#### **City Council Preliminary Budget presented**

By Gloria Sutter City Treasurer Keri Miller pre-

sented the preliminary budget and explained the planned changes. It showed a total of \$77,381 over the levy limit. Councilman Simpson was concerned that it did not provide funds for a fulltime Park and Rec Director. After discussion, it was agreed that the additional funds for a full-time director be added, bringing the total deficit to \$98,363. By providing the funds from Fund Balance or ARPA Funds, the City will not be punished for going above the levy limit. The Council approved

using ARPA Funds.

Six applications have been received for the Park and Rec position. The Council directed the Personal and Park and Rec Committees to proceed with the hiring process.

T-Mobile requested their contract with the City be amended for an upgrade to their equipment on the water tower at a cost of \$2,800 annually. This was approved pending City Attorney approval.

The Council approved a new Public Works uniform policy and an Exit Interview policy for the Employee Handbook.



get out on their own and were not injured. The other businesses were unoccupied at the time of the fire.

Brodhead Fire District initiated mutual aid box alarm (MABAS) to which eight fire departments in Green, Lafayette and Rock counties, as well as two from Illinois, responded to battle the fire. The fire was contained at 4:40 p.m. Due to the efforts of the responding fire-fighters; they kept the fire from spreading to any of the other historic buildings. Firefighters cleared the scene at 8:18 p.m. No firefighters were hurt at the scene.

Brodhead police and fire officials are still investigating the cause of the fire. A damage estimate was not available to the effected business, at this time.

A three-story business suffered the most damage and until officials can determine the structure's integrity 1st Center Ave. (STH 11) has been closed to vehicle traffic between 10th Street and Exchange Street until sometime on Monday. Large trucks and trucks hauling oversize loads are being routed onto E. 9th Avenue (CTH T) and then onto 23rd Street to get back onto 1st Center Avenue (STH 11) on the south end of the city.



#### Orienteering at Magnolia Bluff

On Friday, October 7, seventhgrade students at Brodhead Middle School took part in a unique experience at Magnolia Bluff County Park. This curriculum-based field trip started in a traditional classroom with instruction on topographic maps and the sport of orienteering. Upon arrival at the bluff, seventhgraders were given specific instructions from Madison native Kevin Teschendorf, a nationally-ranked orienteer competitor. Students collaborated in small groups to navigate a route to seventeen checkpoints throughout the park. It was a beautiful day to be outside, redefining the walls of their classrooms.



Fall is almost over. It's time to think spring. Spring tree planting that is. The Green County Land and Water Conservation Department is offering 14 varieties of trees and two shrubs for landowners interested in planting trees next spring. The tree varieties are: Quaking Aspen, Paper Birch, Black Walnut, Red Splendor Crabapple, Sugar Maple, Bur Oak, Red Oak, Swamp White Oak, White Oak, American Plum, Domestic Apple, White Pine, Norway Spruce, and Sycamore. The shrubs available are Common Ninebark and Redosier Dogwood. Some of these are species we haven't offered in the past so check it out! The trees and shrubs are bare root, and range in height between 12 inches and 3 feet depending on species. The cost is \$3 per tree and must be ordered in increments of 10.

Most of the trees and shrubs are native to the area and the species offered cover a broad range of soil types and moistures, from dry to very wet.

Mycorrhizal root dip and nutrient packs are also available to order. Tree spuds can be rented with a deposit. They also have tree planters available, allowing you to plant a lot of trees with ease. Contact them to get on the planter schedule.





Monday thru Friday 8 a.m. to dark; Saturday 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Please do not leave plastic bags or other garbage at the compost site.

If you want City leaf pickup service, you must follow these guidelines:

• Leaves only. NO garbage, animal waste, grass, brush, rocks or other foreign items mixed in. Items other than leaves can plug and damage the equipment which you could be liable for.

· Leaves must be racked to edge of curb or street in windrows away from trees, posts and other objects. If the machine can't reach your leaves, they will

• <u>DO NOT put leaves in gutter or in the street.</u> Leaves release phosphorus when they break down and decompose, representing one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. When left in the street gutters, a phosphorusrich tea is produced that easily washes down storm drains and directly into our rivers and lakes. You can help by raking leaves from the street curb in front of your home, and then composting them or placing them on the street terrace for pick up.

Please have all leaves out to the street as soon as possible. Leaves put out after November 21st may be too late for pick up.
