Rick graduated from Albany High School in 1977 and attended Blackhawk Area Technical College. He was employed at Woodman's Food Stores for 34 years as a cashier and later a supervisor, retiring in 2020.

He loved sports and followed his favorite teams—Packers, Badgers, Brewers, and Bucks. If he was not at the game, he was sure to be watching at home. He went to as many games as possible, even attending Brewers spring training games in Arizona. SSM Health donates essential items to House of Hope

Special baskets provide necessities for a fresh start

When House of Hope, a female sober living facility in Monroe, opened its doors in 2021, SSM Health Monroe Hospital made the connection to support these women through the creation of immediate need baskets.

When many women arrive at House of Hope, they do not have any personal items with them. Each of the 18 immediate need baskets are filled with shampoo, conditioner, body wash, toothpaste, toothbrush, deodorant, razor, bath towel, journal, mindfulness coloring book and more.

"I think these baskets will give women hope, like someone has reached out to them with kindness," shared Tammie Jamiska, SSM Health Community Health Specialist. "Our purpose is to give them a little bit of peace when they get to House of Hope and help them to further their journey of therapy and staying sober."

Residents of House of Hope are women who have been clean and sober for 30 days and are on a journey to integrate back into the community. While staying in this residential home, they are actively working or are in school.

"I'm very excited, the baskets are so warm [and] will make them feel so welcomed," expressed Susie Schuetz, mentor at House of Hope. "They will have everything they need right in their basket."

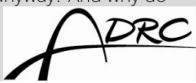

Albany, Brodhead and Juda students have a lot on their plates, but often there's not enough food on them—here's how you can help

There are seven area school districts who have formed a partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank and SWCAP to provide weekend foods and in-school snacks to their students at no cost. Let's focus on three of those seven districts: During 2021, there were 496 weekend food bags issued to Alba-

ny students; 1,063 to Juda students, and 1,547 to Brodhead students. These weekend bags contain shelf-stable foods so the student has sufficient foods over the weekend. In March 2022, we expanded this program to include in-school snacks for students.

Research on the impact of child hunger was commissioned by Feeding America and the ConAgra Foods Foundation. Their report titled, "Child Food Insecurity: The Impact On Our Nation" found the following:

Child Hunger Is a Health Problem
Hungry children are sick more often, and more likely to have to be hospitalized;
Hungry children suffer growth impairment that precludes their reaching their full physical potential,

Hungry children incur developmental impairments that limit their physical, intellectual and emotional development.

Child Hunger is an Educational Problem

Hungry children ages 0-3 years cannot learn as much, as fast, or as well because chronic undernutrition harms their cognitive development during this critical period of rapid brain growth, actually changing the fundamental neurological architecture of the brain and central nervous system,

Hungry children do more poorly in school and have lower academic achievement because they are not well prepared for school and cannot concentrate,

Hungry children have more social and behavioral problems because they feel bad, have less energy

for complex social interactions, and cannot adapt as effectively to environmental stresses.

When school resumes in September, there will likely be a bigger food insecurity issue than what we had in 2021. Why? During the pandemic, all students could receive free breakfast and lunches and that program ends this summer. If federal action is not taken to continue the free breakfast and lunches, families will have to qualify for free/reduced meals and while this program will help some, some students will not qualify.

The partnership between SWCAP, Second Harvest Food Bank and each school district allows these programs to operate without administrative/staffing costs and the only charge to the program is

the cost of food purchased through Second Harvest Food Bank. Each school provides an in-kind contribution to their program through the confidential issuance of foods to participating students. The only eligibility requirement is being a student in each of these schools; no questions are asked.

So, how can you help? These three programs exist through grant funds and local donations. If you wish to contribute to one or more of the programs, please make your check payable to SWCAP along with the name of the school(s) so funds are applied to the appropriate account.

Together, we can end food insecurity within our students. No student should ever be hungry.

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Subject Arrested After Pursuit, After Being Released From Jail 6 Days Earlier

On Thursday, July 7, 2022 at approximately 10:03 p.m. Brodhead Police attempted to stop a east-bound silver Nissan pickup for speeding. Police state the pickup was traveling 48 mph in a posted 25 mph speed limit zone in the 400 block of 1st Street (STH 11). During the pursuit driver turned off pickups headlamps and taillamps. Speeds reached in excess of 100 mph before police terminated at STH 11 and STH 213 in Orfordville, due to the STH 11 being closed for a bridge replacement between Orfordville and Footville.

Police notified Rock County law enforcement agencies of the pursuit and were subsequently notified by the City of Beloit Police. Beloit Police stopped the pickup in the area of Liberty Avenue (STH 213) and 6th Street. Brodhead Police responded to this area and took into custody William J. Hoefle, 48, of Freeport, Illinois. The passenger in the vehicle was cooperative with police and released.

Hoefle was cited for several traffic violation. In addition Hoefle is being referred to the Green County District Attorney's Office for fleeing an officer in a motor vehicle, recklessly endangering safety and bail jumping. Hoefle was released on July 1, 2022 from Rock County Sheriff's Jail after posting a cash bond on charges of burglary, theft, and criminal damage to property. Hoefle's next court appearance in Rock County Circuit Court is on Wednesday, July 13th.

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2021 Weekend Food Programs for students—students continue to need our help!

The 2021 Weekend Food Programs Annual Report has been released. Through a partnership between Southwestern Wisconsin Community Action Program (SWCAP), Second Harvest Food Bank, and the School Districts of Albany, Black Hawk, Brodhead, Juda, Monticello, New Glarus, and Pecatonica, weekend foods are provided to participating students in these Districts at no cost to the District or student.

During 2021, 5,971 weekend food packs were issued to students in these seven Districts. Here's how the partnership works. SWCAP donates administrative functions, maintaining separate accounts for each District; volunteers fundraise, transport foods to the schools, and write grants to support the purchase of the foods through Second Harvest Food Bank. Second Harvest's purchasing power provides low-cost nutritious foods to participating students. Each District provides an in-kind contribution to the program through the confidential distribution of foods to students. Only the District knows the identity of the student and the only expense to this program is the cost of food through Second Harvest.

Are these foods needed? Two reports indicate the likelihood of food insecurity within students in these Districts.

Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's School Report Cards 2020–2021 indicate the percentage of students who are 'Economically Disadvantaged' in each of the Districts:

Albany—39.2%; Black Hawk—51.6%; Brodhead—48.4%; Juda—67.5%; Monticello—44.5%; New Glarus—21.4%; and Pecatonica—36.5%

United Way's ALICE report for the Wisconsin Counties of Green and Lafayette also shows a sizeable percentage of households whose income is not keeping pace with the cost of living. ALICE is an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed — households that earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living for the county (the ALICE Threshold). This is the percentage of households in poverty/ALICE:

Village of Albany—36%; Village of Blanchardville (Pecatonica)—31%; City of Brodhead—43%; Village of Gratiot (Black Hawk)—37%; Jefferson Township (Juda)—31%; Village of Monticello —34%; Village of New Glarus—23%; and Village of South Wayne (Black Hawk)—48%
