



Wisconsin War Bride Diary I

Chapter 16 - First Date with Major Herbert John Ripp

I'm back in my old room and have a ton of clean-up and varying things to do. Mom and Dad are quite happy overall with my situation. I've regained my job, I'm sleeping and eating well; and, I'm under their watch. I don't care because I have Herb; and will not ever take him for granted. I want a good, clean relationship. I'm fortunate to have that presently. Herb works hard with his Milwaukee Railroad job and military commitments. Many dates have to be cancelled due to shipments arriving late at the county train depots, late telegraphy requirements and railroad track issues. Additionally, the military is requesting his reserve regiment to be constantly ready. I don't like this aspect of his life; but it helps pay his bills. That is modern life with many work requirements and fast changing lifestyles. Our society is rapidly changing post World War II. The aftermath within the world is impressive. Our government is attempting to keep us out of conflicts; but it seems the United States is always in need to assist depressed countries economically or via military intervention. There's talk of a draft again. Military commitments may occur in Asia, Africa and South America. Protecting the homeland is a national priority. Herb talks of scary matters; however our government is avidly attempting to quench the fighting around the world.

I have a cold that won't quit and I've seen our family doctor who prescribed some Penicillin. This seemingly has worked along with cough syrup and Vicks Vapor Rub. I surely hope I don't have or develop pneumonia. My time is due because I've seen many patients become quite ill with respiratory conditions. It's obvious that I caught this in the hospital work environment. I need sleep, rest and decent hours (better now). I haven't missed work; but I've been very close to calling in ill. I don't like to miss work and have a perfect attendance record. We want to maintain this employment level of non-tardiness. I cannot fathom faking illness or not coming to work with a simple cold. Many RNs have family/children commitments and occasionally use their sick days to benefit. I don't like that practice; but I understand the family issues and need for Mom at home. Despite this, the need to have a trained RN on staff who has at least received some sleep is critical. I've witnessed endless mistakes by well-meaning healthcare personnel who haven't slept well. I don't want to be in this category.

Now that Herb and I have begun to know one another, it seems both of us want to advance our relationship. Mary and Roland want to meet Herb; as do the rest of the family from Chicago. This has become a supersonic relationship all of a sudden. I'm happy with all of this because I wasn't that happy with my personal life prior. Overall, if I can obtain administration and my immediate supervisor (Shelly) to allow me the time I need for personal needs, then I'm back into the head RN Obstetric position. Some matters need to be adjusted and hopefully advanced by a writing. I need

confidence that St. Claire Hospital will treat me well through some limitations on hours and having a staff that can handle the endless amounts of newborns. I want a safe unit under my watch. Sadly, with limited health insurance and many families struggling despite having babies, the bills for the hospital only partially get paid. Some families I've treated state that they cannot only afford a small amount if anything. They appreciate the medical treatment (in many cases free). Our country has toyed with universal health insurance (President Truman); but we're not quite there yet.

My family has decided to go back to our lake cabin this weekend. James, my brother and a real Jesuit Brother, and my sister/her husband with my nephew, Jimmie, will be there also. Everyone will obtain a chance to meet Herb. We're both a little nervous over this aspect of our lives. We're both so happy with each other that we expect this scrutiny. I'll probably eventually be required to undergo evaluation in Cross Plains, Wisconsin, under the scrutiny of Herb's many siblings. His parents seem low key regarding our relationship according to Herb. I cannot wait for the weekend. I'll be able to sleep, obtain comfort with my family and eat considerably immense amounts of great food cooked by Mom. I'm certain Herb will have a great time discussing the war with my Dad and Roland. There's been a tremendous amount of combat in our family with Dad in World War I and Roland and Herb in the Second World War. These guys are all similar in ways because of the military connection. They all enjoy some (not excessive) beer, are athletic and love the outdoors.

I receive a call from Dot Asper. She's engaged to be married and wants me in the wedding party. That is wonderful. She has a great "all-purpose" guy; and she's obtaining her undergraduate education in literature. Most probably Dot will advance to graduate school and instruct at a high school or college level subjects of literature or English. She's in her niche regarding career; but I'm certain kids are in the plans (like everyone else). I invited her to our cabin for Saturday afternoon. She'll buffer the Herb and me stuff (I think). I don't know that much about her fiancé except that he's a very nice handsome young guy. He seems to love Dot to no end. That is good for her because a gal with a career and potentially having children needs tremendous support. I feel good about Dot's situation with her education and fiancé. They'll arrive about 2 p.m. and stay for supper. Mom is also excited to meet her new beau. Dad will be busy working on the piers, boathouse and also endlessly work within the grounds (trees/leaves/fences).

Work has been steadfastly improving. My life with sleep, a steady boyfriend and existence with minimal expenses (now that I've moved back home) is fantastic. I'm beginning to think of obtaining a car, another apartment and some better clothes. My donated clothes prior to my proposed Denver move would still work. The poor people in Green County need support; and I'm happy to donate (most of my ward-

robe is gone). I believe I saw one of my old dresses on a gal downtown the other day. It's fun to obtain new fashionable clothes. The dresses are becoming more stylish, colorful and wooing. The colorful half sleeve dresses with neck ties/low V-neck are the rage in our area and nationally. Shoes are suede with heels; and come in varying colors. My jumpsuits will have to be replaced. Many choices for clothes await at the local stores. The Sears and Wards catalogs have extensive collections with free shipping on holidays (I can't wait, however). Socks have become the rage with many two tone colors and designs. This reflects everyone's continued happiness over the War being complete. Most of us view Korea as a side war; however, the horror stories continue to mount from this war. Thus, with due respect to the Korean War, the country is rapidly becoming post war. It's boom in many ways economically, via the baby boom and with overall "boom" mood. I cannot bear the thought of another world war. Our country would cave inside out if another major conflict erupted.

It's Friday night before the weekend has arrived. Roland, sister Mary and baby Jimmie are on their way to the cabin where everyone will converge tomorrow morning. Herb has to work for the Milwaukee Road with furniture shipments arriving early Saturday morning. We will await for Herb's arrival excitedly. It will be a light lunch and a heavy supper. Mom has everything planned tightly with meals and drinks. She is a maser of entertainment. I want nothing but the very vest after Mom's diligent work. Mary and I have helped some for the upcoming weekend. We all want to participate and enjoy family time together. After the War people have an enlightened feeling of just being alive. It's estimated that perhaps 50 million people died from World War II. What is happening in Monroe, Wisconsin and throughout the world is real. There was so much suffering and tragedy from the war that it has enlightened the world into a new renaissance. Youth and adults alike are celebrating all aspects of life including babies, cars, sports, dress and each other. I remember prior to the war the endless amounts of angst with the Great Depression, food lines, rationing and many other aspects of poverty.

Saturday arrived and Herb was late but made our light lunch. Evervone was positive and having fun. Jimmie, Mary's little baby, had a mild cold. His Grandma (Mom) had a multitude of home remedies, which seemed to help clinically. I was impressed. Mary and Roland are quite happy with their home in Aurora, Illinois. They have many neighborhood friends with families and kids in the area. Mary's life appears to be a dream. Life is good in many ways; and now that Roland has returned from Indochina and being Chiang Kai-Shek's interpreter, their family is settled. It will be continued success if Roland is able to maintain his job with General Electric in Illinois. Many are advanced in their positions with GE, which may require transfer. I hope Roland is advanced but somehow maintains his ability to live in the Midwest.

The rain settled in on Decatur Lake. This gave everyone a chance to do a sing-along at our cabin. We sang many folk songs with myself playing the piano including: Amazing Grace, Down By the Riverside, If I Had a Hammer, Anchors Aweigh, 100 Bottles of Beer on the Wall, Do Your Ears Hang Low, Happy Trails, I've Been Working on the Railroad, Jimmy Crack Corn, Muffin Man (baby Jimmie), Oh Susannah, She'll Be Coming Round the Mountain, Shenandoah, This Land is Your Land and Yankee Doodle. This was an amazing session with considerable laughter and extreme fun. Thankfully, we had rain, which forced our family to come together and meet Dot and her new husband, John Allenby. By the time we finished we were ready for supper. We had barbequed chicken, potatoes and green beans with cherry strudel for desert. It was a scrumptious meal that everyone enjoyed.

The talk at the supper table was about war experiences that were good, new movies (The Red Shoes), old movies (Citizen Kane, Meet me in St. Louis, Grapes of Wrath), and sports-mainly Milwaukee Braves baseball. It was an exuberant discussion. Everyone liked Herb; though he's somewhat shy and quiet. That could be him or the war. Additionally, I need to factor in that this was his first visit with many of the people at our cottage. It was an exciting time for me because I feel like I'm really falling in love. It's hard to describe; despite my pesky parents, I couldn't be happier. I've only known Herb for a few days; yet, it seems we're going steady for months. It is an easy transition to caring for just me to now a steady partner. I just hope it lasts. I firmly believe we're on the same plane. I don't know what else to do but try to be a good girlfriend and partner. I'm having more fun than I've had since college. I'm totally loving every minute of my existence. At times, I don't care if the obstetric ward throws endless cases at me. I still, however, need some downtime.

The evening appeared to become better for everyone. Guests and family were relaxed, a friendly Green County beer was consumed by most present and my parents seemed pleased (a high hurdle). Herb had fun conversing with Mary and James. My parents and I had an interesting discussion with Dot Asper and boyfriend John. Dot is consumed by college humanities; and she's exactly where she belongs in her life. Her new beau, however, is thinking marriage and children. This may place a slight blunt into Dot's career plans. That is the case with many modern women who want to work outside the home. It works; and it doesn't work. Every couple is different; and barring a house husband (rare), it is very difficult to have a career outside the home. All the magazines discuss this new phenomenon; however, it's an uphill fight with employers, family and children (who want Mom constantly).

We played some checkers and scrabble on the outside indoor/outdoor porch overlooking the lake. The weather continued to drizzle and nearly required the gas furnace to turn on. Normally, in the evening

we go to the fireplace with the Wisconsin stone at the mantle (really does classically portray the state of Wisconsin by its shape). The outside fire generally maintains good heat on cold evenings. The rain has persisted on and off; and it's very wet throughout our woods. Herb is having a great time and seems like he doesn't want to go home. I'll see him tomorrow at mass and then we'll decide if we're together (nothing planned and I've instructed the hospital "no call" this weekend). We finally end the evening on a very high note with hugs and Herb hugs me with a small kiss with Mom and Dad staring. It's almost like I'm in junior high school. I'll just deal with it because I couldn't be happier and Mom is over everything no matter what the occasion. Thus, we're all moving on and my parents appear as happy as they can be, fortunately.

Sunday arrived without pomp and circumstance. I have heard more miserable news regarding Korea. Herb called and stated he was on ready duty and needed to report to Camp McCoy by tonight (near LaCrosse, Wisconsin). Since he's three blocks away and was attending church, I quietly went over to his apartment three blocks from our family home. He was preparing all his gear and stated he wouldn't make 10:30 church because he had a four to five hour drive. His squadron commander wanted his reserve regiment there as soon as possible. I had to say goodbye to Herb and sensed that something grievous was occurring. I've been through a similar situation prior with Bernie Saddler. That will be the third soldier I've met and who potentially may not come home. I'm crying and Herb wraps me in his arms and says it is only Camp McCoy. I said that will lead to a ship and on our way to the Korean Peninsula where everyone shoots aimlessly at the other side. I couldn't agree with Herb's departure, but made the very best of the situation. We hugged again and promised each other's hearts on his return. We're both being positive. This is such a good and bad time to live. I thought the war was over; but our wars don't seem to ever stop. If war stops, then another conflict is created. You'd want to believe that people are tired of fighting over stupid stuff.



ADDICTION TO VAPING
