### The Community Closet



# Gene Arnold **Pinnow**

Gene Arnold Pinnow, age 89, passed away surrounded by family on November 19th at Albany Oaks Assisted Living. He was born December 21, 1933, in Monroe, Wisconsin, to William and Annie Ida Pinnow (Roenneburg).

Gene was raised on a dairy farm in Spring Grove Township and often spoke of awakening in the wee hours of the morning to do daily chores starting when he was six years old. He entered the Wisconsin Army National Guard at the age of 16, and upon graduation from Brodhead High School, joined the Active Army along with his best friend Mike Zimmerman. After basic training in Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, Gene received orders for Germany while Mike was sent to Korea. Mike was killed during the Korean War, and Gene spoke of that sad memory throughout his life. Gene was very proud to have served in the military as a Forward Observer, and also being a lifelong member of VFW and the American Legion.

While Gene was on leave with friends in Amsterdam, Netherlands, he met his future wife Anna. They married after their fourth date and spent the next 65 years together.

While home on leave in 1956, Gene contracted Guillain-barre syndrome. Within days he was completely paralyzed and fighting for his life at Great Lakes Naval Hospital. He was in the iron lung and given last rights before turning the corner and recovering over a lengthy period of intense physical therapy. After being medically discharged, he and Annie made their home in Brodhead.

Together with Howard and Ann Wallace, they owned and operated the Brodhead Hotel for over seven years. After selling the business to Clyde Harris, Gene started up Pinnow Construction, building and remodeling houses for 10 years. He then worked for Warner Brake and Clutch for 17 years as a machinist before retiring in 1995.

In retirement, Gene and Annie enjoyed traveling the world, mainly through flights to vacation destinations, cruises, and bus trips.

In recent years with the speed of technology quickly changing today's world, Gene often voiced how thankful he was to have grown up when he did.

Gene is survived by three sons: Richard (Jeanne) and Henry (Laurie) of Brodhead, and James (Sharon) of Albany; eight grandchildren: Skyler, Derrick (Niteal), Brynn, Cody, Chase, Becca, Tess, and Paige (Kyle) Olson; five great grandchildren: Laetin, Peterson, Carter Peterson, Alijah, Malakai, and Olivia Olson; a brother Charles; and sister Eileen Campion.

He was preceded in death by his wife Anna in 2020, his parents, brothers: Roy, Earl, Leslie, and Alfred, and sisters: Rosie, Ann, and Ruth.

Per Gene's wishes, there will be no visitation or funeral. Private burial will occur at Greenwood Cemetery in Brodhead. Donations in his memory can be made to ALZ. org, or the Veterans Administration.

# A Storied Past, A Greener Future: Brodhead Ecological Restoration Site Stands as a Testament to Nature's Resilience

Tucked along the banks of the Sugar River near Brodhead, WI, lies a hidden gem. A place where the echoes of history reverberate through flowing waters and rustling leaves of century-old oaks. Three Waters Reserve, with its picturesque landscapes, is not just an event venue, but a living testament to centuries of human stories and the resilient spirit of nature.

#### A Walk Through Time

Strolling the trails that wind through the 70-acres of restored oak savanna, prairie and wetland ecosystems that form Three Waters Reserve feels like stepping back in time. Millennia ago, the first people left their mark on the land, shaping its history for generations to come. The Ho-Chunk once called this valley home, and archaeological remnants in the area tell tales of an enduring connection between humans and nature.

The mid-nineteenth century brought about a major change with the construction of a dam and mill race on the Sugar River, powering a hydroelectric operation that illuminated the nearby City of Brodhead. The dam also gave rise to Decatur Lake, a scenic backdrop that still abuts the Reserve today.

#### From Pearl Rush to Conservation Haven

In the early twentieth century, a freshwater pearl rush briefly turned the Sugar River into a global sensation, supporting a button industry that capitalized on the abundant mussel shell resource. The boom was short-lived however, coming to a halt once the river's mussel popu-

lation had been depleted. But the land's agricultural legacy endured.

In 1905, the property that now forms Three Waters Reserve was purchased by Henry C. Putnam, a Wisconsin pioneer who would serve as Brodhead's village president, and eventually, a Wisconsin State Senator. With business ties to the railroad company, Putnman intended on capitalizing on the forested areas of the property for lumber production.

Over the years, the property changed hands, becoming the Decatur Lake Golf Course in 1926. For nearly a century, the property was enjoyed for its picturesque river bluff scenery and rolling hills until the golfing landscape shifted in the twenty-first century.

#### **A New Chapter Unfolds**

In 2018, Southern Wisconsin Land Conservancy took stewardship of the land usering in a new chapter in the Reserve's story. Their vision was clear—to restore the natural beauty of oak savanna, prairie, and wetlands while creating a space for community gathering, celebration and education.

Since then, partnerships have blossomed, bringing science, education, and local regenerative farmers and chefs into the fold. Public events programming thus far has included foraging workshops, a "Lunch and Learn" series exploring local and regional history, chef's tables featuring local and regionally sourced ingredients, and a "Plants as Medicine" series highlighting the critical connection between nature and human health. The former fairways now stand as a testament to the power of conservation and community collaboration.

A Taste of What's to Come

In 2024, Three Waters Reserve will enhance its public events programming by expanding accessibility for mobility-impaired and elderly audiences. The Reserve plans to expand its nature-based educational initiatives and foster culinary collaborations with local breweries and distilleries. Additionally, the Reserve will continue to welcome both businesses and the community to utilize the facility for private events like meetings, retreats and celebrations.

TWR's Director of Culinary Services, Chef John Marks, and a developing team of servers, bartenders and kitchen staff are getting ready to open up the food service for more than just catering events. 

## Armed Robbery Suspect Deceased in City of Monroe

On Tuesday, November 14, 2023 at approximately 2:09 p.m., Green County Law Enforcement agencies were notified of an armed robbery that had just occurred at a business along STH 11 in the Rock County Village of Orfordville. Law Enforcement was given a description and license plate number of the suspect vehicle that reportedly had one male occupant.

At approximately 2:38 p.m., a Monroe Police Officer located the suspect vehicle in the vicinity of STH 69 and STH 11 in the City of Monroe. When the officer attempted to stop the suspect vehicle, it fled southbound in the City of Monroe and officers pursued the vehicle to a business parking lot located along 17th Street and 12th Avenue. Upon stopping, the driver reportedly exited the vehicle, pointed a handgun in the direction of Monroe Police Officers and then turned the handgun on himself. The suspect then reportedly shot himself and despite the efforts of law enforcement and EMS, was pronounced dead at the scene. During the brief confrontation with the suspect, no Law Enforcement Officers discharged their firearms and none reportedly any injuries.

Monroe Police requested that the Green County Sheriff's Office conduct the death investigation, which is ongoing as of the time of this release. Additional information is expected to be available in the coming days

#### Suspect in Monroe Death Investigation Identified

Green County Sheriff's Detectives continue to investigate the death of an adult male that occurred in a parking lot along 12th Avenue in the City of Monroe, that occurred during the afternoon of Tuesday, November 14, 2023.

The deceased male has been identified as Casey J. Austin, age 49, who has a last known address of Janesville. Mr. Austin's vehicle was positively identified as the suspect vehicle in an armed robbery in Orfordville, earlier Tuesday afternoon and he matches the physical description of the suspect involved in the armed robbery.





Josh Brownell and Kerryann DiLoreto co-own a vintage 1930 Waco ATO Taperwing biplane. This beauty of a plane can carry up to two passengers in the front cockpit, depending on weight, and Josh is the pilot in the rear seat. Brownell grew up in California. His neighbor, Ron Price was an airline pilot and traveled internationally. His son, Chris, was a good friend of Josh's. The Prices were into antique airplanes. Josh was drawn to mechanics like cars and motorcycles so it did not take too long for him to become interested in the antique airplanes. There is an element of craftsmanship and learning the idiosyncrasies of the crafts that was intriguing to Josh. Combined with his desire to "see the world" it was a natural transition to become a professional pilot. As a pilot he states he has flown the DC-3 and the 747, two of the most iconic airliners built. His friend, Chris, eventually moved to Brodhead for the airport that is established here. Josh arrived a few years later living in the Madison area with Kerryann and together they purchased the WACO Taperwing as they had the reputation for being agile along with maneuverability of golden-age aircraft. They spent the next three years over hauling it so it would fly the way they wanted it to. They found themselves spending so much time driving back and forth

from Madison to the Brodhead air-

port, they decided to build a home and move here saying it was one of their best decisions.

With owning a vintage aircraft, there are definite challenges to the near nonstop maintenance needed to keep it flying that include acquiring the specialized parts, tools, and machinery to keep their plane soaring. He states he has had many people through the years who have mentored Kerryann and himself. The people that have guided them have been valuable resources of knowledge in addition to hands on assistance. The costs of fuel, insurance, hangar costs and prepping for the next engine overhaul can be daunting. They now share what they have learned to the upcoming generations of vintage plane interested people. They also offer biplane flights in Brodhead and undergo routine audits and maintain the certifications to be approved by the FAA. It is a pretty cool feeling to be in the open-cockpit.

Fred Kloepping, formerly of Juda, was gifted a flight in the Taperwing for Father's Day and made his flight in August. He described it as one of the highlights of his life with the ability to fly over and look down on the farm he once operated and the surrounding area. "Sure beats a tie" he proclaimed.
