New Operations Referendum Discussed

Superintendent Novy presented a timeline for a proposed upcoming Operational Expenses Referendum. The Board will need to adopt a resolution by Tuesday, January 21st to put it on the ballot in April. Public meetings will be held this fall seeking input, with more details to be determined at next month's meeting.

Max Pinnow, Brodhead senior, is raising funds to replace the Varsity Baseball scoreboard. After the discussion last month, he went back to the vendor and the coach and reduced costs to approximately \$25,000 by changing the layout of the sign. All sponsorships will be lifetime and will pay for the bulk of the scoreboard. The other \$3,000 will come from the Junior Cardinals. After a discussion, it was decided to move the current scoreboard to the JV diamond.

With input from Athletic Director Brian Kammerer, the board voted to allow sixth graders to participate in wrestling this year. Potentially adding sixth graders to other sports will be addressed in the future.

Principal Matthys gave a shout out to the Zimmermans for hosting the FFA's Food for America event.

The high school will be hosting the Rock Valley Conference Cheer and Dance Contest on Saturday, October 19th.

High school students will be performing the musical Footloose Monday, October 14th through the 16th.

The District received a \$1,900 grant from Focus on Energy to go toward the middle school gym HVAC upgrade.

Middle School Service Learning projects include writing letters of support to victims of Hurricane Helene.

The middle school will again be participating in Make a Difference Day on Saturday, October 26th.

Bill was a private person and his wishes were to have no services.







BRODHEAD LEAF PICK-UP

City leaf pickup service is planned to start around mid-October.

However, you can haul your leaves to the compost site Monday thru Sunday 8 a.m. to dark.

Please do not leave plastic bags or other garbage at the compost site.

If you want City leaf pickup service, you must follow these guidelines:

- · Leaves only. NO garbage, animal waste, grass, brush, rocks or other foreign items mixed in. Items other than leaves can plug and damage the equipment which you could be liable for.
- · Leaves must be racked to edge of curb or street in windrows away from trees, posts and other objects. If the machine can't reach your leaves, they will not be picked up.
- DO NOT put leaves in gutter or in the street. Leaves release phosphorus when they break down and decompose, representing one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. When left in the street gutters, a phosphorusrich tea is produced that easily washes down storm drains and directly into our rivers and lakes. You can help by raking leaves from the street curb in front of your home, and then composting them or placing them on the street terrace for



Please have all leaves out to the street as soon as possible. Leaves put out after Friday, November 22nd may be too late for pick up.






PINK OUT



Medicare 101: Changes for 2025

How Does the Inflation Reduction Act affect you? Submitted by Pam Ward, Program Coordinator, Friends of the Durand Library

Are you feeling overwhelmed, confused, or just wanting to make sure you've made the best choices for your health coverage? Then you need to join us at the Durand Library, 10 a.m. on Saturday, October 19, to help you be prepared for Medicare's Open Enrollment Period from October 15 to December 7, the period during which you can switch plans or make changes to your existing coverage.

Serina Starnes will provide a general overview of Medicare, explaining the different parts (Part A, Part B, Part C, and Part D), and emphasizing the importance of reviewing your plan annually. She will also cover an overview of supplemental insurance.

What's new in 2025? There are several things to be aware of: lowering prescription drug costs; managing mental health and well-being; adding more resources for caregivers; and postal service health benefits program; and changes to telehealth coverage.

If you are already receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement Board (RRB) benefits, you will automatically be enrolled in Medicare Part A and Part B when you turn 65. However, those who aren't receiving these benefits must actively sign up for Medicare through the Social Security Administration. Serina will get you started and she will also explain the potential penalties for delaying enrollment in Medicare Part B and highlight the flexibility offered during the Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment Period, which runs from January 1 to March 31 each year.

Serina Starnes has been an Independent Insurance Agent since 2016. She was awarded the Circle of Champions for being a leader in Affordable Care Act enrollments and was recognized by the White House for her efforts. Serina specializes in Health, Life and Medicare products.




