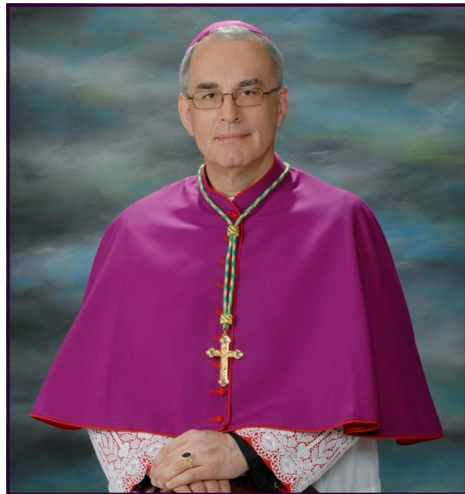
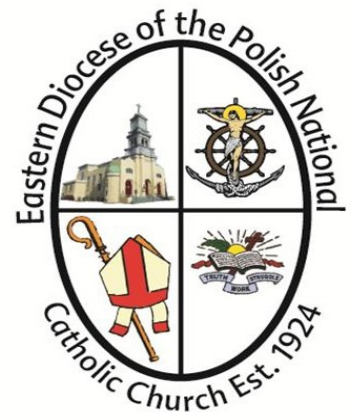

THE HOLY EUCHARIST SHOULD BE THE CENTER OF YOUR SUMMER

"Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For on him the Father, God, has set his seal..."

"Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst.'"

John 6:27, 35, NAB

Summer is beginning, and our thoughts are going in many directions, trying to determine how we best spend the measured days of warm weather.

I would propose that the Holy Eucharist should top everyone's "to do" list every day of Summer. It makes sense that Holy Mass and Communion be first, because God's direction and the love of Christ, manifested in His Body and Blood, will both ground us every day and will give us direction as to how we interact and share with others during these Summer days.

We need the focus that the Holy Eucharist provides. In fact, I would argue that if we planned on taking part in Holy Eucharist with the same energy as we plan our vacations or our one- and two- day getaways, then the vacation days, the days around the house, every day would be a celebration of life, God's life in us and our lives reaching out to others.

New Englanders love being outdoors. They love sharing in the beauty of nature, of creation. Understanding and acknowledging God, Who, after all, created all that we see and share in, can only enhance our experiences of the world. I can assure you that temptation and secularism will be at our heels each day we're in sandals. Society does all it can to distract humanity from our Lord and, unfortunately, it's been successful with the majority of people.

The things that draw us in the material world are fleeting and temporary at best. The Body and Blood of Christ and the Love the

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Eucharist represents is eternal and the peace and tranquility of our souls is dependent on God's presence, daily, in our lives.

In the magazine *One Bread, One Body* we find the following written for Sunday, June 18, the Solemnity of Corpus Christi:

"The man who feeds on My flesh and drinks My blood remains in Me, and I in him." —John 6:56

"This book, ***One Bread, One Body***, is written to motivate you to go to Mass daily or as often as possible. ...Our prayer is that you would live the Mass and make our Eucharistic Lord the center of your life.

"Jesus proclaimed: 'The bread I will give is My flesh, for the life of the world' (Jn 6:51). This is a hard saying, and 'the Jews quarreled among themselves' about it (Jn 6:52). 'Thereupon Jesus said to them: 'Let Me solemnly assure you, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you. He who feeds on My flesh and drinks My blood has life eternal and I will raise him up on the last day. For My flesh is real food and My blood real drink' (Jn 6:53-55). The Lord has made it very clear that "in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Eucharist 'the Body and Blood, together with the soul and divinity, of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore, the whole Christ is truly, really, and substantially contained'.

"If we don't believe the Eucharist is the Body and Blood of Jesus, Who is God, then we shouldn't trust the Church, which has always taught this. If we don't trust the Church, we have little reason to believe the Bible, for the Bible was compiled, established, and interpreted by the Church. If we don't believe in the Eucharist, the Church, and her Bible, then we have no objective basis for believing in Christianity. We then exist in a subjective, new-age confusion or in the empty hopelessness of agnosticism. Instead, we must believe that the Eucharist is the Body and Blood of God."

Hopelessness is not something any person wants to experience and the writer minces no words in saying that "we must believe" in the Eucharist. Christ Jesus gives us reason to overcome "subjective new-age confusion." Keeping our relationship with God as our primary goal, we grow in faith and reject "the hopelessness of agnosticism." Clearly the absence of God means the absence of hope.

So let's spend this Summer rededicating ourselves to our Catholic faith, centered in the Holy Mass. Let Faith, Church, and Holy Communion have first place in our daily "to do" list. God will bless you for it.

FUTURE DIRECTION SUBCOMMITTEE OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL POLISH NATIONAL CATHOLIC CHURCH

Action Plan for 2017- A YEAR OF COMMITMENT

1. Greater Understanding of Church Solemnities: In 2017 we will focus on the Solemnity of the Institution of the Polish National Catholic Church. This will be celebrated on March 12, 2017. A pamphlet will be prepared and distributed – this will complete the series of pamphlets for our four special PNCC Solemnities. Also, an online presentation will be led by our Prime Bishop on the History of our PNCC and Bishop Francis Hodur. A community service project could be tied into this effort as well.

2. Two Days of Retreat: Lent and Advent Pick a day during the seasons of Lent (March 11 in Woonsocket) and Advent in 2017 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to local community.

3. Complete at least four community service projects: One service project could be in conjunction with the Institution of the PNCC in March of 2017 and the others, selected by the local parish. It is important that these three projects be done in the local community of the parish so that these efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community. Various options include but are not limited to: Food Drives, serving a free meal for the community, providing a community breakfast/meal for First Responders – for Veterans, prayer blanket ministry, clothing drive for the community, sponsoring a local family in need, responding to a particular need in the local community, etc.

4. Implementing the Commitment Component: Develop and emphasize this theme through 2017. Please see the monthly Future Direction emails regarding this effort.

January – Our Spiritual Commitment to Christ and His Church

February – Our Financial Commitment and Stewardship

March – Commitment to our PNCC

April – Our Commitment as Easter People

May – A Commitment to guidance of the Holy Spirit

June – *Sacred Vocations Month*– A Commitment to Sacred Vocations
(*Encourage our men to consider the ordained ministry*)

July - Commitment to constant prayer

August – Commitment to our Youth

September – Our Commitment to Living a life of Love

October – *Clergy Appreciation Month* - Our Commitment to Faith and Family

November – Our Commitment to living Thankful lives

5. Stewardship component to increase our financial commitment to our parishes, diocese and national church will be developed. A Pamphlet will be shared with all parishes. We then encourage parish committees to communicate this with the people and stress to them that stewardship is an integral part of a lived faith.

6. Implement Lay Ministry Program in PNCC: Our national and diocesan Lay Ministry chaplains begin to implement this program across our PNCC that will enhance, encourage and strengthen the role of the laity within our PNCC.

7. Continuing Adult Education from the diocesan synod surveys many are asking for more adult education. The parish can purchase copies of ***“An Abridged History of the PNCC”*** and this book be used for a discussion series for all parishioners as we focus on the Institution of the PNCC in 2017. Other educational opportunities added to this this can be: a parish Bible Study, the Alpha Program, a Lecture series on Church teachings, etc., led by the local pastor.

8. Utilize Social Media & PNCC Future Direction You Tube Channel: Various spiritual messaging from our Prime Bishop and Bishops to be continued throughout the year. We encourage parishes to keep up to date their websites and Facebook pages. Social Media is the mode of communication most used by our younger members.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE XV EASTERN DIOCESE SYNOD

OCTOBER 28-29, 2016

The XV Synod of Eastern Diocese convened October 28 -29, 2016 in Bristol, CT hosted by Holy Trinity Plantsville Ct by the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. The Synod began with Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Parish celebrated by Bishop Sobiechowski and concelebrated by the clergy of the Eastern Diocese. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Bishop Hodur by celebrating the Hodurian mass and receiving two presentations dedicated to the life and ideals of Bishop Hodur: the Convo2016 Video Presentation on the Life of Bishop Francis Hodur by the youth of the PNCC and the presentation on the life of Bishop Hodur by Prime Bishop Mikovsky and;

Whereas, we acknowledge the dedicated and ongoing work of the Future Direction Sub-Committee of the Supreme Council as they pursue the themes defined by the 14th General Synod: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations, and Community Involvement and Presence

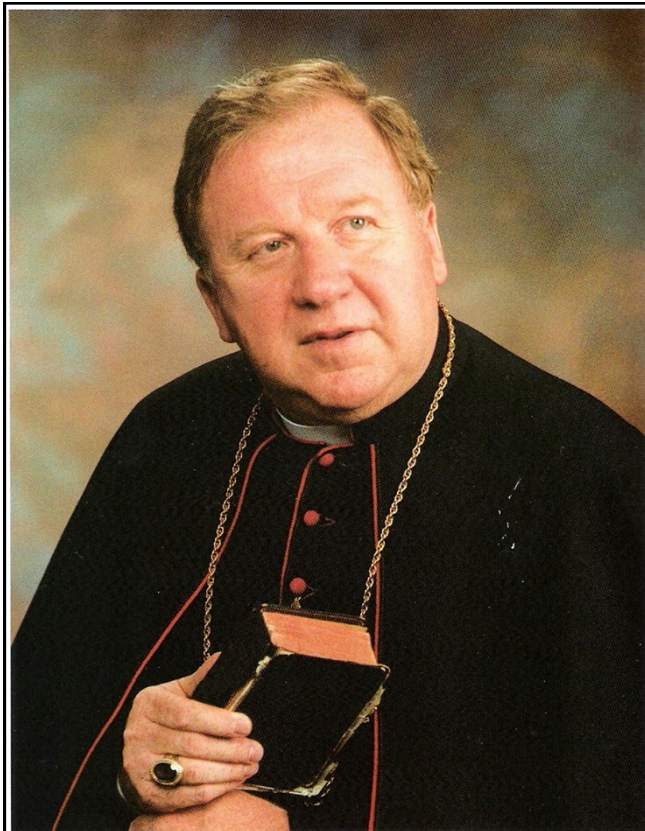
Whereas, through the work of the Committee of Twenty and the small group discussions, the Synod body agreed to focus their attention on young adults between ages of 16 to 35 and to reach this audience through the following overarching goals:

- Increase awareness of our church through all social media outlets addressing
 - Our founding principles and beliefs
 - Bishop Hodur and his progressive ideas
 - The spiritual needs of these young adults
 - Provide clarity on our Catholic faith

+Bishop Thomas Gnat

Bishop Thomas Gnat served the Eastern Diocese as Bishop Ordinary and pastor of Holy Trinity Cathedral for thirty-three years. Another way of understanding this is that Bishop Gnat served the diocese longer than any other Ordinary and he served the Cathedral as its pastor for one-third of its existence. Another way would be that three generations of Eastern Diocese Polish National Catholics were guided by the good bishop. The effect of his life and his episcopacy will continue in the many souls he touched.

" The diocese hosted many synods, both national and diocesan under his jurisdiction. Many national and diocesan gatherings of our Church societies took place under his pastoral care. Bishop Thomas also continued the many youth oriented programs of our diocese and hosted, as bishop ordinary, many national youth convocations of the Church. The cathedral complex was expanded and developed under his pastorate. So many individuals were Baptized, Confirmed, Married, Ordained, Anointed, Forgiven, and heard the Word of God Proclaimed by Bishop Thomas. For me to try to summarize how he touched all of you, who were indeed affected by Bishop Gnat and his episcopacy would necessarily fall short of giving due honor to this man who served and loved so well.



"We share with you the obituary that was prepared by his family and presents the man they would like everyone to remember. encourage you to reflect on your own memories and share them with one another, thus building a more complete picture of this many faceted bishop of the Church that we remember so well. His example continues to guide me in my ministry as your bishop today."

Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Gnat Obituary

Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Gnat, Dunmore, retired Bishop of the Polish National Catholic Church, died Wednesday at Geisinger Mt. View Care Center. He and his wife, the former Katherine Stanczyk, celebrated their 53rd wedding anniversary April 4, 2017. Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, he was the son of the late Walenty and Rose Radecki Gnat.

He completed his studies for the priesthood at the Savonarola Seminary in Scranton, Pa., and was ordained a priest of the Polish National Catholic Church on Sept. 18, 1958, by the late Prime Bishop Leon Grochowski in historic St. Stanislaus Cathedral in Scranton.

From September 1958 to 1959, Father Gnat was assistant pastor at St. Stanislaus Cathedral. In February 1959, Father Gnat was assigned as pastor of St. Francis PNC Parish in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C., and for a time served as administrator of Holy Cross PNC Parish in Baltimore, Md. During his pastorate in Washington, D.C., Father Gnat represented the Polish National Catholic Church in many instances. He assisted at the laying of a wreath on Woodrow Wilson's tomb and a wreath at the bier of the Ambassador to America at the Polish Embassy in Washington.

He also attended the Installation of the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. Father Gnat also represented the Church and the official newspaper of the Church (Rola Boza) at the State Department meeting on foreign policy for non-governmental organizations and at the White House Conference of Civil Rights. He was also a representative on the National Council of Churches, participating in June 1970 during its general board meeting. While in Washington, he studied at the American University.

In 1978, Father was appointed a senior priest, and also in 1978 at the General Synod of the PNCC, he was elected a bishop of the church and consecrated a bishop in St. Stanislaus Cathedral, Scranton, by the late Prime Bishop Francis Rowinski on the Feast of St. Andrew on Nov. 30, 1978.

Upon consecration, he became Diocesan bishop of the Eastern Diocese, comprised of parishes in New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island, and also named as pastor of Holy Trinity Cathedral, Manchester, N.H. Bishop Gnat continued in this position from Nov. 30, 1978, until Nov. 2011, at which time he retired, and he and his family moved to Dunmore, Pa. Until his illness and medical problems started in 2016, Bishop Gnat and his wife attended as many high school plays, community theater productions and religious concerts as they could, enjoying the excellent talents in Pennsylvania. They also did a lot of sightseeing, going to Williamsport, Pa., a ride on the Hiawatha, the Dorflinger Glass Museum, the Yuengling Brewery and a scenic boat ride around Lake Wallenpaupack, to name a few.

Bishop Gnat was active in many of the Polish National Catholic Commissions, such as the liturgical, Bishop Hodur Biography and the School of Christian Living. He was chaplain of the National United Choirs, a position he held for many years, and a member of the Hymnal Commission. He was well known for his love of music and singing.

Bishop Gnat was well-respected for his knowledge of the constitution and by-laws of the Polish National Catholic Church and was called upon many times to interpret these laws. During the synods of the PNCC, Bishop Gnat was asked to conduct the synod sessions, especially those having to do with the constitution of the PNCC.

Also surviving are one son, Joseph Walenty Gnat, Dunmore; one brother, Carl Gnat and wife, Sheila, Fort Myers, Fla.; one sister, Geraldine Gnat, Redwood City, Calif.; numerous nieces and nephews. He was also preceded in death by three infants, a daughter and twins, a daughter and son.

Thank you to Dr. Salvatore Lawrence for his care and concern and his patience.

Thank you to the staff at Geisinger Mountain Care Center, especially B corridor, for their professionalism, care and genuine compassion.

Thank you also to PA Ambulance for driving carefully to avoid those potholes in the road and for being so nice. You know who you are.

Thank you to his sister-in-law and husband, nieces, friends and clergy who visited him in the nursing home and hospital and to those who sent countless cards and prayers for his recovery.

Mass will be celebrated Tuesday, June 27, in St. Stanislaus Polish National Catholic Cathedral at 10 p.m.

A vesper service will be held Monday at 7 p.m. at the Cathedral. Interment, parish cemetery.

Friends and family may call Monday, 5 to 7 and Tuesday, 9 a.m. until time of Mass.

Memorial contributions may be made to the Clergy Pension Fund.

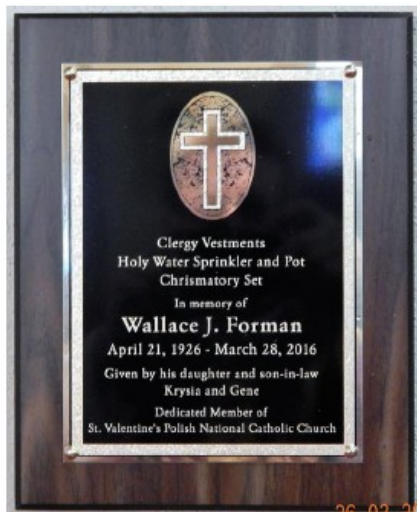
There were about twenty five people in attendance coming from Northampton, Easthampton, Hadley, Greenfield, Hatfield and

THE AMBRY



As a Catholic Church we are a Sacramental Church where sacramental signs and symbols are very important. Among these signs are Holy Oils, which are not only a sings of the Holy Sacraments but are also Holy intrinsically because they are consecrated by our Bishops during the Holy Mass of Chrism. The Holy Oils are used at key moments in the sacramental life of the Church: baptism, confirmation, ordination and anointing of the sick, and also in the very important ceremonies as dedication of Church and consecration of altars and some of liturgical vessels. That is why the ambry is



such a welcome addition to our worship space. Having the Holy Oils visible helps remind us of these sacred moments and of the Parish's link with her Bishop.

In the beginning of this year it was decided that in memory of Wallace J. Forman amongst other paraments beautiful crystal Holy Oils vessels would be donated. Will be not fair to keep them with Holy Oils hidden in some place in the sacristy. I decided to make an ambry for our Church. The ambry is made mostly of oak with plexiglass door and windows. Also is designed with a light top and a glass bottom so that the light would shine on the Oils. **The ambry is donated by Fr. Adam and Danuta Czarnecki in memory of their father Witold Czarnecki who passed away August 10, 2014.** On Maundy Thursday, April 13, 2017 the ambry was blessed just before the reception of Holy Oils consecrated on Holy Tuesday by our Bishop Paul at Holy Mass of Chrism.

The Polish Exile from the November Uprising 1830-1831

On April 24th, a marvelous spring day a group of people interested in Polish and Polish American history gathered at Bridge Street Cemetery in Northampton to remember the life of **August Antoni Malczewski** vel **Jakubowski** a young Polish nobleman who died on this date 180 years ago at the young age of 21.

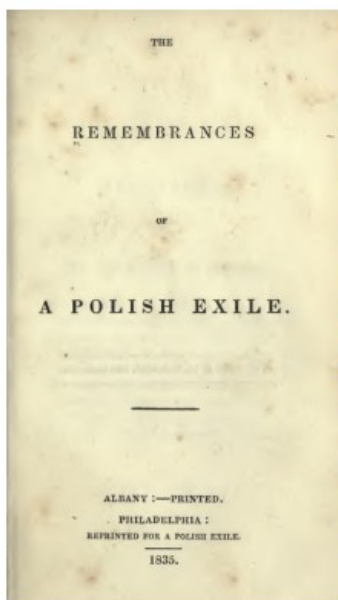
He was the natural son of the romantic poet Antoni Malczewski famous for the narrative poem *Maria* (1825). He left his studies at the gymnasium at

Krzemieniec (Kremenets), in the Ukraine to join a group of revolutionaries in Warsaw in 1831. After the failed revolution in this Russian gubernia the leaders along with August were exiled to New York.

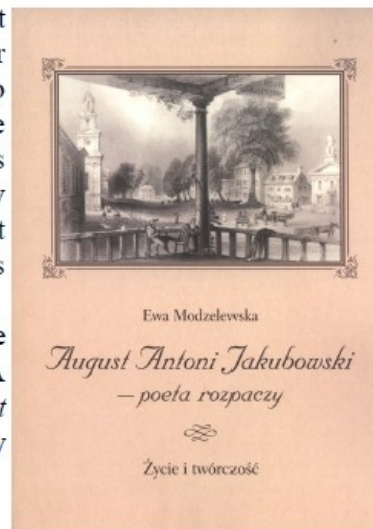
The exiles were met in New York city by an enthusiastic crowd who welcomed them as heroes or what we would call freedom fighters. The young August was taken into the home of Reverend William Buell Sprague. While there he learned English and wrote a book entitled *The Remembrances of a Polish Exile*. Then he learned that



his uncle General Konstanty Malczewski was fighting for Mexican independence. He journeyed there hoping to stay with his uncle. But he was rebuffed. Returning to the United States he began teaching French at Miss Dwight's Seminary for Young Ladies in our city. Probably suffering from tuberculosis of the spine he died a short time later. Being penniless he was buried in a pauper's grave with a fine gravestone purchased by his students.

His book *The Remembrances of a Polish Exile* is in the Hampshire Room at our local library (EJ21.A 1990). A brief description of his life and literary work titled *August Antoni Jakubowski - poeta rozpaczy. Życie i twórczość* by Ewa Modzelewska is also there (EJ21.M721.2015).

POLISH NATIONAL CONSTITUTION DAY OBSERVANCE

Northampton's Polish Heritage Committee in conjunction with St. Valentine's Church observed **Polish Constitution Day** on Wednesday May 3rd at 6:30 p.m. in the parish hall with a film screening of **"Europe's First Constitution"** by **Prof. Richard Butterwick-Pawlikowski***. Northampton and its neighboring communities were invited to attend this free event. Approximately thirty individuals attended. After the film presentation light refreshments were served.

Following is a little about the holiday...

The holiday celebrates the anniversary of the adoption of a Constitution for reform in 1791 to avert further foreign intervention and improve governing internal issues ensuring conditions for future reforms. Free elections, the first in Europe, and the elimination of the paralyzing liberum veto were parts of the document. Alarmed by its loss to neighbors Austria, Prussia, and Russia who simultaneously annexed territories in 1772, Poland adopted a unique Constitution, second only to that of America, and was the first in Europe allowing for freedoms and benefits which became threatening to the autocratic ruling royalty of Europe as they were witnessing rebellions and revolutions in Russia 1773, America in 1775, France and Netherlands in 1789. A second annexation took place in 1793 followed by a heroic 1794 Polish insurrection led by Gen. Tadeusz Kosciuszko which failed and led to the third annexation in 1795. Poland, a centuries old nation, now vanished from the map of Europe until reborn after World War I, some 119 years later.



***Short bio of Professor Richard Butterwick-Pawlikowski**

Professor Butterwick-Pawlikowski took up the European Civilization Chair on 1 August 2014. In his teaching and supervision at the College he aims to facilitate students' understanding of the history and civilization of all of Europe (east, west, north, south and centre). He acted as Director of Studies for the European Interdisciplinary Studies programme in the summer of 2015.

Richard studied History at the University of Cambridge where he graduated with first-class honours in 1989. Following a year at the Jagiellonian University in Kraków, he moved to the University of Oxford to study for his doctorate, which he was awarded in 1994. He then held a postdoctoral fellowship at Oxford, before becoming Lecturer in Modern European History at the Queen's University of Belfast in 1997. In 2005 he moved to the School of Slavonic and East European Studies at University College London, where in 2013 he became Professor of Polish-Lithuanian History. He is on leave from UCL in 2014-17, enabling him to hold the European Civilization Chair at Natolin. In 2016 he was awarded the degree of habilitated doctor by the Tadeusz Manteuffel History Institute of the Polish Academy of Sciences, with which he has long co-operated.

Polish National Catholic Church
Seventeenth Annual Mission & Evangelism Workshop
“Faith That Works: The Letter of St. James”

Hosted by Holy Cross Parish, Woodland Park, New Jersey

May 5-7, 2017

Polish National Catholic clergy and faithful from four dioceses gathered recently in **Woodland Park, New Jersey**, to participate in the PNCC's **Seventeenth Annual Mission Workshop**. All received a warm welcome from the **host pastor, Rev. Joseph Cyman**, and the **good people of Holy Cross Parish**. The **Very Rev. Gregory Młodzik**, a member of the Commission on Mission and Evangelism, opened the Workshop with **an introduction to the Letter of James**. With its emphasis on works, some theologians (notably Martin Luther) have not held it in high regard, insisting that one is justified by faith in Christ alone. On careful examination, however, one can see that James never implied that human efforts can earn salvation. The good works do not save us, rather, they give tangible evidence to a person's faith.

Rev. James Konicki continued the opening session with an **exegesis** (critical look) at this Biblical text. He stated that on its surface, James' letter has nothing to do with Mission and Evangelism! It is probably the oldest New Testament text, dating to 50 AD, so its content is very connected to what was happening in the early church. **Written to Jewish believers in Jesus** who were in exile because of persecution, it closely parallels the material in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount; and though it was written centuries ago, its message is applicable to the challenges we face today. James advises believers to “count it all joy” when trials come, approaching them with steadfast faith in Christ. God, in His wisdom, allows these difficulties in our lives to hone our faith, thereby giving us the opportunity to become mature believers. **Our faith becomes visible and illustrates our friendship with God, to a world that needs to know Him**. Father Konicki summarized the theme of James - **the call to a genuine practice of the faith**, to “get our house in order.” The fruit of living an authentic Christian life is what draws others to Jesus (mission and evangelism).

We took a break for dinner and fellowship, renewing old acquaintances and meeting new friends. Friday's activities concluded in the sanctuary with **Evening Prayer for the Feast of St. James and the Sacrament of Penance**, led by the **Bishop of the Central Diocese, Rt. Rev. Bernard Nowicki**. The readings and prayers helped us to examine our consciences and reflect on St. James' admonition to put our faith into practice.

We started on Saturday at 8:45 AM with **Morning Prayer, led by Very Rev. Gregory Młodzik**, and a **Votive Mass to Saints Philip and James, Apostles**, celebrated by Bishop Nowicki. **Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC**, was the homilist. He commented on the beauty of the sanctuary and how we are often inspired as we spend time in worship, only to forget that holy experience in the reality of our daily lives. We are to draw strength from the love of God we experience in the hour of worship, demonstrating it in our love of our neighbor during the remaining hours of the week. When people see Jesus' love living in us, they will be drawn to Him.

The **Rt. Rev. Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop of the Eastern Diocese**, led the morning session, an **interactive Bible Study on the first chapter of James' letter**. Bishop Paul gave us a homework assignment on Friday evening in preparation for this session, and there was plenty of thoughtful discussion as a result. He shared his audio visual and study sources with the group, encouraging them to finish this study on their own and perhaps start a similar study in their home parishes.

After our lunch break, **Deacon Tom Walsh** presented the **“Prayer of Faith,”** examining various types of prayer mentioned in James: Blessing and Adoration, and Prayers of Petition, Intercession, and Thanksgiving. James gave practical instruction on prayer to the early Christian community drawn from the Scriptures available to them at that time. He calls his readers to **pray with assurance** for what God has promised, and **pray with submission** when no promises have been made. Many circumstances call for prayer:

When one is suffering, “undergoing hardship or experiencing sadness,” he should cry out to God for deliverance or help to endure.

When one is in good spirits, he should sing praise to God.

When one is experiencing illness, he should call on the elders to pray and anoint him in the name of the Lord. In this Sacrament of Anointing, we unite our prayers with Jesus to overcome the forces of evil, sickness, suffering and sin in the world. He emphasized that a person’s sickness is not necessarily a consequence of sin, debunking a commonly held notion.

During this session, Deacon Tom asked if anyone would like to share a testimony of answered prayer, and several people did so. He concluded the session with a prayer of assurance, that God would grant personal revival to each individual, strengthening them to confidently share their faith with others and lead them to Christ.

After a short break, **Sherry Mack** helped us to put our faith into action by preparing **Prayer Blankets** for people in need. We divided into several small groups, and before beginning our work, the bishops blessed our hands for this ministry. We proceeded to cut, pin, and tie the edges of the blankets, praying for the recipients as we did so. Sherry directed us to the website for prayer shawl ministry which gives detailed instructions for making various types of prayer blankets, explaining the symbolism of colors and patterns used. She also provided “technical assistance” as we worked, emphasizing that perfection was not the goal, but that our love and prayers would benefit the recipients of our blankets. The finished products would be blessed at Sunday’s Mass. We all signed cards for those who would receive the blankets. Following the session, there was time for group members to share personal experiences of faith which carried them through difficult or challenging situations in their lives.

After a hearty dinner, we had more testimonies, and then we took time for **silent prayer** in the sanctuary. The peaceful atmosphere and soft candlelight quieted us and afforded an opportunity to reflect on the many topics presented earlier. To conclude the day, an **Evening Prayer and Commissioning Service** was led by Prime Bishop Mikovsky, with the assistance of Father Cyman. Candles, pins, and certificates were distributed to all participants, along with the charge to “put (our) faith into work and action in spreading the good news and bringing others to a knowledge of Jesus Christ”.

On Sunday, we gathered for **Morning Prayer**, led by Father Cyman, and **Holy Mass**, with Prime Bishop Mikovsky as celebrant and homilist of the liturgy for the Fourth Sunday of Easter. He focused on Jesus’ statement, “I AM the Good Shepherd,” one of seven “I AM” statements included in Holy Scripture. Although portrayed idyllically in art, the life of a shepherd in Biblical times was far from glamorous. He lived out in the field doing the vital work of caring for the sheep which were needed for religious sacrifice, but as an individual he was not highly regarded. With infrequent opportunities for bathing or personal care, he did not mingle much in society. When we say “The Lord is my Shepherd,” we acknowledge that “Jesus cares for us so much that He is willing to delve into our lives and get dirty.” Jesus told His followers, “I AM the gate”: At night, shepherds would lie on the ground across the opening of the sheep pen, a stone enclosure, to keep the sheep from wandering away. Sometimes several flocks and more than one shepherd would share the pen. In the morning, when it was time to lead sheep to pasture, the sheep would follow the voice only of their particular shepherd. **As Christians, we need to become familiar with the voice of Jesus and follow Him**, instead of the many other voices in the world (in the media, on our phones, and elsewhere) clamoring for our attention. “He is speaking all the time, if we choose to hear Him. We have a choice every moment, to listen to the voice of evil...or to listen to the voice of Jesus. Which voice do I hear? Which voice do I follow? Which voice do I serve?” Jesus calls us to share His message, His love, and His victory over sin and death; and to invite others to hear the voice of the Good Shepherd, the One who brings life, love, and healing to all who seek Him.

During the Mass, the youth of Holy Cross Parish offered the prayers of intercession. At the end of Mass, they sang “Our Symbol,” a song which describes the symbol of the PNCC and tells of God’s love for us.

After Mass, we enjoyed brunch in the parish hall with the parishioners of Holy Cross. Mission and Evangelism Commission Member **Ron DeLuca** spoke about his relationship with the chairman of this commission, **Father Raymond Drada**, who recently passed away after battling cancer. Father Ray was actively involved in many endeavors of our Church, and we keenly feel his absence. After sharing these thoughts, Ron presented his traditional “**wrap-up**” of the Workshop. One Scripture passage which made an impression on him was James’ admonition: “**Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry**” (James 1:19). Ron also took the Prime Bishop’s words to heart about living for Christ every hour of every day, not just for an hour on Sunday. He shared with us a song, “I Am a Friend of God” and finished his presentation with a call to “Go where Jesus wants you to go and do what He wants you to do.”

Prime Bishop Anthony gave his closing remarks, mentioning the challenge of putting this Workshop together and of the many hands needed to complete the tasks that typically were done by Father Ray. Prime Bishop echoed Ron’s appreciation for James 1:19. His “takeaway” from this Workshop is “Listen to Jesus. Be friends of God and of each other.” With this in mind, attending Church won’t be seen as merely an “obligation” but as a privilege. Prime Bishop remarked, “Every moment is a work...Who - or what - does it serve?” Prime Bishop thanked Father Cyman and Holy Cross Parish for the hospitality extended to us and presented them with a gift from the Mission and Evangelism Commission, a plaque with the word “FAITH” in the middle, surrounded by four Scripture passages on the subject. Father Cyman in return thanked the Commission for the privilege of hosting the Workshop and spoke about incorporating some of the ideas which were presented.

Bishop Mack issued an invitation to the 2018 Mission Workshop which will be held in the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese, most likely in Carnegie and Stowe Township, PA. Bishop Mack also shared his reminiscences of Father Ray and asked for prayers for Pennie Drada.

To conclude the Workshop, Bishop Nowicki prayed and gave everyone his blessing.

Much more happened in the individual conversations that took place: divine appointments, in which new friendships were forged and common experiences shared. Answers to prayer, ongoing needs, and words of encouragement were all a part of this gathering, and I pray that more PNC faithful would take the opportunity to experience the Body of Christ in this way. It doesn’t only happen at a national gathering, but it can be a part of our local experience when we are friends of God and friends of each other. “Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says” (James 1:22). May God draw near to us as we draw near to Him.

Eastern Diocese United Women's Societies for the Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament— 66th Convention Holy Trinity Cathedral Parish, Manchester, NH

The 66th Annual Convention of the United Women's Societies for the Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament was held on Saturday, May 20, 2017, hosted by the sisters of Holy Trinity Cathedral, Manchester, NH. Holy Mass, celebrating the Institution of the Polish National Catholic Church using the Hodurian Rite, was con-celebrated by the Right Rev. Paul Sobiechowski, diocesan bishop assisted by the Very Rev. Joseph Krusinski (Holy Trinity Parish, Plantsville, CT); the Rev. Andrzej Tenus (St. Casimir's Parish, Lowell, MA); and the Rev. Paul Dudek, (Holy Saviour Parish, Union City, CT). The sermon was preached by Bishop Sobiechowski. Readers were Diane Bielizna and JoAnn O'Connell. Organist, Karen Sobiechowski, led diocesan choir members in appropriate hymns.

Bishop Sobiechowski, pastor of Holy Trinity Cathedral, extended greetings of his parish and the local ANS Society. After a group picture, all present assembled in the parish center to partake of light refreshments.

President JoAnn Menzia introduced the theme of our convention which was chosen to coordinate with the program instituted by the 2014 General Synod entitled "A Year of Commitment" for stewardship and prayer. This year we concentrated on the Solemnity of the Institution of the Polish National Catholic Church.

The meeting was called to order at 11:47 am by President Menzia who asked Father Senior Krusinski to give the invocation. President Menzia then welcomed Bishop Sobiechowski, clergy, delegates and guests.

The mandate committee was approved on a motion by Linda Gonyea, seconded by Janice Dzialo.

Sally Watson gave the Mandate report. Present were 1 bishop, 3 priests, 12 executive board members, 13 delegates and 7 guests, for a total of 36 people representing 8 parishes.

Recording Secretary Janice Klimczak then conducted the Roll Call after which Bishop Sobiechowski administered the Oath of Office to delegates.

Minutes of the 65th Annual Convention, held in Lowell, MA May 21, 2016 had been sent out with the mandates and were accepted on a motion by Phyllis Dalton seconded by Marilyn Folcik and passed.

The treasurer's financial report was prepared by Sally Watson. The report of the financial secretary was prepared by Susan Locks.

Diane Hodgkins, auditor, reported that the financial books had been examined at the annual executive board meeting held in March and were found to be in order. A motion to accept all reports was made by Linda Gonyea, seconded by Arlene Strazzulla and passed.

President Menzia introduced the Rev. Andrzej Tenus, pastor of St. Casimir's Parish, Lowell, MA, who gave the keynote address entitled "Christian Stewardship". The presentation talked about how we can be good stewards and featured a beautiful power point presentation showing ways in which we can give of our time, talents, as well as treasures.

Those in attendance were asked to write down some of the ways they use their talent, time and treasures in their parishes and attach them to a foam board at the front of the auditorium.

After grace was offered by president JoAnn Menzia, the meeting adjourned for lunch at 12:45 pm. A delicious meal was served by the ladies of the parish.

The meeting resumed at 1:23 pm at which time President Menzia spoke of the activities the delegates and guests would enjoy. They included:

Hymns written by Bishop Hodur were introduced by Arlene Strazzulla, Marilyn Folcik and Janice Klimczak. Polish, English and phonetic pronunciations were made available. All in attendance were able to sing *Do Ciebie Przyszli*, *Do Głębi Duszy* and *Tyle Lat*, accompanied by Karen Sobiechowski on keyboard.

JoAnn Menzia gave helpful hints for praying which were followed by a demonstration by Phyllis Hunt with suggestions on how to make prayer pockets. These can be filled with favorite prayers one can take along in daily travels or as a gift when visiting sick and shut-ins. Samples were available for those in attendance to take home.

Carolyn Dickson, member and archivist of the Cathedral parish, gave an enlightening talk on the history of the cathedral after which she gave a tour of the beautifully renovated facilities.

All of these activities emphasized stewardship and commitment to Christ and His Church.

President JoAnn Menzia led us in prayers for our sisters who have passed away in the past year as well as for the health of those sisters who are ill.

JoAnn Menzia announced that the 2018 Convention will be hosted by Holy Trinity Parish, Plantsville, CT. The convention of 2019 will take place in Westfield, MA at St. Joseph's Parish.

The National ANS will hold a retreat in Erie, PA in October. More information will be forthcoming. Vice-president Marilyn Folcik informed the assembly that ANS medals are available for purchase at a cost of \$10 each.

President Menzia thanked all for their attendance as well as the host parish ANS sisters, Bishop Sobiechowski, Karen Sobiechowski, Father Andrew Tenus, our keynote speaker, clergy, executive board members, readers, kitchen workers, liturgical commission members, choir, and presenters.

Bishop Sobiechowski made closing remarks, reminding us of the following dates/activities: Diocesan Council meeting, June 3, Northampton, MA, 10 am; Ordination of Deacon Thomas Walsh, June 10, Union City, CT; Acolyte retreat, end of June, Woonsocket, RI; Scouting Camporee, July 7-8, Woonsocket, RI; Cathedral of the Pines, July 9, Rindge, NH; Youth Retreat, August 21-25, Camp Howe, Goshen, MA. Bishop also expressed his thanks to everyone for such a beautiful and inspiring convention.

Meeting adjourned at 3:12 pm with a prayer by Bishop Sobiechowski.

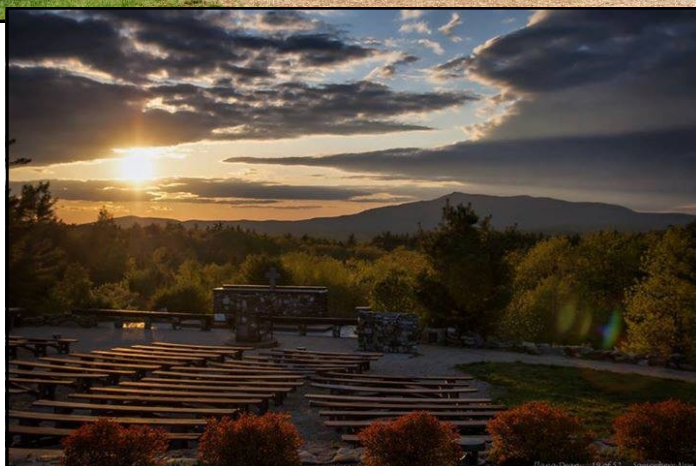
In case of inclement weather, the service (the Solemn Vespers) will be held in the nearby indoor facility.

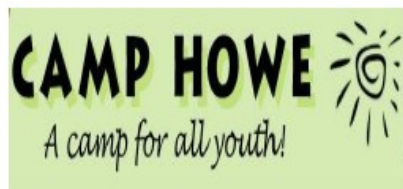

LETTER TO THE EDITOR...

Dear Readers of the Messenger-our Diocesan Newsletter!

As the Editor of The Messenger I have been receiving different materials for publication. A lot of the ED PNCC members are looking for the new ideas to help our parishes in their struggles.

They are dedicated members of their parishes and express concern for the future of our Polish National Catholic Church. The Author of this letter is one of them. I hope you will find this letter interesting and inspiring as it was for myself.

My thoughts inspired by praying to God:

Disintegration definition by Merriam-Webster: to lose unity or integrity by or as if by breaking into parts

Change definition by Merriam-Webster: to undergo a modification of, to replace with another

My name is Kelly Burek and I am currently a member of the St. Joseph's Church in Westfield, MA. I am a member of the PNCC. I have been involved in the School of Christian Living, the Scholarship coordinator, and the Mission and Outreach group at our parish in the past. I have been observing how the numbers in the parish have been decreasing over the years and heard many discussions on why this may be. As I sat quietly one evening thinking about my faith, this is what I thought. These are the ideas that came to me as I prayed to God and asked for guidance:

Disintegration: There seems to be disintegration all around us. Disintegration of the church, of religion, of society, of morality. Obviously, the PNCC is not the only religion seeing a decline in participation. There are so many factors involved in the changes occurring in our world today that one could not possibly place a blame on one thing. However, I look at the disintegration of what is still there, the people that are still going to church, the communication between the priest and his followers, the communication between one another between churches, the communication with the Bishops and I can't help but think if we cannot keep our own parishes from disintegrating, how do we expect to attract new members or followers? If we cannot speak freely to one another without being concerned about stepping on toes or being chastised, if our Priests and Bishops do not reach out to us, if we continue to struggle with communication, we will continue to disintegrate. Of course, there are positives in the World as well and we should learn by example. Take a look at the parishes that are thriving, that are growing and what steps they are taking to adjust to the changes around us while still teaching and living by the Word of God.

Change: What I have observed over time is people hate change. People love tradition and having things stay the way they are. Why are people so afraid of change? Why can't we see that without change, problems cannot be corrected or solved? Without change we cannot move forward. When God had Jesus come to us, was He not looking for change in the world? I truly believe if the PNCC cannot change, cannot modernize, cannot see that things are not set in stone and can be altered, that it will cease to exist. Change can be a good thing, a great thing but we will never know if we are not willing to try. We need to open up our hearts and minds to change. Listen to the people that are in your parishes. See what new ideas can be brought to light and try them and really give them a chance. Let's talk to our Priests and Bishops, let's talk to our Parish Committees, to our Parish Groups and Organizations, hopefully they will reach for change too. We are all one, we are all members of our parishes because we believe in the Word of God, we believe in the fundamentals of the PNCC, we are brothers and sisters.

I see people join the church and leave the church. I have seen people that have been in the PNCC all their lives and had truly loved the church that leave or worse yet, stop going to any church. What is wrong? We need to take a hard look at what is happening and how to change. I pray that we begin to communicate better with one another, with our Priests and Bishops. I pray that we are guided by God to make the changes that allow us to continue our service to God, that help us continue to live by God's word.

I also see people who have been members of the PNCC and the leaders of the PNCC time and time again try their hardest to make the Parish survive and grow. They love their Parish and do everything they can, volunteer their time and labor, donate, participate in community activities and charity drives and more. There are many good things in the World and in the PNCC. We need to harvest this positive energy somehow when striving to spread the Word of God and grow the PNCC.

GOD is LOVE and with this love we can make the world a better place.

Ewa Lipska



Born October 8, 1945, in Kraków. Ewa Lipska is one of the most important Polish poets of her generation. She studied painting at the Academy for Fine Arts in Krakow, and from 1970 to 1980 she worked as an editor at the Krakow publishing house Wydawnictwo Literackie. In the 1990s she

Twórczość Lipskiej została wyróżniona licznymi nagrodami literackimi, a jej książki zostały przetłumaczone na piętnaście języków, w tym na angielski, niemiecki, francuski, hiszpański, szwedzki i hebrajski.

Chociaż Lipska bywa traktowana jako część grupy "Nowa Fala" z lat 70-tych, sama dystansuje się od takich skojarzeń, woląc tworzyć samodzielnie. Z biegiem lat jej nieufność do języka z jej codziennego otoczenia, do języka masek i kłamstw, wzrosła. W odpowiedzi Lipska opracowała język przeciwny, który jest konfrontacyjny i często złowieszczy. Jej wiersze są klarowne i w kilku słowach z łagodną ironią wnoszą jej własną rzeczywistość. Zafascynowana ludzkimi zachowaniami obnaża fałszywe znaczenie słów, udowadniając, że wciąż jesteśmy tylko "Ludzkimi Debiutantami".

Mieszka i pracuje w Krakowie.

lived for seven years in Vienna, where she managed Polish Cultural Institute.

She debuted as a poet in 1967 with the collection *Wiersze* (Poems), and from then until 1978 she published four more collections, from *Drugi zbiór wierszy* (The Second Poetry Collection) up to *Piąty zbiór wierszy* (The Fifth Poetry Collection). She has now published more than twenty poetry collections and several anthologies.

Lipska's work has been awarded various literary prizes and her books have been translated into fifteen languages, including English, German, French, Spanish, Swedish and Hebrew.

Although Lipska is sometimes considered as part of the "New Wave" group of the 1970s, she distances herself from such associations, preferring to operate autonomously. Over the years, her mistrust of the language of her daily surroundings, for her a language of masks and lies, has grown. In response, Lipska has developed an inverted language, which is confrontational and frequently ominous. Her poems are lucid, and in few words, she puts forth her own reality with gentle irony. Fascinated by human behavior, she strips away the false meaning of words, proving that we're still merely "Human Beginners".

She lives and work in Kraków

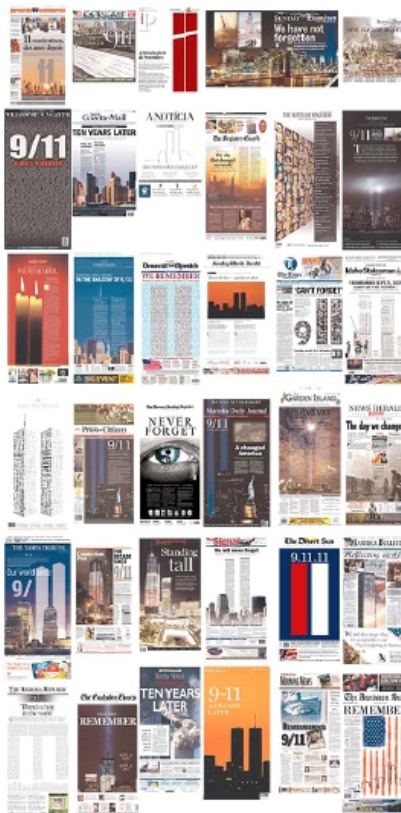
