

CONTENTMENT


... "Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well -fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through Him Who strengthens me."

Philippians 4:11-13, NRSV

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God – not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what He has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life." Ephesians 2:8 - 10, NRSV

In a pandemic world people are asking; When do things open up? What can we do now? Where do we go from here? How do I keep my loved ones safe? How do I keep safe? What's going to happen to my savings? How will I make ends meet? When will I go back to work? Will I go back to work? When can I go to Holy Mass? When can I receive Holy Communion? What will happen to my family? to my Church family? Can I trust what I'm being told?

These are all difficult questions that we've posed to ourselves. And I'm sure there are many more questions we want answers for. Our parish, our diocese, the general Church also is asking and analyzing how we deal with Ecclesiology (the study of "being Church") in new and different ways. And how can we tell if we're doing what is right?

That is why I shared the above two Scripture passages with you. These Scripture passages remind us that (1) God is always in control. (2) He has saved us through faith. And (3) this knowledge can be absolutely relied on. Hence we can echo the words of Saint Paul and *"be content with whatever [we] have."*

Read the words of Saint Paul to the Philippians (first reading) again. Consider - Saint Paul, with all that he experienced in his life, experienced **contentment**.

Contentment is not a word I've heard spoken a lot these past three months. But I believe it is a word, indeed a state of being that we should learn and should begin practicing in our individual lives.

The website <u>dictionary.cambridge.org</u> defines **contentment** as: happiness and satisfaction, often because you have everything you need.

As Christians, we are called to be **content**.

Consider Paul's life after his being confronted by Jesus on the Damascus Road (Acts 9) to his final martyr's death in Rome years later. It is hard for the average person to imagine that someone who had suffered as much as Saint Paul (see 2 Corinthians 11:21-33) could be **content**. In the second excerpt from Ephesians Saint Paul tell us that our faith is a gift to us from Jesus Christ our Lord. His gift of faith has made us the Christian men and women that we are. And Saint Paul focuses on the point that **God prepared beforehand to be our way of life**.

So Saint Paul is content in all situations because he understands that God is in control and that he has a purpose for not only himself, but that God has a purpose for all of us. Saint Paul did not know this right from the start. Rather he learned it by experiencing God in his life. *"I have learned to be content with whatever I have... I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need.* Paul learned that he could do all things and endure all things *"through Him Who strengthens me."*

The Polish National Catholic Church is a family of like-minded Christians who have chosen to walk their Christian walk in the manner we find in this Ecclesial community. We are neither better nor worse that other Ecclesial communities. For us this Church reflects our best expression of the relationship with our Lord God, One in the Holy Trinity.

This Church has survived all the perils that the world posed over the past one hundred twenty-three years. We've survived the Spanish Flu, Two World Wars, and the many military engagements that have touched the lives of her faithful, to the point of death in some cases. The Church has survived natural disasters over this time and other pandemics that had also affected its people. The Church has survived the challenge of Communism that opposed it in Poland and continues to survive the challenges against it by our increasingly secular world.

The Church survives because "...this is not [our] own doing; it is the gift of God – not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what He has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works..."

And we will survive into the future, if we understand the relationship we have to God. We will have an Altar Server Retreat this month. We will have a scouting camporee. We will celebrate Vespers at the Cathedral of the Pines after the Fourth of July. We will have a Youth Retreat in some form this August. We will have our Diocesan Synod in October. We will have our Clergy Retreat in November. And we will carry on the work of the God we serve, One in the Holy Trinity, in our General Church, in our Diocese, in our seniorates and parishes. And we will carry on the work God puts before us individually, as Disciples of Christ Jesus, Our Lord. The difficult questions that we are posing to ourselves at this time can be answered once we begin to realize our relationship to God and the **contentment** we find in Him. In our contentment we will be able to address these questions with a new, Christian reality.


And in all of this, no matter the challenges, no matter the setbacks, no matters the barriers we perceive set before us, we will accomplish all of God's Will "...through Him Who strengthens [us]."

We will experience the **contentment** that only God can provide. We will be at peace as Saint Paul was. Faced with the Covid 19 virus, we will be content. In the middle of an economic upheaval, we will be content. As the world challenges and attacks our Church, our faith, we will be content.

A final quote, to perhaps sum up this meditation and to underline the hope we have for the present and the future, *"I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world!*" *John 16: 33, NRSV*



DISCIPLESHIP: 2020

PNCC FUTURE DIRECTION - ACTION PLAN FOR PNCC PARISHES BASED ON THE EFFORTS OF THE $24^{TH} \& 25^{TH}$ PNCC GENERAL SYNODS

Continue to develop and emphasize Discipleship through 2020: Our purpose is to strengthen all members in their following of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This will give us a better sense of ourselves as the Church. During 2020 we will examine the lives of some of the early disciples of our Lord and their discipleship virtues to see what we can learn from them and apply to our daily living. Please see the monthly Future Direction messages regarding this effort with reflections for living this out daily.

Questions for Reflection each month: Name a few important "discipleship qualities" that the figure(s) demonstrate? Which one would you personally like to better emulate? How can you begin to practically do so in your daily life?

These questions could also be used in the parish for a monthly adult reflection session on the figure(s) noted below.

JANUARY - JOHN THE BAPTIST: FORTITUDE, HUMILITY

Matthew 3:1-17; John 1:15-36, 3:22-30 <u>Reflection Question</u>: John the Baptist called others to repent and prepare for the Lord Jesus. How can you, as a disciple, help others take their relationship with our Lord more seriously? Begin planning/implementation of the Parish Assessment

FEBRUARY - SIMEON AND ANNA IN THE TEMPLE: PIETY, COMPASSION

Luke 2:22-38

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Simeon and Anna recognized Jesus as the promised Messiah and told others in the Temple about Him. Can you come up with 2 practical ways by which you can do the same? Schedule Soup, Sandwich & Sermon or Wine and Cheese Gathering – Adult Education

MARCH - MARTHA AND MARY OF BETHANY: PRAYERFULNESS, SERVICE

Luke 10:38-42; John 11:1-45

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Martha and Mary together give us a balanced model of the aspects of our discipleship. Do you have this same balance of prayer and service in your daily life? What can you do to achieve it?

Schedule Mass for Healing Schedule and conduct Lenten Retreat

APRIL - MARY MAGDALENE: FAITHFULNESS, FORTITUDE

Luke 8:1-3; Mark 15:33-47; John 20:1-18

<u>Reflection Question</u>: Mary Magdalene was faithful to our Lord even at the foot of the Cross and so Jesus rewarded her with being the first witness to his Resurrection. How can you better follow her example of unconditional faithfulness to Christ in your own life?

MAY - ST. PETER: HUMILITY, TRUST

Luke 5:1-11; Matthew 26:31-35; John 21:1-19

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Peter did not feel worthy to accept the Lord's call and he was right. Yet, he followed and Jesus used him to boldly proclaim the Gospel to others and to give the greatest witness in his martyrdom. How can you overcome your own sense of unworthiness and embrace God's great plan for you?

Schedule Soup, Sandwich & Sermon or Wine and Cheese Gathering - Adult Education

JUNE - SAINTS JAMES AND JOHN: SONS OF THUNDER, APOSTLES OF LOVE

Mark 3:13-19; Luke 9:28-36; Matthew 20:20-28

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Jesus taught the "Sons of Thunder" that true honor and greatness come from putting the needs of others before your own and becoming a servant. Do you sometimes do things so that others will see you doing them instead of doing them out of love? How can you better learn the lesson that James and John learned as disciples of Jesus?

Remember Clergy Appreciation Weekend & Sacred Vocations Month

JULY - ST. PAUL: REPENTANCE, FORTITUDE AND SPIRITUAL ENDURANCE

Acts 8:1-3, 9:1-20; Romans 8:18-27; 2 Tim 4:1-8

<u>Reflection Question</u>: Paul understood the sacrifices that had to be made for the sake of the Gospel and he willingly made them. Have you ever been called to sacrifice something as a disciple of Jesus? How can you prepare this month to be able to give up things of the world for the sake of the Eternal Kingdom of God?

Schedule Mass for those Grieving

AUGUST - THE CANAANITE WOMAN: PERSISTENCE, HUMILITY

Matthew 15:21-31

<u>Reflection Question:</u> The Canaanite Woman persisted in her request for healing even when Jesus tested her faith. How do you respond when you petition the Lord through prayer but don't receive an immediate response?

SEPTEMBER - ST. BARNABAS: GENEROSITY, FORTITUDE

Acts 4:32-37, 9:22-27, 14:8-20, 15:1-29

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Barnabas was called "son of encouragement" by the Apostles. In what ways can you follow his example and encourage others this month on their own journeys as disciples of Jesus?

Schedule Soup, Sandwich & Sermon or Wine and Cheese Gathering - Adult Education

OCTOBER – THE HOLY THEOTOKOS: HUMILITY, GENTLENESS, COMPASSION AND EVERY VIRTUE Luke 1:26-56, 2:1-19; John 19:25-30; Acts 1:13-14, 2:1-4

<u>Reflection Question</u>: The Mother of God is the first and greatest disciple of her Son, faithful from the Annunciation to the Ascension and then still prayerfully present with the Church at Pentecost. How can you better emulate her consistent faithfulness to God when faced with both great sorrows and times of joy?

NOVEMBER - ST. MATTHEW: SELF DISCIPLINE

Matthew 9:1-13, 10:1-42; Matthew 5:1-12, 25:31-46

<u>Reflection Question</u>: When Jesus called Matthew the tax collector to follow Him, he did so despite what others said about him. Have you ever been the one to deem someone else unworthy of being a disciple of Jesus in some way? How can you overcome such perceptions and instead help strengthen others in their discipleship?

Schedule Mass and Breakfast for those who serve

Schedule Soup, Sandwich & Sermon or Wine and Cheese Gathering – Adult Education Report of the Parish Assessment

DECEMBER - ST. JOSEPH - PROTECTOR OF THE LORD: OBEDIENCE, TRUST, PATIENCE

Matthew 1:18-25, 2:13-23; Luke 2:39-52

<u>Reflection Question:</u> St. Joseph was obedient to the will of the Father even when asked to do some very difficult things. Have you struggled to embrace God's will for your life in the past? How can you spiritually prepare to more fully surrender your life as a disciple of Jesus? Schedule and conduct Advent Retreat/Penitential Service

PARISH ASSESSMENT - PHYSICAL AND SPIRITUAL

Steady and lasting *Growth* in "readiness" to reach out and welcome others to our Church and Parishes. *What and how will it be done:* Focus on two project areas for parishes to systematically put their house in order both physically and spiritually. Some parishes are better maintained than others, but no parish is ever complete. Just as in our own spiritual lives there is always room for improvement, and we are never complete. We must keep moving forward in some way.

Phase 1: The outcomes of this phase would be twofold: first, the plan itself and then the actual execution of the plan resulting in improved grounds and church building.

Phase 2: The outcomes of this phase would also be twofold: first, the assessment and plan itself and then the actual execution of the plan resulting in improved (or at least confirmed satisfactory state of) the liturgical life of the parish.

Final outcome: Parishes with increased internal readiness that leads out to external growth in membership; feeling a sense of humble and grateful pride at what God had helped them accomplish and a growing sense of healthy confidence that they are truly ready to welcome others who are seeking a spiritual home.

This is really grounded in the observation that perhaps we are not as ready as we might think to welcome new growth in membership and the notion that every parish can and must continue to improve itself.

SPECIAL MASSES

Again have at least two Special Masses and open them to the community. This would be in addition to our Sunday Mass. During Lent have a Mass for Healing and invite all those who are ill, hurting spiritually or emotionally to attend and spend time in prayer, to hear God's Word and receive Christ in the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Anointing. Use the Mass for Healing during Lent – this will be emailed to all clergy as a reminder at the beginning of Lent.

In the fall (November) have a Mass to Salute those who Serve - for your first responders/those in military service and Veterans. This Mass could be followed by a meal to honor those who serve/who have served. You could also have a Mass in time of tragedy when the need may arise in your community or our nation. These could be followed by a time of fellowship and food at the parish.

You could also schedule a Mass for those grieving anytime during the Church Liturgical Year.

Welcome the community to these Masses by promoting them in your local media and newspaper, as well as fliers and social media. Invite other local groups to join you for these Masses.

CONTINUE THE BUSINESS FREE ZONE

For 10-15 minutes prior to the celebration of Holy Mass have a time where the pastor is unavailable for Church business and that no other things are being discussed but a focus on the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. This will continue to bring an enhanced spirituality and reverence for the Eucharist to our parishes. Encourage use of the introductory pages of the Mass booklet – *especially page 8* as well as prayers from our Prayer Book preparing for Holy Mass and Confession.

Continue and Strengthen your Social Media Presence

Short two minutes messages by various members speaking to our Year of Discipleship on YouTube. Continue to post monthly messages to our Facebook page and videos to YouTube and ask our members to share them. We hope more will be reached and encouraged to participate in these efforts. Parishes should have a presence of Social Media to promote their Special Masses and events. Consider streaming Holy Mass live on the internet and use these tools to promote the work of the parish. Pastors are also encouraged to record and share their Masses and Para Liturgical Services.

Adult Continuing Education

WINE AND CHEESE CLUB OR SOUP, SANDWICH AND SERMON

Continue to gather for adult education and formation in our Christian Catholic faith. Perhaps you could use the questions for reflection from the monthly figures for 2020 above. This can be done via the Soup, Sandwich and Sermon Concept, Wine and Cheese Gatherings concept (based on the Pub Theology: Beer, Conversation and God), using a Book Club format or even via online.

TWO DAYS OF SPIRITUAL RETREAT

Lent and one other (Advent) Pick a day during the seasons of Lent and one other time in 2020 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament; For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to the local community.

COMPLETE AT LEAST SIX COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

It is important that the six projects be done in the local community of the parish so that these efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community.

Various options include but are not limited to: blood drives, a project to aid an assisted living facility, or other care facility i.e. nursing home, group home; volunteering for a special needs event; having a Mass or event for your local widow's group; aiding a family crisis center, food drives, serving a free meal for the community, providing a community breakfast/meal for First Responders – for Veterans; prayer blanket ministry, clothing drive for the community, sponsoring a local family in need, and/or responding to a particular need in the local community, etc.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE XV EASTERN DIOCESE SYNOD

OCTOBER 28-29, 2016

The XV Synod of Eastern Diocese convened October 28 -29, 2016 in Bristol, CT hosted by Holy Trinity Plantsville Ct by the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. The Synod began with Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Parish celebrated by Bishop Sobiechowski and concelebrated by the clergy of the Eastern Diocese. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Bishop Hodur by celebrating the Hodurian mass and receiving two presentations dedicated to the life and ideals of Bishop Hodur: the Convo 2016 Video Presentation on the Life of Bishop Francis Hodur by the youth of the PNCC and the presentation on the life of Bishop Hodur by Prime Bishop Mikovsky and;

Whereas, we acknowledge the dedicated and ongoing work of the Future Direction Sub-Committee of the Supreme Council as they pursue the themes defined by the 14th General Synod: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations, and Community Involvement and Presence

Whereas, through the work of the Committee of Twenty and the small group discussions, the Synod body agreed to focus their attention on young adults between ages of 16 to 35 and to reach this audience through the following overarching goals:

- Increase awareness of our church through all social media outlets addressing
 - Our founding principles and beliefs
 - Bishop Hodur and his progressive ideas
 - The spiritual needs of these young adults
 - Provide clarity on our Catholic faith

From our Parishes:

Holy Trinity Cathedral Manchester, NH

- As with all of our parishes the COVID19 has affected the way we conduct activities at our parish; activities have been canceled and Bishop has held mass to an empty congregation. • As a parish we had decided to participate in "40 items in 40 days" during Lent. Before Lent began, we gave parishioners large bags for them to place unwanted clothing, one piece for every day of Lent. Even though masses were not held during a good portion of Lent, we were able to donate 27 bags of clothing to the Salvation Army.



On June 7th we were able to hold Sunday mass in church with parishioners in attendance. Bishop Paul
received and blessed his new violet chasuble and stole which was donated by our parish's ANS
organization in memory of their long-standing past president, Louise Kos.

Masks were distributed to our local nursing homes, hospitals, First Responders (FRPD, FRFD and FREMS), SSTAR and others in need in our community.

Hundreds of cards were delivered and food and cash donations were made to help our local food pantry and others in need during this challenging time. A thank you to our parish youth who pitched in to make cards as well - Maya, Gaby, Emmy and even Charley!







eral religious denominations participated in a "Blessing over the







Groceries were dropped off at the church for delivery to the local food banks. All you had to do is let Father know it was coming and leave it at the front door. We had a socially-distant blessing of Easter foods on Holy Saturday and a special blessing for mothers and mother figures on Mother's Day. Meanwhile, Father Tom resumed his work at Yale-New Haven in the COVID unit, providing comfort to those afraid and in need of spiritual reassurance. He also kept in touch with parishioners through phone calls and emails to see how everyone was holding up in isolation.



Regretfully, we lost two long-time parishioners during this time, Bill Petrino and Art Niedzielski. Although we were unable to gather as a community to celebrate their lives and mourn their passing, the weekly broadcast services remembered both men and their families. Parishioners could only express their condolences through cards, emails and phone calls.



Now that this stage of pandemic is waning, we have begun celebrating Mass together again, albeit from our cars in the church parking lot observing social distancing protocols. A local company broadcasts the Mass on a radio channel so all can hear in their cars. The weather has somewhat cooperated, giving us sunny skies both weeks, but quite a bit of wind. Our biggest interruptions have been planes taking off/landing at nearby Sikorsky Airport and a high volume of motorcyclists passing by our property out enjoying the summerlike weather.



We are looking forward in anticipation to the day we can once more celebrate Mass inside our church. Events that had been planned, like the Colossal Kielbasa stand, are predictably on hold until they can be held safely for all involved.

69th Convention of the Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament Society May 16, 2020

The 69th Convention of the Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament Society was called to order by President JoAnn Menzia at 10:09 am. The convention was scheduled to be held in Holy Cross PNCC in Central Falls, RI but, because of the coronavirus pandemic was held virtually on Zoom.

Clergy present included Bishop Paul Sobiechowski, bishop of the Eastern Diocese; the Very Rev. Joseph Soltysiak, our chaplain;the Very Rev. Robert Nemkovich; the Very Rev. Joseph Krusienski; the Rev. Andrzej Tenus; the Rev. Pawel Lukaszewicz; the Rev. Paul Dudek; Cleric Justin Daviault.

Minutes of the 68th Convention and financial reports had been sent electronically and were accepted.

Our program began with the playing of the hymn "Gentle Woman", sung by Laurie Dionisio, cantor, Blessed Trinity Parish, Fall River, MA.

The litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary was led by Bishop Sobiechowski assisted by Karen Sobiechowski and Janice Klimczak. The Prayer in time of distress and the Regina Caeli were also recited.

Steven Mendrzychowski and Lois Beauparlant from Holy Cross, Central Falls gave an enjoyable and informative power point presentation on discipleship practices in Holy Cross Parish.

Before planning a program, they suggested parishes consider the needs of their community or if there is a need for seasonal assistance. Research outside funding to assist in covering costs of supplies/ food or partner with other churches. Consider a relationship with public service groups who can point to needs in the community. If providing food, insure proper permits are in place as well as handicap accessibility.

President Menzia thanked Steve and Lois and commended them and Holy Cross for being good disciples, sharing, caring and being friends.

Sally Watson, our treasurer, spoke of a change in the amount of dues per member we are requested to send to the National ANS. At the National Convention of ANS held in 2019 it was decided that dues to the national ANS will be \$2/year rather than \$1/year per person beginning in 2020. Our executive board suggested we discuss this at the 2020 convention and raise diocesan dues from \$3/person per year to \$5/ person per year. We would send in \$1/member to the National ANS for 2020 until this is passed at convention and then catch up. Obviously, this matter cannot be acted upon until the next convention when more delegates are present.

Marilyn Folcik, vice-president, was called upon to conduct the election of the executive board for 2020-2022. She explained that a slate of officers was sent to our local officers. All officers present at the executive board meeting had agreed to serve another term. Karen Sobiechowski agreed to serve as marshal. Hearing no volunteers from the floor to serve in any office, a motion to accept the slate as is for 2020-2022. Officers include:

JoAnn Menzia, president (5th term); Marilyn Folcik, vice-president (5th term); Janice Klimczak, recording secretary (7th term); Sally Watson, treasurer (6th term); Susan Locks, financial secretary (7th term); Diane Hodgkins (5th term), Anne Barnet (5th term), Sue Pretola (5th term), auditors; Organizers: Cindy Hebert (Northeast, 3rd term), MaryAnn/Bunny Curylo (Central, 2nd term), Southeast open; Marshals: Phyllis Hunt (5th term), Kathleen Sherman (6th term), Janice Soltysiak (3rd term), Arlene Strazzulla (2nd term), Karen Sobiechowski (1st term). Plans for the annual Youth Retreat are pending, depending on the laws in Massachusetts. Father Senior Nemkovich suggested we wait until plans are finalized. He will contact our president and then we can make a decision as to how much to donate.

President Menzia then said a prayer for our sisters departed since last year and for those ill, anxious or under stress.

The convention next year will be held in St. Joseph's Parish, Westfield, MA with the ANS groups of Westfield and Chicopee working together.

The National ANS convention will be held May 19 and 20, 2023 hosted by the sisters of Holy Trinity Parish ANS, Plantsville, CT.

After announcements, several sisters and clergy members shared thoughts on how they were faring during the pandemic.

The president acknowledged those who helped coordinate this first virtual ANS convention: Bishop Sobiechowski, Father Senior Nemkovich, Father Tenus, Steve Mendrzechowski and Lois Beauparlant, presenters, Janice Klimczak and officers of the local societies.

Father Senior Nemkovich mentioned that twenty four devices were connected to the convention. We had lay participants from nine parishes. It is difficult to determine how many participants we had because more than one person could have been on a computer.

Father Senior Joseph Soltysiak gave the closing prayer. Bishop Paul gave his blessing and the convention ended at 11:45 am.





Dear Very Rev. and Rev Fathers, Diocesan Council Members and Parish Families of the Eastern Diocese:

Preparation for our diocesan synod continues. We plan on holding the synod in person. However, with the present Covid-19 pandemic, we are preparing to revert to a Zoom format, if necessary, for this important and Holy gathering.

Mandates will be going out to parishes, clergy, council members and sub-central organizations and the Polish National Union of America in July.

Diocesan Bishop

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- The SS. Peter & Paul Grant program continues. There are funds still available to any parish that has yet to submit a grant application. Reports on the success of the various grants as well as the amounts conferred to each parish will be reported either at the diocesan synod, or at the 2021 meeting of the diocesan council
- At the Eastern Diocesan Council meeting held June 6, 2020 it was decided to donate twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00 US) dollars to the Clergy Pension Fund and to, once again, match all donations for the pension fund that come from Eastern Diocese parishes this year.
- It was also decided that, as of July 1st, 2020, the Eastern Diocese would assume all costs involved in the health insurances of Bishop Paul and Karen Sobiechowski. This action removes the obligation of the cathedral parish to provide for health care. The diocesan council further decided not to ask for the one third reimbursement from the national Church, thus somewhat relieving the General Church with its financial obligations.
- The diocesan council also voted to increase the monthly stipend to its administrative seniors and the diocesan treasurer by one hundred twenty-five (\$125.00 US) dollars. They also increased the quarterly stipend to the editor of The Messenger by one hundred twenty-five (\$125.00) dollars. The monthly salary of the diocesan bishop was also increased by three hundred (\$300.00) dollars.

Rys autobiograficzny

Urodziłem się 18 VIII 1937 r. w Pont-de-Cheruy (dep. Isere) we Francji. Dzieciństwo miałem spokojne i piękne. Kiedy miałem 7 lat, śniło mi się, że posiadam zdolność lotu. W tym czasie zacząłem uczęszczać do francuskiej szkoły elementarnej i sny zaczęły się zmieniać jak nowe obrazy w fotoplastykonie. Drugą wojnę światową pamiętam tylko ze smaku czekolady,

którą obdarowywali nas Amerykanie. Pamiętam jeszcze pająka na suficie naszej piwnicy, w której musieliśmy się ukrywać przez dwa tygodnie.

Kiedy miałem 11 lat, rodzice doszli do wniosku, że należy opuścić słodką Francję i powrócić do jeszcze słodszej Polski. Nie rozumiałem jeszcze wtedy słowa: nostalgia. Teraz dopiero rozumiem, ileż smutku się w nim zawiera. Z opowiadań i książek słyszałem dużo o wilkach grasujących w Polsce. Nie widziałem nigdzie wilków, ale nie mogłem się spodziewać, że tak małe będzie moje rozczarowanie.

Osiedliliśmy się w ponurym miasteczku, w Aleksandrowie Kujawskim. Było to kiedyś graniczne miasteczko i słynęło szeroko z przemytu. Tutaj skończyłem szkołę podstawową. Ponieważ wykazywałem wysokie zdolności, oddano mnie do gimnazjum w Ciechocinku, żeby zrobić ze mnie "inżyniera" lub "doktora". Po trzech latach przeniosłem się do liceum ogólnokształcącego w Gdyni, które ukończyłem i gdzie do tej pory otoczony jestem legendą, jak wyczytałem w tamtejszej szkolnej gazetce. Jeden rok, tzn. 1956, włóczyłem się po Polsce napotykając wszędzie ślady wilków, a nigdy ich samych. Potem zacząłem studiować filologię francuską na KUL-u, gdzie doskonała dobroć kilku osób wzruszyła mnie do głębi. Studia przerwałem przede wszystkim z własnej winy, a może z winy wierności tradycjom moich wielkich "ancetres".

Życie to nie teatr

Życie to jest teatr, mówisz ciągle, opowiadasz; Maski coraz inne, coraz mylne się zakłada; Wszystko to zabawa, wszystko to jest jedna gra Przy otwartych i zamkniętych drzwiach. To jest gra!

Życie to nie teatr, ja ci na to odpowiadam; Życie to nie tylko kolorowa maskarada; Życie jest straszniejsze i piękniejsze jeszcze jest; Wszystko przy nim blednie, blednie nawet sama śmierć! Ty i ja - teatry to są dwa! Ty i ja!



Autobiographical Sketch

I was born on August 18, 1937 in Pontde-Chéruy (dep. Isère) in France. My childhood was peaceful and beautiful. When I was seven, I dreamt I had the ability to fly. At that time I started to attend the French elementary school and dreams began to change like new images in a magic lantern. The Second World War I only remember from the taste of chocolate we always got from

the Americans. I also remember a spider on the ceiling in our basement, where we had to hide for two weeks.

When I was eleven, my parents decided that it's time to leave the sweet France and return to the even sweeter Poland. Then, I did not yet understand the word nostalgia. Only now do I know how much sadness there is in it. From people and books I learned about wolves prowling all over Poland. In November 1948 we came to Poland. I didn't see any wolves, but I couldn't expect how small my disappointment would be.

We settled down in the gloomy little town of Aleksandrów Kuj [awski]. Once it was a border town and was widely famous for contraband. There I finished grade school. Because I was showing unusual talents, I was sent to the "middle school" in Ciechocinek to be turned into "an engineer" or "a doctor." After three years I transferred to highschool in Gdynia, from which I graduated, and in which I am still surrounded with legends, as I read in the local school newspaper. One year, i.e.1956, I wandered all around Poland finding wolf trails everywhere but never the wolves themselves. Then I started studying French philology at CUL where I was deeply moved by the perfect goodness of a few people. Withdrawing from college was mostly my own fault, and maybe also the fault of fidelity to the traditions of my great "ancêtres."

Life Is Not Theater

Life is theater, you say, you explain; Masks and such, and false pretenses; All entertainment, nothing but a game, From the openning to the closing – It is a game!

for the lack which I feel with each particle of my body and each particle of my soul; for the lack which is tearing me to pieces like a newspaper covered with for the chance to unite with the Nameless, the Extraverbal, the Unknown for a new day for wonderful wilderness for the sight above all sights for the true apparition for the dot over ypsilon for the mystery of death in fear, in terror, in sweat of toil for the loss of the obvious for the lost keys of understanding with a tiny spark of trust that if the seed dies, it will bear fruit for the loneliness of dying since all body is always the corpse since it's hard, frightful and unbearable for the chance to transform for people's misfortune and my own which I bear on me and in me for it all looks like it's only a dream, a nightmare for it all looks like it's not true for it all looks like it's absurd for all here decays, rots and nothing is permanent but longing for permanence for I no longer am of this world and maybe never have been for it looks like there is nothing here that can save me for I no longer can love with earthly love for noli me tangere for I am very tired, indescribably exhausted for I have suffered much for I have already been, although it happened in madness, crucified in the most literal and most physical way and how deep and how real was my pain for I wanted to deliver from evil all people and the whole world and if it did not happen, I cannot call it my fault for it looks like there is no need for me here for I don't feel cheated which would help me rather stay than die; stay and search for the guilty one, maybe in myself; but I don't feel cheated for he who can stay in this world—let him stay and I wish him well, and when his time comes to die-let his death be light for I-I'm going to you, Father of the pastures to maybe at last find peacefulness, deserved I suppose, deserved I suppose, for I wasn't spared even from madness for everything hurts me terribly for I am suffocating in this cage for lonely is my soul until death for the last piece of paper ends on time and it's only a step and long Live Life

for I have stood at the beginning, for the Father pulled me and I will stand at the end and I will not taste death.

This leave-taking poem Stachura wrote just before he took his own life in his Warsaw apartment on July 24, 1979.
