


QB Gabe Bockhop has led the Brodhead Juda football team the last two years and led the team into the playoffs. (Free Press file photo by Teresa Earleywine)

Green County UW-Extension Dairy Modernization Tours: Monday, October 30th

UW-Extension will be sponsoring Dairy Facility Farm Tours on Monday, October 30th. The tours will include seven dairy farms located in Green and Lafayette Counties that have all made modernization improvements to their dairy facilities to increase productivity and animal comfort as well as reduce labor.

The tours are popular with dairy farmers as they feature an open house format in which dairy producers can visit any number of the seven farms they wish between 10:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. There is no central meeting place or any formal presentation for the tours. Farmers can simply select which farms they would like to visit on their own time schedule between 10:30 a.m.-3 p.m. on Monday, October 30th. A farm representative will be on hand at each farm to answer questions for the tour participants.

The tours will feature various sizes of dairy farms with herds ranging from 120-1800 cows. For producers interested in upgrading their milking facilities, the tours will include robotic milking systems, swing parlors, parallel parlors, and other milking setups.

Multiple types of freestall sheds will be available at these farms including three and four rows with headlocks, mattresses, and alley scrapers. Others may include sand bedding, waterbed mattresses, and recycled sand creating various kinds of cow comfort. A tunnel ventilation barn may also be viewed.

One farm features an automatic calf feeding system utilizing milk replacer and the nursery calves receive pasteurized milk. Another farm features a calf barn with a pasteurizer and bottle cleaner.

Several manure handling systems will be included on the tours. Some of the host farms on the tour have daily scraping systems with mini manure pits for short-term storage. One farm features a sand separator and utilizes polymers to keep the water clean to ensure the sand being reused is clean. One farm also uses bedding from manure solids on the mattresses made with an EYS screw press.

These tours are designed to help generate ideas for dairy producers who are considering future improvements and modernization in their own dairy facilities. Host farmers will be on hand to share their experiences in the building process and to explain what they like about their facility and what they might change if they were to do it again. Tour participants will be required to wear plastic boots that will be supplied at each of the farms.



On Monday, October 30th from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Lance Peterson and Jayson Montiel will be hosting a blood drive at Brodhead High School for their Senior Project. It takes about an hour to complete your paperwork and donation. Snacks will be provided.

Today, RRVBC supplies the total blood needs for 13 area hospitals: Beloit Health System, Edgerton Hospital and Health Services, FHN, Javon Bea Hospital-Riverside, Javon Bea Hospital-Rockton, Mercyhealth Hospital and Medical Center—Harvard, Mercyhealth Hospital and Trauma Center-Janesville, Mercyhealth's Hospital and Medical Center—Walworth, OSF Saint Anthony Medical Center, Rochelle Community Hospital, SwedishAmerican Hospital, SwedishAmerican Medical Center—Belvidere and SwedishAmerican Medical Center/Regional Cancer.

RRVBC must collect more than 800 units of blood each week to meet the needs of their 13 hospitals. They rely on donors from nine counties of the Rock River Valley, including Winnebago, Boone, Carroll, Lee, McHenry, Ogle and Stephenson counties in Illinois and Walworth and Rock County in Wisconsin. RRVBC employs approximately 100 people, including a Medical Director, healthcare, financial and community relations. RRVBC has four locations. In addition, there are up to three mobile blood drives each day. RRVBC is a not-for-profit organization, governed by an 11 member Board of Directors. They are regulated by the Food and Drug Administration; accredited by the American Association of Blood Banks; and a member of America's Blood Centers.

If you would like to sign up to give blood, please go to RRVBC.org, create an account, and login to schedule your appointment at the Brodhead High School Mobile Drive. All donors will need a photo ID with their date of birth. In order to donate, you must be 17 years old or older, or 16 with parental consent. All blood types are needed! Cards Get Trumped

In a game of dueling Cardinals in last week's Level 1 playoff round, Brodhead struggled from the start when on first possession they fumbled and Columbus made the recovery but BJ defense kept them from scoring. With Brodhead's second possession it was two quick pass plays from QB Gabe Bockhop to Isaac Saunders and then again to Gunner Boegli to get our guys well into Columbus territory. But this time it would be an interception by Brady Link that would ultimately result in a score for Columbus to take a 7-0 lead. Brodhead was unable to find their groove with Bockhop getting sacked and they would need to punt. Columbus capped this possession with their second touchdown. Another interception of Brodhead-Juda and Columbus put together another quick scoring drive. With Columbus having all the momentum, it would be 35–0 at the half.

Columbus opened with the ball at the start of the third quarter, a continuous clock was also implemented. Their first drive resulted in their sixth TD. Brodhead had just too many errors and seemed to have the wind knocked out of their sails early in the game. The game ended with a final score of 49–0 to move the defending D4 state champions, and senior Colton Brunnell, who became Wisconsin's all-time rushing leader with 6,985 career rushing yards and his team, the Columbus Cardinals onto level two in D5.

Brodhead's junior QB Bockhop passed for 189 yards with Boegli leading the receivers with nine carries and 152 yards. 

Juda School District Annual **Meeting** Summary

Voters at the annual meeting of the Juda School District approved a mill rate for 2023/2024 of \$10.95. The levy for 2022/2023 was \$11. The amount levied in 2022/2023 was \$1,756,699 and the amount proposed to be levied for 2023/2024 is \$1,916,485 an increase of \$159,786. In the 2022/2023 school year the district was able to put into the general fund balance \$8,958 giving the district a current fund balance of \$845,394. In the 2023/2024 school year, the district has budgeted to use \$75,036 from the general fund balance.

In other action the voters:

•Approved the board salaries of \$100 for the President, \$100 for the Clerk, \$60 for the Vice President, regular meetings of \$35 per member, special meetings of \$25 per member and \$30 per member for the annual meeting.

•Approved the 2023/2024 school fees and breakfast/lunch fees.

•Designated the Bank of New Glarus-Juda as the official place of depository.

•Authorized the board to furnish textbooks at the fees the board designates.

•Authorized the board to furnish school lunches at the fees the board designates. •Authorized the board to engage

Boardman and Clark as legal counsel as needed.

•Approved the district to provide transportation services to students.

•Approved to authorize reimbursement for board member expenses.

•Set the date for the 2023 annual meeting to be held on Wednesday, October 16th, 2024 at 7 p.m. in the Technology Lab.

Following the annual meeting, the board held a special meeting to approve a mill rate of \$10.95 for 2023/2024, this rate is down \$.05 from the prior year mill rate. The board also passed a resolution authorizing short-term borrowing as needed.

Green County Conservation Tree Sale

Fall is almost over. It's time to think spring. Spring tree planting that is. The Green County Land and Water Conservation Department is offering 10 varieties of trees and three shrubs for landowners interested in planting trees next spring. The tree varieties are: Quaking Aspen, Sugar Maple, Bur Oak, Red Oak, Swamp White Oak, Domestic Apple, White Pine, Norway Spruce, American Arborvitae, and Tamarack. The shrubs available are American Plum, Serviceberry, and Elderberry. Some of these are species they haven't offered in the past so check it out! The trees and shrubs are bare root, and range in height between 12 inches and three feet depending on species. The cost is \$3 per tree and must be ordered in increments of 10.

Most of the trees and shrubs are native to the area and the species offered cover a broad range of soil types and moistures, from dry to very wet.

Mycorrhizal root dip and nutrient packs are also available to order. Tree spuds can be rented with a deposit. We also have tree planters available, allowing you to plant a lot of trees with ease. Contact us to get on the planter schedule.

Trees can be ordered by contacting the LWCD directly by phone or by ordering through the Green County LWCD website www.greencountylwcd.com under the tab "Resources". They also have order forms in the office if you want to stop by and pick one up. If you are unsure about what trees will work in your particular soil, have any questions about the trees or how to order stop in or give the Green County Land and Water Conservation Department a call at 608-325-4195. They will be taking orders until Friday, December 29th. Trees are scheduled for pick up mid to late

Land judging contests held

The 2023 Green County Land Judging Contest was held Wednesday, September 27, at the Nick Hartwig farm, located on the northside of Monroe along Hwy. 81. Those participating were FFA students from Bay Port, Beaver Dam, Blackhawk, Cassville, Cuba City, Dodgeville, Evansville, Fennimore, Juda, Lancaster, Milton, Monticello, Mt. Horeb, Pecatonica, Platteville, Potosi, Prairie du Chien, River Ridge, Seneca, and Shullsburg. There was a total of 180 students.

The students reviewed four soil pits and determined the position in land-scape, slope of the field, determined type and degree of erosion or if there is deposition, evaluated soil properties, such as texture, structure, and drainage, estimated slope, ranked land classes, observed soil limitations, checked for invasive species, and recommended conservation practices. Soils ranged from silt loam to sand to clay, which made for a very challenging contest. A perfect score for the contest is 400 and only three of the 180 students got a score of over 300.

The results are as follows: Top Individual was Sydney Recker of Potosi, second place went to Aiden Uppena of Potosi, third was Reid Stalsberg of Fennimore, fourth was Brendon Jentz of River Ridge, and firth place went to Havanna Jantzen of Potosi. In team results, Potosi placed first, Fennimore second, Juda third, River Ridge fourth, and Monticello fifth.

Thank yous go to Rufer and Son for digging the pits for the contest. Jeff Deniger of the Natural Resources Conservation Service was the official judge of the contest. Local Land and Water Conservation staff Tonya Gratz, Tess Wallner, and Todd Jenson, as well as local NRCS staff Emily Colson, Ashley Letcher, Chelsea Gruber, and Kristin Fischer ran the contest. And of course, thank you to Nick Hartwig for agreeing to host the contest.
