City Council

Easement payment designated for Pearl Island improvements

Public Works Director Rich Vogel requested the \$10,000 easement payment from Alliant Energy be designated for Pearl Island improvements, such as stream bank

reinforcements. Since the easement involves Pearl Island, the Council approved the request.

A change in the Public Works uniform policy was approved. An employee will receive a \$500 al-

lowance the first year and a \$400 allowance each year thereafter. The clothing needs to be purchased through a city-approved vendor. This is expected to save money.

Mayor Jones requested the Council approve vacating a parcel of land in Woods Crossing. He would like to build a storage unit and an activity area for the residents. He then recused himself from the discussion and the Council President

directed the discussion and voting. The matter was tabled for more detailed information regarding the proposed improvements.

Applications for the Park and Rec Director will be accepted through September 30. Names submitted for sidewalk shoveling will be forwarded to the library since a current employee feels he can handle the other areas.

Brodhead is participating in the

Rural Wisconsin Communities Project, which is an Economic Development initiative. It is being piloted in several communities. Several community members will be asked to join the project leadership team. If interested, contact the City Clerk.

Debbie Jean’s was actually born from another passion of Niedermeier-Wartgow’s—painting.

“I had purchased some framing equipment so I could frame my artwork and sell it,” Niedermeier-Wartgow said. “Word got around that I could frame pictures. Before long, people started asking if I could do some framing for them. After a while, I realized I could try making this a full-time business. For the past 20 years, Niedermeier-Wartgow has framed everything from senior pictures and wedding photos to family heirlooms, posters and sports memorabilia. “One of the most interesting things I’ve framed is a major league baseball bat autographed by Prince Fielder who played for the Brewers,” Niedermeier-Wartgow said.

Painting has also remained an integral part of Niedermeier-Wartgow’s business. Debbie Jean’s has become known for its handpainted Christmas ornaments. Snowmen, barns, covered bridges, cardinals and churches are among the regular favorites. Additionally, Niedermeier-Wartgow creates dozens of custom designs every holiday season.

To commemorate her 20th year in business, Niedermeier-Wartgow is holding a monthlong celebration in October. Customers can get a sneak preview of new ornament designs for the coming season, as well as new items in the gift shop. Customers can also enjoy some of Niedermeier-Wartgow’s favorite family treats.

“Rather than a two-day open house event like I used to do, I thought it would be fun to celebrate all October long,” Niedermeier-Wartgow said. “Every Saturday in October, I’ll be offering a special treat to customers. I’ve been going through family recipes, trying to pick my five favorite treats growing up. I don’t know how I’m going to settle on just five, because so many have a very special story behind them. I guess people will just have to stop in on a Saturday to see what I’ve come up with.”

If you answered yes to any of these questions, Green County 4-H has the perfect event for you. Explore 4-H Day will be held on Saturday, October 1st from noon to 2 p.m. at the Green County Fairgrounds, 2600 10th Street, Monroe. Homecoming is Sweet

On a cloudy Saturday afternoon, Brodhead played host to Dodgeville for their homecoming game. Schools around the area are having to be flexible in their scheduling due to a shortage of referees resulting in not enough teams of refs to cover all the games on Friday night. Though Brodhead started out sluggish at the start, Blake Matthys was on point for an interception that several plays later resulted in him getting the ball for a two-yard plunge across the goal line for the first score of the game. Quarterback Gabe Bockhop does double duty on obtaining the point-after-kick to make it a 7-0 game. Dodgeville receives the ball but on their first play, fumble that is recovered by B-J Sean Huffman. Bockhop will connect with Gunnar Boegli who goes high to catch a 15-yard pass and he comes down in the endzone. The Cardinals opt for the two-point option, Isaac Saunders gets the nod and Brodhead Juda has a 15-0 lead. The Dodgers are unable to get anything going their way. On the kickoff return their receiver fumbles and Bockhop recovers the ball. Just seconds into the second quarter, Matthys gets his second TD from 12 yards out. Bockhop is solid on his PAK attempt, 22-0, all Brodhead. Dodgeville would get on the board before halftime on a 19-yard pass but the PAK fails. The halftime score: 22-6.

The Cardinals receive to open the second half. Matthys will get two consecutive scores in the third quarter. The first is a 14-yard run and Bockhop is again good for the PAK. The Dodgers are able to move the ball utilizing their pass options. Matthys reads his opponent's plan well and intercepts the ball for a 65-yard run. When they are unable to advance, Dodgeville will then punt the ball back to the Cardinals. Aidyn Vondra will get the handoff and dodge the Dodger defense finishing with a touchdown on his 65-yard run. At the end of the third, with the score 42-6, a continuous clock will be initiated. As the Dodgers take possession, their initial play is a pass that is intercepted by Boegli. Sean Huffman will get the next score for Brodhead. Again, Dodgeville will try their hardest to make something happen but again their plan is thwarted when Vondra intercepts and runs 39-yards for the final TD for the home team. Dodgeville will get one more score to finish out the game. Homecoming is sweet with a 54-14 victory for the Cardinals.

This week the team will make the trek to Adams-Friendship who is also undefeated. They have outscored their opponents 288 to 61 thus far this season. This game will be a test of "who wants this win the most" for both teams.


This week on Tuesday the team will host East Troy and be at Big Foot on Thursday.



RESILIENCE is a one-hour documentary that delves into the science of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and the birth of a new movement to treat and prevent toxic stress. Experts now believe that toxic stress is one of the leading causes of everything from heart disease and cancer to substance abuse and depression. These extremely stressful experiences in childhood can alter brain development and have life-long effects on health and behavior. RESILIENCE chronicles this new approach among pediatricians, therapists, educators and communities who are using cutting-edge science to disrupt cycles of violence, addiction and disease.

Positive Childhood Experiences (PCEs) are the strengths and connections that children and young people have that have positive developmental and healing effects. Typically, these are not things that can be bought or that necessarily cost a lot of money. They are the experiences that help children learn to trust others even when life is uncertain, difficult or frightening. They happen when adults are willing to talk honestly about things that are hard to understand, scary, embarrassing or painful. When adults are willing to have these types of conversations with children, the result is that children feel reassured that they are not alone in their struggles and they are better able to find meaning or purpose in their struggles. Positive Childhood Experiences also include opportunities to engage in meaningful learning and growth experiences.

Rabies Confirmed in Rock County Bat

A Rock County bat submitted to the Wisconsin State Lab of Hygiene has tested positive for rabies. At this time, no human contact with the bat has been reported. While it is not uncommon for Rock County to have at least one rabid bat a year, this positive rabies result is a reminder that this fatal disease is present in our community's wildlife.

Rabies is an infectious disease that affects the nervous system of humans and other mammals. The rabies virus is transmitted through direct contact, usually a bite, from an animal with rabies. The virus is regularly found in wild mammals such as raccoons, skunks, foxes, and coyotes. However, bats cause the majority of rabies cases in humans.

Rabies can spread from bats to people through small, minor bites that may go unnoticed. Though bats are commonly found outdoors, bats can enter your home through small openings in screens, around chimney caps, underneath door gaps or any hole larger than a quarter-inch by half-inch. If you find a bat in your home, contact the Rock County Public Health Department for instructions on how to proceed.

Rabies is a deadly disease, but there are steps you can take to prevent spread of the virus. Avoid wild or stray animals, especially commonly affected animals like raccoons, skunks, bats, foxes, and coyotes. Also, learn the signs of rabies, such as excessive drooling or aggression, and animals that are acting out of character, such as a raccoon that is out during the day. If you are a parent, teach your child about rabies and how to protect themselves. If you are a pet owner, visit the veterinarian on a regular basis and keep your pet's rabies vaccinations up to date. To prevent bats from coming into your home, "bat proof" your house through locating and sealing potential entrances.

If you have been in contact with any wildlife or unfamiliar animals, especially if you have been bitten or scratched, talk with your healthcare provider or local health department to determine your risk for rabies or other illnesses. If you have been bitten or scratched, thoroughly wash the wound with soap and water and immediately make plans to see your healthcare provider.

If you capture a dead, sick, or injured bat, you can have it tested for rabies. If possible, do not freeze or destroy the animal to allow for more accurate testing. 

Green County Clean Sweep Program

Green County will be offering a two-day Clean Sweep Hazardous Materials Collection Program for county farmers and residents on Friday, October 28th from 7 a.m.-2:30 p.m. and Saturday, October 29th from 7-11:30 a.m. The Clean Sweep collection site is located at the Green County Landfill, W2002 County SS, Brodhead.

The Clean Sweep program is an opportunity to dispose of banned products or supplies damaged by moisture or contamination. This will be the 15th year that Green County has offered a Clean Sweep Collection Program. A total of over 135,000 pounds of hazardous material has been collected through the previous collections in Green County.

All Green County residents will be able to dispose of materials at the landfill for two days only. Pre-registration is recommended by going to <https://go.wisc.edu/6l05zr> to sign up for a timeslot. Residents may also call the Extension Green County office at 608-328-9440 for help in signing up.

Residents will be able to dispose of up to 100 pounds of hazardous materials free of charge. Farmers and homeowners wishing to dispose of more than these amounts need to call the Extension Green County office at 608-328-9440. All items should be properly identified and materials will only be accepted by authorized personnel.

Examples of hazardous items that will be accepted include: oven cleaners, spot removers and drain cleaners; Herbicides like Atrazine, Round-up, Banvel, 2,4-D, Silvex, brush killers and many others; Insecticides including Diazinon, DDT, Chlordane, Thimet, Furadan, Sevin and others; Fungicides including Captan, lead, marine and auto paint, solvents, animal health products, mercury, degreasers, roofing tar, wood finishes, oil based paint and stains, hydraulic fluid, pool chemicals, old gasoline, paint strippers, and cadmium and lithium batteries.

Items that WILL NOT be accepted include tires, latex paint, firearms and ammunition, Freon 11 and 12 radioactive material, compressed gas cylinders, yard waste, waste motor oil, fluorescent tubes, recyclable materials or biological wastes.

Green County Healthy Community Coalition is excited to share this opportunity to learn about Adverse Childhood Experiences (or ACEs). After the film screening they will have a discussion about how we as a community are planning to come together to enhance children's access to Positive Childhood Experiences

RESILIENCE is a one-hour documentary that delves into the science of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and the birth of a new movement to treat and prevent toxic stress. Experts now believe that toxic stress is one of the leading causes of everything from heart disease and cancer to substance abuse and depression. These extremely stressful experiences in childhood can alter brain development and have lifelong effects on health and behavior. RESILIENCE chronicles this new approach among pediatricians, therapists, educators and communities who are using cutting-edge science to disrupt cycles of violence, addiction and disease.

Positive Childhood Experiences (PCEs) are the strengths and connections that children and young people have that have positive developmental and healing effects. Typically, these are not things that can be bought or that necessarily cost a lot of money. They are the experiences that help children

learn to trust others even when life is uncertain, difficult or frightening. They happen when adults are willing to talk honestly about things that are hard to understand, scary, embarrassing or painful. When adults are willing to have these types of conversations with children, the result is that children feel reassured that they are not alone in their struggles and they are better able to find meaning or purpose in their struggles. Positive Childhood Experiences also include opportunities to engage in meaningful learning and growth experiences.
