# **Increased Beneficiary Pay**

In a December 11, 2023 Executive Board meeting our treasurer, Dr. Carl F. Hill, Sr., recommended an increase in our beneficiary pay from \$1000.00 to \$2000.00 based on economical changes and its importance to our sustainability in the 21st century. The Executive Board, after a feasibility review, approved the recommendation be brought before the general assembly. On January 23, 2024 during the general assembly the motion was carried.

This is the first increase since January 2012 under the leadership of former President Ida B. Sullivan who presided from 1997-2012.

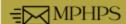

# By-Laws updates from the Vice President

Motivated by a desire to better serve the Mount Pleasant Home Protection Society and our community, our Bylaws Committee proposed amendments to our bylaws, which were subsequently adopted by our membership. On January 27, 2024, the membership voted to create the officer position of Assistant Warden (4.8), specify a financial contribution for all members of twenty (\$25) dollars for annual day (7.3.3) and increase the beneficiary payment to two thousand (\$2,000) dollars upon the death of any member who has maintained their membership for at least twenty-four months (9.1). The membership also approved amendments requiring the Society's President to be bonded for their duties to the Society (4.2, 10.4) and for the Society's financial records to be audited annually by a certified Public Accountant (10.3). On May 18, 2024, themembership voted to require the Treasurer to also be bonded for their duties to the Society (4.5, 10.4).

### ARE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE?

Registering to vote in Alabama is not only a civic duty but also an essential way to ensure that your voice is heard in shaping the future of your community, state, and country. Voting allows you to have a say in critical issues such as education, healthcare, and local governance. Alabama, like all states, has voter registration deadlines to ensure that all eligible citizens have time to register and participate in elections. It's important to stay informed about these deadlines so you don't miss the opportunity to vote.

In Alabama, you can register to vote online, by mail, or in person. The general deadlines are as follows:

- Online or in-person registration: You must register at least 15 days before the election.
- By mail: Your registration must be postmarked at least 15 days before the election.

Make sure to check your registration status and confirm your eligibility ahead of these deadlines to avoid any complications on Election Day. Registering to vote is a small step with a significant impact—take it today to ensure your voice is heard in Alabama's future.

- established the Robert Kirk Memorial Scholarship received grant funding through the Black Belt Foundation

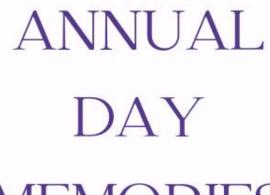












































# A Trip Down Memory Lane

# Pineapple Upside Down Cake

PREP TIME: COOKING TIME: SERVES: 10 MIN 30 MIN











### Ingredients

1/2 c. butter

1 c light brown sugar

18oz. can of sliced pineapple

2 thsp lg whole pecans

1 c sifted cake flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/8 tsp salt

3 eggs separated

1 c granulated sugar

5 tbsp pineapple juice

### Directions

- 1. Melt butter in lg baking pan.
- Spread brown sugar evenly in pan.
- 3. Arrange pineapple slices on sugar, filling in spaces with pecans.
- 4. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together.
- In a bowl mix cake.
- Beat egg yolks until light, adding sugar gradually.
- Add pineapple juice and sifted flour.
- 8. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites.
- 9. Pour batter over pineapple slices.
- 10. Bake in oven at 350 for 30-35 minutes.

11. Cool 5-7 minute.

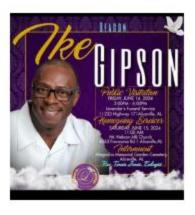

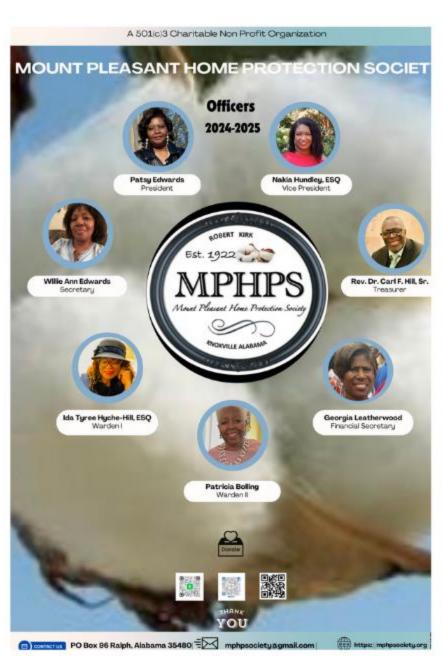

### **BBCF Grant Award**

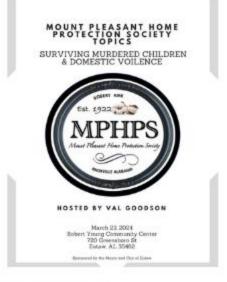

In 2024, an estimated 310,720 women and 2,800 men will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer. Breast cancer is a type of cancer that starts in either one or both breast. Cancer starts when cells begin to grow out of control. It's important to understand that most breast lumps are benign and not cancerous (malignant). Non-cancer breast tumors are abnormal growths that do not spread outside of the breast. They are not life threatening. Some types of benign breast lumps can increase a woman's risk of getting breast cancer.

Breast cancer can develop in any part of the breast: glands, milk ducts, nipple, fat and connective tissue or blood vessels and lymph vessels and other tissues. Any breast lump or change needs to be checked by a health care professional to find out if it is benign or malignant (cancer) and if it might affect your future cancer risk.

Breast cancer can spread when cancer cells get into the blood or lymph system and then are carried to other parts of the body. The lymph system is part of the immune system and runs throughout the body like blood vessels. The lymph system consists of nodes; whereas, the blood vessel have vein, arteries and capillaries. If cancer cells have spread to your lymph nodes, there is a higher chance that the cells could have traveled through the lymph system and spread (metastasized) to other parts of your body.

There are many different types of breast cancer. They are determined by the specific kind of cells in the breast that are affected. Most breast cancers are carcinomas. Breast cancers are also classified by the type of proteins or genes each cancer might make. After a biopsy is done, breast cancer cells are tested for proteins called estrogen receptors and progesterone receptors, and the HER2 gene. The tumor cells are also closely looked at in the lab to find out what grade it is. The specific proteins found and the tumor grade can help decide the stage of the cancer and treatment options.

Items that may increase chances of getting breast cancer are: drinking alcohol, being overweight or obese, not having children, lack of regular physical activity, taking birth control hormones such as pills, shots, implants, intrauterine devices, skin patches and vaginal rings; menopausal hormone therapy, and breast implants.

There are several treatment options for breast cancer depending on your type, stage and location of the disease. If you are high risk for breast cancer, there are two drugs on the market that may lower your risk for developing cancer by 40%. These drugs are tamoxifen and raloxifene, have side effect such as developing blood clots, cancer of the uterus, and onset of menopause symptoms.

# **Breast Cancer Awareness**

normally look and feel so that you are aware of changes. Alert your healthcare professional if you notice any <u>changes</u> inyour breasts, such as a new lump, sore spot, changes in the appearance of the skin, or nipple discharge. <u>Mammography</u> can usually detect <u>tumors</u> before they can be felt, so screening is key for early detection.

How Should A Breast Self-Exam Be Performed?

There are three steps necessary to perform a thorough breast self-exam. Each of these steps should be completed each time you perform a breast self-exam.

- 1) In the Shower With the pads/flats of your 3 middle fingers, check the entire breast and armpit area, pressing down with light, medium, and firm pressure. Check both breasts each month, feeling for any new lumps, thickenings, hardened knots, or any other breast changes.
- 2) In Front of a Mirror With your arms at your sides, visually inspect your breasts, looking for any changes in the contour or shape of the breasts, any dimpling, swelling, or other skin irregularities on or around the breasts, or any changes in the nipples. Next, rest your palms on your hips and press firmly to flex your chest muscles. Look for any dimpling, puckering, or other changes, particularly on one side. Note that the left and right breasts will not exactly match—few women's breasts are perfectly symmetrical.
- 3) Lying Down When lying down, the breast tissue spreads out evenly along the chest wall. Place a pillow under your right shoulder and put your right arm behind your head. Using your left hand, move the pads of your 3 middle fingers around your right breast, covering the entire breast area and armpit. Use light, medium, and firm pressure to feel for any new lumps, thickenings, hardened knots, or any other breast changes. Also squeeze the nipple to check for discharge. Repeat these steps for your left breast.

But there is hope. According to the American Cancer Society, when breast cancer is detected early, and is in the localized stage, the 5-year relative survival rate is 99%.. Advances in early detection and treatment methods have significantly increased breast cancer survival rates in recent years, and there are currently over 4 million breast cancer survivors in the United States.
