City Council

Ordinance to Rezone Wuthrich Property to R2 Failed

Ordinance 006-2023 would allow for the property north of the Senior Village and west of Cardinal Estates be rezoned to R2 to allow for duplexes to be built. Alder Simpson moved to decline to rezone due to residents' concerns it would affect their property values. He was also concerned that it didn't pass the Zoning Board of Appeals. Mayor Jones stated the Planning Commission recommended the zoning be changed and the many local residents who live in the Mobile Home Park were not asked for their opinion since they rent the land on which their homes sit. He also stated that the city has a housing shortage and this type of development would help that. Mr. Simpson stated the city has land to develop for housing. The mayor stated that land in

the industrial park is not an option. The representative of the property said the Zoning Board of Appeals meeting was not professional and he wasn't given a chance to address the homeowners' concerns. He further stated the variance question is a matter of two feet along the length of the properties. After much discussion, Simpson's motion to deny the rezone ultimately passed with a five to one vote.

Sheriff Jeff Skatrud attended to answer questions about Green County's request for approximately \$70,000 for a 911 dispatcher. Skatrud explained that from 1981 until a staffing shortage earlier this year, Brodhead accepted 911 calls for the 897 exchange and cell phones from the same area. The county agreed to help even though their staffing model wasn't built for this. With the

increase in volume, they need two additional dispatchers. The county will fund one and they're asking the city of Brodhead to fund the other. Alder Burkhalter asked if any other communities pay for dispatch and the Sheriff responded they do not. Alder Simpson asked if the proposal had passed the Green County and Brodhead Attorneys. Sheriff Skatrud stated it had. Attorney Schroeder clarified he'd reviewed it, but wasn't asked to research it. Alder Baxter asked if the county would still take the calls if the city declined to pay and the Sheriff stated they would. After further discussion in closed session, the council directed the city attorney to research state statues concerning 911 emergency services in regards to the contract Sheriff Skatrud presented.



Sharon was preceded in death by her parents, two sisters: Joyce and Pam; and two brothers: Allen and Brad.




