



and Our Sacred Honor

At the moment the 56 men signed the Declaration of Independence they pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor. This was no empty promise. They were challenging England's power and were committing treason in the eyes of King George III. In fact, many of those signing did pay dearly for their bravery and commitment to their principles.

As the country celebrates Fourth of July it is important to remember the risk and the danger to which the signers exposed themselves and their families. Please visit National Archives, America's FoundingDocuments > Signers of the Declaration of Independence for a full list of the 56 men who put their lives on the line to boldly declare independence from England.

Several websites tell of the repercussions, some brutal and deadly, for those who signed the Declaration of Independence. It was not a time of easy communication and recording of events. However, several sources state that five of those men were captured by the British, tortured and put to death. Nine others lost their lives during the war and the sons of two of the signers also lost their lives fighting against the British soldiers.

Others lost their homes, businesses and families through harassment and destruction by British soldiers or loyalists. Many suffered hardships throughout the Revolutionary War, which led to shortened lives as home, family and business were destroyed. Thus these brave men lost their own right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness while opening the way for coming generations to enjoy those freedoms.

The Durand Library will be closed Saturday, July 5 in recognition of this moving national holiday and so that our volunteers can participate in the many activities going on in the Village.



Green County Healthy Community Coalition Publishes Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

The Green County Healthy Community Coalition is proud to share that the 2025-2027 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) has been published. This plan lays out steps the community can take to help improve health in Green County.

"The Community Health Improvement Plan is an important part of helping improve people's lives here in Green County. It includes goals and strategies to outline what we're actually going to do about some of the biggest issues in our community," Said RoAnn Warden, Director at Green County Public Health. "This plan was created by people from different areas and organizations across Green County, by working together we're able to combine resources and make a greater impact."

The Green County Community Health Improvement Plan focuses on two priorities; mental health and housing. The plan includes goals, objectives and strategies for how the community can help improve mental health and housing. To view the full plan, visit greencohcc.org. There are two workgroups working on achieving these goals over the next three years. The housing workgroup is led by the Green County Development Corporation and SSM Health Monroe, with group members who represent local municipalities, businesses, non-profits, education, healthcare, human services, and more. The mental health workgroup is led by Green County Public Health and Green County Behavioral Health with group members from human services, local businesses, non-profits, law enforcement, and healthcare. Anyone is welcome to join these workgroups, for more information, contact the coalition through the "Contact" form on our website. The workgroups will be working on this Community Health Improvement Plan through the end of 2027. Stay tuned for updates about their achievements.

Mental health and housing were chosen as priorities for the Community Health Improvement Plan after the coalition completed a Community Health Needs Assessment in 2024. The purpose of this assessment was to better understand what the largest health issues facing the community are, and mental health and housing were consistent themes throughout the assessment process. During the assessment we gathered data about the health of the community, created an online survey, held community conversations, conducted key informant interviews, and gathered secondary data. After gathering data, we shared the results with coalition members, and then discussed which issues we were able to make an impact on, and which issues came up the most during the assessment; which were mental health

Rainfall Simulator to be presented in Monroe on July 8

There will be a demonstration of the rainfall simulator on the evening of Tuesday, July 8. Why should someone see a rainfall simulator in action? Who goes out in the rain just to see how the water interacts with the soil? Does it run off or soak into the soil? Best case is it all soaks into the soil, but unfortunately that's not the case in all management scenarios. Very few people get to see different land managements side by side to evaluate their potential to run off or infiltrate water.


This rainfall simulator has five trays of different land managements, ranging from mowed grass to several kinds of tillage in crop fields to native prairie. All are subject to heavy "rainfall" allowing spectators to see how the water interacts with the soil- does it infiltrate or run off? Spectators remain dry and see firsthand how important it is for soil users to manage the land properly.

Interested individuals should gather on the north side of Monroe's Square by 6:15 p.m. on Tuesday, July 8th. Tonya Gratz, Soil Conservationist, from the Green County Land and Water Conservation Department will lead the presentation. Water and soil should matter to everyone. The effects of poor soil health and excessive runoff have lasting economic burdens to communities and the county. The presentation will be wrapped up before 7 p.m. to allow county board members to attend their monthly meeting.

Kelch Aviation Museum hosts Waunakee Big Band for night of music, living history, and airplanes

On Saturday, June 14th, the Kelch Aviation Museum's normally quiet museum space was filled with the lively sounds of a full brass section as the 18-piece Waunakee Big Band launched into classic swing era tunes by the likes of Duke Ellington and Glenn Miller. Guests, many dressed to the nines in 1940s attire, filled the dance floor and sat at tables both inside the hangar and outside on the grassy lawn. Once or twice, the music was interrupted briefly by the sound of a vintage airplane taking off or flying overhead, but that only added to the festive vintage ambiance. In the elegant museum atrium, a bar served aviation-themed mocktails like the "Airmail Special" and "Engine Oil," while guests perused a selection of highly-coveted raffle prizes including two different vintage airplane rides donated by local pilots.

This was the Swing and Wings Vintage Hangar Dance hosted by the Kelch Aviation Museum, and this June marked the fourth time the Waunakee Big Band has presented a 1940s-era concert at the Kelch Aviation Museum. "This band is top-notch, and they just carry you back in time," said Ami Eckard-Lee, Creative Director at the museum. "It doesn't matter your age or experience—everyone has fun with this kind of music." That music pairs perfectly with the museum's collection of airplanes, cars, and exhibits focusing on the 1920s, 30s, and 40s. "I love this event because it really proves history doesn't have to be something dusty, old, or forgotten," says Eckard-Lee, who originally started working with the museum because of her interest in history.

The evening kicked off with an intro swing dance lesson taught by Nicolle Wood, a renowned 1940s-era dance instructor in the Midwest, before the band launched into more than two hours of classic swing and jazz songs, often led by talented Madison-area vocalist Susan Robertson. The Chicago Chorus Girl Project, a vintage-style dance team from Chicago, performed a brand-new number. And everyone enjoyed the high-energy skills on show during the swing dancing competition. Choosing a single winner was a challenge; the three final couples were chosen by audience applause and given prizes from the museum.

A food truck, "On the Fly," owned and operated by local entrepreneurs Dan and Ashley Wegmueller, served smash burgers and sides. The beef in the smash burgers came from the Wegmueller's farm in Monroe. Wegmueller, perhaps best known in the area for his farm and agri-tourism efforts, is also a pilot and can regularly be seen flying is 1942 open-cockpit PT-19 airplane at the Brodhead Airport; Dan donated a ride in his historic airplane to the raffle.

Hangar Dances have a long tradition in the USA and aviation communities, dating back to the legendary USO dances in WWII. When Reneé Liedre, the leader of the nonprofit Waunakee Big Band, first reached out about collaborating on such an event, Eckard-Lee didn't know how successful it would be, especially in this rural community. But the event has sold hundreds of tickets every year, and guests drive from as far as Chicago and Milwaukee. Some visitors attend specifically for the dance floor—"We love going to hangar dances," said one visiting couple, "But they're harder to find these days." Others come to enjoy the live music and watch the band and dancers; it's not every day you can hear an 18-piece band, especially right here in Brodhead. Many guests are first time visitors to the museum and Brodhead.

The Swing and Wings Hangar Dance 2025 was sponsored in part by generous support from Brodhead Veterinary Clinic, Campbells Piggly Wiggly, and Regenold Properties. Raffle items were donated by the Beloit Sky Carp, Madison Partners, Jenny and Mike Flory, Sherri Sorg and Betty Miller, Rich Pember, and Dan Wegmueller. Additional donors, supporters, and volunteers made the event possible. The Kelch Aviation Museum and Waunakee Big Band plan to host a Fifth Hangar Dance in summer 2026. The Waunakee Big Band will be playing at various locations and events all summer; check their website for upcoming dates!
