#### Funds allocated to complete the Covered Bridge

The Council approved a bid from Precision Drive and Control, Monroe, for the installation of a generator to be used for emergency operations at City Hall and the Police Department. Russ Jensen. MSA, explained the bid process and what will be included in the project. The bid of \$84,000 includes needed wiring, a new control panel and a Total Energy System generator manufactured by Kohler. Capital funds of \$60,000 had been budgeted for the project. The bidding process and needs analysis has cost over \$16,000 thus far. The additional needed funds for the project will come from the fund balance. The Council voted to take up to \$51,000 from fund

Jerry Elmer reported that funds have been allocated to complete the covered bridge. Dimension IV believes the roof will cost between \$100,000 and \$110,000. Brodhead Foundation has allocated \$80,000, Pearl Island had \$20,000 and private donations will cover the remaining cost. To proceed, the Council needs to approve the cost of the bid-

ding process by Dimension IV. The Council approved \$10,860. No City funds are being used for this proj-

The Council had one applicant that applied to fill the vacancy caused by Alderperson Naramore's resignation. A motion to table choosing the candidate failed. A motion was then approved to appoint Casey Jones with a four to one vote.

After closed session, the Council approved referring the purchase of property for the Driftless Home Project to the Finance Committee to research payment options.

A Class B beer and liquor license for Simple Soiree was approved.

Three bartender licenses were approved.

A secondhand article license was approved for Good Ole Stuff.

The next meeting is Monday, January 17.



# Donald E. Utschig

Donald E. Utschig, age 93, died peacefully at the ThedaCare Medical Center-New London, lovingly surrounded by his family on Wednesday December 22, 2021 after a courageous battle with AML, an aggressive type of leukemia.

A lifelong resident of Appleton, Don was born on May 25,1928 to loving parents, Theodore A. and Pearl A. (Boldt) Utschig. Thirteen years later, he became the brother to his dear sister and only sibling Sandra (Robert) Bradshaw of Woodstock, Illinois.

When Don was in ninth grade, he attended church camp and met the love of his life, Janet Mae Lederman, formerly of Brodhead, Wisconsin, parents John and Esther (Petersen) Lederman. Don and Jan parted ways that summer but were unexpectedly reunited at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois. They married on June 13,1953 and recently celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary. When our father was asked what he thought was the success of their long marriage, he stated "I was the boss at work, your mother was the boss at home and we never went to bed angry." Our mother's parting words to our father were, "I've loved you since the moment I saw you".

Don attended Appleton High School where the football coach gave him the distinction of "having the intestinal fortitude" to be the center of the football team. His love of the game never faltered as he and Jan were lifelong season ticket holders of the Green Bay Packers starting with the first Green Bay Packer Football game at City Stadium on September 29, 1957. That passion for football continued as he tried to attend every football game his son and grandsons played which even included college bowl games. Another proud accomplishment of Don's during high school was to be chosen an American Legion Delegate to Badger Boys State where it could be argued his keen interest for politics, government and community service were kindled.

Don's lifelong passion for business began early as he left North Central College to start a vending machine business in1950 when he was 19 years old. He believed in people and providing opportunity for others to succeed. This belief gave him the strength of character to collaborate with business partners of the same mind to create additional companies like Warehousing of Wisconsin, Inc., WOW Logistics Inc., Utschig Imperial Inc., Utschig Development Corp., Valley

Grinding and Manufacturing, and Norka Inc. He was always proud of the people employed in these companies and believed it was through their hard work and accomplishments that made them successful not him.

Don and Jan had an active, ro-

bust family life with their five children. They were passionate about attending their children's extracurricular activities and this interest increased exponentially with their seven grandchildren and eleven great grandchildren. They relished in entertaining and welcoming their home to others. Family and friends will long remember the grand holiday parties every Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and the Fourth of July. They loved to travel and circled the globe to places like China, Russia, Australia, Greece and most of the countries in Europe. They were members of Butte Des Mort Country Club and Ridgeway Country Club. For many years they ventured to Mexico with friends for lively times and golf outings. Don gave everyone in his family the opportunity to learn the game of golf. He was convinced that lessons and practice were the avenue to enjoying the sport. He was thrilled when he finally achieved the elusive hole in one at the Tiburon Golf Course Hole #8 in Naples, Florida with Jay whom he considers like son. He was an active member of the Appleton Curling Club where he and Jan would attend Bonspiel tournaments throughout the state. They were also members of the Valley Dance Club. Dad was an excellent dancer, and it was a joy to watch him lead our mother around the dance floor. Finally, Don was an active member of the Rotary Club of Appleton where he looked forward to meetings with his fellow Rotarians and enjoyed bringing in special speakers for the group.



#### Barbara Pautz

Barbara Pautz, age 95 of Altoona, Wisconsin, passed away on Monday, December 20, 2021 at Marshfield Medical Center in Eau Claire. She was born Barbara Elaine in Rockford, Ill on March 25, 1926, just in time to live through the Great Depression. Her parents were Edward and Winifred (Westfall) Garwig. As a first grader in the Rockford School system, she fell in love with learning, a passion that would last a lifetime.

In the worst days of the Depression, her parents left the comforts of the city life and moved to Wisconsin and the rural area of Avon Township in Rock County. She entered the one-room Howard School, where pupils pumped their drinking water, cleaned the privies, washed the blackboards and pounded the erasers. There was more to learning than the lessons found in textbooks.

Barbara attended Brodhead High School and graduated as class salutatorian in 1944. Scholarships and part-time work enabled her to enter Milton College, the first in her family to attend a school of higher learning. She was active in athletics, was editor of the school yearbook and played a number of roles in the school's Shakespearean productions. She was awarded a bachelor's degree in 1948, graduating summa cum laude.

After working for a year at Rockford's Gunite Foundries, she returned to Milton to gain teaching credentials. Her high school career as an English teacher took place in three Green County schools—Brooklyn, Juda and Brodhead. It was in Brooklyn that she met Wilmer Pautz, another beginning teacher. They were married in the Brodhead Methodist Church on June 2, 1951.

In 1962 the couple spent a year in Germany. While Wilmer taught math and science at the U.S. Army's Frankfurt Junior High School, Barbara attended a Goethe Institute, a school for foreign speakers of German. Their free time was spent trav-

eling about the country.

After this preparation abroad, Barbara became a graduate student at the University of Colorado, Boulder and received a Master of Arts degree in German language and literature in 1967. She then joined Wilmer at the University of Wisconsin—Eau Claire where he had been a faculty member since 1963. She became a part-time instructor teaching German.

Barbara's greatest contribution to the university and community was as the co-founder of the school's Viennese Ball, now nearing its 50th year. She and Ada Bors, the other co-founder, were inspired by Vienna's elegant Kaiser Ball and its celebration of the waltz king, Johann Strauss. On an April night in 1974, over 670 guests arrived to initiate what would become the school's signature event. It now draws 3,000 guests on a two-night schedule, making it the largest Viennese Ball in the world outside Vienna. Ticket Sales have generated over a million dollars for music scholarships and awards

For many years Barbara was keenly aware of the social and economic injustices suffered by girls and women. In the early 1970's she and her colleagues from Eau Claire and other universities formed a council to improve the lot of women on Wisconsin campuses, faculty and students alike. They worked to increase the number of women faculty and their promotions, to increase the number of women accepted in Madison's medical and law schools, to establish campus daycare centers, to add women's studies to the curriculum and to open varsity sports to coeds. Today a look around tells how successful they were.

Barbara was an avid reader, a world-wide traveler, a gym rat, a lover of music and fine dining, a gracious hostess noted for her legendary pies and genealogist who wrote a number of family histories.

Barbara is survived by her husband, Wilmer; her sister Patricia of Beloit; many friends and students who over the years have remembered her with visits, letters, phone calls and invitations to reunions.

She is preceded in death by her parents and grandparents: Charles and Gertrude (Wright) Westfall and John and Dora (Reichenbach) Garwig

She will be greatly missed.

Barbara will be laid to rest at Greenwood Cemetery, Brodhead, at a later date.

#### Hardwood trees for planting spring 2022

The Green County Land and Water Conservation Department is offering trees and shrubs for landowners interested in planting next spring. The tree varieties are: Swamp White Oak, Sugar Maple, Black Walnut, American Plum, American Arborvitae, White Pine, and Norway Spruce. The shrub available is Common Ninebark. They are sold out of Burr Oak, White Oak, Red Oak, and Apple trees. The trees and shrubs are bare root, and range in height between seven inches and three feet depending on species. The cost is \$2 per tree with a minimum order of 10

per species and must be ordered in increments of 10.

Most of the trees and shrubs are native to the area except the Norway Spruce. The species offered cover a broad range of soil types and moistures, from dry to very wet.

Mycorrhizal root dip, and nutrient packs are also available to order. Tree spuds can be "rented" for just a deposit. The tree planters are waiting to be rented. You can plant a lot of trees fast with a tree planter. Get on the planter schedule now.

Trees can be ordered by contacting the LWCD directly by phone

or by ordering through the Green County LWCD website www.greencountylwcd.com. They also have order forms in the office if you want to stop by and pick one up. If you are unsure about what trees will work in your particular soil, have any questions about the trees or how to order stop in or give the Green County Land and Water Conservation Department a call at 608-325-4195. They will be taking orders until Friday, December 31st. Trees are scheduled for pick up April 21st and 22nd.

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


