and reviewed by the committee who then performs an interview with the company to talk through the plan and answer any questions.

GCDC is a 501c3 corporation committed to building public and private partnerships that promote and encourage economic growth while maintaining the quality of life that makes Green County a great place to live and work.

Habitat Offers Home in Brodhead

Habitat for Humanity of Green County (HHGC) has reopened the search for a partner family to assist in the rehabilitation of a home. The home, located at 1202 East 6th Avenue in Brodhead, was built by HHGC in 2014. The home has 1,700 square feet of living space, 1,400 square feet on the main level and 300 on the lower level. The first floor includes a combined kitchen/dining area, a living room, three bedrooms and two full bathrooms. The lower level of the home includes two finished rooms and an unfinished space that houses the furnace and water heater. The home also has an attached two-car garage with a concrete driveway.

A family (one or more individuals) must meet the following qualifications:

Need—To qualify to own this Habitat built home, a family income must fall below 80% of the area median family income and within the guidelines established for this home. Also, the family's current housing situation must be determined to be physically inadequate, unsafe, overcrowded, or a cost burden. A qualified family would not qualify for other/conventional mortgage financing.

Ability to Pay the Mortgage-A family must have the financial means to make monthly, interestfree mortgage payments which will include homeowner's insurance and real estate taxes, as well as the ability to pay other expenses of owning and maintaining a home. This is determined by income verification, credit reports, assessment of all other household debt, projected utility costs, and any special assessments and other costs directly associated with the ownership of a home. Habitat wants families to be successful homeowners and determining the ability to pay is a key factor in the selection process. The down payment and closing costs can be covered by

Willingness to Partner-When selected, a family becomes a partner in the Habitat program and will assist in the rehabilitation of their own home. For this project, a total of 150 "sweat equity" hours per adult family member is required. Applicants must show visible evidence of their potential to keep a house clean and in good repair by their concern for proper maintenance of their present living quarters. Applicants must express willingness to participate in the personal development programs selected, e.g. budget counseling, home maintenance, etc.

Ties to the Community—Applicants must be permanent residents of the United States and must have lived or worked in Green County for one year immediately prior to applying. Applicants who can demonstrate ties to the community in other ways may be considered.

Eligible families must complete an application for homeownership. Applications must be submitted by Monday, July 17, 2023. The application and an information sheet which includes income parameters can be printed from the Habitat website at greencountyhabitat.org or picked up at the Habitat Resale Store at 305 2nd Street in Monroe. The application process also includes a home visit, income verification, a credit check, an assessment of existing debt, and sex offender and criminal background checks on all adult family members.

Habitat for Humanity is committed to providing safe, decent and affordable housing and to offering financial education and other programs to facilitate successful home ownership. Green County Board of Supervisors Set into Motion Agricultural Tourism in Green County

As family farms continue to be squeezed, Agricultural Tourism offers an economic engine to help diversify income to sustain farmers and rural communities. By allowing farm-based adventures, learning opportunities, recreation and food experiences that attract visitors to Wisconsin's working farms, Agricultural Tourism provides a unique connection with agriculture through entertainment, education and farm products.

Under the direction of Green County Supervisor and Land Use and Zoning Committee Chair Dennis Schwartz, the Green County Board of Supervisors voted on Tuesday, April 18 to approve the final zoning changes needed for farmers in Green County to host Agricultural Tourism events on their land. With the goal of allowing every working farm the opportunity to develop additional revenue streams through agricultural tourism enterprises, these new zoning regulations, championed by Supervisors and Land Use and Zoning Committee members Sue Nelson and Kathy Pennington, allow for a robust list of allowable and conditional uses within the Agricultural District.

"Agriculture is a vital part of the Green County economy. With the passage of the recent Agricultural Tourism zoning codes, we are helping to leverage this growing industry to set these business owners and our rural community up for success in the future," Olivia Otte, Executive Director, Green County Development Corporation.

The updated sanitation code passed Tuesday support the Agricultural Tourism zoning changes made last year that include allowable uses with no permit required for roadside farmstands, wineries, breweries, distilleries and more. Conditional use permit activities include Agricultural Entertainment and Seasonal Event Centers.

Three years in the making, a local alliance of organizations including the Green County Economic Development Corporation, Farm Bureau of Green County, Wisconsin Farmers Union South Central Chapter, Wisconsin Agricultural Tourism Association, Green County Women in Sustainable Ag (Soil Sisters) and others worked together to support

the adoption of this important economic driver.

"The Wisconsin Agricultural Tourism Association would like to thank the Green County leadership for working collaboratively with farmers to bring the Ag Zoning Ordinance up-to-date to meet both the consumers and farmers desires," Jean Bahn, Advocacy Chair, Wisconsin Agricultural Tourism Association.

The average on-farm, non-commercial venue wedding generates \$3,000-\$5,000 in rental income for the farm and roughly \$22,500 per event for the surrounding rural businesses. This includes revenue for local businesses such as the bakery, catering, hotels, gas stations, restaurants, hair stylists, photographer, DJ, florist and more.

"Given Green County's proximity to Chicago and Madison, it is a perfect destination for families seeking to visit and experience our unique brand of farming. Thanks to the Green County Board, local farms can now welcome visitors onto their farms and host events. We thank them for their continued support of our farming community," Matt Scheaffer, president, South Central Chapter of Wisconsin Farmers Union.

Wisconsin is widely recognized as America's Agricultural Tourism Destination. The total tourism impact for Green County is \$72 million with direct consumer spending \$40.9 million employing nearly 700 people contributing to labor income of \$20.9 million adding \$44 million in state and local taxes.

A Brief History of the Pride Flag



Designed by artist Gilbert Baker, the original rainbow flag made its debut at the San Francisco Gay Freedom Day Parade celebration on June 25, 1978. The pink and light blue strips were later dropped, creating the 6-stripe rainbow flag that is still used today.



Unveiled in June 2017, the "More Colors More Pride" flag includes a black stripe and a brown stripe to draw attention to underrepresented people of color within the community.



June 2018 brought the release of a new design by designer Daniel Quasar. This flag places a greater emphasis on inclusion and progression. The Progress pride flag adds a chevron pattern to the original 6-stripe rainbow representing marginalized people of color, trans individuals, and those living with HIV/AIDS (and those who have been lost).



Designed by Valentino Vecchietti of Intersex Equality rights UK, this design builds on Daniel Quasar's 2018 Progress Pride flag by adding a yellow triangle and purple circle. The updated design reflects the need to include underrepresented intersex people in the broader pride imagery.



Created in 1999 by Monica Helms, the Transgender flag represents the transgender community and consists of five horizontal stripes. Two light blue stripes for boys, two pink stripes for girls, with a white stripe in the center for those who are transitioning, who feel they have a neutral gender or no gender, and those who are intersex.



First used in the early 2000s, the straight ally flag represents unity and support towards the LGBTQ+ community. The letter 'A' means ally, the black and white stripes represent the straight flag and the rainbow colors in the letter 'A' are for the LGBTQ+ community.






