

## Fly, Butterfly, Fly at the Library!

Monarchs are large, beautifully colored butterflies that are easy to recognize by their striking orange, black, and white markings. The most amazing thing about monarch butterflies is the enormous migration that North American monarchs travel each year. Every fall, millions of these delicate insects leave their home range in the United States and begin flying south. They continue until they reach central Mexico, over 2,000 miles away!

On Friday, September 2nd, at 10 a.m., they will begin their first September story time with monarch butterflies. The story time will include stories, songs, and early literacy activities in the program room at the Brodhead Public Library. Then, with help from Diane and Rick Gretebeck, they will release monarch butterflies at 10:30 a.m. Diane and Rick have been caring for and releasing monarch butterflies for four years and they will share their knowledge and experiences with patrons on Friday morning. Evansville and Brodhead-Juda football teams met in a non-conference game Friday night in Evansville. Not too long ago this would have been a test of rivalries going head-to-head but it didn't take long for the Cardinals to put a fork into the Blue Devils with a 41-6 win.

Wyatt Nelson-EV scored the only touchdown of the night for the host team on a 33-yard pass from Bennett Keller, the point-after-kick failed. The Cardinals responded with a TD of their own when Marcus McIntyre connected with Leon Saunders on a 15-yard pass. Gabe Bockhop was good for the PAK.

The Blue Devils, Keller, fumbled after a hit. Joe Lohmar caught the coughed-up ball running it in for a 33-yard score for Brodhead. By halftime Bockhop completed a 24-yard pass to Gunner Boegli and the Cardinals were in control with a 20-6 lead.

McIntyre would score on a quarterback keeper for a 16-yard run in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter, Evansville was deep in their own territory when Blake Matthys intercepted the pass and returned it for a 96-yard gain. Brodhead was successful in the two-point conversion. Matthys closed out the game with his second TD taking the handoff from Bockhop for 18-yards.

#### Area quilter's work featured at Great Wisconsin Quilt Show in Madison

Quilters from across the country submitted their best work for judging in this year's Great Wisconsin Quilt Show. Eileen Daniels of Brodhead, Wisconsin and her quilt "Sunflowers for Ukraine," has been selected to compete in the 2022 Great Wisconsin Quilt Show Quilt Contest. Her quilt will be displayed for more than 20,000 visitors to the annual event in Madison this September.

Every quilt has a story. "This quilt is dedicated to the Ukrainian woodworkers, lace makers and quilters who have been displaced by war," she said in her artist's statement. "The wooden buttons were hand crafted by my husband. The lace doilies were purchased at garage sales. I pieced the various sizes of plates, and the leaves are done with Solvron."

Daniels has been quilting for 55 years. She explains that she got started by "My quilting legacy—grandmothers and mom—[they] were quilters and their work inspired me!"

Quilts accepted in the Quilt Contest are judged on visual impact and stitching technique. Awards are given for first-, second- and third-place recognition in each category, and one quilt is awarded as "Best of Show." One quilt is also selected to receive the Viewers' Choice award by those who attend the event.

For the first time in three years, The Great Wisconsin Quilt Show will return to the Alliant Energy Center in Madison as an in-person event, welcoming quilt lovers from across Wisconsin and throughout the United States to join together and celebrate the art of quilting. It will be held Sept. 8-10.

The Great Wisconsin Quilt Show's main attraction is the 10-category juried and judged Quilt Contest exhibit, showcasing the incredible talents of quilters from across the country. Featured quilts range from traditional sizes and shapes to innovative pictorial quilts.

The Great Wisconsin Quilt Show also includes dozens of educational lectures and workshops led by expert quilters; shopping opportunities from trusted vendors, featuring the latest fabrics and notions; and a community service project—Quilt to Give—in which attendees donate their materials and skills to create quilts for those in need. 





#### Final resting place for ancestor

Recently, I had the honor of finding a final resting place for an ancestor, and someone asked that I share the story with you. Since I grew up in Brodhead, and graduated from BHS, I frequent the Brodhead Free Press online, and agreed with the suggestion.

This story hopefully inspires others to seek out their family tree. In the 1980s, I was inspired by my aunts: Alice (Riese) Wolfe, Helen (Riese) Rufer, and Mary (Riese) Coplien. They put together information regarding my family history. It was roughly 10 pages of information, but it inspired me to seek out more information. I found my great-grandfather's naturalization record, and on a trip to the National Archives in Washington, DC, I found the ship log the family were aboard coming to New York's harbor in December, 1872. From there, the family made their way to Green County, Wisconsin.

The family tree research has been a hobby for me since the 1980s, and I've added a bit north of 66,000 family members to the tree on Ancestry. com. It drove me to have three separate books published on the Riese/ Elliott families, my wife's family, and one for a Reasa cousin.

Through the journey, I knew that my great-grandfather, Fred Vollmann left the family (leaving his wife and daughters) to return to Germany with his mother. My family assumed that's where he remained. Fortunately, Ancestry. com pointed my search to Portland, Oregon. I found a Fred Vollmann living with his mother, Caroline in the census records. I realized that Fred had a daughter from a separate marriage. I found that she had a son, who also had a son. By chance, I called the great-grandson to the Fred Vollmann in the Portland area. His name was Gaylord Davis. When

I called, I told him the story of Fred Vollmann, but he wasn't sure of the family history. He said he had a box of family information in his garage. He called me back later, and told me he found Fred Vollmann's naturalization certificate from Green County, Wisconsin. I knew then that I had the correct Fred Vollmann. Gaylord also had a picture of Fred Vollmann in the box of family information. After he sent it to me, I sent it to my uncle, Alvin Riese living in Monroe, who had never seen his grandfather. Alvin was 92 at the time.

After further digging, I found that Fred Vollmann's mother, Caroline was admitted to the state hospital in Salem, Oregon in October, 1920. She had dementia, and I don't believe the family knew how to care for her. She passed away at the end of the month after being admitted. Back in 1920, if no family member stepped forward to claim the body, the hospital cremated the deceased, as they did with Caroline (my great-great grandmother). I also found that the hospital kept all of the remains, and stored them in a special building with numbers tied to each individual. They have over 4,000 remains still at the hospital. Fortunately, they were willing to ship the ashes to me. I wasn't sure where I could have the ashes buried, but knew from other records that her husband, my greatgreat grandfather, Johann Vollmann (passed away in 1894) was buried at the Mount Vernon cemetery in Juda. I contacted Brian Matzke with the Mount Vernon cemetery, and they were kind enough to have her ashes buried with her husband. My brothers, and a few cousins helped with having a stone placed (no stone was there for Johann), with both of their names, and dates.

It was a wonderful feeling to know Caroline is finally at rest. I hope this story inspires others to seek out their history.





#### Childcare Profile: Monroe Parks and Recreation After School Program

Many people who grew up in Monroe remember dropping by the youth center in the lower level of City Hall to play pool and foosball and listen to the jukebox. The city hired Barb Moser in 1981 to expand the after-school offerings and add more programs for youth. In 2006, school buses began bringing children from their elementary schools to the youth center after school.

The city moved its after-school program to Abraham Lincoln Elementary School in 2016, giving it access to a gym and playground. Theresa Klemm began with the program in January of 2017.

Today, the afterschool program is offered from 3:30 to 5:15 p.m. on Mondays through Thursdays, and from 1:30 to 5:15 p.m. on Fridays for children in kindergarten through

fifth grade. They can ride the bus from their elementary school to the program location at Abe Lincoln.

Klemm said it can be a challenge to come up with a curriculum that is appropriate for five-year-olds that can still hold the attention of older elementary children who can be 10 and 11 years old. But it's a challenge worth accepting, as the result is creating a nurturing atmosphere for children. "We have fun in a safe, inclusive environment," she said.

"My favorite part about working with children and families is the lifetime bond I create with these families," Klemm said. "There are children who share major life experiences with me and invite me to events where they are being honored in one way or another. I feel like part of the family for many of

the children I watch."

Klemm has collected many special memories and moments through her years working with children. "I have too many stories to tell," she said. "But my favorite moments are when they see me in a store and run with open arms to give me a hug."

Klemm said there is a definite need for childcare in the community: Without childcare, families can't go to work, and businesses can't operate. Likewise, it's important for people to realize that childcare providers aren't babysitters, she said.

"It is a profession that is often taken for granted, yet children are our future and our most prized possession."







