City Council Brighten Up Brodhead Resolution Passed

Ehlers and Associates Investment Advisor Tami Olszewski reviewed the city's investments as of Wednesday, July 31st and advised on strategies going forward. In response to their inquiry, she explained with maturities coming due over the next two to three years the city would have plenty of cash flow to fund a proposed new City Administrator position.

After discussing the specifics of roads, costs and funding included in proposed 2025 and 2029 capital projects, the council opted to request Joe De Young from MSA provide an estimate for combining the two projects.

The matter of a bench that the Brodhead Evening Garden Club would like to donate to the Senior Center was referred to Public Safety to draft an ordinance. The current ordinance prohibits its placement on the sidewalk within the city owned right of way.

Heather Oborne was present to answer questions about the Brodhead Fire District Preliminary Budget. Alder Gritzmaker encouraged anyone with further questions to contact him or Alder Burkhalter as they will be discussing the budget further at their upcoming meeting.

Brighten Up Brodhead Resolu-

tion 2024-013 passed. This included Planning Commission recommendations that the funds be available as \$2,000 grants, with one grant per parcel and a minimum project cost of \$3,000. Single family owner occupied or rental homes would be eligible and 75% of the grants need to go to households where the grant doesn't exceed 30% of monthly income. Grant funds may be used for improvements to existing systems and structures, not for new construction.

In Other Business:

During the Public Comment Period, Jenna Jacobson, now representing State Assembly District 43, introduced herself and stayed to learn about the community.

Extraterritorial Certified Survey Map Approval 23012.0699.0000 for property at the end of Ten Eyck Road passed.

Resolution 2024-014 passed reestablishing a handicapped parking space in the parking lot near the Historic Train Depot Museum.

The council approved the Police Department hiring Ryan Willing as Community Service Officer.

Alder Baxter requested input on the future of the Park and Rec director since the former director, Dominic Wiegel, resigned.

Family Promise Community Food Pantry— One Year Later

In March of 2022, our first community meeting was held regarding the start-up of a food pantry to meet the needs of our local families and individuals in the Juda, Brodhead, and Albany areas. This portion of Green County was identified as an area that was underserved and facing food insecurity.

Family Promise of Green County partnered with Second Harvest Food Bank of Southern Wisconsin and local supporters to begin planning a new food pantry site to serve these three communities. Bethlehem Lutheran Church, 405 East 9th Avenue, Brodhead, offered to host the pantry within their facility. It was determined that the most beneficial pantry model would be a drive-up pantry.

Our first refrigerator was purchased for us by Green County Fall Nationals, and we began with two small chest freezers. In August of 2023, we served our first families and throughout our first year, we have seen the demand for assistance grow. Our current average number of households being served is about 80 per month. In our first year of operation, we distributed 39,556 pounds of food to our neighbors in need.

We are extremely grateful to our local businesses who regularly donate food to our pantry. During our first year, we have been fortunate to partner with Brodhead Kwik Trip, and the Dollar General stores of Brodhead, Albany, and Orfordville, as well as our local donors who have joined us in our fight against food insecurity. New donors are always welcome. We can also accept frozen meats including venison if they are packaged by a professional meat packing facility.

While we are extremely grateful for the donations that we receive, not all foods come free, and we do have monthly expenses to meet. We rely on donations and grants to meet our monthly expenses, which range between \$300 and \$400 per month, this is where the communities can help us. Local youth groups, churches, and community organizations can do fund-raisers, and food drives to help support the local pantry. If you're interested in having someone from Family Promise of Green County meet with your group, contact Rick Gleason; Director, at 608-328-2600.

Our three greatest needs continue to be 1) financial support, 2) storage space, and 3) volunteers. Currently, we receive our food delivery order a few days before our scheduled pantry day. Due to limited storage for refrigerated and frozen items, we are transporting part of the order back to our Family Promise Center for storage. On the scheduled pantry day, we reload the product into our van and return it to our pantry site for distribution. This also limits us in some of the food choices we can make. If your organization or business has space in the Brodhead area where we could place an additional freezer and refrigerator that would be extremely helpful. Finally, volunteers; we have two distribution days, and two food truck delivery days each month. Deliveries are always on the first and third Friday between 7:30-9 a.m. and we could use two or three additional volunteers for no more than one hour. Our pantry distribution days beginning September 1, 2024, will be the second and fourth Monday of each month from 4-6 p.m. We have two teams so you can volunteer one day a month or both. The Community Food Pantry is open to residents of Juda, Brodhead, and Albany, you can attend both days each month.



Labor Day is a federal holiday celebrated on the first Monday in September. President Grover Cleveland signed the bill in 1894 in response to the persistent worker demonstrations for better working conditions. The holiday honors workers whose labor has made the country strong, however, it was legislation in response to continued worker demands that finally bettered conditions for the working class in the following decades.

The drive for improvement of working conditions had begun in the decades following the Civil War industrial development took people from the farm to the factory. Working conditions were harsh, and 10 hour days six days a week was the norm. Local governments were often not sympathetic with striking workers who risked violent clashes with police and private security personnel. Socialist and anarchist leaders added to the volatile mix. The establishment of the federal holiday followed clashes between labor and police during the Haymarket Riot in Chicago in 1886 when thousands of workers protested in the streets demanding an eight hour workday. Also pivotal were powerful strikes involving the Pullman Company in 1894 as workers protested lowered wages and higher costs of company housing. These strikes by railway workers had national significance and demonstrated the power of labor.

The Jungle, published in 1906, depicted the harsh conditions for those working in the Chicago meat packing industry. Although Sinclair and his Socialist supporters sought to expose the dreadful working conditions, public focus on the description of the unsanitary practices led instead to demands for improvements in food processing standards. This resulted in the passage of the Pure Food and Drug Act in 1906 but did not lead to improvement in la-


bor standards.

Henry Ford increased wages for his workers in 1914, and in 1926 he reduced the workday from nine to eight hours. The improvement in worker output persuaded some employers to follow suit, but it wasn't until 1938 that the Fair Labor Standards Act was passed. This legislation regulated child labor, mandated a 40 hour work week and an eight hour day as well as providing for overtime pay.

passed the Federal Mine Safety and Health Act.

The tragic loss of life in catastrophic events such as the Diamond Shirtwaist Factory fire in 1911 eventually led to adoption of the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) in 1970. This legislation has resulted in a substantial reduction in the number of worker deaths.

Labor Day today is a welcome day off for everyone at summer's end, but the history of labor reform in the country is a long and difficult one which some would say has not yet ended. The following books at the library tell a fuller story about the labor movement: Labor on the March; The Story of America's Unions by Joseph Gardner; The Enemy Within by Robert F. Kennedy which details the corruption of leaders which plagued unions; We Shall Not Be Moved: The Women's Factory Strike of 1909 by Joan Dash; and The Jungle by Upton Sinclair.



Brodhead Juda Football Begins New Era in 2024

Cristian "Gus" Wedig begins a new era for Brodhead Juda football as the head coach after Jim Matthys retired after his leadership of the past 16 years, 24 years total. Wedig came on board last season as defensive coordinator. He has a passion for football and experience at the high school and college level as a player and gained coaching experience at UW-Whitewater and Milton High School. Returning as assistant coaches in 2024 are BJ Bockhop, Tim Cerjak, Trent Gerber, Chris Hoesly, Brandon Riese, Jared Arn, and Rodney Wedig, who was inducted into the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association in 2021.

Last season in the Southwest Conference, the Cardinals finished with a 6-4 record. They graduated Emmett Allen, Blake Matthys, Gunner Boegli, Owen Hillstrom, Isaac Saunders, and Marcus McIntyre all who earned All-Conference Honors.

Returning will be Gabe Bockhop in his third season as quarterback, and Dave Masloske who each received SWC conference honors. Bringing plenty of experience will be Brody Riese, Jordan Dix, Nick Lobeck, Braydan Sweeney, Garrett Olson, Eric Woodward, and Felix Paffel.

Brodhead will continue to play in the SWC for football with New Glarus being added to the competition. Last year the conference was won by Platteville who went undefeated, followed by Lancaster with one loss and Prairie du Chien will remain tough as they return Blake Thiry who was named Defensive Player of the Year.

The team opened the season hosting Edgerton in a nonconference game last Friday at Larsen Field. Brodhead had control in the first half limiting Edgerton to eleven offensive plays while the Cardinals tallied 30-plus. In the second quarter with Brodhead facing a third and ten, Dave Masloske got the ball from QB Gabe Bockhop and fought his way into the endzone from the four-yardline for the first touchdown of the game. Wedig stated after the game his team needs to work on conditioning, staying hydrated, and being focused. He has his sights set on finishing higher in the conference. With his returning lettermen and several up-andcoming younger athletes, the Cardinals should have a good shot at a deep run into the playoffs. The team will travel to Evansville in a nonconference game this Friday.

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

"Through our ongoing membership and relationship with FSF, we have seen first-hand the organization's impact on farmer-led groups through its sustainability framework. We are excited to offer this program to our producer partners. This program aligns with our Social Responsibility Pillars, particularly our environmental stewardship pillar, and our commitment to protecting the planet," said Greg Siegenthaler, Grande's Vice President of Milk Marketing, Sustainability and Strategic Sourcing.

The FSF Climate-Smart Program is part of a nationwide program funded by USDA to provide three pillars: provide technical and financial assistance to producers to implement climate-smart production practices on a voluntary basis on working lands; pilot innovative and cost-effective methods for quantification, monitoring, reporting and verification of greenhouse gas benefits; and develop markets and promote the resulting climate-smart commodities.

The Grande project is expected to run for the duration of the five-year program and will generate annual outcomes for the participating farmers after each cropping year.

Green County 4-H Recognizes Members and Leaders




