


LOOKING FORWARD TO THE SYNOD MEANS LOOKING BACK INTO A MIRROR

“All of us, gazing with unveiled face on the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, as from the Lord who is the Spirit.”

2 Corinthians 3:18, NAB

In a little more than three and a half months we will join Polish National Catholics from throughout the Church at the Our Lady of the Snows Retreat and Conference Center for Holy Synod. We will hear many reports, analyze a variety of proposals, elect a Prime Bishop to lead the Church for the next eight years, and discuss the Future Direction of this part of God’s Holy Church.

To be successful in Holy Synod it will be necessary to look into our souls to see how we reflect the image of God in our lives, in our parishes and in our Church.

At the recent Mission and Evangelism “Un-Workshop” in Carnegie, PA., the forty-five in attendance were bowled over by a little book entitled I Am a Church Member: Discovering the Attitude that Makes the Difference. Clergy and laity immediately purchased copies for the people in their parishes. Priests determined to have adult studies based on the book and some formed a series of sermons for their Sunday Masses based on the book. The book that was meant to be a preparation for the “Un-Workshop” became the driving force of a discussion group during the workshop. The members of that group have determined to meet again and present a report to Holy Synod of how the book has affected themselves and their parishes.

This was a complete surprise to the Mission and Evangelism Commission members who planned the “Un-Workshop,” but it was a pleasant and encouraging surprise.

I hope as we prepare for Holy Synod that every parish and every delegate of the Eastern Diocese will incorporate the book in their personal and spiritual preparations. The book, for all the power it showed at the Workshop, is very small and a very easy read: seventy-nine pages that can be read in less than an hour. *Cont. next page.*

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When you purchase twenty or more it's only five dollars a copy. I'll tell you how to get it. Let me share with you a portion of the Introduction with you:

“Another way of looking at it is generationally. About two-thirds of the Builder generation, those born before 1946, are Christians. But only 15 percent of the Millennials are Christians. The Millennials are the largest generation in America's history with almost eighty million members. They were born between 1980 and 2000. And we have all but lost that generation.

“We can blame it on the secular culture. And we often do.

“We can blame it on the godless politics of our nation. We do that as well.

“We can even blame it on the churches, the hypocritical members, and the uncaring pastors. Lots of Christians are doing that.

“But I am proposing that we who are church members need to look in the mirror. I am suggesting that congregations across America are weak because many of us church members have lost the biblical understanding of what it means to be a part of the body of Christ.

“We join our churches expecting others to serve us, to feed us, and to care for us.

“We don't like the hypocrites in the church, but we fail to see our own hypocrisies.

“God did not give us local churches to become country clubs where membership means we have privileges and perks.

“He placed us in churches to serve, to care for others, to pray for leaders, to learn, to teach, to give, and, in some cases, to die for the sake of the gospel.

“Many churches are weak because we have members who have turned the meaning of membership upside down. It's time to get it right. It's time to become a church member as God intended. It's time to give instead of being entitled....

“Join me on this journey of discovering or rediscovering the privilege and the joy of church membership... When this journey is over for you, two things will likely take place. First, you will likely have a new or renewed attitude about your church. You will learn the joy of being last instead of seeking to be first. Instead of being a whiner complaining about what's wrong with your church, you will be a unifier seeking what's best for your church.

“Second, your church will begin to change. It will become healthier because one of its members is healthier. And as the church gets healthier, it will have a greater impact on its community and the world.

“We may just discover that the reason our nation is in such bad shape is because our churches are so unhealthy. That lack of health is evident when nine out of ten churches are no longer reaching their communities.

“But that can change. With you. Beginning now.



Action Plan for PNCC Parishes in 2018

1. Greater Understanding of Church Solemnities: In 2018 we will focus on the Solemnity of the Humble Shepherds. Re-distribute the Humble Shepherds pamphlet. Perhaps a video presentation from our Prime Bishop on this Solemnity.

2. Two Days of Retreat: Lent and Advent Pick a day during the seasons of Lent and Advent in 2018 to spend in retreat and prayer. Maybe do this as a family activity. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament; For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to the local community.

3. Complete at least five community service projects: One service project could be in conjunction with the Solemnity of Humble Shepherds and the other, selected by the local parish. It is important that the five projects be done in the local community of the parish so that these efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community.

Various options include but are not limited to: A project to aid an assisted living facility, or other care facility i.e. nursing home, group home; volunteering for a special needs event; having a Mass or event for your local widow's group; aiding a family crisis center, Food Drives, serving a free meal for the community, providing a community breakfast/meal for First Responders – for Veterans; prayer blanket ministry, clothing drive for the community, sponsoring a local family in need, and/or responding to a particular need in the local community, etc.

4. Implementing the Year of the Family Component: Develop and emphasize this theme through 2018. Our purpose is to strengthen all families in living out our Christian faith, virtues and values during this special year. Please see the monthly Future Direction emails regarding this effort with concrete actions.

- **January – The example of the Holy Family** - A blessing of families after Holy Mass on Sunday January 7th and a prayer card for all to take home.
- **February – The importance of unconditional Love in the family.**
- **March – Celebration of Lent as a Family** - Encourage various ways that the family can pray and meditate together during this Sacred season. Have the family prepare an Easter basket together or Easter table together for the blessing of the Church on Holy Saturday.
- **April – Living out our Easter Joy in the family and the parish** – the importance of regular attendance at Holy Mass.
- **May – The love of our Blessed Mother** – her submission to the will of God as an example for all.
- **June – Sacred Vocations Month** – The Guardianship of St. Joseph – his submission to the will of God as an example to all - Family Vocations event and prayer.

- **July – The importance of Family Time/Vacation to the family.** Also remembering to continue the practice of daily prayer and worship during this time.
- **August – Importance of youth in the family** – raising children as an important ministry in the church – an event for the parish youth and prayers for parents and guardians.
- **September – Sharing our gifts and talents in the home and in the parish.** Create a fun exercise/game that lists one’s gifts and talents and then challenge them to share them at home as well as in the parish.
- **October – Clergy Appreciation Month** – On the Solemnity of the Christian Family. Have a sharing family event at the parish where troubles and joys are Shared; strengthening the bonds of our parish families.
- **November – Family Gratitude** – stress the importance of giving thanks and doing it as an individual and parish family. Thanksgiving Day prayer placemats. Helping those in need or alone on Thanksgiving.
- **December – Resources for the family to spiritually prepare for Christmas together,** a shared prayer when putting up their Christmas tree – small advent wreath for the home lit during the family meals. Recognizing and living the true meaning of Christmas as a family.

5. Implement Lay Ministry Program in PNCC: Our national and diocesan Lay Ministry chaplains begin this implement this program across our PNCC that will enhance, encourage and strengthen the role of the laity within our PNCC.

6. Move forward with PNCC Office of News & Media Relations: implement proposal accepted by the 2017 PNCC Supreme Council.

7. Create a PNCC Future Direction Facebook Page – by posting the monthly messages to this page and asking our members to share them, we hope more will be reached and encouraged to participate in these efforts.

8. Constant Prayer to prepare for our October 2018 General Synod – special intercessions for the month leading up to the synod – encourage a novena for this Holy Gathering.

Please keep this church-wide undertaking in your daily prayers – asking God to bless this work and allow it to bear fruit for the building of His Kingdom through our Holy Church.

As we begin this Holy season of Advent may we use this time to spiritual prepare ourselves to again celebrate the Incarnation and be ready for His return in glory. May we show our thankfulness to God not just in our words, but more importantly buy our actions. May God bless you and your family during this Advent season.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE XV EASTERN DIOCESE SYNOD

OCTOBER 28-29, 2016

The XV Synod of Eastern Diocese convened October 28 -29, 2016 in Bristol, CT hosted by Holy Trinity Plantsville Ct by the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. The Synod began with Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Parish celebrated by Bishop Sobiechowski and concelebrated by the clergy of the Eastern Diocese. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Bishop Hodur by celebrating the Hodurian mass and receiving two presentations dedicated to the life and ideals of Bishop Hodur: the Convo2016 Video Presentation on the Life of Bishop Francis Hodur by the youth of the PNCC and the presentation on the life of Bishop Hodur by Prime Bishop Mikovsky and;

Whereas, we acknowledge the dedicated and ongoing work of the Future Direction Sub-Committee of the Supreme Council as they pursue the themes defined by the 14th General Synod: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations, and Community Involvement and Presence

Whereas, through the work of the Committee of Twenty and the small group discussions, the Synod body agreed to focus their attention on young adults between ages of 16 to 35 and to reach this audience through the following overarching goals:

- Increase awareness of our church through all social media outlets addressing
 - Our founding principles and beliefs
 - Bishop Hodur and his progressive ideas
 - The spiritual needs of these young adults
 - Provide clarity on our Catholic faith

Holy Cross Parish celebrates its 100th Anniversary of Love and Service to God and our Neighbor

Holy Cross Parish in Central Falls, Rhode Island is celebrating their 100th Anniversary during 2018. The first Mass of the parish was held on February 17, 1918 by Rev. R.L. Zawistowski. A special Holy Mass of Thanksgiving and Centennial Banquet was held on Saturday, May 5, 2018.



Prior to this historic commemoration in the life of Holy Cross Parish, our Rhode Island State Senator, Elizabeth Crowley, invited our pastor, Fr. Sr. Rob Nemkovich, and parishioners to be her honored guests at the Rhode Island State House on the National Day of Prayer – May 3, 2018. This Year during Lent Our Saviour's Parish held 'Forty Days - Forty Items' project. On Ash Wednesday and on the first Sunday of Lent the trash bags, with the guideline, were distributed to the parishioners. The idea was to take one item (from their house that they no longer wear or need (not broken of course) and put it in the trash bag. They could also add clothes, soaps, tooth paste, deodorants, towels, wash clothes, sheets, blankets, sleeping bags, tents, air mattresses, men's clothes (shoes, new underwear and socks. At the end of the Lent they brought their bags to the church (Sunday following Easter). This year we collected 49 bags. The whole collection was brought to St. James Episcopal Church which distributes these items to the poor and needy in Woonsocket. *The Coat of Many Colors* Committee of St James said thank you to all who got involved in this project.

CELEBRATION OF POLISH CONSTITUTION DAY AND 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF POLAND'S INDEPENDENCE

Sponsored by the Polish Heritage Committee of Northampton and St. Valentine's Church

Polish Constitution Day was celebrated Thursday, **May 3, 2018 at 6:00 p.m.** with Holy Mass of remembrance at St. Valentine's Church, 127 King Street, Northampton. Following the Mass, at **6:45 p.m.**, in the Parish Hall, **Rev. Adam** made a presentation on the Polish Constitution and the 100th Anniversary of Poland's Independence.

The Polish Constitution of 1791 was the second such Constitution in the world, following that adopted by the United States. Poland reacted after being partitioned by its neighboring nations by adopting a Constitution allowing freedoms which the neighboring nations feared would spread and destabilize their autocratic rule so they continued to partition until Poland no longer existed until 1918.

The changes offered by the Constitution now included judicial, legislative and executive branches, protection of the peasants as they were now to be recognized as part of the nation, religious tolerance, and abolishing the *liberum veto* which tended to paralyze legislation.

This year marks the 100th Anniversary of when Poland regained its independence, November 11, 1918 after 123 years of partitions by Austria-Hungary, Germany and Russia. On this day, the Polish Military Organization's clandestine departments, demobilized soldiers and legionnaires disarmed the Germans in Warsaw and other Polish towns. The Regency Government appointed Józef Pilsudski as commander in chief over the Polish forces and 3 days later he was given complete civil control. He formed a new centralized government which on November 21 issued key measures including a manifesto of agricultural reforms. Pilsudski also brought in more favorable conditions for the workers and called parliamentary elections.

Thirty-five individuals attended this celebration and presentation. We thank Fr. Adam for the excellent PowerPoint presentation which made the information easy to understand. Coffee and cookies were served.

WHAT IS A PROTESTANT GUY LIKE ME DOING IN A CHURCH LIKE THIS?



There is not one drop of Polish blood in my veins or a single drop of papal Catholicism in my doctrine. My ancestral history goes back to England, Scotland, and Ireland, and my theological heritage is squarely rooted in the Reformation. However, on the first Sunday of Advent in 2017 I officially joined St. Valentine's Polish National Catholic Church in Northampton, Massachusetts.

The obvious question, of course, is why did I commit myself to a congregation whose cultural and ecclesiastical identity is so different than my own? As one friend put it, "Just when I thought your life couldn't get any more interesting!"

The reasons are rather straightforward:

1. I reside in Hatfield and wanted a church close to home for the sake of being able to regularly participate in its congregational life. Although I lean towards conservative Anglicanism, it simply does not exist anywhere in western Massachusetts. Consequently a local alternative had to be found, unless I was willing to drive 60 miles to the nearest Anglican parish. St. Valentine's became the only logical choice, especially since I have little affinity for contemporary evangelicalism and none whatsoever for progressive liberalism. Area churches within those traditions were not up for consideration.
2. Although I am Reformational, a few years ago I largely abandoned the competing "isms" of Protestantism and moved towards paleo-orthodoxy, which is something of a Protestant return to the pre-Schism accents of the early Church. Thus, I hold to the nonnegotiable tenets of biblical Christianity summarized by the Ecumenical Creeds. St. Valentine's likewise adheres to the Athanasian, Nicene, and Apostles' definitions of the Faith.

3. I value God-honoring liturgy. St. Valentine's is a liturgical church.
4. St. Valentine's confesses the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. So do I, although I prefer not to use either consubstantiation or transubstantiation to explain how that holy mystery actually works. Instead, I favor the position of Queen Elizabeth (1533 –1603) who wrote:
*Tw'as God the Word that spake it,
He took the Bread and brake it;
And what that Word did make it,
That I believe and take it.*
5. I demanded a church that understands Christ to be the exclusive Savior of fallen humanity, and rejects the idea that all religions lead to God. St. Valentine's properly regards religious pluralism as antithetical to the claims of Christ.

St. Valentine's is absolutely Catholic, but not Roman Catholic, and I am obviously neither. Nevertheless, by virtue our mutual subscription to the essential truths of genuine Christianity, the congregation and I can worship God together in unity. Plus the pastor and people put up with me . . . a pipe smoking eccentric who hunts, fishes, rides a motorcycle, and reads old books by dead theologians . . . brotherly love at its finest!

There is no ideal church, no ecclesiastical heaven on earth. Perfection must await the Second Coming. Nevertheless, if you are looking for a church characterized by a focus on following Christ and a belief in the core doctrines of "mere Christianity" (to borrow language from C. S. Lewis), I heartily recommend a visit to St. Valentine's.

Recently a PNCC priest said of our parent denomination, "The Polish National Catholic Church combines elements of Eastern Orthodoxy, Roman Catholicism, and Protestantism." I would quite heartily agree.

Maybe you are Catholic, perhaps Protestant, Orthodox, or even Anglican. Polish or not, there is a place at the Lord's table for you in St. Valentine's. You will always be welcomed here.

Bachand Hall

St. Casimir's looks for new service projects each year. One that seems to be our favorite is our collection of toiletries for the girls of Bachand Hall.

Bachand Hall is a residence run by the Sisters of Ottawa for girls who have aged out of foster care. They are very carefully vetted by social agencies before being placed with the good sisters. They are provided with safe shelter and food in a home like setting. The sisters also provide transportation to school/work for the girls until they are able to live independently.

When a girl arrives at Bachand Hall, she is given a basket with sheets, pillowcases, blankets and toiletries such as toothpaste, toothbrush, shampoo, conditioner, body wash, tissues. These items are also replaced as they are used up. To provide these things for a maximum of twelve girls is costly and that is where our project begins.

Our collection of toiletries spans about one month. This year, Sister Cecile, house mother of Bachand Hall, informed us that 479 items had been donated by our small group. Cash donations would be used for gifts during the holidays. She was grateful for the generosity of our parish.


The Day began at Blessed Trinity Parish in Fall River, Massachusetts with Holy Mass of the Day celebrated by Fr.

Polish National Catholic Church
Eighteenth Annual Mission & Evangelism Workshop
“The UNWorkshop:You Will Find Me”

Hosted by All Saints Parish, Carnegie, Pennsylvania

April 27-29, 2018

Polish National Catholic clergy and faithful from four dioceses gathered recently in **Carnegie, Pennsylvania**, to participate in the PNCC’s **Eighteenth Annual Mission Workshop**. All received a warm welcome from the host pastor, **Very Rev. Richard Seiler, Jr.** and the **parishioners of All Saints Parish**. The **Rt. Rev. Paul Sobiechowski**, chair of the PNCC National Mission and Evangelism Commission, and the Prime Bishop, **Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky**, explained that this year’s theme, **“The UNWorkshop: You Will Find Me,”** represents a different approach. Instead of relying on Commission members to develop a program, UNWorkshop participants set the agenda. The ideas generated will help to determine the direction and work of PNCC Mission and Evangelism for the next few years. In advance of the UNWorkshop, those who registered received a book entitled I Am a Church Member, by Thom Rainer. The ideas promoted in this short but inspiring book were meant to be food for thought in the discussions for this weekend.

Rt. Rev. John Mack engaged the participants in several icebreakers, which helped Workshop “veterans” and “newbies” to get better acquainted. After dinner, **Deacon David Gaydos** gave a power point presentation on **Sacred Vocations**, asking the question, “Why me, Lord?”. Deacon David explained the different responsibilities of and requirements for ordination to the diaconate and the priesthood.: **“Every bishop was a priest, every priest was a deacon, and every deacon was a man willing to answer the call of Christ.”** Doubts and concerns keep some men from doing so. Based on his conversations with clergy and their wives, Deacon David gave a realistic view of life in the ministry, its blessings and challenges, without “sugarcoating” it. He emphasized the desperate need for clergy and urged all to pray and encourage the young adults in our lives to consider sacred vocations.

Rt. Rev. Stanley Bilinski explained the rationale for choosing the UNWorkshop as this year’s theme. Ideas presented in previous workshops were sometimes implemented but not on a large scale. By inviting input from participants, the Commission gains a better understanding of what is needed for Polish National Catholics to evangelize in their local areas. Bishop Stan explained that **Dr. Shirley Mietlicki-Floyd** was instrumental in developing the sessions for this UNWorkshop and was to be the key facilitator this weekend but was unable to attend for medical reasons. However, Dr. Mietlicki-Floyd will receive the materials generated from this body and will compile an executive summary of the ideas presented this weekend.

The day’s activities closed with **Evening Prayer and Penitential Devotions** in the newly renovated sanctuary of All Saints PNCC, which will celebrate its 100th anniversary this year.

We reconvened on Saturday at 8:45 AM with **Morning Prayer**. In Session One, Bishop Stan gave instructions for the day’s work, divided us into four groups and asked us to consider key questions and discuss our responses:

- #1 - What are the **joys** you experience as a member of your parish? Of the PNCC?
- #2 - At the same time, what are the things that **concern** you most about your parish? Our church?
- #3 - What do you see as (at least) two significant **challenges** facing our church now and in the future?

Each group recorded its responses on large Post-It notes. These were shared during Session Two with all of the participants, and we began to see some common themes emerge.

Next on the agenda, we heard from **Laura Vincenti**, Executive Director of **Family Promise** of Southwestern Pennsylvania, an organization which began as the “Interfaith Hospitality Network,” caring for homeless children and families for over 20 years. Laura shared some statistics which help explain the reasons for homelessness. Lack of affordable housing, a long wait for section 8 housing (three years in some cases), wages that are below the “housing wage” for a two-bedroom apartment (\$15.46/ hour), the low percentage (25%) of qualifying families who actually receive housing assistance, were just a few. Family Promise provides services 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year. Their guests receive evening meals and overnight accommodations from local churches and spend daytime hours in a center. **All Saints in Carnegie has served as a host parish** for Family Promise since 2014, welcoming overnight guests for a week at a time to their auditorium, approximately six times a year. **Karen Seiler** and a few other volunteers shared their experiences: the concerns they had at the beginning, the offers of help from unexpected sources in surprising ways, and the many blessings the volunteers receive by taking part in this ministry. Ms. Vincenti answered questions and informed us that Family Promise exists in a number of communities. She mentioned that there are many ways to be involved, not only by hosting guests but by providing other types of assistance. We had the opportunity to do so, and Bishop Paul on behalf of the Workshop participants presented Ms. Vincenti with a check for \$500 to help support the important work of this organization.

While participants had lunch, the responses from each group were summarized and major themes were identified. For Session Three, we formed new groups to explore these themes: **Discipleship, Stewardship, Vocations, and Identity**. Through brainstorming we generated ideas, reviewed and refined our lists, and determined which idea was most important/doable/realistic to implement. Group members decided what to do, how to do it, and what resources would be needed. We established a timeline and set criteria to determine achievement of the goal and a plan for communicating our results. This session was lengthy and completed in two parts, with a mid-afternoon break for a session on **Social Media and Digital Marketing**.

Hannah Bilinski shared the do’s and don’ts of developing our church’s digital presence. “We shouldn’t be marketing chaos; we need a streamlined plan” if we expect to successfully promote the PNCC “brand”. She displayed some examples of websites from several PNC parishes and commented on them. One thing lacking in many cases was a recognizable “brand.” Something as simple as including the symbol of the PNCC would be a way of clearly showing who we are. Hannah talked about the importance of teamwork, clearly defined goals, frequency of communication, understanding various social media platforms and using them correctly, the 40/60 rule (brand and other content), engagement, and analytics required for successful marketing. Hannah patiently answered our questions and gave practical suggestions to help us become more engaged in the digital world.

After completing their work, the four groups shared their action plans and gave reasons why their particular emphasis was most important. We began to see the interconnectedness of the themes, and how the work of one would support the others. Two of the groups included the proposal to study Thom Rainer’s book on a larger scale. (Since the Workshop, a number of PNC parishes and groups have taken up this challenge.)

We took a break for dinner and reconvened for the final session to prioritize the themes for the Commission to address.

To conclude the day, participants gathered in the sanctuary for an **Evening Prayer and Commissioning Service**, led by Prime Bishop Mikovsky, assisted by Bishop Sobiechowski and Father Senior Seiler. All participants received a candle, commemorative pin and certificate for the work completed during the weekend.

On Sunday morning, participants joined with All Saints Parishioners for **Morning Prayer**, led by Father Senior Seiler, and **Holy Mass**, concelebrated by the bishops. Prime Bishop Anthony was the homilist, and the Word of God had much to teach us on the Fifth Sunday of Easter. In John's Gospel, we hear that God the Father is the Vinegrower, Jesus is the Vine, and we are the branches. A healthy vine needs to be pruned regularly in order to produce the best fruit. An untended vine produces fruit which is diminished in size and quality. Likewise, we must allow the Father to "prune" us, removing that which is harmful from our lives as we regularly confess our sins to Him. As branches draw life from the vine, so we draw our sustenance from Jesus, in His Word and in the Sacraments. We learn from John's First Letter that "[God's] commandment is this: we should **believe** in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ..." The word "believe" means much more than "mental assent". When this particular Greek word is used, it indicates a life which demonstrates total loyalty and dedication to Jesus Christ. In Prime Bishop's words, "This is what God requires of us: a faith in Jesus Christ, crucified but living again, in heaven and in us. If He abides in us, we will produce much good fruit, in loving deeds of service to others." At the conclusion of Mass, Bishop Paul presented a gift for the parish to Father Senior Seiler, with gratitude for their gracious hospitality to the Workshop participants.

At brunch following the Mass, parishioners and guests enjoyed a time of fellowship, and Prime Bishop Anthony gave his closing remarks. Bishop Paul invited everyone to come to the Eastern Diocese in 2019 for the next Workshop (location to be determined), and Bishop Bernard Nowicki gave the benediction to dismiss us. For this writer, a "veteran" of many workshops, I found the UNWorkshop to be particularly meaningful. The number of first-time attendees was encouraging, the faith and enthusiasm of the participants was refreshing, and the plans of action which resulted from our discussions gave me hope that, "with God, all things are possible." May we continue to draw life and find joy in being part of the Body of Christ, and may we rely on the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we face present and future challenges. May God be glorified in us, His Church.

The basket raffle brought in \$480 As has been the custom, half the proceeds were given to the Plantsville ANS to donate to a charity of their choice.

President Menzia thanked all for their attendance as well as the host parish ANS sisters, Bishop Sobiechowski, Karen Sobiechowski, Victoria Triano, our keynote speaker, clergy, executive board members, readers, kitchen workers, liturgical commission members, and choir.

Bishop Sobiechowski made closing remarks and Father Koerber spoke of the Camporee involving Boy/Girl Scouts. Bishop also expressed his thanks to everyone for such a beautiful and inspiring convention.

Meeting adjourned at 3:30 pm with a prayer by Father Lukaszewicz and benediction pronounced by Bishop Sobiechowski.



W latach 1987-1990 mieszkał w Berlinie Zachodnim, gdzie współpracował z sekcjami polskimi BBC oraz Deutsche Welle oraz czasopismami emigracyjnymi. Od przyjazdu na stałe do kraju w roku 2003 wykładowca Uniwersytetu Szczecińskiego, Częstochowskiej WSP, Uniwersytetu Warszawskiego. Redaktor pism „Nowaja Polska” oraz „Przegląd Polityczny”. Laureat Nagrody Kościelskich (1986), nagrody literackiej „Kultury” (1999) i Srebrnego Medalu „Zasłużony Kulturze - Gloria Artis”(2009). Członek Stowarzyszenia Pracowników, Współpracowników i Przyjaciół Rozgłośni Polskiej Radia Wolna Europa Imienia Jana Nowaka-Jeziorańskiego.

Leszek Szaruga, actually Alexander Wirpsza (born February 28, 1946 in Krakow) - Polish poet, prose writer,

translator of German and Russian poetry, university lecturer - literary historian, literary critic.

He is the son of Witold Wirpsza and Maria Kurecka. In the 1970s and 1980s he was the editor of the underground newspapers (anticommunist), such as "Puls", "Wezwanie". In the years 1979-1989 he cooperated with the Polish section of Radio Free Europe (under the pseudonyms: Jan Krajnik, Krzysztof Powoski). From 1979 he cooperated with Kultura. At the end of the magazine's existence he was the head of the poetry department. In the years 1987-1990 he lived in West Berlin, where he cooperated with the Polish sections of the BBC and Deutsche Welle as well as with emigration periodicals. After return to the country in 2003, a lecturer at the University of Szczecin, Częstochowa WSP, and the University of Warsaw. Editor of the "Nowaja Polska" and "Przegląd Polityczny" magazines. Laureate of the Kościelski Prize (1986), the literary prize of Kultura (1999) and Silver Medal "Merited to Culture - Gloria Artis" (2009). Member of the Association of Workers, Co-workers and Friends of the Polish Radio Free Europe Named after Jan Nowak-Jeziorański.

 Death. They have known it since childhood.


