






Green County Market Steer/ Market Heifer Weigh-In

The annual Green County Market Steer/Heifer Weigh-In will be held on Saturday, January 8th, at Equity Livestock, located south of Monroe from 8–10 a.m. In case of inclement weather the snow date will be Saturday, January 15th. An announcement will be made over WBGR radio prior to 8 a.m. on the morning of January 8th, if the weigh-in will be re-scheduled due to inclement weather.

All exhibitors who plan to show market steers or market heifers at the 2022 Green County Junior Fair must have their market animal weighed and identified at this weigh-in. Each exhibitor can identify a maximum of 5 market animals. U.S.D.A. radio frequency identification tags will be used to identify each market animal for the county fair. Exhibitors will be required to provide the premise ID number for the farm that the market animal will be housed at.

Green County Fair exhibitors must reside in Green County or be a member of a Green County FFA or 4-H Club, to have their market animals weighed and identified at this weigh-in. Market animals must also be identified and weighed to be eligible to participate in the 2022 Green County Fair Meat Animal Auction, Junior Steer/Heifer Show and the Market Animal Performance Class at the Green County Fair.

A market animal performance class will be held again in 2022. Market Animals entered in the performance class will be scanned for carcass merits and will not be sent for harvest during the fair. This will allow youth to exhibit the same market animal in both the performance and the market steer and market heifer classes with the exception of the Grand and Reserve Champion Performance Market Animal. The grand and reserve champion performance market animal will be selected based on their rate of gain, live show placing and scanned carcass data. Beef Steers must weigh 1,100 pounds and Dairy steer breeds including Holstein, Guernsey, Brown Swiss and Normande must weigh a minimum of 1,300 at the final weigh-in to be eligible for the performance class. Dairy steer breeds including Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, and Ayrshire, must weigh a minimum of 1,050 to be eligible for the performance class. Beef heifers must weigh a minimum of 1,000 pounds to participate in the Performance contest.

This weigh-in is only for market steers/heifers that will be exhibited at the Green County Fair. Steers/ Heifers that will be exhibited only at the WI State Fair will be self- identified by exhibitors and are not required to attend this weigh-in.

The Green County Beef Producers will be assisting with the weighin. Record books for the Green County Meat Animal Sale and fair rules will be distributed to all exhibitors at the weigh-in. 

With the pure way form the bee of which candles are made, the one nature of Christ is shown, the human nature. And as wax comes form the bees that are virgins, so did the body of the Lord come from the virginal womb of the ever-virgin Mary. It symbolizes three virtues: faiths because it dispels darkness, hope because it turns our minds to heaven, and love which wants us to offer our body and soul to God. The burning candle melts just as a Christian does I his holy struggle to enlighten others with his words and his deeds. He melts like a candle and he sacrifices himself for the love of God and his neighbor.

The light of the candle is the flame of faith. In Holy Scripture, God, is characterized as light. God on the first day of creation created light. He Himself appeared in the bush that burned in front of Moses and was like a burning column that went ahead and guided the Israelite people. We offer our pure beeswax candle so that its fragrance of purity can be like that of the soul of man. As it melts away, the candle symbolizes the spiritual joy, as well as the metonia of the heart. 

A story of the Divine Christ-child: When the holy family fled before Herod's sword to Egypt, robbers leapt out of the road with the intention of stealing something. The righteous Joseph was leading the donkey, on which were some belongings and on which the Most-holy Theotokos was riding with her Son at her breast. The robbers seized the donkey to lead it away. At that moment, one of the robbers approached the Mother of God to see what she was holding next to her breast. The robber, seeing the Christ-child, was astonished at His unusual beauty and said in his astonishment: "If God were to take upon Himself the flesh of man, He would not be more beautiful than this child." This robber then ordered his companions to take nothing from these travelers. Filled with gratitude toward this generous robber, the Most-holy Virgin said to him: "Know that this Child will repay you with a good reward because you protected Him today." Thirty-three years later, this same thief hung on the Cross for his crimes, crucified on the right side of Christ's Cross. His name was Dismas, and the name of the thief on the right side was Gestas. Beholding Christ the Lord innocently crucified, Dismas repented for all the evil of his life. While Gestas reviled the Lord Dismas defended Him, saying: This man hath done nothing amiss. 
