

REJOICE IN YOUR LENTEN DISCIPLINES

"...with the return of that season marked out in a special way by the mystery of our redemption, and of the days that lead up to the paschal feast, we are summoned more urgently to prepare ourselves by a purification of spirit."

"The special note of the paschal feast is this: the whole

Church rejoices in the forgiveness of sins. It rejoices in the forgiveness not only of those who are then reborn in holy baptism but of those who are already numbered among God's adopted children."

Saint Leo the Great, Bishop of Rome, *Sermo 6 de Quadrgesima*, 1-2, PL. 54, 285-287, Ash Wednesday, Office of Readings.

As a fan of the Pittsburgh Steelers, it's not easy to write this, but I was impressed with the unity shown by New England fans when they won the Super Bowl. That energy and positive spirit exhibited in Boston during a rain and snow storm truly showed a united jubilant spirit. People of all groups joined as one, cheering on their team and expressing a oneness of jubilation.

I mention this because in the reading from the Daily Office cited above, a radically different vision of Lent is presented than one normally understood by Catholics. The common view is that Lent is a period of self-sacrifice, of personal penance, of a sharing in the pain and suffering of Jesus Christ that led to His crucifixion on Calvary Hill. It is neither pleasant nor desirable.

But Leo is suggesting something quite different. Leo is telling us that the Lenten season leads to a Paschal Feast of rejoicing for all the souls that have been reborn in Holy Baptism, for all the people who have recommitted to our Lord Jesus and His Church, through which His Kingdom is being established on this earth. The reading speaks of rejoicing in the forgiveness so freely given by God to all who turn from their sins. A little further in the same reading we hear: "...Men are made new by the rebirth of Baptism. Yet there is still required a daily renewal to repair the shortcomings of our mortal

nature, and whatever degree of progress has been made there is no one who should not be more advanced. All must therefore strive to ensure that on the day of redemption no one may be found in the sins of his former life." Going back to the Patriots analogy, we've heard that the clubhouse motto was and is: "keep focused and get the job done."

So Lent is more than just penance and abstinence. It is performing these disciplines in a jubilant spirit. Jesus Christ has already accomplished for us that which is required in His redemptive death on the Cross. We are then called in Lent to emulate His commitment of "keeping focused and getting the job done." Scripture tells us that "there is more joy in heaven over one sinner that repents than over ninety-nine righteous souls." So in emulating Christ we are called to rejoice with those who are turning from sin and turning toward Jesus.

And this attitude makes a lot of sense. After all, would you want to be a part of a Church whose members are always, joyless, with dour long faces, people who by their very demeanor drag others down with them? I think not. And so we must really think how we approach Lent. Is Penance to be viewed as a penalty or as a challenge? Is fasting to be considered an undesirable but necessary deprivation of self, or does it provide an opportunity to refocus our energy in more positive and productive efforts? When the Patriots began their season in training camp almost nine months ago, they had a goal set, but the approach they had towards the discipline and practice, their positive and joyful spirit, made all the difference in "getting the job done." This Lent, let us focus on getting the job done without getting distracted by the "It's so hard to give up what I'm giving up", "the penance I'm experiencing is so hard", "the additional church services are such a burden..."

Rather, be up for the challenges this year's Lent will present. And be a source of encouragement to others who are traveling down the same Lenten road. Be supportive of one another, and let the joy you experience as you support your brother and sister be seen by others. Commitment is an interesting state, because as you demonstrate commitment, others are drawn to that same commitment. Others will want to share your goals. And as they are gradually accomplished, then all those who are committed increase the joy and support they give one another, and others see that joy and commitment and want to be a part of it... and the Body of Christ grows.

If you want your parish to grow, put your heart and soul into Lent this year. Be that example and source of encouragement for others and be loud in your support of everyone making the same Lenten commitment. Only a few men in a Patriots uniform that "kept focused on getting the job done" were able to excite the greater part of New England. And they did this for a sport that is, in the greater realm of things, a passing thing. But twelve men (the Apostles) and St. Paul were able to excite many millions of people for a faith that was no passing fancy but rather that which was redemptive and eternal.

Don't we want millennials to get excited about the Church, the faith, the commitment both require? Then let's set the example by being joyful in our approach to Lent, joyful in our approach to penance, joyful in our approach to abstinence. Let us be joyful in all things to bring the joy of Christ into the hearts and souls of others.

I want to encourage all our Eastern Diocese family members to look up these Scripture citations and then apply them to your Lenten journey this year:

Proverbs 17:22; Romans 15:13; Romans 12:12; Psalm 28:7; James 5:13; John 14:27; John 16:22; 1 John 4:18. And here are two you need not look up: "...for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline." (2 Timothy 1:7); "For the kingdom of God is not food and drink but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit." (Romans 14:17).

FUTURE DIRECTION SUBCOMMITTEE OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL POLISH NATIONAL CATHOLIC CHURCH

Action Plan for 2017-AYEAR OF COMMITMENT

- **1. Greater Understanding of Church Solemnities:** In 2017 we will focus on the Solemnity of the Institution of the Polish National Catholic Church. This will be celebrated on March 12, 2017. A pamphlet will be prepared and distributed this will complete the series of pamphlets for our four special PNCC Solemnities. Also, an online presentation will be led by our Prime Bishop on the History of our PNCC and Bishop Francis Hodur. A community service project could be tied into this effort as well.
- 2. Two Days of Retreat: Lent and Advent Pick a day during the seasons of Lent (March 11 in Woonsocket) and Advent in 2017 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to local community.
- **3. Complete at least four community service projects**: One service project could be in conjunction with the Institution of the PNCC in March of 2017 and the others, selected by the local parish. It is important that these three projects be done in the local community of the parish so that these efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community. Various options include but are not limited to: Food Drives, serving a free meal for the community, providing a community breakfast/meal for First Responders for Veterans, prayer blanket ministry, clothing drive for the community, sponsoring a local family in need, responding to a particular need in the local community, etc.
- **4. Implementing the Commitment Component:** Develop and emphasize this theme through 2017. Please see the monthly Future Direction emails regarding this effort.

January – Our Spiritual Commitment to Christ and His Church
February – Our Financial Commitment and Stewardship
March – Commitment to our PNCC
April – Our Commitment as Easter People
May – A Commitment to guidance of the Holy Spirit
June – Sacred Vocations Month – A Commitment to Sacred Vocations
(Encourage our men to consider the ordained ministry)
July - Commitment to constant prayer
August – Commitment to our Youth
September – Our Commitment to Living a life of Love
October – Clergy Appreciation Month - Our Commitment to Faith and Family
November – Our Commitment to living Thankful lives

- **5. Stewardship component** to increase our financial commitment to our parishes, diocese and national church will be developed. A Pamphlet will be shared with all parishes. We then encourage parish committees to communicate this with the people and stress to them that stewardship is an integral part of a lived faith.
- **6. Implement Lay Ministry Program in PNCC:** Our national and diocesan Lay Ministry chaplains begin to implement this program across our PNCC that will enhance, encourage and strengthen the role of the laity within our PNCC.
- **7. Continuing Adult Education** from the diocesan synod surveys many are asking for more adult education. The parish can purchase copies of "An Abridged History of the PNCC" and this book be used for a discussion series for all parishioners as we focus on the Institution of the PNCC in 2017. Other educational opportunities added to this this can be: a parish Bible Study, the Alpha Program, a Lecture series on Church teachings, etc., led by the local pastor.
- **8. Utilize Social Media & PNCC Future Direction You Tube Channel:** Various spiritual messaging from our Prime Bishop and Bishops to be continued throughout the year. We encourage parishes to keep up to date their websites and Facebooks pages. Social Media is the mode of communication most used by our younger members.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE XV EASTERN DIOCESE SYNOD OCTOBER 28-29, 2016

The XV Synod of Eastern Diocese convened October 28 -29, 2016 in Bristol, CT hosted by Holy Trinity Plantsville Ct by the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. The Synod began with Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Parish celebrated by Bishop Sobiechowski and concelebrated by the clergy of the Eastern Diocese. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Bishop Hodur by celebrating the Hodurian mass and receiving two presentations dedicated to the life and ideals of Bishop Hodur: the Convo 2106 Video Presentation on the Life of Bishop Francis Hodur by the youth of the PNCC and the presentation on the life of Bishop Hodur by Prime Bishop Mikovsky and;

Whereas, we acknowledge the dedicated and ongoing work of the Future Direction Sub-Committee of the Supreme Council as they pursue the themes defined by the 14th General Synod: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations, and Community Involvement and Presence

Whereas, through the work of the Committee of Twenty and the small group discussions, the Synod body agreed to focus their attention on young adults between ages of 16 to 35 and to reach this audience through the following overarching goals:

- Increase awareness of our church through all social media outlets addressing
 - Our founding principles and beliefs
 - Bishop Hodur and his progressive ideas
 - The spiritual needs of these young adults
 - Provide clarity on our Catholic faith

An incredible response was received in Advent for our commitment to help our neighbors in need. Our Toy Drive was held in conjunction with our Neighborhood Watch group and the other neighborhood associations across the city. We were blessed to open our doors and welcome folks from across the city for an incredible wrapping party to help hundreds of children in need across the city. A huge Thank You to the wonderful officers of our Fall River Police Department for their efforts in distributing the toys to many families.



Our Advent Food Drive was another great success. This and the toy drive culminated at our annual Birthday Party for Jesus. Several of our parish youth were present for this celebration of our Lord's birth. It was great to see how many presents were given to Jesus for families in need.



Our parish youth and a couple of adults did a tremendous job in making God's Word come alive with our Living Nativity. Each year they find a way to outdo themselves. What a blessing they are for us all.



Unfortunately in Fall River our homeless population continues to grow. A recent headline showed 381 homeless in our city. Blessed Trinity made a commitment to that and our city by having a Warming Center each Monday during the entire winter season. We provide a light breakfast and then serve hot homemade soup and a warm meal for lunch. We have received donations of several new winter clothing items we have given out to our guests. A big thank you to all who donated winter coats, hats, gloves, socks, sweatshirts, sweatpants and thermals. Also for all the toiletries donated and numerous \$5 Dunkin Donut gifts cards. Many homeless folks have been served in the parish and this effort will continue through the reminder of this winter. This has been a wonderful experience living the Gospel in its most basic form. The gratitude and stories of our guests at the Warming Center put so many things into perspective as we live as disciples of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Fr. Sr. Rob have been working with the Mayor's Office and other local clergy to help these brothers and sisters in need. The parish also supplied food and clothing for an emergency Warming Center opened at Government Center for a very cold stretch in December.





Blessed Trinity has also committed to make s difference in Suicide awareness and prevention. The parish hosted a safeTALK Suicide Alertness Training orday - January 28th. This training helped those attending identify warning signs of suicide and how to direct one who is hurting so badly.

Our Saviour's Parish, Woonsocket, RI Parish Events:

Adopt - A - Family. For several years leading up to Christmas, the Ladies Sodality leads the parish in
participation in the Adopt-A–Family program, which is held in the city of Woonsocket. Over 900 families
annually apply for assistance through a local non-profit RI corporation for their children for Christmas.

This year, eight children from two families were sponsored. All donors remain anonymous to those who receive the gifts. This event is important to share with those in the community of Woonsocket the spirit of giving, and share with their children the love that it brings to us to make their Christmas special. 
Activities in the last three months:







"Writing poetry is perhaps nothing more than trying to play a straight man to that rambling, rambunctious, never-to-be-interrupted, always-on-a-roll, stand-up comic, the world."

Stanisław Barańczak urodził się 13 listopada 1946 r. w Poznaniu. Zdobył zarówno tytuł magistra jak i doktora w dziedzinie filologii na Uniwersytecie Adama Mickiewicza, gdzie poznał swą żonę Annę Bryłka. Barańczak rozpoczął publikować poezję w połowie lat 60-tych. W latach jego wykładów na Uniwersytecie A. Mickiewicza, rząd podniósł ceny podstawowych towarów, co spowodowało fale strajków i protestów Czerwiec 1976. Barańczak współzałożycielem Komitetu Obrony Robotników wspierających represjonowanych. Jego działalność polityczna kosztowała go pracę, a jego l z powstaniem Solidarności Barańczak odzyskał stanowisko wykładowcy, jednak juz

wcześniej Harvard zaproponował mu pracę na wydziale języków słowiańskich i literatury. Po trzech latach starań o wizę, Barańczak wyjechał w 1981 r. do Stanów Zjednoczonych. Wykładał na Uniwersytecie Harvarda do czasu, gdy stopniowe nasilenie choroby Parkinsona zmusiło go do przejścia na emeryturę pod koniec lat 90-tych.

Barańczak pisał o polityce Europy Wschodniej zarówno w prozie i poezji. Jego utwory zajmują się skrzyżowaniem literatury i polityki z wnikliwością i humorem. Wpływ na jego poezję miały też jego przekłady. Według Clare Cavanagh, byłej studentki z którą tłumaczył noblistkę Wisławę Szymborską, Barańczaka "tłumaczył wszystkich. Od metafizyków poprzez Boba Dylana do Ogdena Nasha." Barańczak przetłumaczył na polski większość dzieł Szekspira, Roberta Herricka, Johna Donne i Roberta Frosta, a także wiele piosenek i poezji humorystycznej.

Stanisław Barańczak zmarł 26 grudnia 2014 r. w swoim domu w Newton, MA, USA.

Stanisław Barańczak was born November 13, 1946 in Poznan, Poland. He earned both his MA and PhD in philology at Adam Mickiewicz University, where he also met his wife, Anna Brylka. Barańczak began publishing poetry in the mid-1960s. He was teaching at Mickiewicz University when the government raised the price of basic goods, a move that precipitated the June 1976 protests. Barańczak helped found the Workers Defense Committee in support of those injured or persecuted because of the riots. His political activities cost him his job, and his work was officially banned. When the political

movement Solidarity emerged, Barańczak regained his teaching position; however, Harvard had by then offered him a job in the department of Slavic languages and literature. After three years of being denied a visa, Barańczak moved to the United States in 1981. He taught at Harvard until his gradually worsening Parkinson's disease forced him to retire in the late 1990s.

Barańczak wrote about the politics of Eastern Europe in both prose and poetry. His works treated the intersection of literature and politics with insight and humor. Barańczak's work as a translator also influenced his poetry and poetics. According to Clare Cavanagh, a former student with whom he translated Nobel Prize—winner Wislawa Szymborska, Barańczak "translated everyone. The metaphysicals to Bob Dylan to Ogden Nash." Barańczak translated into Polish much of Shakespeare, Robert Herrick, John Donne, and Robert Frost as well as song lyrics and light verse.

Stanisław Barańczak died on December 26, 2014 at his home in Newton, MA.




well let's agree it's yes but this is not a condition forever, you know. our souls have thin walls, so let's just presume it for today, for a while, and don't say "yes" before you delete it;
