Local Vaping Ordinance to be Enforced

Officer O'Malley Lomax has accepted a position as School Liaison Officer in Durand, Illinois. Due to his skills in field and firearm training, the council approved Chief Brian Raupp's request to retain him as a part-time officer and post his full-time position.

Alder Nick Burkhalter reported he had relayed concerns to Chief Raupp about vaping in local establishments despite the fact there is a city ordinance that forbids it. Because there may be confusion with the state statute, which does not explicitly refer to vaping, the chief will speak to the establishments in question to make sure they understand the ordinance.

Alder Troy Nyman resigned his position on the City Council. His spot will remain vacant until the spring election. Alders Nick Burkhalter and Emily Sauer are up for re-election in April. Zach Woodford will be running to fill the vacancy left by Troy Nyman's resignation.

Ordinance 001-2025 was passed rezoning the old Brodhead Veterinary Service building from R2 to R3. This would allow for a third apartment to be constructed in the basement of that building.

In Other Business:

The Council approved MSA to perform a background review regarding new construction in the Crosswinds Development.

Water Quality Implementation Contracts were approved.

It was approved to pave the gravel service road from the bleachers to the restrooms in Putnam Park using previously allocated Park and Rec funds that had been returned to the General Fund.

Chief Raupp reported Capital Improvement projects have begun at the Police Department with work on the HVAC system and the replacement of ceiling tiles underway.

The next meeting was moved to Monday, February 24th at 6 p.m. due to the next month's upcoming election.







SSM Health in Wisconsin launches firstin-state postbirth alert program

Alert bracelets can help medical providers identify potential postbirth complications

According to the CDC, 817 women died in 2022 from maternal health related causes. More than two thirds of these deaths are considered preventable.

Knowing the first few weeks following childbirth come with many potential life-threatening health risks, SSM Health in Wisconsin launched a first-in-Wisconsin postbirth alert program on Wednesday, January 1. Through this program, all mothers who deliver at SSM Health Monroe Hospital and other SSM Health hospitals in Wisconsin are given an orange bracelet to wear for at least six weeks after they give birth. The bracelet serves as a visual identifier to medical teams that the patient recently gave birth and they could be experiencing a post-pregnancy complication like blood clots, hemorrhaging, sepsis, or cardiomyopathy.

Michele Schiess, Acute Care and Emergency Services Director at SSM Health in Monroe, lead the way in implementing the program at SSM Health's hospitals in Baraboo, Fond du Lac, Janesville, Madison, Monroe and Waupun.

"Many postpartum deaths could be avoided if post-pregnancy and delivery complications were considered earlier in medical emergencies," says Schiess. "These bracelets could save lives by making emergency responders and clinicians aware of potential complications earlier in an emergency, leading to better care for women in this critical post-partum time."

To fully implement this program, SSM Health is working to educate area EMS service partners and other community health systems to ensure women wearing a post-birth alert bracelet receive prompt emer-

The post-birth alert bracelet was first introduced in Florida in November of 2023. Since then, the bracelets have been implemented in other states, including Illinois.

Download and open Libby on your devise. Answer a few basic questions. Browse or search to discover your next eBook or audiobook and start reading or listening!

To open Libby on a laptop or desktop computer, go to the Albertson Memorial Library website at: https://www.albertsonlibrary. org/. (Don't have a computer or Wi-Fi? No problem, use the library's!) Click on "Libby," which you can find on our homepage under the section titled "Reading Resources." You can also go directly to Libby at: https://www.Libbyapp.com. On Apple iPhones and iPads download "Libby, the library app" from the App Store. On phones and tablets with Google Play download "Libby, the library app" from Google Play. On Amazon Fire tablets download "Libby, the library app" from the Amazon App Store.

Once you've downloaded and opened the app you will need to answer a few basic questions. Question like-whether you possess a library card from the Albertson Memorial Library? If you do, select "Yes." If you do not, please visit the library where one of our Library Aides will assist you in obtaining a card. To locate your library, choose "Search for a Library," then enter the zip code "53502" for Albany. The "Albany Public Library" will be displayed; click on it. Select "Sign in with my card." To begin reading a borrowed material from your "Shelf", tap "Loans" at the top of the screen. From there, you can: tap "Read With..." to decide whether to open the material in Kindle or Libby. If you opt for Kindle, you'll be directed to Amazon's website to complete the download. If you're signed into your Amazon account, confirm the "deliver to:" device and tap "Get Library Book." If you're not logged in, select "Get Library Book", sign in, and choose a delivery device. Tap "Open in Libby", "Open Magazine", or "Open Audiobook" to begin reading or listening through the app. Tap "Manage Loan" to access options, such as, "Renew Loan" and "Return Early." Enjoy flipping through those digital pages!



Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library

From New France to the Shaping of the Midwestern States

The Saturday, January 25 program told the story of the French who had settled in a vast area stretching from what would be Pennsylvania to the Mississippi River and extending from their port at the mouth of the Saint Lawrence River to an entry point at New Orleans. The French first explored in 1624 and retained control until 1763.

The program began with discussion of the multiple Native American tribes inhabiting this large area and how they interacted with each other and the French. Speaker Mark Peterson, as in his previous two presentations at the library, enriched his talk with great illustrations and maps.

For the French who learned to associate and work with the Native Americans, their control of the land is the story of killing beavers for their valued pelts and fighting off the English. After many battles and much bloodshed, in 1763 the French King Louis XV decided it was no longer worth their while to try to control the extensive area and they

yielded to the English.

The Story Continues with a look at The Shapes of the States Part 2, covering the Midwestern States.

Saturday, February 8 speaker Brad Keyes will continue the story and discuss how the Midwestern states were carved out of the "new" land. Following the American Revolution, the area, which had long been controlled by the French and then by the English, became part of the fledgling United States.

With the 1783 Treaty of Paris, the English ceded the land west of the Appalachian Mountains and north of the Ohio River to the United States. The Northwest Ordinance, which was passed by Congress on July 13, 1787, established governance of the Northwest Territory and outlined the process for admitting new states to the United States. But where were those lines to be drawn in order to form first the separate territories and thus prepare them for statehood? Please join us Saturday, February 8 at 10 a.m. to learn about the tricky business of deciding state lines. Many factors were at play: the desire for access to waterways, faulty surveying, territories jockeying with each other for

more land as well as quirks of geology and moving riverbeds.

About the Library

The Durand Library is a collaboration between Durand School and the Friends of the Durand Library. We are more than happy to deliver books to those who are physically unable to get to the library and volunteers can meet at other times with those who can't make public hours.
