Crosswinds Homes Project Brings Attainable New Housing to Brodhead

Brodhead's newest neighborhood, Crosswinds Homes, is taking shape—with more than 50 home sites planned and the first model home expected to be ready for tours soon. The development represents a unique partnership between the City of Brodhead, the Green County Development Corporation (GCDC), and The Bank of New Glarus, working together to bring quality, attainable housing options to the community.

Homes in Crosswinds will start in the low \$300,000s and include attached garages. Buyers will have several options to fit their needs and budgets-including homes built on slabs or with basements, and the ability to add a storm shelter for extra peace of mind.

The homes will be built by CAVCO Homes in Dorchester, Wisconsin, inspected prior to leaving the factory, and assembled on-site by RM Berg Contractors. The community will feature both single-family homes and zero lotline duplexes, as well as rental duplexes to serve a variety of housing needs.

So far, five homes have already been ordered, with completion expected at the start of 2026.

"The Crosswinds project shows what's possible when local leadership and smart financing come together, and we were proud to provide gap financing to help bring this project to life," said Olivia Otte, Executive Director of the Green County Development Corporation.

Mayor Tom Simpson of Brodhead shared his appreciation for the many individuals and groups that helped move the project forward. "This development didn't happen overnight, and I want to give credit to all those who played a role in making it possible. Our Economic Development and Planning Committees, the City Council, and our financial advisers at Ehler's all contributed time, ex-

pertise, and support to move this project forward."

Mayor Simpson also reflected on the origins of the project, noting, "When Ron and Scott Mallon approached me with the idea for Crosswinds-a subdivision designed to offer homes that workingclass families can afford-I was immediately on board. Their goal from the start was to make homeownership attainable for the people who work in our manufacturing companies, local businesses, and service industries. That vision truly aligns with my belief that owning a home is part of the American dream, and I'm proud to support it."

Looking ahead, Simpson added, "I'm looking forward to seeing new houses being built and new families moving into Brodhead. Our city has a lot to offer, and this growth will not only bring more people to our community but also help strengthen our local economy. Crosswinds represents progress, and I'm excited

for what it means for Brodhead's future."

The Crosswinds team hopes this project will not only bring new residents to Brodhead but also strengthen the local economy and provide housing that residents can be proud to call home.

For those curious about the difference between home types: a modular home is built to Wisconsin State Building Codes and can include a traditional basement, while a manufactured home is built to HUD standards and placed on a slab foundation. Both types qualify for traditional mortgage financing and a variety of loan programs.

Crosswinds Homes represents an important step toward addressing local housing needs-offering high-quality, energy-efficient homes designed for modern living right here in Brodhead.

WCMA Opens Entries for 2026 World Championship Cheese Contest

Enter today to compete for the dairy processing industry's most prestigious title-World Champion Cheese! Beginning November 4, cheese, butter, cultured products, and dry dairy ingredients can be entered in the 2026 World Championship Cheese Contest at World-ChampionCheese.org.

Hosted by the Wisconsin Cheese Makers Association (WCMA) since 1957, this 36th biennial competition is the largest technical dairy products evaluation in the world. In 2024, judges evaluated 3,302 entries, with Hornbacher, made by Michael Spycher of Mountain Dairy Fritzenhaus in Bern, Switzerland for Gourmino AG, earning an incredible 98.98 points out of 100 to win the top spot.

"The World Championship Cheese Contest stands out for its technical rigor, transparent scoring and results, and reputation for excellence. It's a unique opportunity for dairy manufacturers and processors to get technical product feedback from skilled experts, plus a chance to earn the cheese world's highest honor," said John Umhoefer, WCMA Executive Director.

In 2026, the World Championship Cheese Contest will include 150 classes of dairy products. Entries will be evaluated by an elite team of more than 50 international judges. Starting from a maximum possible 100 points, judges deduct for any defect found related to flavor, body and texture, salt, color, finish, and packaging. A gold, silver, and bronze medal will be awarded to the three highest-scoring entries in each class. Gold medal cheeses move to a Championship Round for a shot at the World Champion Cheese title.

For a limited time, entrants can take advantage of special early-bird entry rates of just \$80 per entry, available now through Friday, December 12. After that date, all entries will cost \$95 each. Submissions can be entered online using the secure MyEntries© system on World-ChampionCheese.org. All entries must be submitted by January 30, 2026. Judging will occur March 3-5, 2026, at the Monona Terrace Convention Center in Madison, Wisconsin.

Yes, they were there from the very beginning! Even as the small settlement on Lake Michigan was struggling to grow there were plenty of scoundrels. Come to the Durand Library Saturday, November 15, to learn about these unscrupulous characters. Brad Keyes will be discussing the bad actors who helped shape the young city in the 1800's. He always adds humor to his talks so this program will be more fun and entertaining than dark and grim.

But what exactly is a jerk? The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines a jerk as "one who is cruel, rude, or small-minded." It also offers as synonyms the terms "bastard," "skunk" and "creep."

Join us for a look at some of these badly behaved characters. There were of course the notorious thieves and bad guys but we will also look at perpetrators of mischief and other colorful anti-heroes... some who could be considered misunderstood visionary thinkers. From the Chicago Times newspaper publisher, Wilbur Storey, to the king of department stores, Marshall Field, to the dastardly sausage maker Adolph Luetgert, we will take a delightful look at those individuals who helped shape Chicago in the 1800s.

Green **County Land** and Water Conservation Tree Sale is **Open**

Oh yes, fall. The time to bust out the flannels, eat all manner of pumpkin flavored foods and... start ordering trees for next spring! The Green County Land and Water Conservation Department is offering eight varieties of trees and two shrubs for landowners interested in planting trees next spring. The tree varieties are: Bur Oak, Red Oak, Swamp White Oak, White Oak, Black Cherry, Domestic Apple, White Pine and Norway Spruce. The shrubs available are American Plum and Redosier Dogwood. The trees and shrubs are bare root, and range in height between 18 inches and four feet depending on species. The cost is \$3 per tree and must be ordered in increments of 10.

Most of the trees and shrubs are native to the area and the species offered cover a broad range of soil types and moistures.

Mycorrhizal root dip and nutrient packs are also available to order. Tree spuds can be rented with a deposit. The LWCD has tree planters available, allowing you to plant a lot of trees with ease. Contact the office to get on the planter schedule.

Trees can be ordered by contacting the LWCD directly by phone or by ordering through the Green County LWCD website https:// greencountylwcd.com/tree-sales/ There are also order forms in the office if you want to stop by and pick one up. If you are unsure about what trees will work in your particular soil, have any questions about the trees or how to order stop in or give the Green County LWCD a call at 608-325-4195 ext 119. Orders will be taken until Wednesday, December 31, 2025. Limited amounts of each specie are available, so it is advised if you are looking for something specific- order early. Trees are scheduled for pick up mid to late


BHS band performed Fall Feature Concert

Petition for Decatur Ag Enterprise Area Meeting to be Held Thursday, November 20th

There will be a meeting at 1 p.m. on Thursday, November 20th at the Decatur Town Hall, 1408 14th Street, Brodhead for interested parties to form an Agricultural Enterprise Area (AEA) and petition the state for designation in 2026. Discussion on the rough draft of the petition will be needed as well as public input on the boundaries of the AEA.

Green County Land and Water Conservation Department is working with Decatur Township to put together a petition. It has many parts- narratives on why it's needed or wanted, the history of the area, signed petitions from landowners in the area in favor of it, written support from businesses that rely on and support agriculture and a map showing exactly what parcels are in and outside of the AEA. The delineation, at this time, is proposed to be in Decatur Township plus a mile—to half a mile buffer outside the township in Green County, effecting extreme edges of Albany, Sylvester, Jefferson and Spring Grove Townships. The residential areas of Decatur Township will be excluded from the AEA.

An AEA needs to be created in order for landowners within the area to enroll into a Farmland Preservation Agreement and be eligible for a tax credit of \$10 per acre. The Farmland Preservation Program is a tool for landowners looking to preserve their farmland as such into the future. Agreements are for 10 years at a time. Participants in FPP agree to voluntarily meet state soil and water conservation standards in exchange for tax credits.

Interested landowners are strongly encouraged to attend the meeting. If unable to attend, please reach out to Ron Schwartzlow at 608-897-4441 or Tonya Gratz with the Green County LWCD at 608-426-2218. The more public participation in this process the stronger the petition will be.





Abby Hollis raises \$6,933 for Albany community programs



Abby Hollis held her fourth annual Comet Classic 3 on 3 Tournament on Sunday, November 2nd. There were 33 teams and 130 players from Albany, Argyle, Barneveld, Belleville, Blanchardville, Brodhead, Edgerton, Madison, Monroe, Monticello, Mount Horeb, Parkview, Sauk Prairie, and Stoughton.

Abby is a 2025 graduate of Albany High School where she was a member of the Albany Comets and Albany-Monticello Space Stallions girls' basketball teams. (Albany and Monticello formed a co-op her junior year). She is a three-time basketball conference champion, four time regional champion, two time sectional champion and state champion in 2024. That year she hit a three with just seconds left in the championship game to send the game into OT where she hit another one to secure the win. It was the first state championship for Albany and happened in the first year of the co-op. Her sophomore year she set school records in single season points, three pointers in a single game, three pointers in a season, and three pointers in a career (which she built on for two more years). She has earned all-state and all conference accolades, qualified for the WIAA 3point contest twice (competed once as the other

year she was playing at state), was the Prep Girls Hoops State Tournament MVP in 2024, and the WBCA All-Star three point champion in 2025. As a WBCA Girls All-Star she lead all fund-raisers with \$6,600. In high school she also participated in Track and Field, Cross Country and Volleyball.

Abby is currently a double major in Sport Management and Business at Clarke University where she is a guard on the women's basketball team.

Abby started the Comet Classic four years ago with another teammate to raise funds for the community. As that teammate moved on, Abby became the sole tournament director last year. She runs the tournament, securing sponsors and teams, marketing the event, making team and volunteer schedules, designing and ordering shirts, and running the event day of.

From raising \$1,888 in 2022, and \$3,866 in 2023 to \$5,300 in 2024 and \$6,933 this year she has raised just under \$18,000 for her community. The funds are donated to youth programs and initiatives. To date she has donated to the Albany Sports Boosters, Albany Junior Comet Basketball League, the Albany Music Boosters, the Albany-Monticello Girls Basketball team.

She has created a scholarship (new this year) and an avenue for just in time donation requests through her website https://comet-classic.weebly.com.

This coming weekend she is going to determine where her large donations will go. She had two college games this week and came down with strep, which had delayed her decision making. She has donated the admissions and tip-jar proceeds to a local Albany Middle Student (Erin) who is battling Ewing Sarcoma.

Her goals for the "off-season" before next year's event she plans to update her website and socials.

Sen. Mark Spreitzer and Rep. Jenna Jacobson Introduce Bill to Support Beginning Farmers

Recently, Senator Mark Spreitzer (D-Beloit) and Representative Jenna Jacobson (D-Oregon) introduced legislation to create a refundable tax credit for beginning and existing farmers for the sale or lease of agricultural assets, including farmland. LRB-4784 would create the Farming Forward Program in Wisconsin, which would help pass family farms on to the next generation by encouraging existing farmers to sell or lease farmland and machinery to beginning farmers and help beginning farmers with their startup costs.

Senator Spreitzer: "Family farms and agriculture are central to Wisconsin's heritage and to our economy. We are proud to introduce legislation today to uphold Wisconsin's strong agricultural tradition by supporting our next generation of family farmers. Wisconsin's farmers bolster our economy and feed our families, and we as a legislature should be doing all we can to support our current farmers, as well as the next generation.

"The Farming Forward Program would create an important incentive for established farmers to sell or rent agricultural assets—including land, machinery, equipment, facilities, and livestock—to beginning farmers at a more affordable price. The program will help beginning farmers afford critical startup costs and make needed investments in their farming operation to set themselves up for long-term success."

Representative Jacobson: "Family farms are at the heart of Wisconsin's history and our communities. But many new farmers struggle with high startup costs, while retiring farmers often depend on selling or leasing their land for retirement income. The Farming Forward Program helps with both challenges by offering a 5% refundable tax credit to farmers who sell or lease land or equipment, and to beginning farmers who make improvements on their farms. This program supports Wisconsin's proud tradition of family farming and helps keep farms in the next generation."

LRB-4784 is available for co-sponsorship by the members of the state legislature through November 14.

The bill was modeled on a previous beginning farmer tax credit program in Wisconsin, as well as successful programs in Minnesota and Iowa.







Orienteering at Magnolia Bluff

On Friday, October 24, seventh-grade students at Brodhead Middle School took part in a unique experience at Magnolia Bluff County Park. This curriculum-based field trip started back in the traditional classroom with instruction on topographic maps and the sport of orienteering. Then, with compasses and maps in hand, 65 students and seven staff members embarked on a day of outdoor physical fitness, fun, and instruction at Magnolia Bluff.

At 9, seventh-grade students received specific instructions from Madison native Kevin Teschendorf, a nationally ranked orienteering competitor, when we arrived at the bluff. Then the challenge was to navigate a course through the brush, woods, hillsides, and woods to 17 control checkpoints. Students worked in small groups, using their compass and a detailed topographic map for guidance. Students completed two "loops" of checkpoints before enjoying a cookout lunch and a third "loop" afterward.
