## **Brodhead Leaf Pick-up**

The City leaf pick-up service is planned to start the week of October 11th. However, you can haul your leaves to the compost site. Monday thru Saturday 8 a.m. to dark.

Please do not leave plastic bags or other garbage at the compost site. \\

If you want leaves picked up, you must follow these guidelines:

- •Leaves only. NO garbage, animal waste, grass, brush, rocks or other foreign items mixed in. Items other than leaves can plug and damage the equipment, which you could be liable for.
- •Leaves must be racked to edge of curb or street in windrows away from trees, posts and other objects. If the machine can't reach your leaves, they will not be picked up.

DO NOT put leaves in gutter or in the street. Leaves release phosphorus when they break down and decompose, representing one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. When left in the street gutters, a phosphorus-rich tea is produced that easily washes down storm drains and directly into our rivers and lakes. You can help by raking leaves from the street curb in front of your home, and then composting them or placing them on the street terrace for pick up.

Please have all leaves out to the street as soon as possible. Leave put out after Saturday, November 20th may be too late for pick up.  $\,$

Despite a wet and cold spring and a zillions beetles, we've had a wonderful growing season at the Brodhead Community Garden with abundance of just about every garden vegetable. We enjoyed regular visits by a family of cranes and many pleasant days.

As the season winds down here are a few reminders for all our terrific gardeners. We will expect to have freezing temperatures soon so it's time to clean up the gardens for the year. Please have your garden area cleaned up by Monday, November 1st. That would include removing any metal or wood objects and removing any large woody plants like sunflowers and cornstalks. They can be placed alongside your garden. Everything else including all plant material can be placed in the compost pile.

We will be cutting back all vegetation in early November. The more clean up you can do on your own plot the better. You might want to put manure, grass clippings or other organic material on your garden after the gardens are cut back.


Senior portraits: Senior photos are due by Wednesday, December 15. Any senior that does not have a photo will still be included in the yearbook and their most recent school photo will be used.

# Wisconsin War Bride Diary I

#### Chapter 17 - Plunging Into Obstetric Nursing

The evening is beginning to become late; and I'm certain my parents sense that something is awry. This is far too critical for me to worry about Mom and Dad now. Father McCollow returns and is smiling. He states that classes for marriage can begin tomorrow, both churches and pastors will be involved, and the wedding will be at St. Victor's in Monroe. This situation will be a win for God, both churches and Dot's growing family. I asked to use his phone and relay the message. The couple were both very excited and returned the elation over the phone. Though nothing of the sort has ever been competed in our small community, the combined wedding with both churches will occur. Wow! I'm happy and feel I accomplished more tonight than I have as an obstetric RN at the hospital. I travel home and both parents are up and sensing that something is occurring. Mom can hear a mouse on the other side of town if she puts her ear to the ground.

I relay what has occurred to Mom and Dad. Both are in shock that St. Victor's Church and the community Methodist Church would agree to such an arrangement. We essentially have broken a few rules; however, Father McCollow can move to do right where an emergency exists (abortion). Mom and Dad will be wondering how this will be viewed within the parish. I relayed that the congregations of both churches will have to deal with an issue that may not uncommonly occur. I feel the best solution for all involved has occurred; and both pastors can explain to their church board what and how this decision happened. I feel good about the process and resolution. Though much of this was of my making; I did what I felt was the correct decision for Dot Asper and fiancé Jerry. Anything less and we've compromised the rights of the newborn. Besides, Dot and fiancé are very close to marriage. They've yet to delve into the issues of a mixed marriage; but now things will be resolved either way.

Formerly, the non-Catholic was required to become Catholic. This is still the standard and culture within our country. This standard may be changing. Objectively, most religions have highly similar doctrines, manners of how to live your life and requirements to uphold. I want the very best for everyone involved. Hopefully, I didn't create issues for the churches and parishioners. Some may say the church is changing its rules due to Dot's pregnancy. I would hope parishioners wouldn't be that shortsighted. Frankly, I don't care and would hope they would accept the couple into both churches. The rigidity of many churches' rules and obligations are customary, expected and essentially required. Blackballing a member can occur if one parishioner breaks rules. I would expect some of this to change post WWII; however, this is rural America. Customs don't change rapidly. Many envision the day when priests will marry, women will become priests and open confessions to yourself will occur. The confessional is a very intricate

exposing experience. Many (including myself) feel intimidated by the process of exposing our mortal (deep) and venial (lighter) sins. I don't envision this changing in our lifetime frankly.

I return to the obstetric ward after a long evening. I slept well knowing that I performed the right act with Dot's relationship and pregnancy. When a friend needs someone you must act. I feel they will be closer with a baby; and in time the churches will accept the issue as resolved. Many will still hang onto that the church changed its rules to fit the circumstances; however, I felt the churches adapted to the needs of the couple. As I ponder over these matters, a first time Mom (primigravida) is admitted onto our obstetric service. Dr. Radd (internist) has diagnosed pyelonephritis because of the high fever (106 degrees Fahrenheit), fast heart rate (160), fast breathing (24 breaths/minute) and low blood pressure (74/40). Her urine is infected (bacteria) and her white blood cell count is high (35,000—normal is to 9500). She is ill and the plan is to avoid delivery because she's a month early. The baby thus far is tolerating the infection and has good fetal heart tones. If the baby becomes infected; however, then all is lost. A Caesarean Section is being contemplated. The baby may not survive because of prematurity and the Mom is too ill to be transferred to Madison at the University Hospital.

Mom's desire to just get better and we're discussing different treatments in addition to Penicillin. The antibiotic doesn't appear to be helping at present. Unfortunately, we will have a disaster on our hands if this doesn't resolve. We could give steroids for a super infection and sepsis (now agreed that is our present clinical state). Transfer is out of the question because Mom is just too ill. Dr. Radd begins high doses of cortisone and changes the antibiotics to one of the old sulfa drugs. The cortisone allowed her blood pressure to elevate and heart rate to decrease. Over the next day her color improved and fever dropped. The bacteria in the urine became less; and she was well on her way to recovery. The baby appears fine, is growing and the family is relieved. I would champion Dr. Radd for his superlative care and compassion. Our nurses did an amazing job with a difficult case. I walked home and happened to see Dot Asper and Jerry driving into town for their very first marriage classes. Both churches are involved. News travels fast in a small community; and it appears universally most people in our community praise the churches for getting together over a matter that was very difficult involving a baby. Jerry and Dot have essentially been blessed by both churches and the good part of life goes on. They stop and Dot reveals her pregnancy. We talk about getting together this weekend. I replied assuredly that I would be available. This couple was meant for each other undoubtedly. They asked how Herb was coping with the military reserve obligation. I replied that he was needed back on his job and he's a touch lonely for me. I felt downcast after informing Jerry and Dot of Herb's loneliness.

Jerry then remarked that it is scary with China entering and supporting North Korea. Now I feel extremely disconsolate. I didn't show them my feelings; however, my true deep inner feelings are desolate. I want nothing to happen to Major Herbert John Ripp. Maybe I'll have a Huber beer when I arrive home?

## Chapter 18 - A Long Await for Herb's Return

Herb has left for an undisclosed period of time. I'm anxious regarding the world situation and my boyfriend's actual presence in a conflict. There are increasing reports of Korean War body bags containing American soldiers (if they can retrieve them). Families want bodies or remains; however, I feel the soul in a human has ascended at death and what is left is mere tissue (nothing else). What matters is how you live your life on earth; and not what happens to your body upon death. Camp McCoy is not that far away. Specific family members can attend and visit for short periods depending on the day or worldly events. The training is quite rigorous by his letters. He's definitely in shape and ready for whatever situation that could arise in a battle. His regimen has good spirits presently. Most are homesick for return to family and Green County, Wisconsin. I cannot wait and want this military stuff to just end. Nobody discusses peace treaties. It seems there is war at all costs and who is ever left standing wins. I'll maintain my plunge into obstetric nursing, help my parents and perhaps visit friends in Chicago and Denver. My sister could also use a visit in Aurora, Illinois.

Shirley Tompkins gives me a call and wants to play tennis. She's essentially a single parent with multiple kids. She isn't divorced because it appears "bad" to everyone. She'd be considered a failure. Her husband (Halet) never recovered from stress war syndrome ((WWII) and the incurred emotional/physical trauma. The alcohol problem never left and continued to escalate. She's living in an apartment with three little children (ages five, three, and a newborn). Thankfully, her recent delivery was quick and she's now breastfeeding baby Charlie. I have empathy for her present situation. This couple has been through everything attempting to improve. Her kids are doing well in school (K1) and at home; and, she is working waitressing part-time. Generally, when we've played prior, we talk more than play.

I agree to play at Recreation Park this Saturday at 0700 hours. The courts can be full by 0800; and neither of us have time to wait. This will in part diffuse my loneliness for Herb. He has been writing two-three times per week. Military phone calls are only allowed under special circumstances (like a death in the family). Thus, our tennis match/ball hitting is on for this Saturday at 0700. Shirley's neighbor is watching the kids. Thankfully, Shirley has that option much of the time because of an empathetic neighbor realizing that Shirley Tompkins needs to get out of the house on her own. Mom has also babysat in a pinch. I'll make the very best of this time for her; and if it is extensive talk, then that works also.

RN work today was boring compared to normal days. We performed in service drills - our usual practice when labor is slow. We reviewed cases and decidedly are attempting to improve immediate and long-term outcomes. Our first case was extensive postpartum bleeding. The review of uterine massage and use of the medications oxytocin and methergine were discussed. Foley catheter balloon treatment in the uterus has been shown to work (pressing the uterus on the inside). We progressed onward and discussed twins, triplets and ambiguous genitalia in the newborn. Breastfeeding was a major issue and continues to be controversial with pressure from the infant formula companies fighting the forming organizations promoting breastfeeding. I'm leaving it to Mom's discretion. Grandmas have considerable influence and discretion over baby's feedings. I feel this is a personal and family matter, which has two good options. I've witnessed babies automatically improve on bottle feedings. Alternatively, I've actually witnessed failed bottle-feeding and babies feed will with the breast.

There were many topics of discussion regarding when the physician doesn't arrive and we instruct women in their second stage not to push or labor down. This is difficult for many gals who want their freedom from labor/childbirth. New techniques are emerging in obstetric anesthesia including the general anesthesia with halothane, caudal or sacral injections and catheters, pudendal blocks near the vagina and local anesthetic infiltration around the vaginal introitus and perineum. Our medications include our triple of scopolamine, phenergan and Demerol, which places a woman into twilight after an intramuscular injection. Most of the older obstetricians use this method exclusively with local anesthesia for the episiotomy if needed. I love the newer techniques because many patients are more alert and aware of what is occurring. If the patient is delirious, then we perform general anesthesia. The deep anesthetic in many cases removes mom's pushing power; and forceps deliveries are required. I want to be the most experienced obstetric nurse in the world. Though we are a rural hospital, our referral area is quite extensive because of the physician excellence. Monroe, Wisconsin has attracted a high number of very good physicians and is now called " The Little Mayo Clinic."

I walked home this evening after two deliveries. I can no longer deal without a car. I've been looking at a car on the Chevrolet lot. It has some miles and is in good condition. The previous owner traded the car for a new Chevy and reports it is in excellent condition. The price seems reasonable and I need wheels to get around. I'm quite tired of myself asking for my parent's car endlessly. It has some good features including some snow tires (needed) and a radio. The trunk will easily hold anything I'd need to carry. It obtains 10-12 miles per gallon. I will have access to visit friends in far away places on my time. The car will give me the mobility I need to improve my social life and maintain sanity.

I'll be able to visit Dot Asper with her new baby in Madison. I'll be able to drive to Denver, Milwaukee, Chicago and Aurora, Illinois where my sister and brother in law reside. I'll have some fun. Due to the world conditions and Korean War, I can't count on Herb returning home soon. He has no idea if his regimen will be activated. I become nauseated every time I think of war.

Mom and Dad seem a little down regarding Herb being gone. Dad, A World War I soldier in the European trenches, states that war is beyond hell. He feels that the folks in Washington, DC, have no choice but to make some sort of peace treaty with the North Koreans. Our country is unwilling to escalate Korea into a large Asian or world conflict. The US is far too tired of war and needs peace at all costs. Dad feels there is considerable happening beneath the surface to prevent escalation of Korea or anywhere else on the globe. Fortunately, Dad has knowledge and has stability with his thoughts. The sentiment just in our small community is against war-especially on foreign soil. Without a direct threat on our shores, the United States should mitigate any and all conflicts. This sounds dreamy; but taking on the role of the world police is far too difficult. The situation with Herb may require his regiment at Camp McCoy. Perhaps Herb's battalion is the last one to leave the United States for Asia. If that occurs, it could be a long good-bye. People would ask me if I would wait for his return and it is undoubtedly yes. I love him.

The St. Claire Hospital is surging with patients. The need for ancillary employees (especially in obstetrics) is highly acute. I'm back to doing everything from check-in/ registration to cleaning the rooms after deliveries (a mess). I don't mind except when we have charting, other patients requiring attention and more patients in OB triage. I try to float some help from medical and surgical floors. I hear from other head nurses that they are quite short of help also. The hospital has been squeamish regarding hiring help because they are concerned regarding a slowdown in hospital business. Barring a miracle birth control cure (pharmaceutical companies are avidly working on injectables and pills for women), there is no turning back this "baby boom." I love what I'm doing; but I'm back to difficult uphill hours, overtime, weekends and burnout mode. I need some reprieve. Perhaps I'll purchase this old car and take a trip to Chicago. That will settle my nerves. I'll be able to see Bess and Bethany.


