It is with mixed emotions that I share with you that Brodhead Police Chief Chris Hughes has presented me with his letter of intent to retire from the City of Brodhead Police Department. He will be retiring after a 28-year career in law enforcement including the last seven serving as Chief of Police in the City of Brodhead.

The Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) participants classified as public safety are allowed to retire earlier than other WRS participants due to the hazards and stresses experienced during their career.

Chief Hughes has afforded us the thoughtful consideration of giving us enough notice to prepare for the important task of a smooth and seamless transfer of leadership in the department. His willingness to help out in the transfer will ensure the continuity and quality police services remain intact for the citizens of Brodhead.

Council met on the 21st of November in closed session to discuss what the Chief's impending retirement and my thoughts on the next steps in transitioning leadership within our department. The City Council deliberated and approved the compensation package for the Chief that was in line with the City's Personnel Manual.



As Mayor and on behalf of the City Council I would like to thank Chief Hughes for his passion and efforts in keeping Brodhead a safe place to live. I wish him all the best in the next chapter of his life's jour-

The citizens of Brodhead can be assured that our commitment to public safety and high-quality police services will remain a priority as the Council and I navigate the next steps in transitioning leadership in our Police Department.

Clarification of resolution to dissolve Fire District

This letter is to clarify a lot of the questions that were brought up about the resolution to dissolve the Brodhead Fire District.

First of all, let me assure you that the City will still have Fire service. It will be in the form of a City of Brodhead Fire Department. The City of Brodhead had a Fire Department long before there was a Fire District. Your insurance rates will not be affected because of lack of fire service.

This was not an easy decision for the council and I to make. The Brodhead Fire District was formed in 2013. A large amount of the assets of the District were given from the City of Brodhead. The contract had a dissolution clause. If the District was dissolved prior to seven years was the date of forming each party would have received their contributed assets back. Since we are pass the seven-year mark, the division of assets will be divided based on the appraised value of the assets in a proportion determined by using the same formula as is used to determine the budget assessment for each member.

WINTER IS COMING!

After the seventh year, things began to morph dramatically for the intent of the original contract. The commission, in my opinion, has ventured outside of the purpose and intent of the formation of the Brodhead Fire District. The proposed merger/gifting of assets of the Brodhead Area EMS is not consistent with that purpose and intent.

Excerpt for Agreement.

"PURPOSE AND INTENT. This Agreement is entered into for the purpose of providing fire protection, first response, and public service within the District and within such other areas as may be contracted for by the Commission. It is intended that as of the effective date of this Agreement, the fire department will be operated and maintained as an independent entity and that the City of Brodhead Fire Department will cease to exist. It is the intent to create a commission which is a separate and distinct municipality under 66.0301 Wis. Stats.; not a fire company under Chapter 213, Wis. Stats. The parties hereto believe that this Agreement will provide adequate fire protection for all persons and properties


The family would like to extend a special thank you to Agrace Hospice Care for the care they provided to their mother.

situated within the District through joint and mutual cooperation, and will provide the same by means of a single administrative authority. It is the common belief of the parties hereto (1) that adequate protection against fire losses in the District can best be secured by the mutual joint purchase and ownership of firefighting equipment; (2) that a more effective fire protection organization will result from joint and mutual cooperation of the District Members; and (3) the overall costs of fire protection can be reduced by the equitable sharing of costs by the District Members."

The purpose and intent is clearly defined as "adequate protection against fire losses" and "a more effective fire protection organization" and the reduction in costs.

The incorporation of EMS services is not authorized by this agreement. The city lawyer was presented with a second Amendment to the Brodhead Fire District by their lawyer. We as a council decided not to sign the amendment because of the non-transparency and the unwillingness of the EMS to provide a proper balance sheet. It was later told to the Commission members by the chair that they do not really need the amendment. Our question is, then why did your lawyer send it to us? Did he just do it to pad his billable hours?

There are other questions we have but it has become evident that the commission overall does not want to listen. I say overall because we keep getting outvoted by the rural reps and our one at large committee member.

Rest assured that Brodhead will have adequate and quality fire protection.

Very proud coach watching them all push it hard and not giving up! On Saturday we traveled to Darlington (Varsity) and Bigfoot (Jv).


