

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUMMER READING

Oprah Winfrey has a book club and is one of the many celebrities that people look to for suggested summer reading as they lounge their vacations away.

I would like to jump into that mix and offer two authors of my own. Before you say, "The bishop's suggesting it, so it's going to be overly theological or downright boring," hear me out. I'll even cite a few examples.

This year two important subjects are being presented by the Church to its faithful. The one that you've hopefully heard a lot about is "Discipleship." The second, following the decision of the Supreme Council is "the Election of Bishop-candidates". Both subjects have a profound effect on the Polish National Catholic Church. I would like point our diocese in a historical direction that will have us consider both subjects, reflecting our work as disciples and guiding our prayers for the delegates that will gather in Scranton to elect this October.

So here are my two authors for your consideration: St. Ignatius of Antioch and St. Polycarp of Smyrna.

Depending on which tradition one chooses, Ignatius was either the second or third bishop of Antioch. Ignatius either followed Saint Peter or followed his successor.

Depending on sources he was also a disciple of St. Peter or St. Paul. Ignatius clearly has a great Christian pedigree.

He served as bishop at the end of the first century and the beginning of the second. He is considered one of the Apostolic Fathers (those who were disciples of the Apostles). Ignatius wrote seven letters that speak to "discipleship" and it should be remembered that the Church was growing by leaps and bounds at the time. He was also martyred for the faith in the Coliseum in Rome, a martyrdom that he desired and wrote about.

Ignatius' seven letters have much to say about discipleship and the relationship of the people to their bishop. For example, about discipleship: "Take heed, then, often to come together to give thanks to God, and show forth His praise. For when ye assemble frequently in the same place, the powers of Satan are destroyed, and the destruction at which he aims is prevented by the unity of your faith. Nothing is more precious than peace, by which all war, both in heaven and earth, is brought to an end." (Letter to the Ephesians, Ch. 13). And about the office of bishop: "Now it becomes you also not to treat your bishop too familiarly on account of his youth, but to yield him all reverence, having respect to the power of God the Father, as I have known even holy presbyters do, not judging rashly, from the manifest youthful appearance [of their bishop], but as being themselves prudent in God, submitting to him, or rather not to him, but to the Father of Jesus Christ, the bishop of us all. It is therefore fitting that you should, after no hypocritical fashion, obey [your bishop], in honour of Him who has wired us [so to do]..."(Letter to the Magnesians, Ch. 3 - Honour Your Youthful Bishop).

St. Polycarp, (69 - 155 A.D.) bishop of Smyrna, was a disciple of Saint John the Apostle and a friend of Saint Ignatius of Antioch. Polycarp is also an Apostolic Father of the Church who was a revered Christian leader and Ignatius' contemporary. Saint Polycarp was also martyred for his faith. His death was recorded in "the Martyrdom of Polycarp." This document, written about him, together with one surviving "Letter to the Philippians", is the extent of the early writings we have of this saint. But Polycarp, as Ignatius, spoke to discipleship and the episcopacy: "And let the presbyters be compassionate and merciful to all, bringing back those that wander, visiting all the sick, and not neglecting the widow, the orphan, or the poor, but always 'providing for that which is becoming in the sight of God and man; ' abstaining from all wrath, respect of persons, and unjust judgment; keeping far off from all covetousness, not quickly crediting [an evil report] against any one, not severe in judgment, as knowing that we are all under a debt of sin. If then we entreat the Lord to forgive us, we ought also ourselves to forgive; for we are before the eyes of our Lord and God, and 'we must all appear at the judgment-seat of Christ, and must every one give an account of himself.' Let us then serve Him in fear, and with all reverence, even as He Himself has commanded us, and as the apostles who preached the Gospel unto us, and the prophets who proclaimed beforehand the coming of the Lord [have alike taught us]. Let us be zealous in the pursuit of that which is good, keeping ourselves from causes of offence, from false brethren, and from those who in hypocrisy bear the name of the Lord, and draw away vain men into error." (Second Letter to the Philippians, Chapter 6).

I would commend to all our diocesan family the Seven Letters of St. Ignatius and the Letter of Polycarp to the Philippians and the "Martyrdom of Polycarp." They are all easily accessible through the internet, in the religious sections of major book stores, or even in your local libraries. Perhaps it won't be the "lightest" of reading, but it will certainly put into a better perspective the matters of "discipleship" and the election of bishop-candidates the Church faces this year.


May we all approach our role as Christian disciples as well as the prayerful responsibility we are charged with in preparation for the election of bishop-candidates. From Holy Scripture we read:

"He [God] saved us and called us to a holy life, not according to our works but according to his own design and the grace bestowed on us in Christ Jesus before time began, but now made manifest through the appearance of our Savior Christ Jesus, who destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel..."

"For this reason, I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God that you have through the imposition of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control. So do not be ashamed of your testimony to our Lord, nor of me, a prisoner for his sake; but bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God." Second Letter of St. Paul to Timothy, Chapter 1, verses 9 - 10 and 6 - 8



DISCIPLESHIP: 2019

PNCC FUTURE DIRECTION - ACTION PLAN FOR PNCC PARISHES BASED ON THE EFFORTS OF THE 24TH & 25TH PNCC GENERAL SYNODS

Develop and emphasize Discipleship through 2019: Our purpose is to strengthen all members in their following of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Getting back to basics. Discipleship is who we are – all this flows from being a disciple of Jesus. Please see the monthly Future Direction messages regarding this effort with concrete actions.

January – The Call to Discipleship "Follow Me"

Logo to be used during the entire year - Calling all to Discipleship

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will have a deeper insight into the true nature of Discipleship, which will serve as the foundation for the rest of the year.

February – The Disciple: Teaching by Example (Living the Virtues in our lives)

Series refresher on Catechism – Soup, Sandwich & Sermon (Presentation)

or Wine and spirit presentation format – see below for more information

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will honestly reflect on themselves and come up with one way by which they can role model the life of Christian discipleship that month at home, at work, in school, etc.

March – The Disciple: Repentance and Overcoming Temptation

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will develop a better understanding of what it really means to repent and have a practical strategy to engage this and overcome temptations when they come.

April – The Disciple: Called to Serve (The Mandatum)

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will be inspired to choose one way to personally serve another person/other people within their everyday lives that month--at home, at work, in school, etc.

May – The Disciple: Living the example of our Blessed Mother – Saying Yes to God

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will be inspired to say Yes to God by a choice they make each week during this month choosing God's Will for them and not their own.

June – Clergy Appreciation Weekend & Sacred Vocations Month

The Disciple: Living the Great Commission - Disciples making Disciples

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will better understand their own roles as promoters of Sacred Vocations and come up with one practical way for them to personally do that during the month of June.

July – No Vacation for the Disciple: Living God's Word

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will recognize that the life of discipleship is ongoing – even during the summer months – and they will be encouraged to continue regular Mass attendance on Sundays, even while away from home or during travel.

August – Let the Children Come to Me – Discipleship of and with our youth

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Adult Church members will take an opportunity to speak with a young member of the Church to acknowledge the dignity and value of their place within the Church and to help them discern how might God want them to live out their discipleship in the new school year.

September – Disciples – ambassadors of Love and Mercy

Series refresher on Gospels - Soup, Sandwich & Sermon - Wine & Cheese

Gather – Book Club (Presentation)

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will genuinely live the two commandments of love and come up with a concrete way that they can show their love of God and neighbor during each week of this month.

October – The Cost of Discipleship

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will more fully understand that Christian discipleship means being willing to "take up our crosses" to follow Jesus and what this means in our every day lives.

November – The example of Saints and giving Thanks

Select Saints that have influenced folks in your parish and make a collage of them.

Also, Time in quiet prayer and meditation in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will be more aware of the many gifts God has given them—especially those not typically acknowledged as such—and more clearly understand that the best way to express gratitude for them is to share them with others <u>OR</u> Church members will take the time to research the life of their patron Saint or another Saint as a means of being inspired in their own life of discipleship.

December – Fruits of Discipleship

<u>Projected Outcome</u>: Church members will reflect on their journey during the year and articulate two ways in which they have grown in their discipleship and two areas in which they still need to focus on with the help of the Holy Spirit.

Special Masses

Have at least two Special Masses and open them to the community. This would be in addition to our Sunday Mass. During Lent have a Mass for Healing and invite all those who are ill, hurting spiritually or emotionally to attend and spend time in prayer, to hear God's Word and receive Christ in the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Anointing. Use the Mass for Healing during Lent – this will be emailed to all clergy as a reminder at the beginning of Lent.

In the fall (November) have a Mass to Salute those who Serve - for your first responders/those in military service and Veterans. This Mass could be followed by a meal to honor those who serve/who have served. You could also have a Mass in time of tragedy when the need may arise in your community or our nation. These could be followed by a time of fellowship and food at the parish.

Welcome the community to these Masses by promoting them in your local media and newspaper, as well as fliers and social media. Invite other local groups to join you for these Masses.

Create a Business Free Zone

For 10-15 minutes prior to the celebration of Holy Mass have a time where the pastor is unavailable for Church business and that no other things are being discussed but a focus on the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. This will bring an enhanced spirituality and reverence for the Eucharist to our parishes. Encourage use of the introductory pages of the Mass booklet - especially page 8 as well as prayers from our Prayer Book preparing for Holy Mass and Confession.

Adult Continuing Education via a New Forum

Wine and Cheese Club or Soup, Sandwich and Sermon

In the spring have a series reviewing our Catechism - the teachings of our Church, and then in the Fall a series on reviewing the Gospels – specifically the teachings of Jesus. This can be done via the Soup, Sandwich and Sermon Concept, Wine and Cheese Gatherings concept (based on the Pub Theology: Beer, Conversation and God), using a Book Club format or even via online.

Social Media Presence

Short two minutes messages by various members speaking to our Year of Discipleship on YouTube. Continue to post monthly messages to our Facebook page and videos to YouTube and ask our members to share them. We hope more will be reached and encouraged to participate in these efforts. Parishes should have a presence of Social Media to promote their Special Masses and events. Consider streaming Holy Mass live on the internet and use these tools to promote the work of the parish. Pastors are also encouraged to record and share their Masses and Para Liturgical Services.

Two Days of Spiritual Retreat

Lent and one other (Advent) Pick a day during the seasons of Lent and one other time in 2019 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament; For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to the local community.

Complete at least six community service projects

It is important that the six projects be done in the local community of the parish so that these efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community.

Various options include but are not limited to: blood drives, a project to aid an assisted living facility, or other care facility i.e. nursing home, group home; volunteering for a special needs event; having a Mass or event for your local widow's group; aiding a family crisis center, food drives, serving a free meal for the community, providing a community breakfast/meal for First Responders – for Veterans; prayer blanket ministry, clothing drive for the community, sponsoring a local family in need, and/or responding to a particular need in the local community, etc.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE XV EASTERN DIOCESE SYNOD OCTOBER 28-29, 2016

The XV Synod of Eastern Diocese convened October 28 -29, 2016 in Bristol, CT hosted by Holy Trinity Plantsville Ct by the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. The Synod began with Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Parish celebrated by Bishop Sobiechowski and concelebrated by the clergy of the Eastern Diocese. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:


Whereas, we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Bishop Hodur by celebrating the Hodurian mass and receiving two presentations dedicated to the life and ideals of Bishop Hodur: the Convo 2016 Video Presentation on the Life of Bishop Francis Hodur by the youth of the PNCC and the presentation on the life of Bishop Hodur by Prime Bishop Mikovsky and;

Whereas, we acknowledge the dedicated and ongoing work of the Future Direction Sub-Committee of the Supreme Council as they pursue the themes defined by the 14th General Synod: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations, and Community Involvement and Presence

Whereas, through the work of the Committee of Twenty and the small group discussions, the Synod body agreed to focus their attention on young adults between ages of 16 to 35 and to reach this audience through the following overarching goals:

- Increase awareness of our church through all social media outlets addressing
 - Our founding principles and beliefs
 - Bishop Hodur and his progressive ideas
 - The spiritual needs of these young adults
 - Provide clarity on our Catholic faith


Two Wine and Cheese Faith Conversations were held at the parish on February 28th and May 23rd following the 2019 Future Direction Action Plan. They were wonderful,



Our Ecumenical Spirit

Our Saviour's Parish takes part in the Ecumenical Services led every year in Woonsocket during Lent. There are usually 5-6 different Christian Churches involved. The people in the area have the opportunity to go and participate in various liturgical services. This year Our Saviour's led the Ecumenical Lenten Service on Wednesday, April 3. Over 80 people joined us that night. Collection was taken for the **New Beginnings**, a local soup kitchen in Woonsocket. We collected over \$200. A free supper followed the service.

'Forty Days - Forty Items' project.

This year during Lent our parish held 'Forty Days - Forty Items' project. On Ash Wednesday and on the first Sunday of Lent the trash bags, with the guideline, were distributed to the parishioners. The idea is to

take one item from their house that they no longer wear or need (not broken of course) and put it in the trash bag. They could also add clothes, soaps, tooth paste, deodorants, towels, wash clothes, sheets, blankets, sleeping bags, mattresses. men's tents. air clothes (shoes, new underwear and socks. At the end of Lent they brought their bags to church (Sunday following Easter). This year (2019) we collected 46 bags. The collection will brought to St. James Episcopal Church which



distributes these items to the poor and needy in Woonsocket.

SOCL

The children once a month participate in a special children's Mass. They read the


Readings, Prayer of the faithful, collect the money and provide lively music for the Mass.




Tri-State Firefighters meet








Holy Cross Parish, Ware, MA

CELEBRATION OF POLISH CONSTITUTION DAY



Northampton's Polish Heritage Committee in conjunction with St. Valentine's Polish National Catholic Church observed Polish Constitution Day on **Friday May 3, 2019** at **6:00 pm** by the celebration of a bilingual Holy Mass at St. Valentine's Church. Following the Holy Mass all were invited to the Parish Hall for the PowerPoint presentation on the Polish Constitution and her similarities with the US Constitution made by Fr. Adam Czarnecki. After the presentation approximately fifty individuals enjoy a fellowship and light refreshments.

On May 3, 1791, Poland became the second state, after only the United States, to adopt a comprehensive written constitution for the purpose of defining the structure of government. Unfortunately, the Polish Constitution was never fully implemented, because its promises of reform caused Russia, Austria and Prussia

to complete their plans for the final partition of Poland.

The writers of May 3 Constitution found inspiration from the text and philosophy of the Constitution that the United States had adopted less than four years earlier.

First similarity we find in the origins of the authority in the country. First words of the US Constitution "We the People of the United States" states that all the authority comes from the people. Same Article V of May 3 Constitution "Wszelka władza społeczności ludzkiej początek swój bierze z woli narodu." ("All authority in human society takes its origin in the will of the people.")

The similarity is evident in the preambles of these respective documents. In its preamble, the Constitution of the United States lists six goals for the new American government. At least three of these are repeated in the Polish Constitution. Both documents recognize a need to promote the general welfare. The United States Constitution looks for government to "provide for the common defense", Poland's charter similarly strives "for the preservation of our country and its borders."

While the founding fathers of the United States sought to "secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity", the authors of the May 3 Constitution stated their desire "to merit the blessings and gratitude of contemporary and future generations... for the establishment of liberty."

US Constitution in its first three articles describes three branches of government: the legislative, the executive and the judicial. Article V of the Polish Constitution states "that the integrity of the states, civil liberty, and social order remain forever in equal balance," the government of the Polish nation shall consist of three branches: the legislative, the executive, and the judicial. These three branches of government are described in the next three articles of the Constitution.

Also both constitutions describe similar construction of the legislative branch of government - Congress of the United States, which consist of a Senate and House of Representatives and Polish Sejm (Polish parliament) "divided into two chambers: a chamber of deputies, and a chamber of senators."

very hard for St. Valentine's Church. May they all rest in peace.



National Events- From the Ecumenical Field......

2019 Union of Scranton Convocation for Restoration and Renewal of the Undivided Church: Through a renewed Catholicity

St. Stanislaus Bishop and Martyr Cathedral - Scranton, Pennsylvania April 24-26, 2019



The Union of Scranton (the Polish National Catholic Church and the Nordic Catholic Church) hosted a second Convocation for Restoration and Renewal of the Undivided Church: Through a renewed Catholicity. This gathering built upon the foundations laid at the first Convocation held in Dublin, Ireland in March of 2018.

The purpose of this gathering was to invite selected bishops, mostly from Anglo Catholic Churches in the United States, Canada and Africa, to discuss the preservation and the strengthening of ecumenical catholicity within non-papal aligned traditions. Confronted with the present crisis of faith, the desired goal is to create the foundation blocks for a united witness so that the doctrinal and historical coherence can be saved for the future. It is our conviction that Old Catholicism, based on "The undivided faith of the first millennium", stands out as the best platform to address not only the crisis of faith but also the present challenges from aggressive secularism and militant Islam. The Convocation moved forward to recapture the structure, unity and communion of the Church as found in the Church of the first thousand years.

In this call to restoration and catholicity, possible paths for such a restoration were examined with the following presentations given in this order:

Prime Bishop Anthony Mikovsky of the Polish National Catholic Church: Ecclesiology of the Union of Scranton


Very Rev. Geoffrey Neal (Vicar General of the Nordic Catholic Administration in the United Kingdom): Holy Orders and Apostolic Succession

Very Rev. Robert M. Nemkovich Jr. of the Polish National Catholic Church moderated a discussion on proposed additions to the document "Requirements for Communion with the Polish National Catholic Church" from the Post Dublin Collaborative working group on Catholic Essentials for Unity



Twenty-five participated in this Convocation from the PNCC, Nordic Catholic Church, Missionary Diocese of All Saints, Diocese of the Holy Cross, Anglican Province of America, Diocese of Dunwka (Anglican Communion Africa), ACNA, Anglican Union and the TAC. After the presentations, time was spent in small break out groups to discuss the papers and find consensus to move forward towards a renewed catholicity. The formal papers presented can be found on the Union of Scranton Website: TheUnionofScranton.org







A Convocation Prayer adapted by Very Rev. Geoffrey Neal from William Laud was offered during Morning and Evening Prayer:

Gracious Father, we humbly beseech Thee for Thy Holy Catholic Church;

fill it with all truth, in all truth with all peace. Where it is corrupt, purge it; where it is in error, direct it,

where it is superstitious, rectify it; where anything is amiss, reform it;

where it is right, strengthen and confirm it; where it is in want, furnish it;

where it is divided and rent asunder, make up the breaches of it,

O thou Holy One of Israel, for the sake of our Saviour Jesus Christ.











The Convocation concluded with the Holy Sacrifice of Mass celebrated by Prime Bishop Anthony Mikovsky of the Polish National Catholic Church and Bishop Paul Hewett of the Diocese of the Holy Cross offered an inspiring homily.

We are scheduling a third convocation in the spring of 2020.

2019 Union of Scranton Convocation For Restoration and Renewal of the Undivided Church Through a renewed Catholicity

What brings us together?

Following our initial Convocation in Dublin, Ireland in March of 2018, leaders from the Polish National Catholic Church, the Nordic Catholic Church, Federation of Anglican Churches in America, Anglican Province of America, Missionary Diocese of All Saints, Anglican Church in America, Traditional Anglican Church, Anglican Catholic Church of Canada, Anglican Union along with observers from ecclesial bodies in Sweden and Canada met again in Scranton Pennsylvania at Saint Stanislaus Bishop and Martyr Cathedral from 24th to 26th April, drawn by a common urgency to present the message of God's liberating grace and hope for this world as expressed through the historic catholic faith.

The leaders present declared in their time of prayer, study and dialogue that they share the conviction that the Holy Spirit has brought these leaders together following as agreed in the statement of the 2018 Dublin Convocation Statement on Missional and Ecclesial Fellowship which states that: we are called "to seek ecumenical catholicity, the fellowship in Christ we share and the Standards of Faith that we each cherish and safeguard among us, we pledge....

- 1) Mutual Participation in Synods and Conferences where possible
- 2) Mutual dialogue, study and implementation of common missional objectives
- Exploring possibilities of ministry partnerships where possible.
- 4) To foster growing fellowship and commitment to find a path for a renewed ecclesial community based in principles of ecumenical catholicity

In these pledges, we jointly established working groups on catholic identity and sacramental expression of that identity. We rejoice in receiving recommendations from those two working groups which have challenged us to consider fresh and new ways in which our fellowship can with trust and confidence work together in realizing a closer fellowship leading to the full visible unity of the Church and to make manifest the growth in communion which we are committed to.

What took place?

Experiencing a deep sense of our commonality in the time we have spent together we received testimony from Rev. Geoffrey Neal, Vicar General on the ecclesiastical experience of the oratories in England becoming part of the Union of Scranton through the ministry and oversight of Bishop Roald Flemestad of the Nordic Catholic Church.

Prime Bishop Anthony Mikovsky further affirmed the praxis of this experience in his discourse on the practical ecclesiological principles for application in the forming of the Union of Scranton.

Both of these presentations were followed up by three response groups who agreed in principle that the review of how the Union of Scranton has been lived into in practice offered some fresh

perspectives of seeing one another and offers the potential for a new dynamic in our interrelationships, helping us to find undiscovered fruit in what has already been done before. This will enable us to address fully the various questions among us requiring additional clarification on matters such as Holy Orders, Jurisdictional transfers and polity.

We have found that the method of discussion focused on seeking a consensus proves to be a fruitful means of overcoming misunderstandings both in Dublin and again in our gathering in Scranton.

It is a conciliar model that we seek to embrace to deal with past, present and future complexities. Respecting differing perspectives, we hope to arrive at models for a new expression of catholic communion.

What we seek together

Our churches face similar challenges in communicating the Gospel in an increasingly hostile secular world where the catholic faith is increasingly marginalized. There is a challenge for us who have received the faith once delivered to the saints to witness to God's profound grace in a pattern of unity that is rarely seen in church traditions.

Our proclamation of the faith, our traditions and teachings need to be communicated in a way which better reaches people today while safeguarding the eternal truths without compromise. Such an effort requires careful cooperation, study, dialogue and application, which we are committed to in this coming year to lay the foundation for an emerging conciliar catholicity for the 21st Century.

As we prayed together during these days, it became clear for the need to go forward affirming our common biblical, sacramental, creedal and ecclesial heritage, seeking pathways for a more visible common witness in worship and service in our journeying together.

Next Steps

We will continue to collaborate with the working groups to continue the momentum generated by our gatherings to move toward a common life and a common catholic witness. We shall gather again in Convocation to consider the reports of the working groups and how to best implement the recommendations.

Conclusion

We thank God for the opportunity to experience this holy fellowship. We are grateful for the generous hospitality offered to us by the PNCC during our time in Scranton which has enabled us to move forward together on our journey, inspired and energized to bring renewed ecumenical catholic witness to the world. May the Holy Spirit bring to completion the work God has begun.





Piotr Sommer

Piotr Sommer, born in Walbrzych in April 13, 1948, is one of the most important Polish lyricists of the younger generation. Poet, essayist, translator from English, and chief editor of the acclaimed literary magazine "Literatura na Swiecie" (Literatur in the World). Since 1977, Piotr Sommer has published 12 volumes of poetry and 5 volumes of essays as well as translations into Polish of works by Frank O'Hara, Charles Reznikoff, John Ashbery, Robert Lowell, Allen

Ginsberg, Seamus Heaney, D.J. Enright and Michael Longley for example. Since the eighties, Piotr Sommer has taught regularly at American and British universities. He has been awarded several important prizes for literature and translation.

Piotr Sommer urodził się w Wałbrzychu 13 kwietnia 1948 r., Jest jednym z najważniejszych polskich liryków młodego pokolenia. Poeta, eseista, tłumacz z języka angielskiego, redaktor naczelny znanego pisma literackiego "Literatura na Świecie". Chciałbym się oblec w grubą skórę świata, chciałbym być cierpki, ale w sumie smaczny połyka mnie z niechęcią jakieś dziecko a ja pomagam mu na katar.

Gdzie jesteśmy? W ironiach których nikt nie chwyci, krótkotrwałych i nieakcentowanych, w trywialnych pointach które kwitują metafizykę niedorzecznym detalem, w piątku, co wypada na piatego listopada, w mnemotechnice dni. Można dać przykład i można to przyjąć na wiarę, kocią łapę na gardle.

I lubi się jeszcze pewne słowa i te, za przeproszeniem, składnie, które udają, że coś je z sobą łączy. W tych międzysensach zawiera się cały człowiek, włazi tam, gdzie widzi trochę miejsca.

Medicine 1981-1982

I saw a real lemon again. Ania brought it back from France. She'd been wondering: come home or stay abroad? And come to think of it, what keeps her here a few faces, a few words, this anxiety? The lemon was yellow, it looked like the real thing. You didn't have to put it in the window to ripen alongside our pale tomatoes. Or as we ourselves ripen growing up and growing yellow over years. No. it was already entirely itself when she brought it, not even yellow, but gold, and a little rough, so I took it gratefully.

I want to wrap myself in the thick skin of the world, I want to be tart, but good-tastingsome child swallows me reluctantly and I help to cure his cold.

Indiscretions

Where are we? In ironies so fleeting and unstressed that no one gets them, in foolish punch lines that buy off metaphysics with ridiculous details, in Friday, which falls on November fifth, in the mnemonics of days. You can give an example, or take it for granted, or take it or leave it, or take it and run.

And you still like certain words and those, pardon the expression, sorts of syntax that act like something's holding them together. Man is wholly held within those intermeanings, he creeps in wherever he can see a space.
