Community Gardens Fall Update

As with just about everyone else who grows summer crops, it has been a tough year at the Brodhead Community Gardens. Most of the summer was abnormally dry with several weeks at a time without rain, many really hot days and drying winds. In addition, many of our gardeners had crops stolen from their garden just as they were getting ready to harvest. After months of hard work to come to their plot to find things missing was very frustrating. Despite these problems, many vegetables were harvesting. We look forward to an even better year in 2024.

As the season winds down here are a few reminders for all our terrific gardeners. We will expect to have freezing temperatures soon so it's time to clean up the gardens for the year. Please have your garden area cleaned up by Sunday, November 5th. That would include removing any metal or wood objects and removing any large woody plants like sunflowers and corn stalks. They can be placed alongside your garden. Everything else including all plant material can be placed in the compost pile. We will be cutting back all vegetation in the gardens in early November. Please also fill in any trenches that you made for root crops. The more cleanup you can do on your own plot the better. You might want to put manure, grass clippings, or other organic material on your garden after the gardens are cut back.

Cards Secure Playoff Berth

When Adams Friendship came to town last week, Brodhead understood this team would not be a pushover. The first quarter demonstrated that as both teams went head-to-head, the Green Devils gained their first down on a 15-yard penalty against the Cardinals to take them to their own 45-yard line. Two plays later Lincoln Smith, QB for AF, connected his pass to Tyler Erickson for 49-yard gain to the Cardinal 15-yard line. Brodhead's defense, with senior Blake Matthys back in action after missing six weeks due to injury, would stiffen to set up a fourth-and-nine with Gunner Boegli breaking up the pass and Cardinals take over. Brodhead's first drive would result in a TD set up by QB Gabe Bockhop's keeper run for 61 yards, capped off with Isaac Saunders scampering 13 yards for the first touchdown of the night. But the Green Devils would respond with a scoring drive of their own when Smith's pass would be caught by Robert Irey for a score to make it 7-7 that would hold to end of the first quarter. It would be midway through the second quarter before the next score. Saunders would rush for 32 yards, with Bockhop then tossing a short pass to Brody Riese who would cross the goal line. AF would get deep into Brodhead territory to bring fourth-andeight. Boegli would deflect the pass, 2:38 on the clock, Cards took over on the 30-yardline. Bockhop passed to Riese who gained 17 yards, followed by Marcus McIntyre advancing on a hand off to the 36-yardline. Riese would then be called into action again gaining an additional 17 yards and into the redzone. Saunders would finish the drive with a six-yard TD run leaving just 40 seconds on the clock. It would be enough for Smith from 40-yards out, under pressure, make the pass to Erickson who would score to make it 21-14 with just eight seconds remaining before the half. The Green Devils chose to do an onside kick that the Cardinal's, Dane Huffman, would take control of at the 44-yardline. Many thought Brodhead would take a knee, but holdthe-phone, Bockhop on a slant, would pass to Boegli who would take it to the endzone. The Cardinals had the momentum to go into the half 28-14 leading the Green Devils.

Trying to regain their energy, AF again kicked off with an onside recovered by Huffman. Bockhop and Boegli teamed up for another 39-yard pass. Three plays later, Saunders would get his third TD of the night. AF felt Brodhead's defensive pressure with Owen Hillstrom and McIntyre getting backto-back sacs on OB Smith. McIntyre, late in the third, would get his first crossing into the endzone with an eight-yard run, 42-14 score. The Green Devils would score the final TD in the fourth. With the 42-21 victory, Brodhead clinches a playoff berth.

This week will be the final home game of the regular season and senior night. Brodhead will welcome Prairie du Chien to Larson Field.

Volleyball was at Edgerton on Tuesday and senior night will be Thursday with Big Foot playing here.














BRODHEAD LEAF PICK-UP

City leaf pickup service is planned to start around mid-October.



However, starting Monday, October 9th you can haul your leaves to the compost site.

Monday thru Sunday 8 a.m. to dark.

Please do not leave plastic bags or other garbage at the compost site.

If you want City leaf pickup service, you must follow these guidelines:

· Leaves only. NO garbage, animal waste, grass, brush, rocks or other foreign items mixed in. Items other than leaves can plug and damage the quipment which you could be liable for.

· Leaves must be racked to edge of curb or street in windrows away from trees, posts and other objects. If the machine can't reach your leaves, they will not be picked up.

• DO NOT put leaves in gutter or in the street. Leaves release phosphorus when they break down and decompose, representing one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. When left in the street gutters, a phosphorusrich tea is produced that easily washes down storm drains and directly into our rivers and lakes. 

Evers Visits Brodhead's The Nurturing Tree

On Monday, September 25 Governor Evers, Rep. Clinton Anderson, and Senator Mark Spreitzer visited The Nurturing Tree, Brodhead's brand new group center. They did so to continue bringing awareness to the foundational role childcare has on our entire economy and to continue talking about the need for Child Care Counts. The federal childcare stabilization funding slowed in June and will be completely done in February 2024. A recent survey by the Green County Child Care Network and Green County Workforce Development shows that programs already started increasing tuition through the summer and fall to offset that lost revenue and most will be raising tuition by about a total of 25% a week over Jan 2023 rates unless the state replenishes Child Care Counts with state funds. The survey also found that many programs had not raised rates since 2019, if they did it was the typical 2-3% (well under the 8% inflation), and increased the child care professionals take home pay significantly by utilizing those funds, from around \$10 and hour to \$13 (still well below other occupations).

Chelsea Andrews and Cori Clark, met at a local park several years ago. Soon after meeting, they began brainstorming on bringing a larger group childcare center to Brodhead.

Their location, 807 16th Street, is across the street from Piggly Wiggly and used to be a car-detailing shop. Andrews had been working for years to bring her dream of a group cen-

ter to reality, several close misses on buildings and offers to purchase later she had this to say, "They [The Bank of Brodhead] got to nominate two businesses for this one grant, and Adam, my bank officer said, 'You have to get this done tonight,'" Andrews said. "A grant? No problem. Then I didn't hear anything and thought that I must have lost, and then he told me I won-and that was the same day of the accepted offer on this building. After uninstalling the garage door and revamping the bathroom to meet ADA guidelines, and laying some flooring, the rustic wood wall paneling met the aesthetic the pair were going for: outdoor adventures. The fenced-in area outdoors has a mud kitchen, water table, sand box, rock garden and amphitheater. Donated tree cuts from The City of Brodhead are in a square for children to climb, balance, and use their imaginations with along with a husband built teepee out of sticks. Asphalt parking lot was left inside the fence to be used for bikes, scooters and sidewalk

"We just really bonded over the fact that kids need to be out in nature and jumping off logs, and playing in the sand, making mud creations and playing with water," Andrews said. "It's just so fun watching the kids come out here and get dirty and have fun. We let the parents know right away this is how it is going to be—and the kids, they love it. They love coming out here barefoot and going home sandy and muddy."
