WCMA Cheers \$12 Million in Funding for Dairy Innovation

The Wisconsin Cheese Makers Association (WCMA) today applauded the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) announcement of \$12 million in federal funding for four dairy innovation centers across the U.S., including the Dairy Business Innovation Alliance (DBIA) run by WCMA and the Center for Dairy Research (CDR).

The announcement was made at Decatur Dairy, a WCMA member business led by Steve Stettler, a current member and former president of WCMA's Board of Directors. The company received a DBIA grant in 2022 to support the expansion of its cheese plant and strengthen the local market for milk from the producers of the Decatur Swiss Cheese Co-op.

"The DBIA is delivering real successes—and more than \$16 million in grants so far—to dairy businesses across the Midwest," said WCMA Executive Director John Umhoefer. "We appreciate USDA's ongoing support, and we're excited to continue this critical work with our partners at CDR."

Since DBII was launched in the 2018 Farm Bill under the leadership of Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), it has directed \$165 million in federal funding to support farmers and processors.

"The Dairy Business Innovation Initiatives utilize a unique approach of providing both technical assistance and subawards to small and mid-sized dairy businesses," said USDA Under Secretary Jenny Lester Moffitt. "Through this, the businesses are able to diversify markets


and income, develop higher value uses for their milk products, and achieve higher returns."

The new funding will be awarded noncompetitively to the four existing programs. The DBIA will be eligible for approximately \$3 million to support product research and development, technical assistance, education, and grants to dairy businesses in Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

As Congress debates appropriations for DBII for the next Farm Bill and fiscal year, dairy processors' voices are urgently needed to advocate for continued funding for this essential program. # Thoughts about being a veteran

During past wars like World War I and World War II, our way of life was threatened; we felt it was our Patriotic duty to join the military to defend our country and we were our county's citizens. Young people joined the military because they felt it was their duty. Many members of the military saw action in the war zone in combat situations and many died serving their country. Many also served in support positions both abroad and at home.

During the Vietnam War era the public increasingly became opposed to the war. It was not a popular war at home. The public then took it out on the soldiers. They did not honor them or respect them. Nobody said "Thank you for your service". Young men and women still had volunteered or been drafted and were trained in the same manner as previously.

Many people like myself enlisted because of the mandatory draft. I joined the Air Force to have the choice of a non combat role but I did serve my country. Through military entrance test, I was selected to receive personnel clerk training. Many ran away to Canada. People burned the flag. Some went absent without leave after they were in the military. This was not a war where people felt like we were defending our country; the patriotic spirit was often lacking. Myself and others who joined the military joined because it was required. After we joined we were trained and obeyed orders for as long as required. I certainly didn't join to learn a trade or because of pay. Sometimes people did learn something they could apply to a civilian job in the future. I found myself over 2000 miles from home with very little money. Starting pay was less than \$100 month. It was difficult to get home even when I got time off. Sometimes I was lonely even with thousands of servicemen around me. I thought that at least I had a job where I was safe from combat. My service as a clerk did provide me with three meals a day and a comfortable room at my duty station. I was supporting the war. This was the first time in my life I was on my own. Sure when I was going to college, I had quite a bit of independence but I had people I knew around me and I was only 40 miles from home so I would go home most weekends and summers when school was done for the year. So after I think back about my experience, I am glad that I served and proud to have been a part of it.

I came home after being honorably discharged and found a job and started a family. I used my GI Bill education benefits to complete my college education and earn a Bachelor's Degree. Eleven years later I joined the Indiana Army National Guard in the same type of job that I had in the Air Force. I agreed to attend weekend meetings once a month and two week active duty training for two weeks each year. My motivation was different this time. I was not going to be drafted; I was not supporting a war. I was providing a reserve a backup for our active duty military. My reasons involved that fact that I felt that I needed the additional money to support my family. I did learn skills to defend our country. I received extensive training in military operations for war and as part of my training I became familiar with infantry skills. I






# Wayne A. Nipple

Using the PDCA (Purebred Dairy Cattle Association) Unified Scorecard, they learned to assess dairy animals based on four categories-Udder, Dairy Strength, Rear Feet and Legs, and Frame. Throughout these practices they strengthened their precise and quick decision making and problem-solving skills, for the timedevent competition. In addition, juniors (youth under 14 years of age) learned how to answer Type Analysis Questions (TAQs) on a chosen class. Seniors (youth 14 years and over) learned how to give oral reasons on how and why they placed a particular class. At the contest, each individual had seven classes to judge. Each class consisted of four animals to place. Juniors also had to answer 10 TAQs for two of the classes, while seniors had to present oral reasons individually on two of the classes. Both the junior and senior teams performed well. Making up the Junior Team was Sierra McCullough (Juda Jolly Juniors), Abby Withrow (Decatur), Braxton Boeke (Spring Grove Honest Workers), and Brooklynn Dosio (Juda Jolly Juniors). They placed ninth as a team. The Senior Team was composed of Taylor Svendsen (Dougherty Creek), Ellie Modaff (Jolly Mixers), Reese Speth (New Glarus), and Grace Gold (Next Generation). They placed fifth as a team both overall and for oral reasons. Kate Olmedo (Juda Jolly Juniors) and Brooke Mueller (Clarence Bridge Pioneers) also represented Green County in the Senior Division. Additionally, they had two youth members participate in the Dairy Showmanship event. Those members were Elena Boss (Cheese Country Clovers) and Joclyn Watson (Cheese Coun-

This year, they also had a Junior Livestock Judging team compete. Breeding and market cattle, swine, sheep, and meat goats are evaluated in this contest. Junior members (youth under 14 years of age) are asked a set of 10 questions based on a class in addition to placings. They are asked three sets of questions. Participants additionally had to complete a slaughter cattle grading portion on the scantron for market cattle. In this section, participants are asked to give each animal a quality and yield grade. Prior to this event, the youth attend classroom practices to become familiar with the scantron, learn about the anatomy of livestock animals, and judge online classes. The Junior team consisted of Thadeus Miller (Browntown Busy Beavers), Benson Miller (Browntown Busy Beavers), Adelynn Monson (Jolly Mixers), Zoie Donovan (Young Americans), and Cambrie Donovan (Young Americans). They placed 10th overall as a team. The coach for this team was Katie Brooks. Congratulations to all the youth who participated!

Additionally, one youth member participated in the Photography and Poster Contest. Remington Zilliox (Washington Center) earned a red ribbon (second place) for his poster. Congratulations!

Area Animal Science Day is designed to give 4-H youth an opportunity to learn more about the educational opportunities in the 4-H Animal Science Projects. 4-H youth are able to learn about livestock and dairy evaluation, while increasing decision making skills through judging and grading experiences. These events are focused more on the learning experience rather than the contest and competition. 



# Restored Knight Mfg Equipment Revealed at Depot Museum

Three pieces of newly-restored vintage Knight Manufacturing equipment were revealed at the Depot Museum on Saturday, May 25, to volunteers who made it all happen. The project started with the vintage Knight Unloader Box (on loan from Rebout Family Farms) and the 115 Manure Spreader (acquired from Ted Knight's estate). Historical Society liaison Doug Pinnow, greatly assisted by Jim Huffman-Brodhead's Thresheree Coordinator and John Deere farm equipment aficionado-contacted several local skilled volunteers and businesses. and in Summer 2023 the project was underway. It became a community project—the skills, interest, enthusiasm, generosity, and quick time frame was astonishing and impressive—our little community just crawls with passion and energy for this! Amidst the farming community conversations, yet another vintage Knight innovation, the Nitrogen Applicator, was located and donated. Enthusiasm grew as the preservation and appearance was enhanced each step along the way, from sand-blasting, painting, new tires, storage inside over winter, then adding final paint details, decals and signage.

A list of the people and their involvement is available at the Depot Museum, and their names are also on the signage next to each piece of equipment. This restoration is history in the making as well! Brodhead Historical Society is grateful for

all involved, for being part of preserving our history for generations ahead to appreciate.

The volunteers attending the "Reveal" in May were treated to a unique surprise arranged by Jim Huffman. They enjoyed a ride in a Knight Wagon that had been restored last fall by its new owner, and converted into a "people hauler". A tour from the Depot Museum to the former Knight Manufacturing site, now Kuhn North America, was enjoyed by all, riding in the wagons pulled by tractors. Animated Knight Mfg stories were shared by all.
