

A NEW YEAR OF DISCIPLESHIP A DIOCESAN SYNOD TO BUILD THE CHURCH

As I write this article we are at the cusp of a new Church Year. New possibilities abound and I look with anticipation to see where our Lord will lead us in 2020. In

anticipation of the ways God will choose to use the talents of the people of the Eastern Diocese we have scheduled pre-synodal meetings during which we will learn of how the One Day Synod will be laid out. Those attending the pre-synodal meetings will also hear members of the diocesan committee on strategic planning speak of the work they have done over the past three years, the work of reviewing our parish website, Facebook pages and other uses of social media. They will also speak to the matrix that our parishes have been submitting to the committee the past five months. And finally we will address the sub-group formula that was a part of the last diocesan synod and how it will be used to set forth the short and long term goals to build and spiritually invigorate the Eastern Diocese.

The work of the pre-synodal meetings will be very important, so my prayer is that MANY of our faithful from every parish will pray for the gatherings, come and be a part of them and help develop what will be the most important aspect of our Synod next year in Fall River, MA.

Before we enter into this new year; before we think about the upcoming diocesan synod; before we think about the work that we will be called upon to do as parish families in the Polish National Catholic Church, and the work we will engage in as individual Christians in Christ's Church...it is important to ask the question why. Why do we do all this? What is the point of this concerted effort?

In the Office of Readings for the First Sunday of Advent we read the words of a catechetical instruction given us by Saint Cyril of Jerusalem (c.313-386) St. Cyril is regarded as a Father of the Church and his words tell us exactly why we engage in the Christian discipline and why we share that discipline with others.

"We do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, much more glorious than the first. The first coming was marked by patience; the second will bring the crown of a divine kingdom.

"In general, whatever relates to our Lord Jesus Christ has two aspects. There is a birth from God before the ages, and a birth from a virgin at the fullness of time. There is a hidden coming, like that of rain on fleece, and a coming before all eyes, still in the future. At the first coming he was wrapped in swaddling clothes in a manger. At his second coming he will be clothed in light as in a garment. In the first coming he endured the cross, despising the shame; in the second coming he will be in glory, escorted by an army of angels. We look then beyond the first coming and await the second. At the first coming we said: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. At the second we shall say it again; we shall go out with the angels to meet the Lord and cry out in adoration: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

"The Savior will not come to be judged again, but to judge those by whom he was judged. At his own judgment he was silent; then he will address those who committed the outrages against him when they crucified him and will remind them: You did these things, and I was silent.

"His first coming was to fulfill his plan of love, to teach men by gentle persuasion. This time, whether men like it or not, they will be subjects of his kingdom by necessity. The prophet Malachi speaks of the two comings. And the Lord whom you seek will come suddenly to his temple: that is one coming.

"Again he says of another coming: Look, the Lord almighty will come, and who will endure the day of his entry, or who will stand in his sight? Because he comes like a refiner's fire, a fuller's herb, and he will sit refining and cleansing.

"These two comings are also referred to by Paul in writing to Titus: The grace of God the Savior has appeared to all men, instructing us to put aside impiety and worldly desires and live temperately, uprightly, and religiously in this present age, waiting for the joyful hope, the appearance of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. Notice how he speaks of a first coming for which he gives thanks, and a second, the one we still await.

"That is why the faith we profess has been handed on to you in these words: He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

"Our Lord Jesus Christ will therefore come from heaven. He will come at the end of the world, in glory, at the last day. For there will be an end to this world, and the created world will be made new."


We are called to live our lives as preparing for the Coming of Christ. We are called to evangelize the world. Quoting from St. Cyril, "That is why the faith we profess has been handed on to you in these words..." This has been the purpose of the Church and its faithful since the beginning. We are not members of a social club. We are the Body of Christ called to build that Body by bringing people to the faith, one soul at a time.

I want to share with you the words with which I ended my article in the last issue of <u>The Messenger</u>:

"It is my desire that everyone in our diocese may be bold in facing the future. In the months ahead I will arrange, with our administrative seniors, meetings with every parish of our diocese. We will talk about the work of the Strategic Planning Committee established after the last diocesan synod. We will also speak to harnessing the various talents of our diocesan family to develop a plan aimed at growing the individual parishes, and thereby, the diocese. We have a marvelous opportunity before us to be the agents of evangelism and discipleship that can build and revitalize Christ's Church. I call upon all the brothers and sisters of our diocese to join me as we embark on this missionary path.

Whereas, we have again considered with renewed enthusiasm and rekindled creativity the Future Direction of our beloved Church by continuing to reflect upon the meaning of Growth with regard to its Membership, the continual need for Increased Spirituality and the value of Lifelong Learning for its members of all ages, the ongoing pursuit of personal holiness as the means of enabling joyful responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations, and the need to further enhance our Community Involvement and Presence;

We, therefore, resolve to fervently ask that God the Father, through the prayers of Our Lady of the Snows, may bring forth abundant fruit from the proceedings of this 25th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church, to seek grace and strength from our Lord Jesus Christ to embrace the work he has entrusted to our care, and to knock so that the Holy Spirit will open and inflame our hearts so that we may return to our parishes inspired to execute the work of this Synod, firm in our Catholic faith, anchored by hope and motivated by charity, unwaveringly committed as members of the Polish National Catholic Church, charged to boldly proclaim the Gospel at all times, in all places and to all people through our words, our actions and our lives of holiness, and more certain than ever that "With truth, work and struggle, we shall succeed!"

DISCIPLESHIP: 2019

PNCC FUTURE DIRECTION - ACTION PLAN FOR PNCC PARISHES BASED ON THE EFFORTS OF THE 24TH & 25TH PNCC GENERAL SYNODS

Develop and emphasize Discipleship through 2019: *Our purpose is to strengthen all members in their following of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Getting back to basics. Discipleship is who we are – all this flows from being a disciple of Jesus.* Please see the monthly Future Direction messages regarding this effort with concrete actions.

January – The Call to Discipleship "Follow Me"

Logo to be used during the entire year - Calling all to Discipleship <u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will have a deeper insight into the true nature of Discipleship, which will serve as the foundation for the rest of the year.

February – The Disciple: Teaching by Example (Living the Virtues in our lives) Series refresher on Catechism – Soup, Sandwich & Sermon (Presentation) or Wine and spirit presentation format – see below for more information

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will honestly reflect on themselves and come up with one way by which they can role model the life of Christian discipleship that month at home, at work, in school, etc.

March - The Disciple: Repentance and Overcoming Temptation

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: *Church members will develop a better understanding of what it really means to repent <u>and</u> have a practical strategy to engage this and overcome temptations when they come.*

April – The Disciple: Called to Serve (The Mandatum)

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will be inspired to choose one way to personally serve another person/other people within their everyday lives that month--at home, at work, in school, etc.

May - The Disciple: Living the example of our Blessed Mother - Saying Yes to God

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will be inspired to say Yes to God by a choice they make each week during this month choosing God's Will for them and not their own.

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June – Clergy Appreciation Weekend & Sacred Vocations Month

The Disciple: Living the Great Commission - Disciples making Disciples

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will better understand their own roles as promoters of Sacred Vocations and come up with one practical way for them to personally do that during the month of June.

July - No Vacation for the Disciple: Living God's Word

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will recognize that the life of discipleship is ongoing – even during the summer months – and they will be encouraged to continue regular Mass attendance on Sundays, even while away from home or during travel.

August – Let the Children Come to Me – Discipleship of and with our youth

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Adult Church members will take an opportunity to speak with a young member of the Church to acknowledge the dignity and value of their place within the Church and to help them discern how might God want them to live out their discipleship in the new school year.

September - Disciples - ambassadors of Love and Mercy

Series refresher on Gospels – Soup, Sandwich & Sermon – Wine & Cheese Gather – Book Club (Presentation)

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will genuinely live the two commandments of love and come up with a concrete way that they can show their love of God and neighbor during each week of this month.

October – The Cost of Discipleship

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will more fully understand that Christian discipleship means being willing to "take up our crosses" to follow Jesus and what this means in our every day lives.

November - The example of Saints and giving Thanks

Select Saints that have influenced folks in your parish and make a collage of them. Also, Time in quiet prayer and meditation in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will be more aware of the many gifts God has given them—especially those not typically acknowledged as such—and more clearly understand that the best way to express gratitude for them is to share them with others <u>OR</u> Church members will take the time to research the life of their patron Saint or another Saint as a means of being inspired in their own life of discipleship.

December – Fruits of Discipleship

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will reflect on their journey during the year and articulate two ways in which they have grown in their discipleship and two areas in which they still need to focus on with the help of the Holy Spirit.

Special Masses

Have at least two Special Masses and open them to the community. This would be in addition to our Sunday Mass. During Lent have a Mass for Healing and invite all those who are ill, hurting spiritually or emotionally to attend and spend time in prayer, to hear God's Word and receive Christ in the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Anointing. Use the Mass for Healing during Lent – this will be emailed to all clergy as a reminder at the beginning of Lent.

In the fall (November) have a Mass to Salute those who Serve - for your first responders/those in military service and Veterans. This Mass could be followed by a meal to honor those who serve/who have served. You could also have a Mass in time of tragedy when the need may arise in your community or our nation. These could be followed by a time of fellowship and food at the parish. Welcome the community to these Masses by promoting them in your local media and newspaper, as well as fliers and social media. Invite other local groups to join you for these Masses.

Create a Business Free Zone

For 10-15 minutes prior to the celebration of Holy Mass have a time where the pastor is unavailable for Church business and that no other things are being discussed but a focus on the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. This will bring an enhanced spirituality and reverence for the Eucharist to our parishes. Encourage use of the introductory pages of the Mass booklet – *especially page 8* as well as prayers from our Prayer Book preparing for Holy Mass and Confession.

Adult Continuing Education via a New Forum

Wine and Cheese Club or Soup, Sandwich and Sermon

In the spring have a series reviewing our Catechism - the teachings of our Church, and then in the Fall a series on reviewing the Gospels – specifically the teachings of Jesus. This can be done via the Soup, Sandwich and Sermon Concept, Wine and Cheese Gatherings concept (based on the Pub Theology: Beer, Conversation and God), using a Book Club format or even via online.

Social Media Presence

Short two minutes messages by various members speaking to our Year of Discipleship on YouTube. Continue to post monthly messages to our Facebook page and videos to YouTube and ask our members to share them. We hope more will be reached and encouraged to participate in these efforts. Parishes should have a presence of Social Media to promote their Special Masses and events. Consider streaming Holy Mass live on the internet and use these tools to promote the work of the parish. Pastors are also encouraged to record and share their Masses and Para Liturgical Services.

Two Days of Spiritual Retreat

Lent and one other (Advent) Pick a day during the seasons of Lent and one other time in 2019 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament; For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to the local community.

Complete at least six community service projects

It is important that the six projects be done in the local community of the parish so that these efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community.

Various options include but are not limited to: blood drives, a project to aid an assisted living facility, or other care facility i.e. nursing home, group home; volunteering for a special needs event; having a Mass or event for your local widow's group; aiding a family crisis center, food drives, serving a free meal for the community, providing a community breakfast/meal for First Responders – for Veterans; prayer blanket ministry, clothing drive for the community, sponsoring a local family in need, and/or responding to a particular need in the local community, etc.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE XV EASTERN DIOCESE SYNOD

OCTOBER 28-29, 2016

The XV Synod of Eastern Diocese convened October 28 -29, 2016 in Bristol, CT hosted by Holy Trinity Plantsville Ct by the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. The Synod began with Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Parish celebrated by Bishop Sobiechowski and concelebrated by the clergy of the Eastern Diocese. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Bishop Hodur by celebrating the Hodurian mass and receiving two presentations dedicated to the life and ideals of Bishop Hodur: the Convo2016 Video Presentation on the Life of Bishop Francis Hodur by the youth of the PNCC and the presentation on the life of Bishop Hodur by Prime Bishop Mikovsky and;

Whereas, we acknowledge the dedicated and ongoing work of the Future Direction Sub-Committee of the Supreme Council as they pursue the themes defined by the 14th General Synod: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations, and Community Involvement and Presence

Whereas, through the work of the Committee of Twenty and the small group discussions, the Synod body agreed to focus their attention on young adults between ages of 16 to 35 and to reach this audience through the following overarching goals:

- Increase awareness of our church through all social media outlets addressing
 - Our founding principles and beliefs
 - Bishop Hodur and his progressive ideas
 - The spiritual needs of these young adults
 - Provide clarity on our Catholic faith



A wonderful assortment of homemade baked goods donated by several parishioners and a large amount by Barbara By oreck and the Laska Family.





This event



is held each year to celebrate Polish Heritage and honor the Late General Casimir Pulaski. Father of the American Cavalry who was killed in the Battle of Savannah on

October 11, 1779. This observance was established in 1929 when Congress passed a resolution designating October 11th as General Pulaski Memorial Day.

Along with our Parish contingent from St. Valentine's, the Parade included many veterans groups, marching bands from Northampton High School, South Hadley High School and Hopkins Academy, the Marquis of Granby drum corps as well as the Windsor Fife and Drum Corps, Polish Societies and Foundations, Polish Center of Discovery and Learning and Polish School children from Indian Orchard, Massachusetts.

The program at Pulaski Park began with the Invocation by Fr. Paul Norman, Parochial Vicar of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church. The Parade Marshal, Wieslaw Olszak of Chicopee, was imprisoned for his work in the Solidarity Trade Union, a group that fought communist rule in Poland and then immigrated to the U.S. with his family; he was unable to attend as he had a family emergency in

Poland. His daughter, Iwona Poznansky accepted the parade marshal plaque on his behalf. Several public officials were present; proclamations were given by the Mayor of Northampton, David Narkewicz, and State Representative Jo Comerford. The keynote speaker was Ron Lech, Associate Director and President of the Board of Directors of the Polish Center of Discovery and Learning.



W tym okresie poznał Leszka Dunina Borkowskiego, Wincentego Pola, później Karola Szajnochę. W 1844 odwiedził Warszawę, gdzie poznał Kazimierza Władysława Wójcickiego, Paulinę Wilkońską, Łuszczewskich i Teofila Lenartowicza. Z Warszawy pojechał do Puław, następnie do

Czarnolasu i Zwolenia, gdzie odwiedził grób Jana Kochanowskiego. Brał udział w pracach konspiracyjnych. w 1847 wyjechał - przez Niemcy i Belgię - do Paryża. W Brukseli poznał Joachima Lelewela, w Paryżu Adama Mickiewicza, Józefa Bohdana Zaleskiego, Fryderyka Chopina, Juliusza Słowackiego. W Paryżu uczęszczał na wykłady Mickiewicza w Sorbonie i College de France, wziął udział w rewolucji lutowej. W 1848 powrócił do kraju, osiadł w powiecie złoczowskim. Kilkakrotnie wyjeżdżał za granicę, w 1860 unikając nadzoru władz przebywał w Jassach. W powstaniu styczniowym nie wziął czynnego udziału, należał do tajnej organizacji rewolucyjnej; w 1863 za zbiorek pt. *Do Moskali* wytoczono mu proces sądowy. W roku 1868 wyjeżdżał do Szwajcarii, Belgii, Włoch i Niemiec. W latach 1877-1878 poseł do Rady Państwa w Wiedniu, występował kilkakrotnie przeciwko konserwatywnemu stronnictwu stańczyków. Zmarł 19 września 1897.

Kornel Ujejski

Born on September 12, 1823 in Podolian Beremiany to a noble family. At first tutored at home, from 1831 he was educated in a Basilian school in Buczacz and later in Lwów. At that time he met Leszek Dunin Borkowski, Wincenty Pol and Karol Szajnocha. During his visit to Warsaw in 1844 he became acquainted with Kazimierz Władysław Wójcicki, Paulina Wilkońska, the Łuszczewski family and Teofil Lenartowicz. From Warsaw he headed for Puławy, then travelled to Czarnolas and Zwoleń, where he visited the tomb of Jan Kochanowski. He participated

in conspiratorial activities; in 1847 he went to Paris via Germany and Belgium. In Brussels he met Joachim Lelewel, in Paris – Adam Mickiewicz, Józef Bohdan Zaleski, Fryderyk Chopin and Juliusz Słowacki. In Paris Ujejski attended Mickiewicz's lectures at the Sorbonne and College de France; he also took part in the revolution of February 1848. Afterwards he returned to Poland and settled in the district of Złoczów. He went abroad several times; in 1860 avoiding the supervision of the authorities he stayed in Jassy. He did not take part in the January Uprising, but did belong to a secret revolutionary organisation. In 1863 he was brought to trial for publishing a collection entitled *Do Moskali* ("To the Muscovites"). In 1868 he travelled to Switzerland, Belgium, Italy and Germany. In the years 1877-1878 as a deputy to the State Council in Vienna, he repeatedly denounced the conservative "Stańczyk" faction. Ujejski died on September 19, 1897.


