Brodhead School District Cost Saving Measures

Quality schools and healthy communities go hand in hand. It benefits us all, both locally and as a society, to provide a great education for the next generation. We have a school system to be proud of in Brodhead, but maintaining our level of excellence will continue to be a struggle with our budget constraints. While Brodhead continues to have one of the lowest mill (tax) rates in our comparable area, our community's schools have provided an excellent foundation for educa-

The need for a Referendum is a direct result of State-imposed revenue caps, declining enrollment, and reductions in State aid to the schools. School Board members have worked to stay within these constraints while maintaining programs. This hard work is reflected in the District's tax rate, which has continued to be one of the lowest among all area districts. Even with the changes that have been made, the budget shortfalls continue to be a concern.

Since the start of the current Operational Referendum in 2022, the Board has continued to work on reducing expenditures and saving revenues. All debt has been paid off for several years, saving on interest costs. Health benefits were transitioned to a HDHP/HSA plan, and adjustments have been made in the contributions required from staff. Strategic staff cuts have been made through attrition while still keeping our student to staff ratios at a respectable level. Building budgets have been frozen for over 17 years. Professional salaries have been renewed at or below the Consumer Price Index.

Community resources have been used to control costs as well. Numerous organizations have stepped up to donate funds to sustain programs and implement facility upgrades. The Brodhead Sports Boosters worked with the Brodhead Area Foundation to support the addition of our new girls' JV Softball field. This is a welcome addition to our facilities and allows our girls to have their practices and games on school grounds rather than traveling to Legion Park on the North side of town. Kid Connection has continued to help us improve the Elementary School playgrounds with much needed equipment upgrades and rubber mulch for added student safety. FFA Alumni has contributed to our Agriculture program with the addition of a new aquaponics system, which is housed in our District greenhouse. Music Boosters continue to provide funds for our Music departments. Field trips are no longer offered unless funded by community donations from organizations like the Lions Club, Kid Connection PTA, or the Optimist Club. These are just a few of the many organizations/people, (too many to list them all) that have provided resources for us to sustain the programs and facilities in our schools.

Our District has also explored other avenues to generate revenue/ save money. Over the life of the current three-year Operational Referendum, our District has utilized many Federal and State grants to supplement funding. We have also utilized many grants to help continue our one-to-one computer initiative and our after-school Community Learning Center (CLC) Program. We also utilized our Federal ESSER funds over the past three years to support curriculum purchases and improve our facilities with over \$1,500,000 worth of projects including roofing upgrades, parking lot replacements, and HVAC efficiency improvements across the entire District.

We take advantage of grants as they become available and understand how valuable these extra funding sources help our ability to supplement costs and maintain programs. Various school organizations

Friends of the Durand Library to Host a Presentation "Understanding China: Complicated but Essential"

Dr. Norman Moline presents this free program on the People's Republic of China March 18 as part of the Illinois Humanities Road Scholars Speakers Bureau. The presentation, entitled "Understanding China: Complicated but Essential," will take place at the Durand Library located in the Durand School.

"We are so fortunate to have Dr. Moline come and speak to us on this important topic of China. We need to understand this powerful country in all its complexities," Barbara Flores, President of the Friends group said. She continued, "Our speaker is a longtime student of China and has visited there 40 times from 1977 until most recently in 2024"

China presents challenges to the United States with its aggressive behavior toward Taiwan and other Asian countries, its unfair economic competition and the deprivation of human rights to its citizens. But as our biggest trading partner it is a country with which the United States must deal.

Dr. Moline cautions, "China is, without question, the other major global power, and its economic and international power is likely to increase as the 21st century advances. China significantly impacts all Americans, including the people of Illinois."

He notes that some of those impacts are well known and covered in news stories as well as experienced in people's day-to-day lives. China produces products we need causing some of our manufacturing industries to close while its demand for food creates markets for Illinois and Iowa soybeans and corn. It seeks to stretch its global interests, causing national security concerns for the U.S. China's policies against minorities, limiting freedom of speech and religion, as well as controlling open access to information on the Internet counter to human rights values. Its verbal threats about Taiwan exacerbate global tensions. It was, of course, the origin point for CO-VID-19. It does cooperate with the U.S. on some key global issues and in research scholarship, but this is often not well known.

One thing is certain, Dr. Moline emphasizes: "China will be an important factor in the lives of people and businesses in Illinois and world affairs for decades to come."

This event is co-presented by the Illinois Humanities Road Scholar Speakers Bureau. Road Scholar speakers travel throughout Illinois sharing free, dynamic presentations about literature, philosophy, theater, local history, film, music,

within our District have also written and received other small grants. We have continued to have lower student fees, lunch prices, and facility rental costs in comparison to other area districts, understanding how increases in these fees would affect our families and community organizations. With passage of this Referendum, it is our hope that student and facility rental fees can continue at these lower rates.

Unfortunately, this has not been enough, and budget challenges remain. Board members have discussed potential options and are not comfortable with the possible consequences. The Board has chosen to present a Referendum question to our community on Tuesday, April 1, 2025, which simply replaces our current Referendum with the same dollar amount (\$1,750,000 per year) and same duration (three-year non-recuring), with no additional tax rate impact for our taxpayers.





Soldier Statue in Veterans **Memorial Park**

This statue stands in Brodhead's Veterans Memorial Park. It bears this inscription, "Erected in honor of the Defenders of the Union From 1861-1865 by W.W. Patton — Relief Corps. Dept. of Wisconsin and other Patriotic Citizens" —dated June 18, 1914.

Awhile after the Civil War was over, on June 4, 1893, 59 ex-civil war soldiers formed the Wesley W. Patton Post #90, Dept. of Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. in Brodhead, Green County, Wisconsin. This Post was named after Wesley W. Patton who was born in 1843 and killed in action June 5, 1864 during the Battle of Cold Harbor eight miles northeast of Richmond, Virginia, which was the capital of the confederacy. A picture and more information can be found on Wesley in the Pearl Engebretson Room in the Depot Museum on the south wall as you enter it.

Eventually from this Wesley W. Patton Post #90, a Women's Relief Corps. (WRC) group was formed. Mrs. Stone, a civil war veteran's wife and member of the WRC, presented the original idea for a statue in the park. After awhile the idea took hold and fund-raising began by the Women's Relief Corps and local businesses, with other interested people also making donations. The WRC purchased the statue for \$1,400 from Jackson Monument Company in Beloit. Andrew Douglas donated his skill and provided the concrete foundation. On June 18, 1914 the statue was presented to the City of Brodhead on behalf of the ladies of the Women's Relief Corps #19. The dedication ceremony was held 49 years after the Civil War had ended and many of the soldiers were gone. There were about 1,000 people in attendance at the dedication. The WRC ladies served a meal at the Opera House with band and choral music rounding out the celebration.

Within the music business arena, there are careers in management, marketing, promotion, sales, and entertainment law. Individuals wishing to establish their own business, or freelance, might be well suited to major in entrepreneurship. Music production, sound engineering, and DJ-ing combines music and technology. Additional handson careers include instrument repair technicians, piano tuners... the list goes on and on.

Where do parents and musicminded students begin? Start by speaking with your music instructor early on expressing your interest. Schedule a time to meet with your school counselor. Brodhead School District utilizes Xello as a career research tool. A quick search will show helpful high school courses and college programs. Some careers require graduate level coursework while others require certificates or on the job training. Taking courses in music while in school, including music theory is recommended. Participate in music experiences, including summer camps, and take a variety of elective classes, e.g. business, psychology, anatomy, depending on your intended field. 
The Brodhead Lions Club performed eye screenings at Albrecht Elementary last week. Nurse Laura with the help of local Lions were able to screen over 450 students.



Informational Meeting for Creating An Ag Enterprise Area to be Held Thursday, March 13

Green County's Farmland Preservation Plan was completed and approved by DATCP (Department of Ag Trade and Consumer Protection). This approval was critical to be able to create a path for local landowners to benefit from Farmland Preservation Agreements through tax credits. Creating that path is the next step in the process.

"Green County's Farmland Preservation participation is much different than surrounding counties", says Tonya Gratz, Soil Conservationist with the Green County Land and Water Conservation Department. She fields many questions during tax season to determine if landowners are eligible to claim the tax. "Our participation has dwindled to less than 20 participants. There have not been any new contracts since July of 2009 when the program changed, so only existing contracts were honored until their natural expiration date."

On Thursday, March 13, all Green County landowners and farmers are invited to meet at 1 p.m. at the Green County Justice Center to learn more about AEAs (Agricultural Enterprise Areas). Representatives from DATCP that coordinate the program will give a presentation to help attendees understand the requirements for creating an AEA in the county. There will also be a guest farmer that participates in the program in Lafayette County to answer landowner and farmers' questions on what it takes to participate and receive tax credits.

The potential next steps are to gauge interest from landowners to delineate an AEA in public meetings, complete the application to DATCP to petition for this AEA by Friday, August 1, 2025 and then once it's accepted by DATCP, landowners in the designated AEA could enter into Farmland Preservation Agreements in 2026 and begin receiving tax credits of \$5 per acre. It takes a strong, collaborative team to drive economic growth, and we are incredibly grateful for the dedication of our partners in making this vision a reality."

The Housing Development Fund represents a unique collaboration between public and private stakeholders who recognized the urgent need for more residential options. With a matching funds pledge, the Colony Brands Foundation led the way for additional funders to commit to this program. Other supporters include Klondike Cheese, The Bank of New Glarus, Woodford State Bank, Lakeridge Bank, Green County Healthy Communities Coalition, and SSM Health. All have united in the efforts to make financing more accessible for developers ready to invest in Green County's future.
