District Seeking School Psychologist

The district has received no applicants for the current school psychologist opening due to a significant nationwide shortage of school psychologists. They are proactively contacting individuals and organizations who might be interested or might offer a referral.

June was a very busy month with several Building and Grounds summer projects getting done. The project in front of the elementary school and concrete work have been completed. At the time of the meeting, the elementary roof and assembly of new bleachers were nearly complete. By assembling the bleachers, themselves, the Building and Grounds department saved the district \$15,000.

In the Information Technology area, a new Internet failover system was put in place as well as a continuity device to maintain internal communications during an outage. They also saved the district an estimated \$1,500 by harvesting parts from Chromebooks no longer in use.

The final 2022-2023 budget ended up with a \$337,000 surplus.

The deficit in the preliminary 2023-2024 budget was substantially decreased after the passing of the new state budget with the new revenue limits.

Five area businesses will be added to the Association of School Boards' Business Honor Roll this year. The plan is to acknowledge five local businesses this way every year going forward.

The board approved of Superintendent Novy arranging for a presentation by Upper90 on a potential future solar array project. The company is currently working with the Monticello and Juda School Districts with good results.

In other business:

Breakfast, lunch and milk prices will remain the same for the upcoming school year as will student fees.

Bread and milk bids were accepted from the current vendors with only minor increases in costs.

Two sections of the district policies were approved. These included revising the process for challenging instructional materials, which is modeled after the process used in Evansville.

Brodhead Embarks on Community Economic Analysis Pilot Project

Brodhead is taking a significant step forward in shaping its future. The City of Brodhead has been chosen as one of the five rural Wisconsin communities to participate in the Community Economic Analysis for Rural Wisconsin Communities (CEA-RWC) Pilot Initiative. This program, a collaboration between the University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension and the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC), aims to develop a comprehensive community economic development strategic plan tailored specifically to Brodhead.

The CEA-RWC pilot program will leverage the input and expertise of the local community to identify the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and challenges facing Brodhead. Drawing on economic and demographic data, project participants will engage in extensive discussions to recommend strategies and formulate an actionable community economic development plan.

On Wednesday, July 26, the inaugural meeting of this effort will take place by focusing on economic and demographic trends related to Brodhead. The following meetings will focus on identifying strategic priorities for the community. The core leadership group, comprising representatives from diverse local community and economic sectors, will guide this endeavor. Their collective insights will play a crucial role in shaping the strategic goals of the plan and envisioning a stronger, more prosperous local economy for the next decade.

Throughout the process, Extension will facilitate connections to state and federal resources and grants, offering invaluable support to help achieve the project's goals.

Safely Managing the Disposal of Lithium Batteries: A Call for Public Awareness and Policy Action

When lithium batteries are disposed of in the trash or recycling, they pose a significant risk to combust and cause fires. In the past eight months, two Southern Wisconsin recycling facilities have experienced catastrophic damage from fires that are believed to have begun by lithium batteries—Columbia County Recycling and Solid Waste facility in Portage and a City of Milwaukee recycling facility. A third recycling facility fire at John's Disposal in Whitewater may have also been caused by a lithium battery. Recycling Centers are particularly sensitive to fires because of the amount of paper and cardboard being recycled.

Lithium batteries have gained widespread popularity because they are compact, lightweight, and have high-energy storage capacity, making them indispensable to our modern, on-the-go lifestyles. From cell phones, tablets, and laptops to power tools, scooters, and electric cars, lithium batteries power our world. As lithium and other, newer battery technologies become abundant in our daily lives, it is crucial to address the hazards associated with their disposal.

In writing this, I hope that we can get the word out to everyone that lithium batteries, and products that contain these batteries, cannot go in the trash or recycling without creating a major risk to waste handling facilities. In Wisconsin, we are fortunate to have a robust waste and recycling system infrastructure composed of recycling centers, transfer stations and landfills that keep waste contained and out of the public realm. As lithium and other battery technologies have become more prevalent, so have batteryrelated fires within these facilities. Each one of these fires has the potential to not just knock out local infrastructure, but also to threaten the lives of workers.

The number of fires will continue to grow if these batteries are disposed of by traditional methods. Recycling facilities are complex

operations, with high-tech sorting technologies. When a recycling facility has a catastrophic fire, it could take a year or more before it can be rebuilt and come back online. Landfill fires burn not just above ground, but they can get beneath the surface making them difficult to contain. These underground fires can burn for weeks until they are fully extinguished.

We are just starting to see the effects of these battery technologies on the waste and recycling infrastructure. We need to stop disposing of batteries by normal waste and recycling methods. Battery manufacturers, retailers, politicians, and government agencies need to work quickly to create a safe and easily accessible infrastructure for battery disposal. Broader public policy and education efforts are needed now. Planning and action should be taken to encourage lawmakers to provide more concrete guidelines and options for more accessible methods to recycle and dispose of these materials.

We have working models in place with other waste products that we can adapt for batteries. For example, Wisconsin has a robust electronics take back and recycling program supported financially by the manufacturers and sellers of electronics. Batteries could be added to this program, or we could mimic the electronics program with a separate infrastructure specifically for batteries. There is also an option for deposits on batteries so consumers would have financial incentives to take them to drop-off sites. There are other states using different methods that might work as well. There are answers and solutions available. Please call your State of Wisconsin representatives and tell them there is a problem and that you support legislation that will help keep our recycling centers, waste infrastructure system and the people working in these facilities safe.

In the meantime, we ask all Wisconsinites, please do NOT put lithium batteries in your trash or recycling containers. If you need to charge it...it has a battery. Don't throw it out. Check with your municipality, county, or Call2recycle. com for a nearby drop-off site.

Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library Introduction to Cranes, shorebirds, and other waterbirds

The Durand Library is privileged to offer a presentation Saturday, July 22 on waterbirds by Dr. James Giocomo of the American Bird Conservatory. Everyone is cordially invited to take advantage of this timely presentation about these beautiful birds as many will soon be passing through Illinois during their annual migration south.

Jim, a native of Illinois, is the Central Region Director for the American Bird Conservatory and is based here in Durand. He works to plan and build bird conservation efforts across the Great Plains from Texas in the south, to Montana and Canada in the north, and over to Illinois and Wisconsin in the east. Jim did his undergraduate and Master's degree work in Pennsylvania focusing his studies on songbird productivity in forest settings. He earned a Ph.D. in Natural Resources from the University of Tennessee.

Jim holds a PhD in ornithnogy and is the Central Region Director for the American Bird Conservatory and is based in Durand. He works to plan and build bird conservation efforts across the Great Plains from Texas in the south, to Montana and Canada in the north, and over to Illinois and Wisconsin in the east. Previously, Jim worked in Texas and Oklahoma as the Oaks and Prairies Joint Venture Coordinator for 15 years. Jim is originally from Illinois, but he did his undergraduate and Master's degree work in Pennsylvania focusing his work on songbird productivity in forest settings. Jim earned a Ph.D. in Natural Resources from the University of Tennessee, where he monitored and modeled productivity of Henslow's Sparrows, Grasshopper Sparrows, Dickcissels,

and Eastern Meadowlarks. Jim has also worked for Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, Audubon Pennsylvania, and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

July is the end of the nesting season for many of our local birds and the woods and yards are silent. However, July is also the beginning of the migration period for many shorebirds which nest in northern Canada and winter on the Gulf Coast and further south. They will be passing through Illinois and stopping at the local wetlands and ponds, making July a great time to see these beautiful shorebirds, as well as resident waterbirds such as the Sandhill Cranes, egrets, and berons

Jim will also introduce and explain the "ebird app" a great application of modern technology to help the amateur birder record and learn about birds. He will also introduce and explain a program called "Merlin" which can be used to identify birds by sight and by sound.

Everyone is invited to visit the library Saturday, July 22 at 10 a.m. to hear this presentation. Children of all ages are most welcome. The Durand Library is located in the school building in the Helen C. Johnson Media Center. Library hours are every Saturday from 9 am to noon. Please enter the library from the east (playground) end of the building. Follow the wide walkway to the back and then turn right to the library entrance.
