Brodhead to Host College and Career Opportunities Expo

High school Counselor Sharon Malone advised the board on plans for the school to host an area-wide College and Career Opportunities Expo. Approximately 500 high school students in all grades from Green and Lafayette County are expected to attend. Representatives from over 50 Colleges and Trade Schools, Trades and Apprenticeships, the Military, and Workforce Partners have committed to attending.

In coordination with Police Chief Raupp, a state-mandated safety drill was held on Thursday, December 11th. Some issues were found with the new spaces, but they've been or are in the process of being corrected.

In Other Business:

Ribbon-cutting ceremonies were held on Monday, January 19th for

the 4K classes.

The district will be contacting families of 4K and 5K students who opened enrolled out to see if they would like to come back next year now that the updated facilities and all-day 4K will be in place.

The Middle School completed a Reality Maze with Better Brodhead before winter break.

Seventy-four middle school students are taking part in the annual Kalahari trip this week.

At the high school, 53 students earned college credit in one or two classes in the first semester, thirty students will be presenting their Senior Projects at the halfway point, and eight students are graduating early.

Next month's board meeting will be held in the library since the boardroom will be used for a due process meeting.

A committee of 18 from staff and community has been formed to re-write the district's vision and mission statements.

Next year's school calendar approved by the board includes dismissal before Memorial Day.

Superintendent Novy will compile a list of potential strategic budget cuts due to projected future deficits.

The board approved investment funds to be used for window treatments and new signage.

The trees and shrubs are bare root, and range in height between 18 inches

On Thursday, January 8, 2026 the Green County Sheriff's Office received information regarding incidents of Repeated Child Sexual Assaults reported to have taken place in the City of Brodhead and in locations within rural Green County in the Town of Decatur.

Due to the nature of the alleged crimes, the Green County Sheriff's Office Detective Division was assigned to conduct further investigation. The Green County Sheriff's Office collaborated with the City of Brodhead Police Department and Green County Human Services to conduct a joint investigation, which included utilizing the Child Advocacy Center in Green County to assist in forensic interview(s).

As the investigation continued, Green County Law Enforcement developed probable cause to support the arrest of Jonathon Scott Elsner, 25, of rural Albany.

Members of the Green County Sheriff's Office arrested Elsner in the

City of Monroe, on the afternoon of Monday, January 12, 2026. Following his arrest, Elsner was transported to the Green County Jail where he was held without bond pending the official issuance of criminal charges and an initial appearance in Green County Circuit Court.

On Wednesday, January 14, 2026 criminal charges were officially issued against Jonathon Elsner under Green County CCAP case number 2026CF8 in which he was charged with one count of Repeated Sexual Assault of Same Child (At least three violations of First Degree Sexual Assault) contrary to Wisconsin State Statute 948.025 (1)(b). This is a Class B Felony.

Court records note (CCAP) that ELSNER appeared in Green County Circuit Court for an initial appearance on the afternoon of Wednesday, January 14, 2026. During court a cash bond was imposed with CCAP records further noting that the cash bond was since posted. At this time of this release—due to the posting of the cash bond—ELSNER is no longer in the custody of the Green County Sheriff's Office. This investigation remains active and no further press releases are planned. The attached image was captured

Residents Help Shape Rock County’s Future as Planning Efforts Advance

Rock County is entering the next phase of its Comprehensive Plan and Farmland Preservation Plan update process, with public input collected over the past six months now being shaped into draft goals and actions that will guide planning efforts in the years ahead.

More than 500 residents shared their perspectives through a countywide public survey this fall, supported by focus groups conducted with Blackhawk Technical College students and Project Thrive participants. The message was clear: protecting farmland, natural areas, and water resources is a top priority across Rock County, with support for agriculture, clean air, and clean water popular among urban and rural communities alike.

Affordable housing also rose to the top of resident concerns, alongside K–12 education, community healthcare and mental health services, well-paying jobs, and efforts to retain young people. Nearly 60% of survey participants said they support focusing development within existing communities by redeveloping vacant and underused sites, rather than expanding onto farmland or natural areas.

Drinking Water Testing Available

Do you own a private well in Green County? If you are interested in learning more about drinking water and the quality of your water, the upcoming drinking water testing program is an opportunity to have your well water tested at a reduced cost and learn of the results during an educational program with drinking water experts. Groundwater specialists strongly encourage rural residents to test their water at least once every 15 months.

This program is neither mandatory nor regulatory. It is completely voluntary. Those who participate will receive the results of their water tests during an educational program in May. Individual results will be kept confidential.

Options for Well Testing:

- Homeowner Package (Includes tests for nitrate, coliform bacteria, pH, alkalinity, and hardness.) Cost = \$78

- Metals Package (Tests for arsenic, lead, copper, iron, zinc, calcium, magnesium, manganese, sodium, potassium, and sulfate.) Cost = \$75

- Triazine Screen (Includes tests for triazine type pesticides like atrazine) Cost = \$45

If you choose all three packages the cost is \$190, a discount of \$8.

Bottles will be available for pick-up at the following locations and times listed. Bottles must be filled and returned on Monday, March 2nd, to the site where you picked up your bottles. Tests must be paid for when the bottles are picked up.

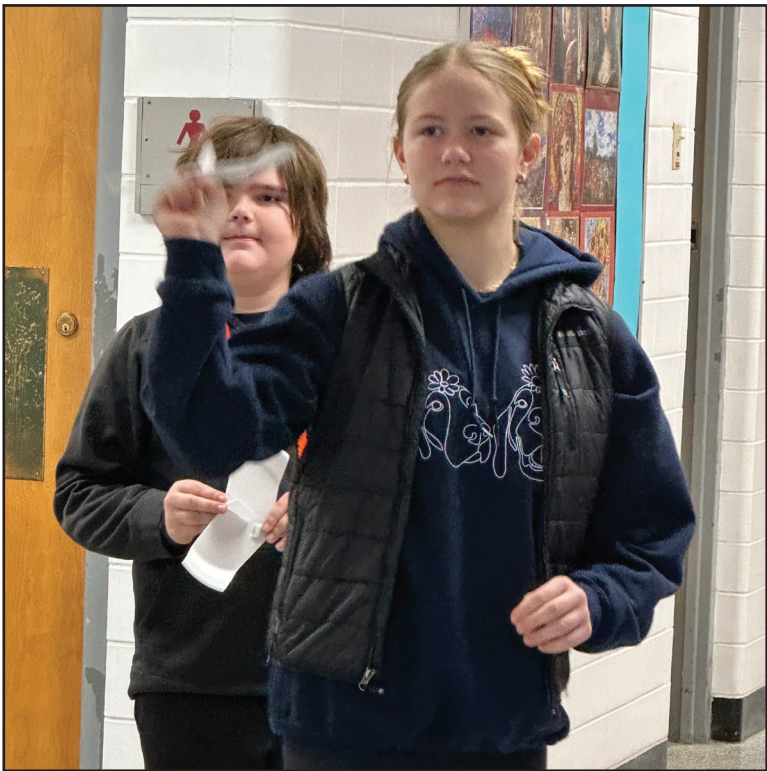
