## **Barbara** Ann Bogden

Barbara Ann Bogden, 86, passed away on May 21st, 2025, after a short illness. Born on July 1st, 1938, to Warren and Agnes Sundt in Chicago, Illinois, Barb grew up on the north side of Chicago with her younger brother and sister, Warren and Judy. She met the love of her life, Vincent Bogden, on a beach along Lake Michigan and they were married December 15, 1956. Barb and Vince moved to their dream home in Brodhead, in 1975—a fiveacre farm, to become known as the "Circle B," at the foot of a beautiful bluff. They lived an idyllic life there with their four children: Lisa, Marc, and twins, Kristin and Gwyneth until 2003, when they moved to Madison across the street from Kristin and her husband, Gary and their two young children. After Vince's passing in 2015, Kristin, Gary and Barb built a home together, where she lived until her most recent ill-

ness this spring. Barb was an avid reader, writer, debater and thinker. She was knowledgeable and skilled in gardening, drawing, music, sewing and cooking/baking. She was a huge sports fan, especially of her Chicago Bears, cheering them on through season after season, and often messaging back and forth with grandson, Josh, to discuss the action during the games. She was a feminist and political whiz. She ran for a Wisconsin State Assembly seat in 1976, and though she did not win, she was successful in bringing the needs of rural farming communities to the forefront during her campaign. She was a history buff and wrote a book, never published, about pioneering women. She was a Brownie/Girl Scout leader for Lisa, Kris and Gwyn when they were younger, then a 4-H adult leader/advisor when they got older. In both roles, she was determined to stay in the background, letting the young people she worked with take the lead, providing guidance when needed. She finished her teaching degree later in life, graduating from Beloit College with honors in 1992, the same year Kris and Gwyn completed their college degrees at UW-Madison. She then taught Sociology at Blackhawk Technical College in 1994-95 and then later worked for the Girl Scouts

She was also a cancer survivor, having been diagnosed with lymphoma in 2009 and undergoing chemotherapy three times before becoming cancer free in 2013. She and Vince both fought cancer, having been diagnosed in 2009 within weeks of each other. Sadly, Vince succumbed to his cancer in 2015, and the family's fierce matriarch was never quite the

Above all, Barb loved being with her family. She loved them fiercely and wholly. If you were a part of her large extended family, she was your biggest fan and most ardent supporter. And if you were a friend to any of her extended family, she was your supporter too. She and Vince aka, Granny and Gramps, hosted countless holiday/birthday/ any day gatherings at the Circle B. Those gatherings were full of laughter, good food, music, games, and love. They continued to host those large gatherings when they moved to Madison. No one in the family could doubt how much Barb cared for and cherished each of them. She attended as many of her children's, grandchildren's and great-grandchildren's activities as she could, going to sporting events, musical performances and more and making sure you could hear her cheering. She loved making her own greeting cards, often alongside Lisa. She would send those cards to family and friends throughout the year, making them far in advance for future birthdays, anniversaries, graduations and other celebrations. She loved to celebrate! She filled stockings for every family member at Christmas—putting together small collections of gifts for her four children and their spouses, her eight grandchildren and their spouses and her nine great-grandchildren, thoughtfully collecting the items for each throughout the year. She elaborately decorated her home, both inside and out, for every season and holiday. Her Fourth of July celebrations were legendary, especially since her birthday was so close to that national holiday.

In the words of her great-granddaughter, Emily Regenold, "Though

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want her to be, her love is still all around us. We will carry her with us in every laugh, every beautiful flower we see, every hug we give. Her sass, her love and her spirit will always be part of who we are. We love you to the moon and back, Mom/ Granny!"



It began at the regional meet held at Monroe last week Tuesday. At the end of the night, Brodhead High School would be represented at sectionals in 16 events. First place finishes were taken by Stella Arn in the 100m and 200m sprints for the women. Erik Woodward—100m and Mavrik Plummer—400m for the men.

Grayson Arn—100m, Cohen Henze 200m sprints, Plummer—800m, Tegan Pinnow and Madi Brown both in high jump, and the 4x100 relay of Arn, Cohen, Pinnow and Woodward, all finished in the number two spot to advance.

Third place went to Elliana Shank—100m hurdles, Simon Moore—pole vault, and the boys 4 x 400 relay of Woodward, Jorge Villalva, Nolan Bump and Plummer.

Advancing to sectionals with a fourth place were Bump—300m hurdles, Gretchen Kammerer—pole vault and the girls 4 x 100 relay consisting of Shank, Kennedi Lerch, Taiya Hawkins and Arn.

Lloyd Schneider Stadium at Mc-Farland High School was the setting for sectionals. It is here that athletes find the thrill of victory or the agony of defeat.

Grayson Arn would pull up short in the 100m with a possible muscle strain, Plummer in the 800m placed sixth. Pinnow experienced frustration with his high jump performance finishing in ninth. Shank missed the hurdles by less than .33 hundredths of a second. Most gut wrenching was the 4 x 100 relay for the girls as a dropped baton in the opening handoff took them completely out of the competition.

The Cardinals broke three school records this night. Electric performances were turned in by Stella Arn in the 200m, 25.11 which was also a new facility record. The boys' relays; 4 x 100, 43.47, and the 4 x 400, 3:25.14, set new records. Others punching their tickets included Woodward in the 100m, Plummer in the 400m and Simon Moore will be pole vaulting. Tickets for the state meet will only be available online.






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
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### Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library

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#### Conservation Education Continues at Honey Creek Park

Six classes of eager fifth grade students from Juda and Monroe's Northside, Abe Lincoln, and St. Victor's Schools participated in the Green County Land and Water Conservation's bi-annual Youth Conservation Day. The perfect weather event was held at Honey Creek Park on Monroes's west side on Wednesday, May 7th. Classes rotated through stations set up around the park.

In the morning, students learned about wildlife calls and other conservation musings from Jim Bauman, Norman Williams and Bob Blankenhorn, long-time Green County Conservation League Members. At the next station the students were detectives in the Barry Prairie looking for six keystone prairie plants under the guidance of Paul Roemer, who tends natives at Taylor Creek Nursery and a retired teacher from Brodhead. Learning about incredible invertebrates was the theme of the third station hosted by Xereces volunteer, Mike Iacomini. Susan Lehnhardt, Lower Sugar River Watershed Association volunteer, showed students the importance of thinking bigger and impacts we have on others in our watersheds with a watershed model. The students love to see what happens if it rains on certain practices in the watersheds. The effects of the Emerald Ash Boerer are very obvious in our parks. Josh Trame, City Forester and Parks Supervisor, shared with students what the little insects look like and the remaining infested trees in the park by the playground. And to round out the morning loop, WI DNR personnel, Cassandra Young and Elle Maculan showed the students tools they use for prescribed burning and explained why this management is used.

After lunch the group was split into two and enjoyed learning about homing pigeons and the Land and Water Conservation's drone. Cal Wasserstrass has a unique hobby that he shared with attendees- raising and racing pigeons. He trains them to return to their pen. He released several for the kids to see and said they'd be home in about 10 minutes (he lives about 8 miles north of town). LWCD's newest employee, Mason Jarosinski, was recently certified as a drone operator showed the attendees the County's drone and some if it's capabilities. Students and teachers were impressed with this technology.

As the sun rose higher and hotter, the afternoon loop began with students rotating between another six stations. Mason teamed up with Chelsea Starr of the Green County NRCS and showed kids the marvelous macroinvertebrates that are found in the surface waters and how certain ones indicate healthier water. Students learned how invasive plants impact our waters and lands from Jasmine Wyant with the Upper Sugar River Watershed Association. Todd Bollenbach, a representative from Pellitteri Waste Systems, gave students information about household recycling and how everyone can do better. Students participated in demonstrations about soil erosion and saw and learned how healthy soil is more resilient from a station from Tonya Gratz with the Green County LWCD. A soil pit was dug by the city beforehand so that the students could get a closer look at what is below their feet-soil layers. The students also learned about soil properties and touched sand, silt and clay (their favorite was clay). Jason Thomas and Kristin Day, Green County NRCS were the professionals at the soil pit. The final station was looking at fish of all sizes that were shocked in Honey Creek- the stream that runs along the park. Camille Bruhn and Marco Scarasso from the WI DNR explained that certain fish indicated certain water conditions like poor habitat or good habitat.

The Conservation Day is a joint effort from the Green County Land and Water Conservation Department, Green County Conservation League, WI DNR, City of Monroe, Watershed Associations and local citizens that support the day with presenters. These groups also appreciate the school districts and teachers that prioritize conservation education for our youth.
