# **Budget Cuts Passed**

In order to reduce next year's projected budget deficit without cutting staff or services, the board voted to reduce the district's Health Savings Account contributions. The current contributions of \$2,500 for individuals and \$5,000 for families will be reduced to \$2,000 for individuals and \$4,000 for families. That will save the district \$107,000. The board also voted to eliminate one of 10 bus routes for a savings of \$40,000. Further budget cuts will be finalized at a later time.

Superintendent David Novy updated the board on the Daniels family proposed detachment from the Juda School District. They did not file the required petition in time for the statutory deadline so the matter is closed for now.

A motion to make Friday, June 6th a non-student day passed. This will allow staff a day to move to the high school before summer school begins the following Monday.

Kelly Knox, Elementary Principal and Director of Curriculum and Instruction, gave a presentation on new Wisconsin Act 20 requirements. The law requires Wisconsin schools to teach reading and language arts using science-based early reading instruction to students in 5K through third grade. It also requires diagnostic tests to be given with the results being reported to the Department of Public Instruction. If students aren't meeting minimum requirements, they must be given a personal reading plan.

Clerk Michael Oellerich reported the election results. The operations referendum passed by 26 votes. Al Schneider was re-elected and Paul Donovan was elected to the school board. Donovan will replace Jodi Kail who will be leaving the board after this meeting.

#### In Other Business:

High School Principal Jim Matthys relayed that Jillian Malkow, Agriculture Teacher and FFA Advisor, has been selected for a 2025 Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Teacher Fellowship.

Finance Manager Robin Bye

reported the district currently has a \$364,000 deficit for the current budget year, which she expects to decrease as additional money comes in.

Mr. Novy congratulated Mr. Matthys for being inducted into the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Due to the ongoing construction, board meetings will be moved to the library for June, July and August.

Mr. Novy presented Jodi Kail with a certificate honoring her nine years of service to the school board.

The board voted to continue the staff clinic for another year.







Laura F. Keyes of Historic Voices has been teaching history with live portrayals of historic figures since 2008. She will tell the chilling story of a this singularly strong Illinois woman using Elizabeth's own words taken from her memoir and writings.

At the insane asylum Elizabeth soon found she was not the only woman who had been committed for her independent thoughts. However, she refused to be silenced and her ceaseless quest for justice not only challenged the medical science of the day but led to a giant leap forward in women's

The highly acclaimed book, The Woman They Could Not Silence, details how Elizabeth prevailed against all odds. It is available for checkout at the Durand Library. The book is a sober tale of what women could be subjected to during the 19th century when a man could exercise almost unbridled control over his wife's life.

And because Elizabeth was a writer, we will hear many of her own words from her memoir and books promoting more rights for women.

Laura Keyes will portray Elizabeth in period dress and give life to the story of how this strong woman won her dignity and freedom and helped countless women through her activism and her writing. At LauraKeyes. om one can see the many characters she portrays and the period dress backgrounds used.



# The Status of Federal Funding for Libraries

On March 14, 2025, the Trump administration issued an executive order to eliminate the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). Established by the Museum and Library Services Act in 1996, IMLS is the only federal agency that funds libraries and museums across the country. In 2024, IMLS provided \$266.7 million to libraries and museums through services, grants, and research, totaling a mere 0.003 percent of the total federal budget. billion patron visits—both in person and virtual—to these libraries, elimination of this funding would essentially affect us all.

The American Library Association issued a statement concerning President Trump's action the following day on March 15, 2025. "Americans have loved and relied on public, school, and academic libraries for generations. By eliminating the only federal agency dedicated to funding library services, the Trump administration's executive order is cutting off at the knees the most beloved and trusted of America institutions and the staff and services they offer."

How much this legislation would affect public libraries depends on the funding of each individual library, so I can only speak for the funding of our library. At Albertson Memorial Library, we don't receive federal funding directly. Roughly 84% of our funding comes directly from our local municipalities (the village and township of Albany), and the rest comes from the counties of Green and Rock. However, we do receive services provided to us from the South Central Library System (SCLS), one of seventeen library systems throughout the state. Badger

Each of these library systems are funded through local and state governments, but they receive federal funding in the way of grants distributed through the Wisconsin Department of Instruction. SCLS has the capacity to provide a lot of services to small, rural libraries such as ours. We receive technology support and upgrades, provisions for our summer library program and children's services, and training for staff. Last year, AML received two federal grants from SCLS. Without those grants, we wouldn't have been able to provide free books to children in our area at Trunk or Treat or Snack with Santa events, nor would I have received the training necessary to serve effectively as the director of our library.

What can you do to support your local library? The biggest impact may come from contacting your representatives in Congress. Tell them to protect your library. Let them know how your local library has supported you and how that library will be impacted by cuts in funding. You can also attend a library, school, or municipality board meeting to express your support. Now is the time for us to stand up in support of one of our more valued assets - our public libraries.
