Board Allocated Last Year's Surplus

A parent raised safety concerns to High School Principal Jim Matthys about students carrying backpacks to class. Prior to COVID, the policy was to leave backpacks in lockers. The teachers generally approve of this policy change and no safety issues have been identified thus far. The middle school prohibits students from bringing backpacks to class. Superintendent Novy suggested reviewing this policy in the upcoming policy meeting. Board Member Jennifer Flory expressed her desire to gather feedback from the teachers before making any changes.

In order to better manage their responsibilities, Building Grounds Director Chad Dix requested to fill an inside maintenance position which has been vacant since the previous employee retired. This request has been added to next month's agenda.

Finance Manager Robin Marshall reported 635 residents enrolled in summer school, along with 58 non-residents, resulting in 37 full-time equivalents. She also stated the 2024-2025 budget ended with a surplus of over \$550,000. The board discussed keeping this surplus in the Fund Balance to use any time to offset future costs and where it would earn more interest, but could potentially have a negative impact on state aid. They weighed this against the option to transfer it

to Fund 46, which is earmarked for future building and maintenance costs. This option wouldn't affect state aid but would tie up the money until 2027. Ultimately, the board voted six to one to move \$200,000 to Fund 46 and leave the remainder in the Fund Balance.

The district is currently working on ordering items such as tables, chairs, and sick beds that were not provided by Nexus post-construction. These expenses amounted to \$40,000, prompting Novy to seek approval from the Building and Grounds Committee.

In other business:

Many thanks were given to staff for stepping up to ensure a smooth transition after construction.

The Homecoming Parade will be at 2 p.m. Friday, September 26th with the route to be announced on social media.

Key individuals attended a joint training session with other Green County schools and first responders to establish procedures for establishing reunification sites following a crisis.

The board approved FFA Advisor Jillian Malkow to take six students to the 2025 National FFA Convention and Expo in Indianapolis.

The Annual School Board Public Meeting will be held on Monday, October 27th at 7 p.m. in the Auditeria, with the same agenda as last vear.

Cobleigh made his initial appearance in Rock County Jail Court on Tuesday, September 9, at 3 p.m.


