Level 4 Playoff Not in the Cards

Brodhead-Juda had hopes of avenging their regular season loss against Prairie du Chien when they met in the third round of the WIAA Division 5 football playoffs this past Saturday. The Cardinals, on their second possession, found paydirt when Gunner Boegli caught a 74-yard pass from Gabe Bockhop. Brodhead was on the board with a 6–0 lead when the point-after-kick was wide. The Blackhawks on their next drive would get deep into Cardinal territory. On third down they attempted a pass play to the endzone. The receiver had the ball in his hands but dropped it as Aidyn Vondra was there to break-up the play. PDC goes for a field goal but that is blocked by Joe Lohmar to preserve Brodhead's lead. The remainder of the first half would be the teams trading ball control.

This game would be a defensive stance for both teams and challenged by the strong winds and wet conditions being a factor. Both teams were also hit with significant penalties throughout the game. At the half the score remained 6-0.

Leon Saunders (BJ) was back playing after recovering from an injury that has kept him sidelined most of the season. He was a key factor as the third quarter opened with the Blackhawks opening possession. Saunders with his speed helped limit PDC from gaining yardage and they punted to Brodhead. The Cardinals would be three-and-out and Blackhawk would get another shot. This time, the Blackhawks put together a 72yard scoring drive near the end of

the third quarter. They took a 7-6 lead with a three-yard endzone run. Again, BJ will punt after three plays. The Blackhawks have momentum and the ball. They marched 80 yards on eight plays and at the start of the fourth quarter, a 23-yard run caps off a second touchdown for the Blackhawks and they have a solid 14-6 lead. Brodhead is desperate to get something going in their favor. PDC forced the BJ offense off the field after a fake punt comes up short of a first down. With their next possession, and the Cardinals racing against the clock, a screen pass from Bockhop to Isaac Saunders gets them their first down of the second half. But it is not enough. QB Bockhop would leave the game due to injury, later determined his upper arm had been broken. Marcus McIntyre would take over the duties of QB. Brodhead turns it over on downs and PDC manages the clock. The 14-6 final score will move the Blackhawks to round four.

In his post-game interview, Coach Jim Matthys reflected on the impact his five seniors; Austin Moe, Aidyn Vondra, Leon Saunders, Sean Huffman and CI Streuly have had on Brodhead Juda football. He stated, these seniors were part of the turning point and getting Cardinal football back on a winning track, "Some will see our glass as half-empty but our glass is really half-full."





Child Care Matters Community Conversation


On Wednesday, October 26th, the Green County Healthy Communities Coalition Mental Health Matters subcommittee and the Green County Child Care Network (GCCCN) hosted a community conversation of the role that child care has in mental health. GCCCN members Brooke Skidmore and Corrine Hendrickson presented. They talked about creating a cohesive system to meet the needs of young children, who, through no fault of their own have had adverse experiences in their lives. Adverse experiences can

be poverty, abuse, neglect, and traumatic experiences. Relationships between important adults and children can help children offset these events and provide a buffer. They also talked about how childcare is also a workforce development issue. Eight percent of women still haven't returned to the workforce since the covid pandemic began because they cannot find childcare. Frank Mixdorf, NAMI Green County, stated, "For me, it was the macro overview that early childhood care and development is not just a parental issue, but more

urgently now an employer issue, and ultimately a societal one." Additionally, an overview of grants and fund*raising efforts that GCCCN has been working on in partnership with the Green County Development Corporation (GCDC) and United Way of Green County including Child Care Matters was provided. Olivia Otte, GCDC Executive Director, stated, "The lack of affordable and quality childcare is directly impacting the health of our economy, that is why GCDC is excited to continue to partner with different childcare advo-

cates in order to make lasting change in this industry." Furthermore, the American Rescue Plan's dramatic increase in child care funding has kept child care businesses open, but that those funds expire soon and it is imperative our state budget adds child care as a budget line item (currently only the minimum required to receive Federal Funds is what is allocated). Elected officials must hear from parents, businesses, community leaders, and residents that childcare is important to them and should be invested in.




