Concerns Remain about Pool Leakage

During the public comment period, resident Terry Sorchy asked for consideration, due to economic concerns, to delay the requirement for him to replace a second stretch of sidewalk until 2026 so that he might take advantage of the Brighten Up Brodhead grant. In other sidewalk news, it was approved to advise a resident required to replace a section of sidewalk that the city will be getting an estimate of the cost to remove the terrace tree causing damage to that sidewalk.

Carter Arndt from MSA stated that Mayor Simpson contacted them regarding tuck pointing for a building adjacent to city hall, but that his investigation revealed issues with roofing, the façade, transition walls, a lack of insulation and no required roof access. The council approved MSA's proposal of a time and expenses professional services agreement for an estimated \$12,800 to do a study, 3D model and propose solutions for the above issues.

Representatives from Consigny,

the incumbent, and Russell Law Firms presented information to the Council regarding why they should be selected to handle the city's legal services. Following closed session, the council voted to retain Consigny Law Firm.

Mayor Simpson reported that they have been replacing an average of 91,000 gallons of the pool's 187,000-gallon capacity every week since he started tracking it. At the time of the meeting, he was awaiting a call back from Newman Pools in regards to completing a pool study. Concerns were raised about the safety of keeping the pool open. The council decided to have the Finance Committee look into the potential cost of replacing the pool.

An advisory Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP) was adopted. This was a requirement for the Jaycees to be able to apply for grant money for the Splash

It was approved to use unspent Capital Improvement Project Funds on a new mower to replace one that just broke down.

After discussions, issues regarding the Septic Tank Dump Station and Sewer Ordinance Violations Policies were referred back to the Public Works Committee for further examination.

A Taphouse Developer's Agreement was approved for an area south of 19th and west of County T.



Cover Crop and Planting Showcase Field Day to be held Thursday, August 7

Successful farmers are typically always improving their operation. Some have adopted no till while others are getting more comfortable with cover crops. The Farmers of the Sugar River are planning to host a showcase of equipment that will plant cover crops on Thursday, August 7th. In one field there will be as many as eight different planting methods, ranging from a drone to vertical tillage to several brands of drills, for the same cover crop mix after wheat. Nick Faessler is hosting the field day at his farm at W3095 County FF, Monroe.

The event will start at 11 a.m. with a discussion on cover crops. Potted cover crops have been grown for attendees to see a variety of cover crops' structures like upright, short or viny and the root qualities- taproot or fibrous. Attendees will learn when certain species should and shouldn't be planted. How a mix is created and why someone would want to have more than a couple plants growing at once.

Lunch will be served around 12:30 p.m. with time to network with other farmers and learn about several local programs to help cost share planting of cover crops. After lunch, there will be planting demonstrations with the variety of equipment on hand. Attendees will be able to chat with farmer owners of the equipment to learn the pros and cons of them. This is an opportunity for farmers looking to upgrade or change something on their drills to see how others work. The drills expected are a Landoll, Sunflower, Case IH, Great Plains and two John Deeres. There will be two vertical till machines-Mcfarlane and Kuhn. A drone will also fly the cover crop mix onto the harvested winter wheat field. The field day is expected to conclude by 3 p.m.



Alarming Spread of Teasel Submitted by Barbara Flores,

What is teasel? It is a nonnative invasive weed, which made its way here from Europe in the 1800s. This three to six foot plus invader spreads rapidly in tight clusters. The raspy seed heads were once used in manufacturing fabrics and are today used in floral arrangements. It is so sad to see how this plant is spreading. It is not unique to our area as patches can be seen throughout northern Illinois along roads and highways.

Teasel spreads rapidly as each plant can produce as many as 2,000 seeds. While its appearance is interesting, the leaves and stem are raspy and unpleasant to touch. Because of its ability to spread, it crowds out other growth, native or cultivated. And the size and bulk of the stems together with their taproot, makes removal of the entire plant a real chore

Teasel is a "monocarpal" which means it goes to seed once and then it dies. Annuals, biennials and even some perennials have that same cycle. Cutting the seed heads off is imperative to control the spread of this obnoxious plant and at least we know it won't bloom again.

The blooms are beginning to form and it is important to get them off before the seed matures. Do not place the plant with the seed heads intact in your compost pile. The seed heads can be removed and should be put in the garbage, while the stem and leaves can go in the compost bin.

Please be on the lookout for this plant—once spotted, it is hard to ignore. And seeing bunches of it, as are shown in the photo, is just plain sad. Carry your favorite lopper and a pair of gloves in your car and be a vigilante on public roadsides!
