

"GOD DESIRES TO LIVE WITH HIS PEOPLE"

This year the Church continues the theme of "Discipleship". It does so emphasizing the truth that we are a "Eucharistic People." We are part of the Body of Christ. We express this in a special way

when we share His Body and Blood; Christ physically within us, as it were. But then, God has always desired to live with His people.

We are introduced to God's desire to be among His people in the opening pages of the first book of the Old Testament, Genesis. God created the Garden of Eden. He then made Adam and Eve and placed them in the garden. God lived and walked among them and all was good until the day they drifted away from God by following the serpent. Their sin caused their banishment from Eden, and God no longer walked with them.

But God desires to walk with His people, so He separated Noah from the people and caused a flood on the earth. All sinful people were removed . God established a covenant with Moses and the rainbow stands as a sign of that covenant until today. The world was repopulated through Noah and his sons, and God savored the smell of the burnt offerings Noah presented. God was with His people until Noah's son Ham sinned against his father. Sin was reintroduced and God no longer walked with His people.

But God desires to walk with His people. So He separated Abram from His people and went into covenant with him. God appeared to Abraham and told him to "...walk before me and be blameless. And I will make My covenant with you." And God walked with Abraham and his generations until they enter into Egypt and fell away from the Lord. The people entered into bondage for four hundred years.

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But God desires to walk with His people. So, he chose Moses to lead His people from Egyptian bondage and entered into covenant with Moses, giving the Ten Commandments as a sign of His covenant with the Hebrew people. God then directed the Hebrews to build a wilderness tabernacle and the Ark of the Covenant. In the Ark, the Hebrews placed the tablets with the Ten Commandments written by God, along with the Manna by which He nourished the people. These were set in the tabernacle room called the Holy of Holies. God then covered the tent with the cloud and filled the Holy of Holies with His glory. And God was with His people, living among them.

God desires to walk with His people. He traveled with the Hebrews from Egypt, through the desert and into the Promised Land. He chose Joshua to lead His people. But in a generation's time after entering the Promised Land, the people once again sinned, embracing other gods. They sinned against the Lord Who lived among them. God even allowed King Solomon to build a Temple in Jerusalem to be a permanent tabernacle and Holy of Holies. But the people continued to sin. At the end of the kingdom period, God's glory left the Temple in Jerusalem. God left the people who had sinned against Him and the Temple was destroyed. The Babylonians destroyed the Hebrew nation and took the remainder of them into captivity.

But God desires to walk with His people. God's presence left the earth until He revealed it again in Jesus, His beloved Son. In Jesus, God fulfilled the promise He had made to Abraham by giving His own life to seal the covenant He had made. Not only did the sovereign Creator live among sinful human beings to demonstrate His presence, He offered His life to save those who had broken His covenant.

God desires to walk with His people. The New Testament refers to Jesus as God's Son and as "God -man" (God taking human form.) During His ministry on earth Jesus was the Holy of Holies. Jesus was God living among His people. He was also the perfect sacrifice, the Lamb of God. Through His death and Resurrection God's people had the means to return to their original state of fellowship with God. Jesus freed us of our sins by taking them upon Himself. By our faith we are made well again.

After His Resurrection Jesus remained with His people for forty days. He ascended to His Father. If you will, the Shekinah Glory left the earth again, as in Ezekiel, but not because of our sinfulness. Rather Jesus says "... the Helper, the Holy Spirit whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and remind you of all that I said to you." John 14:26

God wants to live among His people. Ten days after His Ascension the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles, appearing as "tongues of **fire.**" God takes residence in us and we become "Holy of Holies" by virtue of God's Holy Spirit dwelling in us.

God desires to live among and within His people. We are a Eucharistic people in that Jesus enters us in the Holy Communion we receive. He is a part of us by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in our souls. As we live in relationship to God, we make His presence known to all those with whom we come into contact.


Consider the immensity of the thought that we are God's Holy of Holies. God desires to live with His people through us.

Saint Paul writes to the Ephesians: "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of His power. Put on the whole armor of God, ...so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. "Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak." (Ephesians 6: 10-20)

As we approach Lent this year ask yourself these questions; What or who do people see when they see me? In what way(s) am I revealing God's presence and power? How have I shown myself to be a tabernacle of God, a Holy of Holies?

Resolutions of the 25th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church



Whereas, we the delegates to the 25th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church - representatives of the holy People of God - have convened under the leadership of our Prime Bishop and Bishops at Our Lady of the Snows Shrine in Belleville, IL, from October 1 through October 3, 2018.

Whereas, we were strengthened, nourished and enlightened by our Lord Jesus Christ, truly present in our midst through Word and Sacrament at the Holy Mass concelebrated by our Prime Bishop, Bishops and Clergy, and understand it as the most important aspect of the great work of these days;

Whereas, we offer our gratitude to the Western Diocese of the Church, under the leadership of Bishop Bilinski, and those who assumed the responsibilities of planning and carrying out this Holy Synod;

Whereas, we acknowledge the courageous presence and active participation of the gathered delegates, as we proclaim that the Mission of the Church has been entrusted to her members of all ages, each called to pursue lives of holiness as Disciples of Jesus Christ and to invite others to do likewise;

Whereas, we recognize the foundation that was laid at the 24th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church regarding our Future Direction and celebrate the many diligent efforts to build upon this within our Dioceses and Parishes over the last four years, in pursuing true Regeneration of spirit, mind and heart; by seeking to engender deeper Reverence for God and our neighbors; by willingly Recommitting ourselves to undertaking the work of the Church within our Parishes, and faithfully striving to welcome all of these virtues into the daily lives of our Families;

Whereas, we have again considered with renewed enthusiasm and rekindled creativity the Future Direction of our beloved Church by continuing to reflect upon the meaning of Growth with regard to its Membership, the continual need for Increased Spirituality and the value of Lifelong Learning for its members of all ages, the ongoing pursuit of personal holiness as the means of enabling joyful responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations, and the need to further enhance our Community Involvement and Presence;

We, therefore, resolve to fervently ask that God the Father, through the prayers of Our Lady of the Snows, may bring forth abundant fruit from the proceedings of this 25th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church, to seek grace and strength from our Lord Jesus Christ to embrace the work he has entrusted to our care, and to knock so that the Holy Spirit will open and inflame our hearts so that we may return to our parishes inspired to execute the work of this Synod, firm in our Catholic faith, anchored by hope and motivated by charity, unwaveringly committed as members of the Polish National Catholic Church, charged to boldly proclaim the Gospel at all times, in all places and to all people through our words, our actions and our lives of holiness, and more certain than ever that "With truth, work and struggle, we shall succeed!"

Resolutions of the XVI Eastern Diocese Synod October 10, 2020

Due to the Coronavirus and the inability to meet face to face, the XVI Synod of the Eastern Diocese convened virtually October 10, 2020. Hosted by Blessed Trinity Parish, Fall River MA the Synod was summoned under the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended virtually by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr served as the moderator for this virtual Synod. Additionally, Bishop Paul Hewitt, Bishop Ordinary of the Diocese of the Holy Cross joined us and presented to the Synod.

The Synod began with a morning prayer which set the tone and inspiration for the proceedings of the day. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we are thankful to Bishop Sobiechowski, our senior priests-Very Rev Joseph Krusienski, Very Rev Joseph Soltysiak and Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr for the planning and execution of a very successful virtual Synod; additional gratitude is extended to Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr for hosting and moderating this Synod.

Whereas we acknowledge the active participation of the delegates, guests, and clergy in fulfilling their discipleship role entrusted to them as members of our Holy Church and through their attendance and commitment in spreading God's word throughout our communities, our diocese and our Church.

Whereas we as delegates, reflect upon the legacy of faith set forth upon us by our organizer, Bishop Francis Hodur, the clergy, and organizers of the Church.

Whereas, we continue to support the endeavors of Future Direction and the overall theme of Discipleship towards increasing growth and membership, lifelong learning and renewed Spirituality among all members; to expanding community engagement efforts; and to enabling joyful responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations and service.

Whereas we acknowledge the work of the Eastern Diocese Strategic Planning Committee who over four years has worked diligently to:


- a. increase the awareness of our church by enabling parishes to use more social media technologies, especially Facebook in promoting masses and special services, and various events and fund-raising activities.

During 2021 as we prepare for a post Covid world, reengage and recommit ourselves as the Body of Christ; we will examine the lives of some of the prophets, disciples of our Lord, saints, bishops and their discipleship virtues to see what we can learn from them to apply in our daily living. JANUARY - DANIEL IN THE LION'S DEN

Scripture: Daniel Chapter 6

<u>Reflection and Action Item:</u> Daniel was raised to high office by King Darius. His jealous rivals trick the King to decree that no prayers should be addressed to anyone but the King. Daniel continued to be steadfast in his prayer to God. Thus, he was thrown into the lion's den and as we know God protected and saved him because of his great faith. As Daniel said "My God sent his angel, and he shut the mouths of the lions. They have not hurt me, because I was found innocent in his sight." (6:22)

This story teaches us that no one or nothing is a match for the True God and that God provides for those who are faithful and devoted to Him. So even in the midst of difficult and challenging times such as this ongoing pandemic – let us continue to put our faith and trust in God.

Be steadfast in your daily prayer and encourage others to put their faith and trust in God, Who will guide us through this storm. Do not lose heart but be strong in your faith and encourage others to do the same.

February – Jeremiah

Scripture: Jeremiah 1:10-10; 12:1-6; 20:7-18

<u>Reflection and Action Item</u>: Perhaps more than any of the other Old Testament prophets, Jeremiah's story reveals both the inner struggles and external persecutions that come with being a faithful instrument of God's will. Yet, his journey only foreshadows the reality of the Cross as embraced by our Lord Jesus for our salvation and given to us as the daily means of our own discipleship (Luke 9:23).

We can all feel like Jeremiah sometimes, but as members of the Church, we are called to help one another remain faithful when times are difficult. Sometime this month, prayerfully review the attached list of the *Spiritual Works of Mercy* and find 2 ways that you can apply them to help lighten the load carried by a fellow disciple of Jesus.

MARCH - BISHOP FRANCIS HODUR

Scripture: Wisdom 5:1-5; 1 Timothy 4:1-5; John 15:1-7

<u>Reflection and Action Item:</u> Bishop Francis Hodur was called by God and his people to organize our Polish National Catholic Church. This began on the second Sunday of March in 1897. Bishop Hodur said: "Our Church cannot be a blind, soulless copy of any Christian church. It must reach to the source of religious life, Christ the Lord. If we do not have Jesus' principles more adapted to life and effectively active, we do not have the right to life. Therefore, to work!"

Almighty and merciful God, You called a humble priest, Father Francis Hodur, to be Your servant and to awaken Your people for work in Your vineyard. Grant that, as we remember Your call to us this month, our faith may be made firm and our hearts may be enkindled by the fire of sacrificial love.

Find two ways in which you can make Christ's principles and teachings more effective and evident in your life as we remember our First Bishop and how he followed and served Jesus.

APRIL - MOTHER THERESA

Scripture: Matthew 25:

<u>Reflection and Action Item:</u> Mother Theresa lived her life challenging and inviting others to do something beautiful for God. There is so much going on in our lives that takes us in so many directions many times focusing on things that matter the least, but the example of Mother Theresa's life and efforts call us not to lose sight of what matters the most. She lived performing small acts of kindness with great love for all people – especially the poor and marginalized. Her lifestyle has made her one of the most beloved women in history and an icon of goodness. In following her great example living each day doing acts of kindness with love we can become more faithful disciples of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Perform at least three acts of kindness to help people who are homeless or support a cause that will support them. This can be done with either your time, talent or treasure. Let this help us to see Jesus in those who are less fortunate than we

MAY – BISHOP PADEWSKI: PNCC MARTYR

Scripture: 1 Peter 4:12-19; Luke 9:23-26

Reflection and Action Item:

Bishop Joseph Padewski was made bishop in 1935. His efforts not only rebuilt the PNCC diocese of Poland, but fostered its growth. This growth was abruptly halted with the Nazi invasion of Poland, which began World War Two. During this period the missionary diocese in Poland once again saw the destruction of its churches and the imprisonment, torture and murder of its clergy. Fully three-fourths of the diocese was destroyed. Padewski was himself imprisoned and tortured. He was later released as an American prisoner

of war, for a German general officer. He was sent back to America where he once again assumed the role of a parish pastor.

Following World War Two, Bishop Padewski returned to Poland and worked to rebuild our diocese in Poland. He gained the church a legal status in 1946. A little while later, in the midst of his efforts, the communist government made a general persecution of the Christian Church. Bishop Padewski was taken by the authorities, imprisoned, tortured and ultimately murdered. The oral account of his death was given church authorities by a cleaning woman who witnessed the torture Bishop Padewski endured. He died on May 10, 1951. At the age of 57, he became the first bishop-martyr of the Polish National Catholic Church. He was buried in Warsaw, Poland.

Almighty God, this month we remember the life of the first martyred bishop of the Polish National Catholic Church, Joseph Padewski. He dedicated himself to the building up and restoring of our Catholic Church for the people of Poland. May the example of his life and death inspire us to share the same message to people of all nations, proclaiming Your Gospel and so extending Your kingdom here on earth.

Offer a Prayer for Bishop Padewski and all Martyrs who have given their life for the faith. Support a person who is being persecuted for living out their faith either with your time, talent or treasure.

JUNE - RUTH AND NAOMI

<u>Scripture</u>: As a family, read together the short but profoundly beautiful Book of Ruth. It's only 4 chapters but is very rich. You could read it all in one sitting or divide it up as you like.

<u>Reflection and Action Item</u>: The story of Ruth and Naomi speaks to our hearts of the great dignity of family life and the call to be faithful to one another, come what may. This month reach out to a member of your own family with whom you have been out of touch for a while. Make that call you've been putting off for some reason or send a card with a note to catch them up on family happenings. This is a great chance for all of us to emulate the faithfulness of Ruth and Naomi!

Remember Clergy Appreciation Weekend & Sacred Vocations Month, pray that the Lord Jesus will send more priests and deacons to his Church, and be sure to show your gratitude to your parish clergy by some meaningful gestures of appreciation.

JULY - ST. PAUL: EARLY LIFE AND TRANSFORMATION

Scripture: Acts 21:17-22:21; 2 Corinthians 11:16-33; 12:7-10

<u>Reflection and Action Item:</u> St. Paul readily admits that he has "a past." But we all do, don't we? With him, though, we are called by Jesus to turn our backs to our sinfulness and our faces toward Him that we might live in holiness and righteousness and, in doing so, lead others to Him as well. This will not always be easy for us, just as it was often a struggle for the Apostle. Yet, the love of Jesus compels us to keep trying. Each week this month, make some personal or family sacrifice (e.g., fasting from a meal, abstaining from a favorite food or recreational activity, etc.) that those who have not yet come to know Jesus as their Lord may come to see and embrace the salvation and peace that He alone offers.

plan. As Christians, we have an advantage that Job did not—we know that the key to this riddle comes in the shape of a Cross.

Yet, from the ancient story of Job we learn that we must persevere in affliction, even when we don't completely understand. We know that God is with us always and so we can remain confident in his love even when suffering comes our way. As an act of compassion this month, pray *Psalm 46* every Friday, asking that those who are experiencing some burden, illness or hardship may draw their strength and hope from Christ crucified and risen.

SEPTEMBER – ST. STEPHEN

Scripture: Acts 6:8-10, 7:54-59; Matthew 1:17-22

Reflection and Action Item:

St. Stephen was the first Christian Martyr who died showing his complete faith in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Merciful Father, we celebrate the receiving of Saint Stephen into eternal glory. He died praying for those who stoned him. Help us to imitate his goodness and to love our enemies. How can we show our love for those who don't like us?

As we honor St. Stephen and celebrate the Solemnity of Brotherly Love this month - do a kind deed for at least two people who do not like you this month to show the love of God within you.

OCTOBER - TERESA OF AVILA

Scripture: Psalm 42, Psalm 121

<u>Reflection and Action Item:</u> St. Teresa of Avila is a master of the Christian spiritual life and a true role model for all who aspire to follow the Lord, regardless of their station in life. Her story is one of remaining steadfast in doing what Jesus asked of her for the sake of the Kingdom, diligently overcoming both inner doubts and external obstacles, while always trying to grow closer to Christ through her daily prayer life.

This beautiful prayer she composed speaks to her unshakable trust in Jesus, even amidst the trials of this life: "Let nothing disturb you, let nothing frighten you. All things are passing away: God never changes. Patience obtains all things. Whoever has God lacks nothing; God alone suffices."

NOVEMBER – ST. STANISLAUS

Scripture: 2 Corinthians 4:7-15; 1 Peter 3:14-17; Luke 9:23-26; John 15:18-21

Reflection Prayer and Action Item:

Stanislaus of Krakow (1030-1079) is the patron saint of Poland. In his episcopal ministry he stood up to and challenged the king for his cruelty towards people. This eventually led to the king killing him with a sword.

Lord God of mercies, for whose honor Your Bishop Stanislaus fell to the sword of his persecutors. Grant that, as we reverence the memory of St. Stanislaus who safeguarded the poor and outcast and gave his life defending your sacred Gospel, we may persevere, strong in faith, following his example of self-sacrifice and fortitude. What ways can you continue to be strong in faith even in times of trail?

Offer support and prayer for someone who has been persecuted for living their Christian Faith. Also, as we celebrate Thanksgiving this month, let us show our thanks to Almighty God by helping others who are in need.

DECEMBER - OUR BLESSED MOTHER AND ST. JOSEPH

Scripture: Matthew 1:18-25, 2:1-23; Luke 2:1-7, 22-52

<u>Reflection and Action Item</u>: The Holy Family of Nazareth is the chosen instrument by which the Savior entered into human history. The Blessed Mother and St. Joseph are the first group of disciples—indeed, the first domestic Church—for they heard and believed the Good News and then together responded in humble obedience to the will of the Father, even when things were not easy. They sacrificially put Jesus first and show us what we can become if we but do the same.

Their family life is the first, greatest and clearest example of the kind of cooperation that we too are called to give to God's grace as He seeks to make Jesus present in the world through us. Every day this month, recite the *Daily Family Prayer*, asking the Blessed Mother of God and St. Joseph to pray for your family and all the families of the Church.

Schedule and conduct Advent Retreat/Penitential Service

PNCC CHURCH EVENING RETREATS

During 2021 our Church will hold a couple of evening discipleship retreats via zoom. Our first will be on Wednesday January 20th at 7 pm and focus on Discipleship. More information will be forthcoming on this retreat and others during the year.

PARISH ENGAGEMENT- PHYSICAL AND SPIRITUAL

As we look forward to a post-Coivd world we need to begin to plan for a return and renewal of our worship and building the Kingdom of God with the opportunities presented to us. During the beginning of 2021, all parishes should discuss and prepare to return to all previous as well as additional discipleship activities/engagement. This should be done by the parish committee, other committees and groups of the parish. While we still wait for vaccination please keep social distancing with masks if meeting in person or use Zoom or other internet video conferencing to begin this important process.

SPECIAL MASSES (IN PERSON OR VIRTUALLY DUE THE PANDEMIC PERIOD)

Again have at least two Special Masses and open them to the community. This would be in addition to our Sunday Mass. During Lent have a Mass for Healing and invite all those who are ill, hurting spiritually or emotionally to attend and spend time in prayer, to hear God's Word and receive Christ in the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Anointing. Use the Mass for Healing during Lent – this will be emailed to all clergy as a reminder at the beginning of Lent.

In the fall (November) have a Mass to Salute those who Serve - for your first responders/those in military service and Veterans. This Mass could be followed by a meal to honor those who serve/who have served. You could also have a Mass in time of tragedy when the need may arise in your community or our nation. These could be followed by a time of fellowship and food at the parish.

You could also schedule a Mass for those grieving anytime during the Church Liturgical Year.

Welcome the community to these Masses by promoting them in your local media and newspaper, as well as fliers and social media. Invite other local groups to join you for these Masses.

CONTINUE AND STRENGTHEN YOUR SOCIAL MEDIA PRESENCE

Begin or continue to post regular messages to your parish Facebook – Instagram pages and appropriate videos to your parish YouTube page. Ask your members to share them through their social media accounts as well to reach

more people. Keep your websites current and user friendly. Take advantage of the opportunities that technology offers to promote our precious faith and how this faith is lived in the work and ministries of your parish.

ADULT CONTINUING EDUCATION

VIDEO CONFERENCING, WINE AND CHEESE CLUB OR SOUP, SANDWICH AND SERMON

Continue to gather for adult education and formation in our Christian Catholic faith. Perhaps you could use the reflections from the monthly figures for 2021 above. This can be done via Zoom, Internet Conferencing, the Soup, Sandwich and Sermon Concept, Wine and Cheese Gatherings concept (based on the Pub Theology: Beer, Conversation and God), using a Book Club format or even via online.

TWO DAYS OF SPIRITUAL RETREAT

Lent and one other (Advent) Pick a day during the seasons of Lent and one other time in 2021 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament; For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to the local community either in person or virtually.

CONTINUE THE BUSINESS FREE ZONE

For 10 minutes prior to the celebration of Holy Mass have a time when the pastor is unavailable for Church business and that no other things are being discussed but a focus on the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. This will continue to bring an enhanced spirituality and reverence for the Eucharist to our parishes. Encourage use of the introductory pages of the Mass booklet - especially page 8 as well as prayers from our Prayer Book preparing for Holy Mass and Confession.

COMPLETE AT LEAST SEVEN COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS






OBITUARY OF PRIME BISHOP EMERITUS JOHN F. SWANTEK (1933-2022)

Prime Bishop Emeritus John F. Swantek, 88, of Scranton, passed away Jan. 7 at home surrounded by his family after an illness. He leaves behind his wife of 55 years, Arlene (Miskiavitch) Swantek. Born in Cheshire, Conn., on May 15, 1933, he was the son of the late Felix Swantek and Elsie (Simmons) Swantek.

Bishop John graduated from Wilbur Cross High School in New Haven, Conn. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree in philosophy from Clark University, Worcester, Mass., and a Master of Arts degree in philosophy from the University of Connecticut, Storrs, Conn. He attended Savonarola Theological Seminary in Scranton and was ordained to the priesthood in the Polish National Catholic Church on Sept. 1, 1958.

His first Parish was at Holy Trinity Church in Webster, Mass., where he met his wife, Arlene. Ten years later, he was assigned to St. Joseph's parish in



Westfield, Mass., and was a member of the Diocesan Council, the National Commission on Liturgy, the Theological Commission, and the School of Christian Living Commission.

While serving his pastorates in both Webster and Westfield, Father John was a member of the local Clergy Association, serving as secretary and president. During his tenure in Westfield, he was involved with the Clergy Association in the establishment of the Westfield Drug Council, where he sat many evenings on the drug hotline. He also taught various courses at Savonarola Theological Seminary in Scranton.

On Sept. 29, 1975, Father John was elevated to the rank of Senior Priest in the church and on Nov. 30, 1978, he was consecrated Bishop. He moved to Buffalo, N.Y. and served as diocesan bishop of the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese at Holy Mother of the Rosary Cathedral. Bishop John was elected Prime Bishop of the Polish National Catholic Church in the fall of 1986. He relocated to Scranton and was installed as the fifth Prime Bishop on Nov. 23, 1986, at St. Stanislaus Cathedral.

During his tenure as Prime Bishop, he had the opportunity to travel to various countries and in his travels, he met with Pope John Paul II, Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Queen Elizabeth II and Mother Teresa. He also had the opportunity to travel to the Holy Land and celebrated Mass in Bethlehem where Jesus was born.

After serving two consecutive eight-year terms as Prime Bishop, he retired from his position and continued to serve the church for more than a decade.

Prime Bishop John was an avid sports fan and enjoyed watching tennis, golf and soccer on TV. He was a huge New England Patriots fan and thought Tom Brady could do no wrong. He also loved the Boston Red Sox and got the chance to celebrate World Series victories with his children and grandchildren. He spent much of his time reading in the evenings in his favorite chair. He read the Bible daily, but also enjoyed reading biographies, non-fiction and fictional stories.

Prime Bishop John enjoyed spending time with his family and attended numerous baseball games, dance recitals, violin concerts and various school events. He enjoyed Sunday dinners with his wife, children and grandchildren and loved the spontaneous visits from his grandchildren throughout the week. He looked forward to receiving his Sunday phone calls from his son so they could discuss sports and updates with the family. We spent many days together laughing and sharing stories about the past and present. His sense of humor was with him until the end of his life. His contagious laugh will always be remembered.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Felix Swantek; a brother-in-law, David Burke; a brother-in-

law, Richard Fecteau; and a sister-in-law, Kim Swantek. He is survived by his wife, Arlene; a daughter, Lynn and husband, Kevin Pfohl; a son, John and wife, Wendy Swantek; a daughter, Leslie and husband, William Doyle; and a daughter, Melissa Swantek; grandchildren, Nicholas, Elizabeth, Matthew and Olivia Pfohl, Cameron and Casey Swantek, Abigail and Andrew Doyle, Kaitlyn and Celeste Gingerlowski; siblings, Robert Swantek; Gerald Swantek and companion, Ronald Salka; Glenn and wife, Amy Swantek; Nancy Burke and Alice Fecteau; nieces and nephews. THE LETTER OF BISHOP PAUL SOBIECHOWSKI WRITTEN TO ALL THE MEMBERS OF THE EASTERN DIOCESE ON THE OCCASION OF THE DEATH OF THE PRIME BISHOP EMERITUS JOHN SWANTEK

January 8, 2022

My Dear Family and Friends in Christ Jesus our Lord: Normally this Sunday is filled with joy as we celebrate that moment when our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ was baptized in the Jordan River. His Father's voice is heard, "This is my beloved Son." And through his life, ministry, death and resurrection, Jesus made it possible for all of us to be sons and daughters of God by adoption in the same Baptismal fount.

But this time it's different because two days earlier, on January 7, the fifth Prime Bishop of the Polish National Catholic Church, the Rt. Rev. John Swantek, passed into eternity, joining the Church triumphant.

Bishop Swantek reflected our Lord in his ministry. From his own baptism to his call to the priest-hood, to his service as priest and senior priest in the Eastern Diocese to his role as Prime bishop of the Church and later, in retirement, as a counselor and teacher of the clergy and laity of the Church. Bishop Swantek was God's son, through adoption. I believe God the Father was well pleased. Bishop Swantek encouraged all of us to strive to become sons and daughters of God by adoption in the same Baptismal fount.

In the days, weeks and months ahead, many words, sermons and accolades will be offered in his memory and the way he touched others. During a recent Sunday homily, following the death of Archbishop Desmond Tutu, I recalled how Prime Bishop Swantek would say that he cherished the archbishop's friendship. They were both very humble servants of God and His Church. Now they are joined in the choir of the elect. Bishop Swantek would remind others that we must emulate John the Baptist in our discipleship. That Jesus must increase in us while we decrease.

The following words, written by Saint Paul are also reflected in the person of the late Prime Bishop: "the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life." (1 Timonthy 1: 14-16)




Since October 2020 on the third Saturday of each month Our Saviour's has been serving free Lunch to the local community from 11am-12:30pm.


Eastern Diocese Virtual Bible Study





Kazimierz Przerwa - Tetmajer

Urodzony 12 lutego 1865 w Ludźmierzu, powiat nowotarski. Ojciec - Adolf - uczestnik powstania listopadowego i styczniowego, był marszałkiem powiatu nowodworskiego. W 1883, z rodziną przeniósł się do Krakowa, gdzie uczęszczał do Gimnazjum Św. Anny, w 1884 rozpoczął studia na wydziale filozoficznym Uniwersytetu Jagiellońskiego. tam zaprzyjaźnił sie z Lucjanem Rydlem, Stanisławem Estreicherem i Ferdynandem Hoesickiem, W 1888 podiał współpracę z "Tygodnikiem Ilustrowanym", w 1889 z "Kurierem Warszawskim", w 1893 z krakowskim "Czasem". Po opublikowaniu drugiej serii Poezii (1894) brał intensywny udział w życiu literackim Krakowa, będąc uosobieniem poety młodopolskiego. W 1895 przebywał w Heidelbergu, pełniąc funkcję osobistego sekretarza Adama Krasińskiego. Wyjeżdżał za granicę, zwiedził Włochy, Szwajcarię, Francję i Niemcy. W 1912 obchodzono w Warszawie jubileusz 25-lecia jego twórczości. W tym okresie wystąpiły pierwsze objawy choroby

umysłowej. W czasie pierwszej wojny światowej I był zwolennikiem Legionów Piłsudskiego, iniciatorem Komitetu Ochrony Podhala, Komitetu Obrony Kresów prezesem Południowych. Po wojnie mieszkał w Krakowie, Zakopanem, wreszcie osiada na stałe w stolicy. W 1921 zostaje prezesem Towarzystwa Literatów i Dziennikarzy Polskich, w 1934 członkiem honorowym Polskiej Akademii Literatury. Utrata wzroku i nasilająca się choroba umvsłowa zmusiły go do wycofania się z życia społecznego, pozbawiły możliwości tworzenia. Egzystował dzięki ofiarności społecznej. W pierwszych miesiącach drugiej wojny światowej został wyrzucony z Hotelu Europejskiego, gdzie miał zapewnione utrzymanie. Zmarł w Szpitalu Dzieciątka Jezus 18 stycznia 1940 roku.

W drugiej i trzeciej serii *Poezji* wprowadził problemy znamienne dla epoki modernizmu, znalazła tu swoje odbicie filozofia Artura

Schopenhauera i Fryderyka Nietzschego, a także fascynacja filozofią indyjską. Był autorem śmiałych erotyków, a także wierszy poświęconych pięknu Tatr. Muzykę do jego utworów poetyckich komponowali m.in. Marian Karłowicz i Karol Szymanowski. Autor nowel *Na Skalnym Podhalu*, pisanych stylizowaną gwara podhalańską, powieści *Legenda Tatr* (1912), nieudanej artystycznie powieści historycznej *Koniec epopei*.

Born on 12th February 1865 in Ludzimierz, in the Nowy Targ district. His father - Adolf - took part in the November and January Uprisings, and was the speaker in the Nowy Dwór district parliament. In 1883 he moved to Kraków along with his family. He attended St. Anne's Grammar School, then in 1884 he commenced his studies at the Faculty of Philosophy at the Jagiellonian University, where he made friends with Lucian Rydel. Stanisław Estreicher and Ferdynand Hoesick. In

1888 he started to co-operate with "Tygodnik Ilustrowany", in 1889 with "Kurier Warszawski", and in 1893 with Kraków's "Czas". After he had published his second series of *Poezja* (Poetry) (1894) he took an active part in the literary life of Kraków, where he was the embodiment of a Young Poland poet. In 1895 he was in Heidelberg, where he worked as a personal secretary of Adam Krasiński. He travelled abroad, he visited Italy, Switzerland, France and Germany. In 1912, the twenty-fifth anniversary of the start of his literary career was celebrated in

Warsaw. At this time the first symptoms of mental illness appeared. During the First World War he was a supporter of Piłsudski's Legions, he was the initiator of The Committee for the Defence of Podhale and the chairman of The Committee for the Defence of the Southern Borderlands. After the war he lived in Kraków and Zakopane, until finally he settled down in the capital. In 1921 he became the chairman of The Society of Polish Writers and Journalists, then in 1934 he became an honorary member of the Polish Academy of Literature. The loss of sight and his deepening mental illness forced him to withdraw from social life and deprived him of the possibility to create. He existed thanks to social generosity. In the first months of the Second World War he was evicted from the Europeiski Hotel, where he had been granted board and lodging. He died on 18th January 1940 in the Hospital of the Infant Jesus.

In the second and third series of *Poezja* he introduced problems pertinent to the modernism period; the philosophies of Arthur Schopenhauer and Friedrich Nietzsche as well as his fascination with Indian philosophy found their reflection in

this poetry. He was the author of bold erotic poems and also of poems dedicated to the beauty of the Tatras. Marian Karlowicz and Karol Szymanowski, among others, composed music to his poetry. The author of: short stories, *Na skalnym Podhalu*, which were written in a stylised Podhale dialect, a novel *Legenda Tatr* ("Tale of the Tatras") (1912), and a historical novel *Koniec epopei*, which was an artistic failure


