Notice of Student Academic Standards approved by Board

The Board approved the "Notice of the Student Academic Standards" that are in effect for the 2021-22 school year, as required by State Statute. The District curriculum is aligned with the Wisconsin Model Academic Standards and the Common Core State Standards. This outlines what students need to know and be able to do in English/Language Arts, Mathematics, History/ Social Studies, Science and Technical Subjects. Standards are the foundation for teaching and learning.

District committees have been developed to assist in the implementation of Target Based Learning throughout the District. They have started and will continue to work with all stakeholders in the implementation of this process. Thirty-two staff were involved in curriculum work during the summer.

Some of the COVID impacts on students included an increase in the number of students failing high school classes. However, 20 of the 23 failures were made up during summer school. All seniors completed the requirements for graduation, and nearly \$70,000 in scholarships was awarded. Nine percent of the graduates are entering appren-

ticeship, as compared to none in 2018. Six students earned CNAs and one welding certification through Blackhawk Tech. A downturn in club and organization membership will be addressed this fall.

A new rule requiring that staff teaching dual credit classes have a master's degree in the subject area will limit the number of dual credit classes offered in the District.

The Board approved participation in the Wisconsin School Day Milk Program, which provides one milk daily for each student in 4K through fifth grade that is eligible for free or reduced lunch under the federal program.

In other business:

The administration was given approval accept resignations and to hire staff on the Boards behalf.

Prairie Farms Swiss Valley received the milk contract and Pan O' Gold the bread bid. The cost for milk will increase by \$.05, but will have no impact this year because it is free for all students.

Registration fees will remain the same for 2021-22.

Middle and High School Co-Curricular Handbooks were approved.

The second reading of Board Policy EFN, dealing with nutrition and

wellness, was approved.

Board meetings will be moved back to the boardroom in September

The August meeting will be preceded by finance committee at 4:30 p.m. and a goals meeting at 5 p.m. The regular meeting will start at 7 p.m.

The Board approved hosting a vaccine clinic in the District prior to the start of school. This will be open to students and the public.

A protocol for procedures dealing with vaccinated and unvaccinated students and staff will be published.

The Board approved accepting federal funds to provide for rapid testing for COVID 19 by the school nurse

A \$50 donation, from Carl and Karen Keesey towards Arboretum funding, was accepted.

The resignation of Kate Hipenbecker as Elementary School Counselor and Backpack Program Coordinator was accepted.

The following were hired: Taylor Flannery, fifth grade teacher; Antonio Roudez, high school special education teacher; and Tania Williams, 4K teacher.







Chapter 13—Moving In (Apartment)

I don't have much money, but I want to purchase some better things for my furnished apartment. The lamps are poor and need an upgrade. I have a radio that has a strong speaker. The rugs are borderline; and I will find better rugs at the second hand store. These newer rugs will have more color, firmness and overall appeal. At present I cannot find new rugs that justify the price. The second hand store in Green County purchases large estates and sells the goods for large discounts. I can't wait to obtain my new home furnishings and also clean the windows. I'm picky over windows and overall cleanliness. I'm visibly excited regarding the new efficiency apartment above my landlord.

The hospital repeatedly calls me because we have at present a very inexperienced nursing staff. We lost a baby during childbirth last week. Stillborns are inevitable in all hospitals. The newly capped RN took the blame for not having sterile forceps available immediately. I'm not certain this would have altered the baby's outcome. Standards surrounding birth have become increasingly high. The hospital and delivering physicians are beginning to purchase malpractice insurance due to concerns of civil suits over bad babies. Everyone is at a huge risk when babies are born. It seems no one can accept imperfection. On my last shift we experienced ambiguous genitalia. The pediatricians did not know if the baby was a boy or girl. The baby was fine otherwise. The child made an emergency trip to Madison (University of Wisconsin). Apparently, the baby is a male; and in time will have reconstructive surgery.

My last shift lasted two complete eight hour shifts; and I'm now quite exhausted. I sometimes feel. I'm abused a touch because of my highly acclaimed Marquette RN degree and now continued experience with high-risk pregnancy and difficult deliveries. It can be extremely tough to be here all evening and work your normal day shift the following day. Since I'm head OB nurse, I commonly encounter postpartum bleeding or a sudden nurse ill at an inopportune time. That is life in a busy rural hospital for a full time RN OB manager. I crawl home in my old Chevy. I thought initially it was a Ford, but it is a Chevy. I'm a dumb girl when it comes to cars. Cars are more of a guy thing. Thankfully, my car is always reliable transportation.

I love this old Chevy car because it is equipped with a radio. I generally can obtain only one station locally in the daytime. At night, I can hear distant scratchy voices from Detroit or St. Louis. I always wonder what is happening to these people from afar. I worry about the poverty and stagnation in large cities as I experienced in Milwaukee, Wisconsin as a nursing student. Many of these people can barely feed themselves. Most inner city residents cannot pay rent, clothe themselves or work properly due to never ending lack of education, drugs, violence and illness. Polio spreads like wildfire in those situations; and many patients (including youth) were led to a slow death on a mechanical ventilator

(iron lung). My radio takes me to these poverty stricken patients as a flashback. I always wondered after hospital dismissal where am I going with this patient. What is the next medical step? I always wondered how this family can cope with such a large illness in their family.

My sleep generally is in my pajamas from high school. Occasionally, I find myself sleeping on the couch with my alarm clock ringing at 0530. I'm embarrassed that I didn't take the time to wash and brush the evening prior to retiring. I'm beginning to enter medical burnout; and I've asked for a three-day weekend this coming week. Administration generally says no to an OB nurse; but times are changing. Many new administrators feel the need to reward key employees in order to keep them around. This could be my lucky day off (paid). I have the weekend; and Bethany from nursing school invited me to Chicago, Illinois (120 miles). I think it is for fun; however, it also involves a blind date. I'm good with all this because all first dates are essentially blind. I'm on my way and won't need my Mother's blessing. I'll let her know what is happening, but not about the blind date. Mom has already recruited many eligible bachelors at St. Victor's church in Monroe, Wisconsin (my childhood church). It is unfortunate that I've become not attracted to these guys. There are many great guys; however, despite advanced scouting, they are not for me. I either feel it or not when meeting a possible male lifelong companion. That is just me. I've lost two men to wars, and I've seen and felt enough "broken heart" pain in my time.

The busy hospital administrator missed me today; however, Boss (as I call him) did grant a three-day weekend. I would be already started to pack for two nights with Bethany if I wasn't so tired from all the overtime work at St. Claire Hospital. We're going to the movies the first night in Chicago. The second evening we are traveling from North Chicago into the city for fun and relaxation. We're going to Navy Pier. Hundreds of soldiers in their Navy gear hang out there. It is the Chicago place where people meet. Many marriages occur through Navy pier chance settings. Though our fighting force is lessened with many returning soldiers (many wounded), we as a country are not done with war. Korea is flaming, and we have many strong forces in Europe and throughout the globe. This is far better than the World War II years of food, gas and many other commodities rationed. I also discovered that some of my clothes are beginning to not fit. I need to get a new pair of dress shoes, blouse, and jean pants. My dresses all seem to fit. I'll pack my one suitcase to the very top and take a tote bag for women's essentials. I'm now leaving Thursday evening after work for a 2.5-hour drive.

My big dilemma is finding time to get clothes. Nothing stays open past 6 o'clock in our small town. I may sneak out at lunch to look at shoes and clothing. I know exactly where to go. It will only require a few minutes. Tomorrow I'll fill my car with gas to get me there. I'll have the new clothes purchased within

24 hours. I'll be on my way to the BigWindy City instead of RN work, I will be in the north suburbs of Chicago quickly (perhaps before dark). Bethany and I will need hours to catch up on all the post college happenings. The blind date is not my first; but I'd be lying if I said I don't have some angst. This may be an opportunity for myself personally and professionally. Bethany always had class compared to my roots from a small town. In college, everyone looked up to her and deitized her because she was from Chicago. I was always neutral and suspicious because we're all the same in that frosh chemistry class. Despite my feelings, little town me was able to become very good friends with Bethany. She sounded good on the phone. Bethany has a serious boyfriend, is recently engaged and is aiming toward settlement. Her RN friend, Bess in Mary's wedding, has recovered from trauma, has two healthy babies and is happily married. We'll reunite with her also. I can't wait for the enjoyment and

overall fun. I received a call from Mom after purchased my new white stylish loafers and jean pants suit. My Jesuit brother James is coming home for the weekend on a retreat. Dad and mom want me there. I've instructed Mom that I had this weekend so well planned. She places her usual pressure on me and wins. I'm happy to see my brother; but I've lost a stunning Chicago date. Bethany was quite understanding regarding the matter. She will find a replacement for me or place this guy on ice (he's cute, has finance, a future, and is a blond hair blue eyed guy). I'm stuck in Green County, Wisconsin while a classmate steals my Tarzan or Humphrey Bogart. I then retrieve a call from that other cute guy in Monticello (Eric Clever) who became drunk on our first date. He thoroughly discussed his rehabilitation speal; but I informed him in an unsubtle manner that I had zero interest. I go to bed crying. I'll get lost in work as I always do.

My next day before the threeday holiday for me was refreshing. Our family minus Mary traveled to the cottage at Decatur Lake. James and Dad went fishing after working on some piers. They caught supper. We were handed a surprise, guest family visit with Mary, Roland and baby Jimmie. That automatically put Brother James (he's a true Jesuit brother now) and myself on the back cabin porch sleeping. It was exciting to see Jimmie and how happy the family is with Roland home now from Chiang Kai-Shek duty as French interpreter. The first evening was all pomp and circumstance until baby Jimmie cried all through the night-breaking away from breastfeeding to the bottle. Mom (now Grandma) controlled matters; and finally calmed the little guy down just prior to sunrise. I slept in and felt adequate. My day will be filled with yummy babysitting duties and planting flowers with Edith Zuercher (Mom). Mary's birth with Jimmy was just a couple weeks ago. Labor and delivery was natural. Mary just made a simple call after delivery and wrote a long letter requesting some privacy. We've been so busy moving and with work that our family has not had time to digest how fabulous this occasion has become. Baby Jimmy is fabulous and healthy.

We had a very pleasant day with an early swim and boat ride. I noticed that many neighbors had already prepared their summer residences. We waved by while passing on one of our boats, but didn't stop. People come to Decatur Lake for privacy; and everyone respects the ability to escape and not be bothered or entertained. The work at our cottage now continues with tree trimming, pier work, well flush, raking leaves and painting. There are an immense number of chores with my Mom and Dad supervising. This outdoor "cottage by the lake" work followed by the typical three meals/ day regimen was maintained until Sunday evening. Our men (Brother James, Dad and Roland) then had a Hamm's beer by the outdoor fireplace and discussed the ways of the world. Everyone had so much fun that they decided to do this on many weekends this summer-especially if Brother James had a retreat. I'm exhausted and must return to work tomorrow. My work reprieve was fun visiting with my family. I'm moved in to my small efficiency apartment while everyone has adjusted to me being on my own. Mom's focus is little Jimmy. Little Jimmy has taken the focus off me for now. Mom's eve and brain will still watch and guide me through life. Mom has it all planned for me. Mom's plan is not working regarding the guy thing. I'm a touch lonely. I'll get through all of this somehow.

I return to work and it was a colossal weekend in review. There were many deliveries this past weekend with many more on the way. I'm now seeing women for the second birth with me. Many ask me personal questions and even try to "line me up." It is difficult to take advice from a laboring or postpartum Mom. I place all of this in my back pocket, do my RN obstetric nursing job and allow fate to occur regarding my future life. I always want more than I

have (human nature). I'm highly confused regarding accepting these blind dates—not mixing business with pleasure. Most Green County, Wisconsin Moms essentially are always thinking good thoughts. I'm exhausted after my first day back when I discovered a few undone necessary medical needs (stocking supplies, sterilizing instruments and linen changes). We called a staff meeting with administration before the shift ended and warned some nurses that despite the unpredictability and craziness of OB, we need to administer a clean/sterile efficient OB ward.

Dot Asper called and will be attending summer school in Madison at the University of Wisconsin. We talked considerably. Dot is proceeding with my personal recommendations of obtaining a literature degree and becoming a teacher. This is her lifelong dream. Her career as the public librarian is quite good; but going nowhere. I said we'd get together in New Glarus, Wisconsin (still Green County) for a beer. I cannot go out in Monroe, Wisconsin without being noticed. The cheese is perhaps better in Monroe, Wisconsin. My aunts, Bertha and Lydia, still yodel at the New Glarus Hotel and around town. Friday evening looks great for both our schedules. I can't wait because we have so much fun.

Moving in is nearly complete. I surround my apartment with college and family pictures. It is lonely here at night by myself. There are just the beginnings of modern television; but it has not arrived in southern Wisconsin. My bathroom is gorgeous with colorful spring flowers and evening lighting (dimmer). My clothes wash below at the landlord's main residence has worked well. I'm not having my parents scrutinize when I arrive home tired. I did take up smoking, but don't really like it. Now, I want to quit, but it also is fashionable despite the limited health risks. I can't imagine a better place for me. I love my job and coworkers, hospital and new home. I'm lonely to a degree because I've never lived by myself. I fall asleep and the phone rings. It is Bethany!
