Green County to Take Emergency Dispatch Fulltime Next Year

After discussing in closed session, the council voted to direct the city attorney to prepare a resolution to be sent to the Green County Board informing them the city will be dissolving its 911 emergency dispatch and that they will need to provide service full time starting January 1, 2025.

Nick Burkhalter expressed concern about enforcement of municipal codes, in particular when it comes to work done after a building permit is denied. Police Chief Raupp responded that the department has been downsized by one officer and their priority is emergency calls. He further stated that they investigate code violations any time there is a complaint. Chief Raupp reported that when a new Community Service Officer is hired, that person would be able to go out looking for violations of the municipal code.

There was much discussion about the position of Building Inspector after the mayor received an

unsolicited resume from someone wanting to be considered for the job. The mayor and alders Baxter and Burkhalter are all aware of issues reaching the current Inspector. Attorney Schroeder explained that, prior to the current contract for services, the city had a full time Building Inspector/Zoning Administrator until that person left to work in Monroe. The Council voted to have the Planning Commission look into the situation.

A representative of Pellitteri Waste explained options to the council should they decide not to renew the contract with the Green County Landfill. If the city opted not to move forward with the landfill, they would assume tipping fees, tonnage, and other costs. He said the most economical way to go is to stay with Green County. Rock or Dane County would be significantly more expensive and may lead to collecting waste over two days instead of one because of the additional distance. After discussion in





The team had a strong judging session sharing their engineering process in building and coding their robot, core values, and how they iterated their Innovation Project "The Custom Carver" from a brainstormed idea to a fully functional model. The Custom Carver is the first custom moldable knife handle for beginning carvers. The judges loved getting a chance to mold a handle and were impressed that the team wrote an article for "Chip Chats" the National Woodcarver Association's Magazine.

Robot performance was a big area of growth this year thanks to new coach, Kent Walton. The team learned a lot about physics and forces, which helped them design, build, and code a very consistently performing robots, Giant and Gigantica. One of their goals at AROC was to record an official match over 400 points. They blew that away scoring 410, 425, and 425 in their three official matches. They finished 11th in the robot game, which is the highest they have ever done in a post-season competition.

Team 2x4 was incredibly honored to be asked to give their presentation to the entire audience of about 1000 people. Then at the award ceremony they were given the Champion's Finalist Award. This award celebrates a team that embodies the FIRST LEGO League Challenge experience by fully embracing the Core Values while achieving excellence and innovation in Robot Performance, Robot Design, and the Innovation Project. Being a finalist means the team finished either second or third for the entire competition! Evan Schneider says, "We've never won a Champion's Award at a post season tournament. It was very exciting!"

The team had such a great experience at AROC. Timothy Walton commented, "I'd go back in a heartbeat because its fun!" "Collecting items from teams and winning award made for a great time," according to Mason Williams. Halee Williams said, "Everything was fun!" adding, "I enjoyed teaching everyone about The Custom Carver and launching a successful run one in the robot game."

There is only a short break before the next season starts on Tuesday, August 6th. Team 2x4 encourages families and school officials to contact them, as they'd love to help get more robotics teams in the Stateline area. They are hosting an FLL Boot Camp on Tuesday, August 6th to help new teams get a strong start.

Victor Illichmann, a long-time volunteer and supporter of Green-Rock Audubon Society, received the 2024 Land Trust Volunteer of the Year Award from Gathering Waters: Wisconsin's Alliance for Land Trusts on May 23, 2024 at a private celebration in Janesville, Wisconsin.

Victor Illichmann began the intensive land management of Green-Rock Audubon Society properties over 20 years ago. It started with just a borrowed tractor and brush mower, cutting back willows that had overgrown the property at the Spring Creek Reserve.

Over time, supporting Green-Rock Audubon Society as a long-term Board member and volunteer, Victor helped identify the properties that needed work most urgently. He had a vision for what could be done to return the land to a state that would enhance the population of native plants, birds, and insects, and he made that vision a reality.

Victor partnered with the National Resources Conservation Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and other organizations to seek out funding for Green-Rock Audubon Society's efforts. Walking through the acres of restored properties that previously were overgrown messes and are now delightful woods and prairies, it is evident what Victor has accomplished.

When was the last time you tested your well water?

The 2023 Consumer Confidence Report was sent out for the City of Monroe's well water annual summary of multiple tests they conduct throughout the year. There are a total of five wells in Monroe which range from 680 feet deep to 1,800 feet. Other towns like Monticello, New Glarus, and many others follow the Safe Drinking Water Act, which allows citizens of Wisconsin to have access to safe and sustainable water.

Transient non-community water systems (TN) have different regulations. If the well serves at least 25 people for a minimum of 60 days a year, its regulated in this category. These are usually in rural areas such as churches, campgrounds, restaurants and more. The responsibility for TNs is to maintain a code-complying water system and submit the required water samples. Green County Public Health works with local organizations and businesses who have TN wells to regularly inspect their water systems, test their water, and address any contamination issues.

Private well owners need to be their own advocate. Unlike cities and TNs, they do not have any rules and regulations for testing. Often people feel that their well water is safe because it looks clear. You should not assume your water is safe to drink without testing it. Now would be a great time to get your well water tested. It assures your water is free of harmful contaminants or at least to know their levels. Wisconsin DNR recommends that you test your well once a year. Some areas in Green County have more contaminants like nitrates and bacteria than others

Private well owners should test their well water to make sure their water is safe. You can pick up a homeowner package test kit at the Green County Public Health to test for bacteria and nitrate. If you are wanting to test for metals and/or pesticides, you'll need to contact UW Stevens Point Water and Environmental Analysis Laboratory. Call them at 715-346-3209 or for further questions on well testing call Green County Public Health at 608-328-
