Bats represent one quarter of all mammal species on earth, yet they are widely misunderstood and persecuted. If we look past our prejudices, we see that bats are inextricably linked to the health of our environment and our agricultural systems. Globally they consume huge quantities of crop pests and provide pollination services worth billions of dollars. Locally, bats are busily at work on mosquito control and crop pest reduction and they ask nothing more than to be left alone to do their work.

Barbara Williams will examine our local bats and the challenges they face. We'll take a quick tour of the world's bats and attitudes that people have toward bats in different cultures, look at the risks and benefits of welcoming bats to your landscape and ways you can accommodate and encourage bats without conflict. The program will include a brief demonstration of a bat detection microphone and recorder that can be used to monitor bat populations.

Barbara Williams is a life-long student of natural history with many years of experience as a birder, photographer and traveler. She worked in Rockford at Burpee Museum's biology department for about ten years tending and cataloguing the collections, creating exhibits and preparing specimens of plants, insects, birds and mammals. She also monitors dragonflies and bumblebees as part of the Forest Preserves of Winnebago County citizen science program.

The Green County Genealogical Society will hold its monthly meeting Saturday, November 5 at 10 a.m. The online program "Abandoned: The Untold Story of the Orphan Trains" will be presented by local history author and historian, Michael Keene. By the end of the Civil War, an estimated 30,000 homeless and orphaned children roamed the streets of New York City. The program explores the audacious relocation scheme which operated between 1854 and 1929, when an estimated 250,000 orphaned or abandoned children were transported west by train and placed in foster homes, mostly in rural mid-western areas. Called the Orphan Train Movement, it endeavored to save these children lost to the streets by heroes who fought for their liberation. The premise now seems incredible, but it developed in response to a crisis in care for homeless children. Their stories are incredibly haunting and poignant.

SSM Health Monroe Hospital and Green County emergency response organizations provided education at the 2022 "Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth" (P.A.R.T.Y.) Program on Wednesday, October 5. Over 950 local high school students attended to learn how decisions they make related to alcohol and drug use affect everyone around them.

Testimonials from a Green County Deputy Coroner, a Green County judge and the personal stories of individuals directly affected by their own choices, or the choices of others related to driving under the influence, were also shared.

"I think kids aren't really aware that these are choices they're making. You make the choice to drink and drive, you make the choice to use drugs and get into a car, but they don't foresee the potential of what can happen under those circumstances," shared Mary Tessendorf, SSM Health Monroe Hospital Trauma Coordinator.

It is the P.A.R.T.Y. Program Committee's hope that students will remember this program and be able to identify a risky situation, and a safer alterna-


City leaf pickup service is planned to start around the week of October 17th.

However, starting Monday, October 17th you can haul your leaves to the compost site.

Monday thru Friday 8 a.m. to dark; Saturday 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Please do not leave plastic bags or other garbage at the compost site.

> If you want City leaf pickup service, you must follow these guidelines:

- · Leaves only. NO garbage, animal waste, grass, brush, rocks or other foreign items mixed in. Items other than leaves can plug and damage the equipment which you could be liable for.
- · Leaves must be racked to edge of curb or street in windrows away from trees, posts and other objects. If the machine can't reach your leaves, they will not be picked up.
- DO NOT put leaves in gutter or in the street. Leaves release phosphorus when they break down and decompose, representing one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. When left in the street gutters, a phosphorusrich tea is produced that easily washes down storm drains and directly into our rivers and lakes. You can help by raking leaves from the street curb in front of your home, and then composting them or placing them on the street terrace for
